

# Young gun

British National Champion, European Champion ...and only 19 years old.

Linedancer went to visit a Merseyside lad who means business.

Alan Clarke's front room carpet is looking the worse for wear. The many hours spent drilling dance routines to perfection have obviously taken their toll. Last August, Alan won the ABC Division 3 National Championship and the corresponding European title in the space of just two days. The carpeting takes the punishment, Alan takes the trophies and as far as the Clarke family are concerned there's no one more proud.

Moreton, where Alan lives on the Wirral side of the River Mersey, seems an unlikely place for one of British line dancing's youngest success stories. On the winding housing estate a couple of kids knock about a football, while over the way a golf links runs along the promenade.

You wouldn't exactly say there was much of a "Country" feel. But then appearances can be deceptive. Country music and line dancing have become something of a family tradition.

"My Dad's listened to country music all his life", explains Alan, "and so have I. I started line dancing three years ago. Before then I went to a country music club for two years but never danced...it looked too hard. But when I actually tried it wasn't so difficult after all."

Since those tentative beginnings, Alan has gained international recognition and boasts two other national trophies alongside his British and European titles.

"At first I just went once a week like everyone else and then I began going to more classes. Naturally, when I was asked to enter a competition I

started practising and practising. Doing a competition is the biggest buzz you can get!"

Fate may have led Alan to line dancing but old fashioned hard graft achieved the success. A country music DJ at the Cammell Laird's club in Rock Ferry, ( with a BA in Law, believe it or not) Alan Clarke senior is a constant source of advice and encouragement. "If Torvill and Dean can do it on ice then you can do it on stage", is his motto.

The two are a kind of double of act: father providing the inspiration, son producing the goods. It's an effective combination. Nowadays Alan teaches and between his hectic schedule, practises at his father's club.

Rewards and acclaim may be the light at the end of the tunnel but it's a hard and stressful job to get there.

"You train for twelve months and then you've got three minutes to get it right!", says Alan junior. "You're on the floor,

everybody's watching, and when the judges take down your number and mark your appearance before the dance starts, it's dead silent. That's the frightening part!"

The National Championship in Blackpool last August was Alan's first line dancing competition. In a rags to riches-style challenge, Alan had to win the national event in order to qualify for the European contest just two days later.

"I was thrown in at the deep end to put it mildly. For the European event I was the only British entry in the whole thing. I hadn't seen any of the dancers before. They all walked in dressed in black, uniformed and smart. And they'd had more time to practise!" It was a tall order to win but it seems Alan's

philosophical, nothing-to-lose attitude proved decisive.

"You've got the whole day to wait before they announce the results. Eventually, third was called...then second was called...and I was sat there thinking, 'I've either come nowhere or I've won it!'...When they said I had come first I did a silly little jig, and when the news came through that my mate, Rob Fowler, had won the higher division as well, we both did a little jig!" Line dancing in the UK is taking off.

As well as challenging their European rivals Alan and company have the Americans firmly in their sights.


"At first the Americans used to come over and whitewash everything" says, Alan junior, "but now we're catching them up.



# "...three minutes to get it right..."

"It's mainly down to the arrival of Country Music Television on satellite. We can get their music now as fast as they can, and we get the dances just as fast as well. Before we had to wait maybe three or four years."

Alan and Rob are currently making a video for CMT, while only two weeks ago they performed a demonstration for the BBC's "Out and About" programme. The dance school they



run, "Houston Hustlers", teaches five days a week at sport centres across Liverpool, while the pair also run classes up in Harrogate and Blackpool. It's a hectic livelihood that leaves little time for sleep let alone girlfriends and nights out with the boys. But most of all they enjoy it!

For all their trophies and competitions they remain true to what is most important - that line dancing should be open to everyone and that it's fun!!

"It's not like going to work. I get just as much enjoyment teaching as they do dancing...It's great that we're getting more teenagers involved...In Liverpool, it's taken off like a craze!"

A great fan of the Reds, Alan had to miss most of the FA Cup final to find time to be interviewed. As it turned out he didn't miss much, but it was a sign of his commitment.

Mother, father and three sisters, Alan has the whole family's support. It's become a team effort. Even his eight month old little brother is a "line dancer in the making."

One day, when there's a world title to go for, there'll be the Clarke family waiting in line...

# Heaven help the Americans!.....

#### The Politics of Line Dancing

At present there is only one body in this country that holds a European competition. This is the ABC or All British Council. On the other hand, several organisations hold rival national competitions, each vying for the title of British champ.

It's a situation not greatly unlike the egotistical wrangling of international boxing. Meanwhile Alan, and other dancers like him, are faced with the merry-go-round of trying to win as many of the various titles on offer.

As well as his ABC crown, Alan is UCWDC (United Country and Western Dance Council ) Division 4 Shuffle Champion, and Division 2 British Champion of the smaller and more recent British Western Dance Association. Phew!!! It's a hard business keeping track.

"The ABC and the UCWDC are at the present minute fighting it out like cat and dog, putting different events on at the same time. It's a pity because they're only shooting themselves in the foot. They're all national titles in their own right, and if they'd stop bickering and split the events properly, all the trophies would have more prestige."

Mature sentiments indeed but Alan has to make the best of a bad situation and stick to the job in hand. Promotion to Division 2 alongside arch rival and best friend, Rob Fowler, is the aim this year, as well as winning the European Championships once again down in Dorset in July.

The fact that there exists no division I speaks volumes about the widespread confusion. As dancers make the grade higher divisions are created but presently there aren't quite the numbers to launch a top flight.

And what about the judges? "They're really quite good", is Alan's tactful and professionally astute reply.



At last, a compilation CD of recent/current hits that are ideal for various line dances but are perfectly suitable for partner and couple dancing as well. A twenty track CD compilation, **TOE THE LINE** on MCA is a must for any DJ or dance instructor collection. You may well already have the originals on twenty different CD's but this very effective collection makes life a whole lot easier! It'll you keep you dancing for well over an hour!

Classic numbers to get you groovin' include: Steve Earle's Copperhead Road, George Strait's Adalida, Trouble by Mark Chesnutt, and the deliriously popular Watermelon Crawl by Tracy Byrd. All the same, quite why it's necessary to create club or dance remixes of good quality country music is beyond me. I remember good pop music getting the same treatment in the eighties and it promptly died. We have now established country music in it's own right - let's not now convert it to disco! There is a slogan we used to wear on our tour jackets that read "Keep it Country" - now let's change it slightly to say "Keep our music real country"!

Paul Overstreet's album, **TIME** proves that he is just such a "real country" artist - one of the ultimate country singer songwriters in my opinion. He has a brilliant voice and the music shows excellent arrangement and production. There are very few acts that appear live on stage at a dance venue where the dancers actually stop and listen. This guy is one of them. If you do feel the urge to boogie...here are some of the tracks to go for, along with their beats-per-minute.

# Redneck, Rhythm Blues..... from the "Borderline" CD by Brooks & Dunn

ith 12 million album sales and over 20 major industry awards to their name, Brooks & Dunn have become one of country music's most popular acts. Not bad in just five years.

Among the top 5 highest grossing live bands on the country scene the platinum-studded success story looks set to continue. "Borderline", their fourth and newest album, is a combination of both vintage "Brooks & Dunn" and a taste of something different.

"It's a little bit of a left turn for us...I felt like it was time for us to kind of veer off the most travelled path", remarks Ronnie Dunn, recipient of "Billboard's" 1995 "Songwriter of the Year" award.

Dunn's range and ability as a singer have rarely been better showcased than on the album's lead-off single, "My Maria". An impressive remake of the near-forgotten BW Stevenson hit, the vocals come fresh and hard hitting.

"White Line Cassanova" and "One heartache at a Time", provide ample flashes of the duo's "classic" style among a fistful of new originals. "Brooks & Dunn"

wrote or co-wrote eight of the eleven songs on "Borderline", including "A Man This Lonely", "Why Should I Say Goodbye", and the irresistibly hooky, "Mama Don't Get Dressed up for Nothing."

"I think Ronnie and I are a little bit more settled with each other this time around. We're not so hesistant about expressing some of the things a little bit more below the surface."

So says Kix Brooks, a Louisiana native whose previous smash hits "Lost and Found" and "You're Gonna Miss Me When I'm Gone", betray a cunning sense for chart success.

The lilting "I am That Man" (written by Terry McBride and Marty Powell) and Buddy Miller's "My Love Will Follow You" are a refreshing complement of outside influences; soulful ballads combined with the band's own creative muses that lend "Borderline" it's distinct appeal.

Intense perfectionism and musical originality in the studio have nevertheless always been counterbalanced by an irrepressibly emphatic stage show. It's become the personal

"While you're out there, you feel no pain", says Kix, grinning. "You're oblivious to everything but the music. I took a couple of pretty good spills off the stage and got stitched up twice last year. But I never even know I'm hurt till I come off stage.

> Together with their "explosive" live performance, "Brooks & Dunn's" new album reminds listeners, above all, that these guys are still right out there on the edge, still challenging their audiences and challenging themselves. But, when all said and done, who knows the secret of their success? "I'm not much good at analysing it all", says Kix. "We just do what we do and thank God that a lot of people are into it. I think the public just sees us for what we are: a couple of buddies making

music together. "That tremendous rush we feel when we hit the stage, or when we lay down vocal tracks in the studio, is still there. It's something I can't imagine losing...And we hope to keep doing it for a long, long time."

# Country in the capital

DJ Phil Miles is a difficult man to track down and British Rail trains don't run on time. When you're trying to make an interview, it's a sinister combination. We weren't going to let him get away though. From of a greasy phone box in Liverpool Lime Street station, Linedancer nabs the elusive DI.

Seventeen years experience in radio has taught Phil Miles a thing or two. Do your homework and know your audience. Broadcasting to 9.8 million across London, Country 1035 competes with zillions of other stations for a piece of the commercial action. "We're a country station but first and foremost we're a radio station", says Phil. "Down here, 25,000 country listeners aren't enough to support us so we've got to broaden our appeal, catering as well for the audience out there who don't yet know or may not even like Country music...

Unfortunately, Country does have this "Hick", "Yee-ha" image to many people, so it's a process of bringing people around little by little. We don't just sit here and think, here's a good record lets play that, there's a great deal of research that takes place first. We play a lot of cross-over music.

Wynonna's "To be Loved by You" is a song that's getting a lot of air play at the moment."

Meeting the challenge of the capital rat race, Country 1035, launched in September 1994, are holding their own and have a new show.

Saturday evening's "The Connection" is the pick of the play list and the oracle of all things country.

Interviewing a star of country music every evening, the 7pm show also casts a spotlight on the British and Irish scene and provides the very latest news, reviews and local gig low down.

Plus, Andy Vaughan of Country Music International chips in his six pennies worth, while Sue Wilkinson dishes the hottest gossip from Nashville Tennessee.

And to top it all, chart the latest US hits courtesy of the American Country Countdown.

So, what about line dancing, Phil!!! Ya' cheeky monkey! "It's something we're most definitely aware of. I've got a sister up in Wales who loves it!" She's not the only one.



# Kickin' At the Cattleman's.

"Dick and Geneva" are two names synonymous with British Line Dancing. When they introduced Line Dancing to the U.K. from America 12 years ago, Prestatyn was one of the first places they came helping to establish a festival that's since become a "Must" on the Country Circuit.....

I'M not familiar with holiday camps.

To be honest I'm not particularly familiar with holidays.

It's not so long ago that I was a student, when vacation time seemed to be spent either washing dishes in grimy restaurants or watching my bank account grow zeros in the wrong direction...A moving tale...and a pleasant change to be invited along to the 1996 Pontin's Country Music Festival.

Being my first visit I didn't really know what to expect, so it was a bit of a shock when a Red Indian squaw in full regalia came hurtling into to my path. A Union general replete with gold braid and menacing sabre swished between the tables, while a frontier settler demanded a hair of the dog. Country aficionados are not known for doing things by halves.

There's a social hierarchy to these events, it seems, and dare I say it a certain snobbishness. Western reenactors, line dancers, and country music enthusiasts each occupy their own separate part of the floor - equally convinced that their little world in the country scene is most definitely the best. With the utmost impartiality, I set out to fly the flag for line dancing.

In the Cattleman's Club dance hall "West Virginia" have just finished their final number - a soothing rendition of "David Gates and Bread's" IF. Winding down over a couple of wellearned beers they take time out for a brief chat.

"We've been coming Prestatyn for 12 years", says lead singer, Keith Thornhill. "It's got to the stage where we recognise people in audience.We've got a good following across the U.K." Nominated for Best Band at the British Country Music Radio Awards in March, was one of what have been many highlights in West 20 year

Virginia's





career. "Blue Rendezvous" also picked up Best Album at the ceremony in 1994. With the calendar pleasantly stuffed with bookings the band pays line dancing it's due.

"It's certainly helped raise country music's profile", admits

Brian Nichols, West Virginia's drummer, "and that can only be good news for the likes of us... I can't do any of the dances though; my wife's the expert!"

Deftly avoiding a Confederate's musket, I venture next door to the "Silver Dollar Saloon". Come Saturday, more than 2000 people will have visited the week-long event and the line dancers are certainly making the most of it. Newly weds, Rusty and Mo Douch, have made the trip from Hampshire. Rusty is tonight's compere for the festival's excellent resident LD band, Memphis Roots, while Mo, a former nurse, is making a fleeting escape from the classes she otherwise runs five days a week. Somehow, they can still manage to talk shop.

"Line dancing is a social event", says Mo. "You don't need a partner and you can meet people of all ages...

My youngest dancer is four and my oldest, ninety three! But the first thing I always teach them is just to have fun!"

Is line dancing a fad? The three hundred or so people in the Silver Dollar Saloon don't seem to think so. "Tush-pushing" and "Boot-Scootin", they're the straightest answer you'll get. I've finished badgering people for the evening, so it's time to get trigger- happy with the camera. For all we know Little-Big Horn and John Wayne, alias Terry and Christine Price, could have stepped straight off the Great Plains. Along way from the western frontier they may be, but it makes an irresistible shot. Can't wait to get it back from the developers!


Watching this man fill the stage with musical talent and an obvious love of his work was a joy!





# Linedancing etiquette

# Floor all

This simple guide will help you to enjoy your line dancing even more, especially if everyone is aware of the floor etiquette and tries to follow it whenever possible.

- Never come onto the dance floor carrying drinks, glasses, cans or lighted cigarettes.
- Never stay on the floor to talk if the music has started go off the dance floor to chat.
- When dancing near beginners be mindful and courteous and don't show off. Too many variations can put people off.
- Don't start a different dance of your own, unless there is plenty of room on the dance floor and you sense it is acceptable.
- Remember the floor is for everyone. If you are dancing in lines, try to leave the outside lane clear for the couple dancers.
- Those dancing around the outside lane have the right of way. Don't block their progress.
- When dancing around the floor, the line of dance 'LOD' is always anti-clockwise. Never dance against the LOD.
- If the floor is crowded, take small steps, enjoy the company, but watch out for collisions.
- If you should bump into someone, it is customary to apologise whether it is your fault or not.
- Should you accidentally knock over someone's drink replace it immediately.
- If possible, start another line rather than join one which will block the outside lanes.
- Don't be tempted to stop dancing to teach, especially if there is no room. Try to teach off the floor if you can find space.
- Never walk through a line of dancers to cross the floor always walk around the floor or wait.
- Remember everyone was once a beginner, if you can dance do try to be helpful to newcomers.
- If the dance floor is empty and you are starting off the dance, go to the front so that others can fall in line behind you.
- And finally. Keep your head up, keep smiling and enjoy yourselves.

AS line dancing becomes more and more popular, the number of people attending classes and clubs increases every week. Many are complete beginners and are unaware of the floor etiquette which helps ensure everyone has room and a chance to enjoy themselves.

The dance floor is divided into three sections:

Centre

for the line dancers


Inside lane

(around the line dancers) for two steppers and swing

dancers

**Outside lane** 

(around the two steppers) for the faster moving dancers



# The Easy To Learn...

Now you can learn new line dances or practise your favourites every month by "Stepping off the Page" with Linedancer.

The format is an easy to follow, step by step guide to speed up the pleasure of learning new dances. The terminlogy is selected from research conducted from the various Western & Line Dance authorities and our own fieldwork involving live teaching sessions, analysing teaching videos and examining thousands of printed instructions.

### HOW TO FOLLOW "Stepping off the Page"

Firstly, each dance is divided into small sections to help you learn by easy stages. This way you can practise the sections you have difficulty with and build the entire dance at your own pace.

Dance instructions are divided into four headings:-

### 1. STEPS

Under this heading is a count which gives the number of steps in:-

- a.) each individual section, so that you can count the steps as you perform the routine.
- b.) the total number of steps in the entire dance.

#### 2. ACTUAL FOOTWORK

At the beginning of each section is a summary title for the routine. Experienced dancers will easily follow the dance from the summary title alone. Less experienced dancers may need to study the step by step word description of how to perform each step.

### 3. CALLED

This is very helpful for memorising the dance. Read this column from top to bottom as you step through each section (eg A Grapevine could be called = Step, Behind, Step, Stomp). Memorising the sections this way really speeds up how quickly you can learn a dance.

### 4. DIRECTION

This is just in case you find the steps confusing. It simply gives the direction you should be moving when you perform each step (eg Right, Left, Forwards, Backwards, Turning, On the Spot, etc)

Here are four great dances for you. Boogie Bop, The Texas Twist, Country Boy II and The Nightlife Slide. Choose the one that best suits your experience and se how quickly it takes to learn simply by...

# Boogie Bop






