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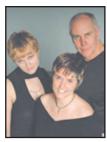


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Funny girl



There's far more to Dolly Parton than the trademark wigs and high heels, says Sharon Twist. She also has a fantastic sense of humour.

he's an intelligent, vivacious, sexy, talented songwriter who heads a multi-million dollar business. But if you've never had the joy of seeing Dolly Parton live, then you won't know that this woman is also incredibly funny. And her new album, *Live and Well*, gives the world that very opportunity – to experience the fun of Dolly live.

Part of her 2002 *Halos and Horns* tour, *Live and Well* was recorded at the Dollywood Theater, Dollywood Lane, Pigeon Forge, Tennessee. This is the real Dolly, the comedian behind the painted doll who admits "it costs a lot of money to look this cheap".

She says that, if she were a man, she'd be a drag queen because "I love wearing all this garb". In fact, she dedicates her iconic song

Jolene to the drag queens in the audience. "I met two coming in," she says. "One of them looked more like me than I do and the other looked prettier than most of us girls ever will".

Actress, singer, composer, businesswoman – it's hard to put Dolly Parton in a box. And it's just the same with her music. Just how do you describe this latest sound of Dolly playing "wa-wa" guitar, backed by her handpicked band, The Blueniques?

"I'm doing exactly what I've always done," she says. "It's a little bit of bluegrass, a little bit of Country, a little bit of mountain. We're all hicks here so you could call it hick-hop."

She shows her mischief by singing "the songs that never made it", including: "I've got the biscuits in the oven, now get your buns into bed".

Live and Well

Dolly Parton's Live & Well album is released by

Sugar Hill records on both CD and DVD on September 14. Recorded at the Dollywood Theater in 2002, the concert was part of the *Halos and Horns* tour which marked her return to the road after a 10-year absence.

The show connects the dots between her return to the rural mountain sound with material from her Grammy-winning acoustic albums — to her commercial hits that helped catapult her to superstardom. Parton and her band, The Blueniques, swing with ease from bluegrass to pop-Country hits to mountain ballads, punctuated with Parton's autobiographical anecdotes and endearing humour between songs.

Yet, somehow, this pint-sized, larger-than-life woman can make her audience laugh one minute and cry the next.

"I love Tennessee – I'm a Tennessee girl," she says. "I've written a lot of songs about the Smokey Mountains. I grew up on a farm: I was the farmer's daughter you heard all those stories about – well, perhaps not all of them. We didn't have a lot of the things money could buy: but we had music, we used to sit round and sing with Mama.

"I have a lot of songs that come from my childhood. My favourite song I've ever written is *Coat of Many Colors* – it's because it's

beliefs. But when she appeared on the BBC religious programme, *Songs of Praise*, last year the topic was sex: "I'm talking about the passion of life," she said. "God is not going to give you all this good equipment and then condemn you for enjoying it."

Dolly's "equipment" has made her as many headlines as her music. One reviewer described her as looking like "a gob-stopper on a stick". But she can give as good as she gets saying: "I always kinda looked like a cartoon".

Dolly Rebecca Parton was born on $19^{\rm th}$ January 1946 at Locust Ridge, Tennessee, to poor farming parents. So poor that they paid the

personal, because my mama made me a coat out of a pile of scraps. I dedicate it to all the good mamas we have out there."

She talks about how her mother read her the Bible story of Joseph and his multicoloured coat. And she's proud of the fact that she learned to sing in the Pentecostal church where her grandfather was the minister.

"Halos and Horns is about people trying to choose from right and wrong," she says. "We've got a little devil on this shoulder telling us how much fun it is to be bad. And a little angel on the other shoulder telling you how much fun it is to be good. I ain't gonna tell you which way I've been leaning lately.

"It's never too late to get on the right side of the angels," she adds. "It gives you a better way to look at something when you believe in God. It stops you placing such importance on yourself, knowing that there is something much greater than you. People ask me what's that light I have. And I say it is definitely the light of God — if you see me shining it has to come from some divine place. Everyone has their own opinion about God. And what God is to me is everything. I look at God like he's my father but also like he's my best friend."

But that's typical of Dolly. She'll happily talk to a concert audience about her religious

doctor in cornmeal for attending the birth of their fourth child. After Dolly, 12 more were to follow.

She was still a child when she first accompanied herself on guitar while singing on local radio — including the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville. Her earliest known recording was a rockabilly number, *Puppy Love*, for a small independent record label in 1958. But by the time she married Carl Dean in 1966, she had signed to Monument and recorded her first Country hit, *Dumb Blonde*.

Hit followed hit: Joshua, Coat Of Many Colors, Please Don't Stop Loving Me and Jolene. And by the 1980s Dolly Parton had ventured into acting, starring with Lily Tomlin and Jane Fonda in 9 To 5 and with Burt Reynolds in the musical Best Little Whorehouse In Texas.

In 1983 she reached Number One in the USA and entered the Top Ten in the UK with the Bee Gees composition, *Islands In The Stream*. And while *I Will Always Love You* was not a major hit for Dolly, she reaped the rewards when Whitney Houston sang the piece in the movie, *The Bodyguard*.

Unlike her first record, Dolly is far from a dumb blonde. She's a shrewd businesswoman and a very funny lady.

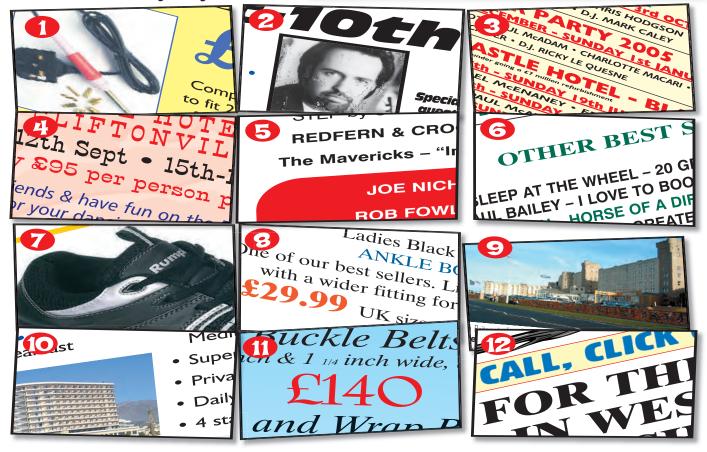

Harare youngsters create laughter lines

Line dancing is proving a hit with youngsters in Zimbabwe thanks to the efforts of Sheilagh Thomas, Chairperson of the Rotary Club of Hunyani.

Sheilagh, who runs a children's daycare centre on behalf of the Rotary, first encountered Line dancing on a cruise and was determined to take it back to Harare.

She now has a team of four- and five-year olds who take their dances to residential homes and

church functions to entertain the older folk.

"As we are a non-profit organisation our funds are very limited," explains Sheilagh. "We couldn't afford to import the fringing, hats and boots and they are not available in this country." But where there's a will there's a way. Sheilagh made the fringing from wool and the hats were woven from straw by local people and painted white. The children wear black sand shoes called "takkies".

"Line dancing is doing a wonderful job," says Sheilagh. "It's bringing lonely people together, giving joy to others who can't dance but who can watch with amazement as these children strut their stuff.

"It just shows that you do not have to have all the right gear to enjoy Line dancing. I am so glad I was introduced to it because it has brought joy and lasting friendships into my life."

from many other classes in the area and by Neville Fitzgerald, Tony "The double T", and the Bossyboots gang, who always come and support him.

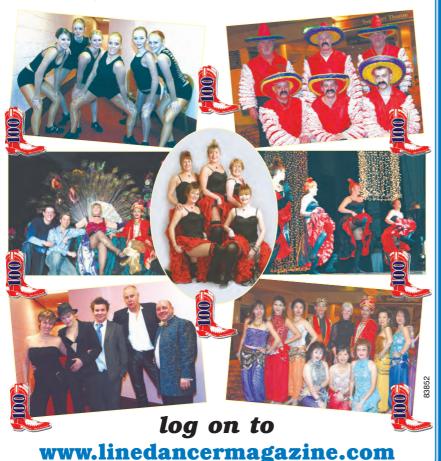
The highlight of the evening was when Rob himself appeared in a grass skirt and garland. And in the distance...the hum of an approaching lawnmower.

Obituary - Susan Anne Luckman

The funeral of Susan Anne Luckman took place at Hugglescote Church in Coalville, Leicestershire on Monday June

21, attended by relatives, friends and the many Line dancers who knew her.

Her husband Geoffrey asked for two of her favourite songs, Halfway to Paradise and Queen of My Heart, to be played at the service.

The funeral tea was held at Ibstock Working Men's Club (WMC) on the usual Line dance class night and, in lieu of flowers, raised nearly £150 for the charity, Coping with Cancer.

Sue, 44, lost her fight with cancer on Mon-

day June 12. She was first diagnosed with breast cancer eight years ago and underwent surgery, radiotherapy, chemotherapy and other treatment. This didn't stop her raising money for several charities, work which she continued even when the cancer returned and she was in constant pain. Charities which benefited included the Macmillan Cancer Relief 500 appeal (organised by Loose Boots Line Dance Club and supported by Robbie McGowen Hickie), the Lemonade Dance for Coping with Cancer and a sponsored walk, also for Coping with Cancer, on her 44th birthday last year. Sue and Geoff also supported The Rebels charity dances held at the Ibstock WMC.

Sue and Geoff met while playing in a darts match and married in 1985. They were soulmates and shared a passion for Line dancing. Sue couldn't wait to get her hat and boots on. They went to local classes and socials and joined Yvonne McEwan's Dix 'n' Chix classes

in Bagworth and Ibstock. Sue would help anyone who had trouble with their steps.

The couple passed their BWDA 2000 bronze medal standard last year and, although Sue was undergoing treatment in hospital when the awards night came around, she was given permission to leave her hospital bed to collect it. The couple went on to pass their silver awards and Sue was really looking forward to taking her Gold Medal Exam. Sadly, she passed away two days before. However the medal was awarded posthumously to her.

Sue's other interest was in World War II fighter planes and in May the Coping with Cancer charity helped her fulfil her dream — to take a runway trip in a Lancaster bomber.

The Way and still are?

n the beginning was the word, and the word was, "Yee-Haw!". The dress was Western and the music Country. So what was it that attracted us to Line dancing 100 *Linedancer* magazines ago? Undoubtedly those who had previously attended Country music venues were attracted by the music, and possibly the dress, (after all, they'd been dancing in lines long before the explosion in popularity of Line dancing).

Most of us had Line danced previously, but we didn't know it; remember *Macarena*, *Agadoo, The Birdie Song, The Slosh?* It was Line dancing, Jim, but not as we knew it!

So what did attract us to Line dancing? I suggest that it was the dancing, the availability of classes, a dance form that did not require a partner, an activity suitable for all ages and physical ability, the fun, undoubtedly the hype, and yes, the music.

So what has changed with the passing of the years? Well the dancing is still there. It's not the same; some saying this is a good thing, others wishing it was, 'like the old days'. However, I do wonder how many people would still be dancing eight years on? if we had not moved on from Electric Slide, Flying 8s, Birchwood Stroll and so on, I for one would have packed up years ago. Yet these dances are still around and still very useful for absolute beginners, which is what a lot of us were eight years ago.

Yes the dancing has changed, but maybe not as much as we initially think.

What about the availability of classes? Clearly there are nowhere near as many as there used to be when Line dancing popularity was at its height. (The very first class I attended saw about 120 of us crowd into a school gymnasium). As the initial surge of enthusiasm subsided, so did the number of people attending classes and socials, and those instructors who had, jumped on the band wagon, packed up their Billy Ray Cyrus CDs and went home.

However, those instructors who had got into it because they loved line dancing stayed, and even today most people are not too far away from a class, as a look through *Stompin' Ground* will testify.

So not too much change there then, fewer classes, but still plenty of choice to suit all tastes.

We still dance in lines and without a partner, so absolutely no change there, and all the reasons that not needing a partner to dance with which attracted us then, are still just as valid today.

Wasn't it great eight years ago to go Line dancing and see people of all ages having fun together? Three generations dancing together, with the young ones adding their youthful exuberance, while their grandparents did the same dance, but with smaller steps and less upper body movement.

Well no change there then, you'll still see seven-year-olds and septuagenarians on the same dance floor, and sometimes older and younger.

Of course, 100 magazine issues ago it was great fun, wasn't it? We didn't know our grapevine from our coaster step, our jazz box from our shuffle. We went wrong quite a lot. We didn't know then that you never go wrong, just dance a variation and we laughed at ourselves and with our fellow dancers.

But if we listen to the prophets of doom these days, the fun has gone out of Line dancing, we are all much too serious. Well, ********, is what I say. We instruct two absolute beginner classes each week and they laugh just as much as we did and sometimes more. Maybe we don't laugh quite as much now because we are not as nervous as we were and don't make as many mistakes as we did. But we, and lots of others, do laugh and have fun, at both class and socials, so if you're not laughing much, maybe you are not doing hard enough dances and making enough mistakes. Just a thought.

My personal view is not much change there either.

The initial hype has undoubtedly gone, but like most new crazes, that was to be expected. After all you don't see as many hula-hoops, yo-yos, or those clacky -balls on strings, these days do you?

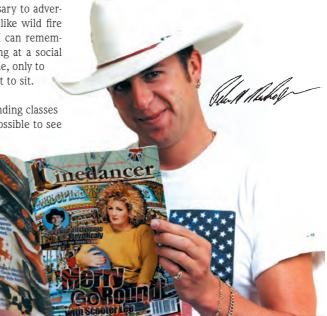
Eight years ago it wasn't necessary to advertise a social. The word spread like wild fire and people simply turned up. I can remember on several occasions arriving at a social half an hour before the start time, only to find that there was nowhere left to sit.

And the number of people attending classes meant that not only was it impossible to see

the instructor's feet, but often the instructor was invisible if you'd not managed to get into the first three rows.

Halcyon days indeed, at least for the instructors and promoters,





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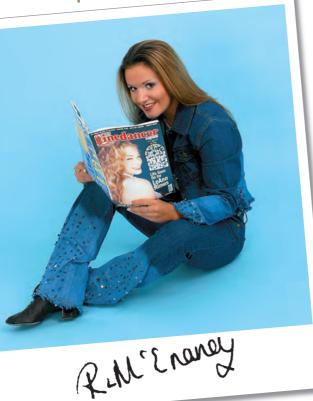

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some of whom raked in the cash and didn't even need to buy many CDs. But for the rest of us, the rank and file dancers, it wasn't ideal learning dances in village halls with 80 others, and no way to see what the instructor's feet were doing. (It's no wonder we laughed a lot, we had plenty of reasons to go wrong). Certainly smaller classes are better for the dancers, and not having to arrive half an hour and more, before the start of a social, is a definite advantage.

So some changes there but on balance better for the dancers, which is what it's all about.

In the beginning Line dancing was an inexpensive pastime, and it still is. The first class we attended, all those years ago, $\cos \pounds 2$ for a 90-minute session, and the first CD social we attended – having spent ages plucking up the courage to go – $\cos \pounds 3$. The price now? Well I can't speak for everyone, but

we charge £2 for a two-hour class and £3 for a four-hour CD social.

So in real terms the cost is only a fraction of what it was, despite all the increases in hall costs, CDs, etc. Change then, but now even cheaper.

OK, so we have to mention the music, and of course that has changed considerably, hasn't it? Eight years ago it was all Country, wasn't it? Of course it was. Still no harm in checking the *Linedancer* archives to be sure. Let's see, issue number 1 June 1996, featured cowgirls on the cover: We can now confess they weren't actually dancers but two of the *Linedancer* sales staff Lesley Robinson and Sharon Murphy. Lesley has since moved on to other things but Sharon is still a leading light with the company.

What dance scripts were printed? Texas

Twist – how Country can you get?

— choreographed to Gonna Take A

Lot Of River by the Oakridge Boys. Yep that's Country. Hold on, there's two other tracks detailed. Twistin The Night Away by Scooter Lee & In The Mood by Jive Bunny. Well that can't be right can it? Must be a mistake.

OK so most of the music was Country, but even in our very first issue, not 100 per cent Country. So maybe, just maybe, not quite as big a change as is generally believed. The dress eight years ago was

much more Western, but again not 100 per cent. Lots of us have never owned a fringed shirt in our lives, let alone matching his 'n' hers cowboy/girl outfits. Most people wore boots those days, but the alternative was "shopping shoes" as there were no dance shoes or trainers to buy. Of course you saw a lot of Stetsons then, but now the number of people wearing hats at a social of several hundred, can be counted on two hands.

So change in dress for some but not for everyone, and dare I suggest that those who have swapped thick canvas shirts for lightweight tops, and boots for shoes and trainers, have done so out of choice and practicality.

So to sum up, the past eight years and 100 *Linedancer* magazines have seen many changes but not quite as many or as much, as is generally believed. I welcome and embrace the vast majority of the changes and the stance that *Linedancer* has taken in these changes.

I believe that Line dancing is now even stronger than it was eight years ago. We have stood the test of time and despite the threat of splits in our movement we are still together as a friendly whole. I look forward to the next 100 issues.

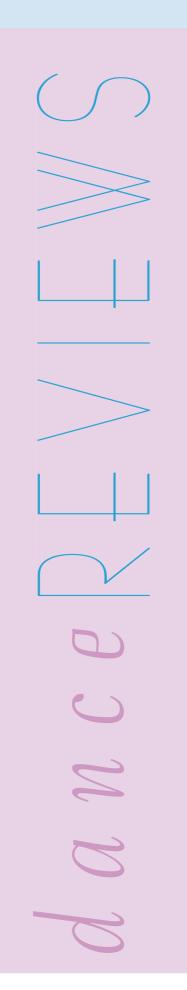

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He's at home on the steamy Cuban beaches and in sweltering vast pine-clad forests of Chile. So *Linda Willis* spoke to Michael Vera-Lobos among the deciduous beech trees and ice-cream vans of England's Epping Forest.

ichael arrived blearyeyed and tired but smiling and hiding those legendary brown eyes behind huge sunglasses. As we sat sharing coffee and stories I realised he is looking increasingly like the huasos (cowboys) who roam the wild plains of his native Chile. Araucanian Indians were the first inhabitants, Diego de Almagro led the Spanish on their quest for gold. But for Line dancers with gold-fever the quest is over - Michael, and his latest fist full of brand new dances, is back with a vengeance. And more appealing than ever.

"You're here in the summer!" I said.

"What's the question?" he replied and then burst out laughing. "It's been very relaxed. Tonight I'm with Johnny Two-Step. The other night I was with Jan Hughes at her dance class. I had a great time – I can just watch and do a few of the dances if I want to do. I like that. It's nice not to have to worry about anything."

He was meeting Glenn Rogers later that day.

"I've been looking forward to speaking to him," he said. "I've just done a dance called *Painting Love* — because the song's called *If I Was a Painting.* It was actually a real easy dance to choreograph because I really enjoyed the song. At home it's gone down really well so hopefully it'll





do the same here. And it's good for me because Glenn's pushing me and I'm actually getting the chance to push him at home."

Michael says it's been "very social this time" and he's been spending time at an animal retreat centre.

"It's for animals that have been dumped. You know, they've been neglected, thrown awav. Horses and pigs and chickens. It was actually a nice day out. That's been about it. It's been a very short trip so we haven't had time to do much of anything else. It's been relaxing – after Cuba - you know?"

No I didn't, but I wanted to.

"Cuba's wonderful," he says. "The food, the music, the villages and the beaches which are fantastic.

The dancing in Cuba is complicated because they've got the salsa and they've got their own version of Tango. But outside of that they actually have their own form of dance.

"I do salsa, because we do a bit of salsa in Chile. That's about it. There's no Line dancing in Cuba. It's so poor in many areas and there are no activities to do, especially for kids, so they've set up these dance halls, which aren't line dancing, but they have a DJ that comes in and he plays music and the kids learn how to salsa. That's their weekend activity that they do every Friday and Saturday. So yeah – it was interesting. I've got a lot of video tapes, so there might be new steps in the future". He laughs again.

The fortuitous meeting with Glenn Rogers happened last time Michael was in Britain. They swapped CD's and ideas, which led to Glenn asking Michael if he would be interested in "making some dances to his work".

"He played me a song, and I said I'd work on it. I did. Brought it back this time. We'll see how it goes. It's only 48 counts – there are no tags. No re-starts."

Classes are going well at home, and the trend is "up" he reports.

"Tamworth is finished now and a lot of people are returning. The numbers really depend on the weather. If it's too hot, they won't come, and if the weather's shocking outside like it's raining or it looks like there's gonna be a storm, the numbers are at least half what they should be. And when you've got absolute weather you can be affected quite badly. When the students come back they've missed out on so much you've gotta cross your fingers they keep up with the revision – or they won't come back."

Michael's days "in jail" are behind him.

"I've been Line dancing full time now for the past three years. I don't miss working in the jail system. But when I get back I'll be looking to sort of going back into that work, but only part time. And more in the community homes for kids. So I might cut back on some of the Line dance hours. But we'll wait and see what happens."

Michael is not a political animal and is saddened that so much gossip and debate permeates the Line dance community.

"My viewpoint on gossip and Line dancing in general is that it's never gonna change," he said. But it's a shame to think that it's everywhere, in every country and in every club. And my advice on politics, from an instructors' point of view, is not to get involved. And, from a students point of view, again the best thing to do is if you're gonna hear it, then hear it. Otherwise shut your ears and just get on the dance floor. Enjoy your dancing. If not the social aspect goes out.

"In my classes I try to have a certain factor of jokes and getting on with the teaching but outside of that I still want that social aspect. My beginners have this social gathering. I know it sounds silly. But it's just something to remind them that this is also what we're here for, you know? They bring in a plate and we turn the place into a 'restaurant' for the night. Small things but it's a way of getting people to speak and actually finding out what they want. You need a good balance. You have to let them know they were right to make this choice. If not there are plenty of other places they can go — salsa, two-step. Lots of other things they can try out.

"I try to give a lot of time to my students. Getting a balance is the hardest part. I'm

pretty lucky because we have so many instructors at our club. If my students are on an "up" during the night I am too. If they are tired or down then I'm gonna be the same. It seems to be give and take. The fact that you are reaching people — that's what makes it successful."

Burning music and nicking dance scripts are hot potatoes that gets him all steamed up.

"A lot of us are faltering," he said. It seems to be a problem. Especially here in the UK. People shouldn't forget the amount of work that goes into the choreography or some of the artistes who are trying to promote their work. They really are cutting off their noses – because it is gonna wreck Line dancing eventually. Not only the burning of music – that's only one thing – but also the idea of what dances are being taught in one location, being kept up to date.

"People just seem to learn what they wanna learn. There's always gonna be so many dances — you're never

gonna be up to date. You have to end up choosing the teacher you're most comfortable with and stick with that decision. Don't keep shopping around because you're never gonna find a balance. If a dance is popular, it's gonna make it's way through the barrier and end up in every class anyway. That's the way it works. Always has."

Michael's off to Chile for Christmas and New Year, returning to the UK at the end of January. Last December he headed home to meet a quarter of his Chilean family. "Too short," he insists. The whole Vera-Lobos contingent will be joined by two-and-a-half year old Emily, Michael's god-daughter, for whom he'd just purchased

a "baby dress, a denim skirt and top. Impressive". He admits that she can't dance yet because "she's too chubby and she can hardly stand up without falling."

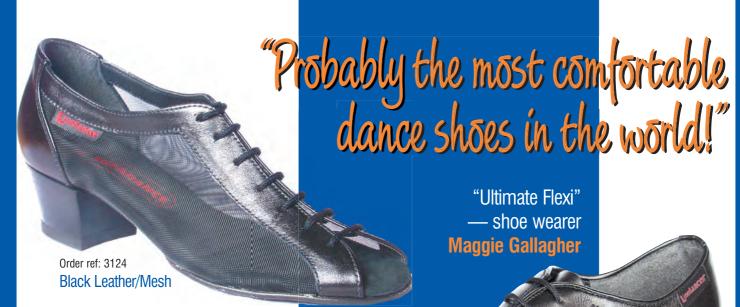
"My family's pretty spread out in Chile," he explains, "and there was a huge language gap. I speak Spanish. I speak broken Spanish – and they speak no English at all."

It was while working as a bar-tender in Sydney that Michael volunteered to do the Line dancing shift because the others hated Country music and he "had no trouble with it." That's how he became hooked.

Michael says: "It changed my life I suppose. I've met some great people through it. Travelled extensively. I've got a better appreciation of music. I've got no complaints whatsoever."

Pictured left to right are Claire, Pam, Hazel, Chris, Linda and Joe. The two cheer leaders are Brian and Mark with Kate in the middle.



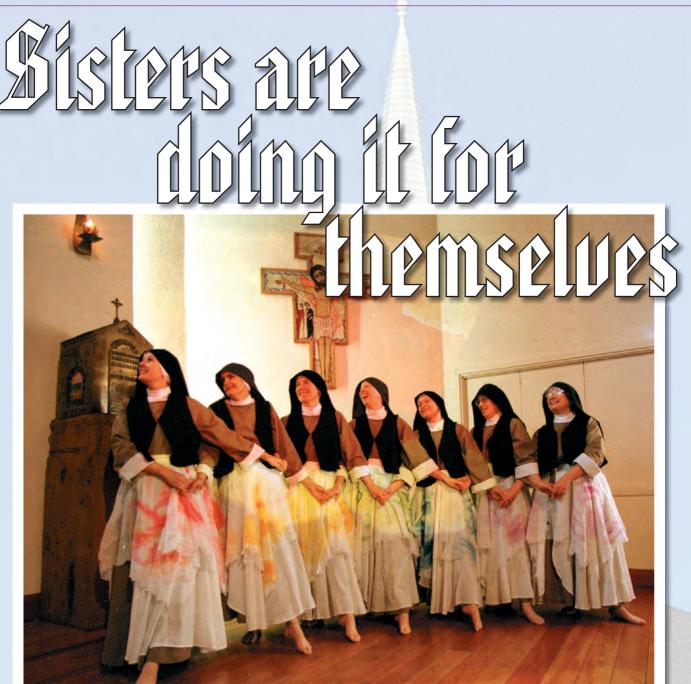

Line dancing takes
place in clubs, schools,
village halls and...
convents. Nick Baty
travelled to North Wales
to meet the coaster
step nuns who have
developed their own
Sister Act

warm August afternoon in the North Wales village of Hawarden. It's a quiet place. Locals pop in and out of the two neighbouring pubs, competing for lunchtime trade. Trees rustle in the breeze and you have to listen hard for the hum of traffic on the coast road more than a mile away. All in all, it's the perfect location for the enclosed Poor Clare nuns who live in the monastery of *Ty Mam Duw*. It's recreation time and, beyond the long-high convent walls, the sisters are sewing and painting and Line dancing.

Most of these women have only ever left the convent for medical treatment. They don't watch television and only read snippets from the newspapers: even then, that's so they can pray for people in "the world". 100 issues ago, when Line dance clubs were opening all over the country, these women were busy going about their daily lives: praying in the chapel seven times a day, painting and sewing items to sell in their craft shop, growing their own vegetables and stirring huge pans of their delicious home-made raspberry jam.

Yet, somehow, Line dancing has taken a hitch step over the convent wall. Even the barewooden floors of this cloistered community experience an occasional coaster step. And the chapel is no stranger to a back rock and a sailor turn.

"Someone handed in a Line dancing video for the jumble sale," Sister Maria explains quite seriously — well, fairly seriously. A smile is breaking out at the corners of her mouth but I suspect she is amused less by what she's saying and more by the fact that I'm so interested.

"Mother Francesca gave it to me because I choreograph the dance for our services, she continues. "Sister Cosima and I quickly picked up a few favourites: Black Velvet and Electric Slide which, I imagine, was inaccurately named after the American police motorbike".

I'm now becoming rather wide-eyed. I'm talking to a middle-aged woman in a brown habit and black veil who, although sitting less than two feet away, is separated by the "grille", a series of iron bars which, it feels, is there to keep me out rather than to keep the sisters in. Not only am I hearing a lecture on the benefits of Line dancing but she's also filling me in on American bikes.

"We picked up the principle quite quickly," she continues. "It's basically a short sequence of steps repeated around a compass turn. We found we could easily adapt it to simple ballet and other dance forms".

And the music? Do they Line dance to sacred music or, perhaps, something from the classical repertoire? By now, Sister Maria is looking at me as though I'm one step short of a grapevine.

"We experimented with the Country and Western idiom," she says, "but we use a variety of background sounds from contemporary rock gospel music like Integrity's *Who Is Like the Lord?* to John Denver guitar instrumentals and old classics like the *Black Orpheus Tango*.

"We write much of our own music. For the Millennium we composed a 3/4 time Gospel song Line dance called *Follow Me*."

Forget Julie Andrews in *The Sound of Music* and Audrey Hepburn in *The Nun's Story.* If these women bear comparison with anyone then it's Whoopi Goldberg in *Sister Act.* Like Whoopi's Sister Mary Clarence, few of these women have backgrounds which make them stand out as nun material. The community includes ex-punk rockers and an ex-biker.

In the 1970s Sister Maria herself was living on the fringes of the hippy culture and was involved in voluntary work which brought her

into contact with "down-and-outs, suicides, drug addicts and prostitutes".

Watching "these desperate people all looking for an answer" led Sister Maria to realise she too was on something of a journey, a journey which eventually brought her into contact with the Poor Clares.

'We found we could adapt the principles of Line dancing to simple ballet and other dance forms', says Sister Maria

Her former hippy friends would probably approve of the communal living, the policy of recyling and the bare feet which, she admits, are not too good for stomping and tend to attract drawing pins.

Of course, not all nuns Line dance. And there are some Christians who brand Line dancing as "sinful". As recently as 1991, the Free





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Presbyterian Church of Northern Ireland reminded its members that Line dancing was "as sinful as any other type of dancing, with its sexual gestures and touching". The statement claimed that Line dancing was "sensual and clearly caters to the lust of the flesh".

Sister Maria remains calm and is uncritical but there's a faint "Honestly" as she goes on to explain the Line dances which she and the other sisters have devised for use in the chapel. There a *Magnificat* for Vespers and *Glory to God* set to a Samba rhythm which they use at their annual carol service.

She explains that the Poor Clares have danced ever since they were founded by St Francis of Assisi and St Clare in the $12^{\rm th}$ century.

"The sister have always danced in the refectory on Easter Sunday," she says. "And St Francis danced before the Pope."

It's a tradition the Hawarden nuns have taken to heart. And with music and drama as well as dance, their services go on for as long as they need to. There's no organ and the sisters accompany themselves on recycled instruments — donated flutes, recorders, zithers and panoply of percussion.

"The services get long each year," explains Sister Maria. "Sooner or later the Christmas vigil will meet up with the Easter vigil and we won't bother to go to bed at all." Given the debatable claims about Line dancing originating from Texas oil men and bored cowboys who wanted to dance without partners, it would seem an ideal pastime for a single-sex monastery.

"That's not the charm of Line dancing," insists Sister Maria. "It's the simplicity which appeals. Line dance can be easily memorised and – providing you have four able dancers at the corners – pretty well anyone can follow it.

"Dancing is a fundamental expression of the joy of being alive – it is a way of praising God. Everyone wants to dance - the line up makes it easy."

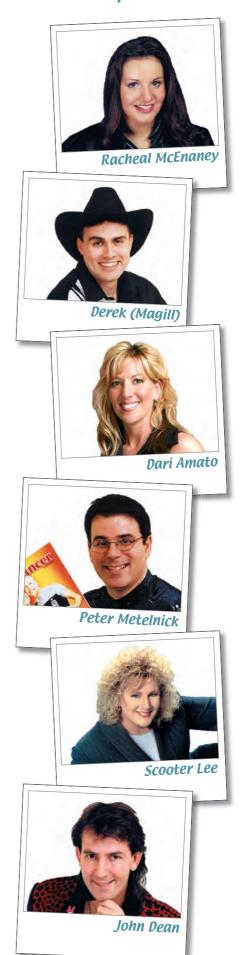

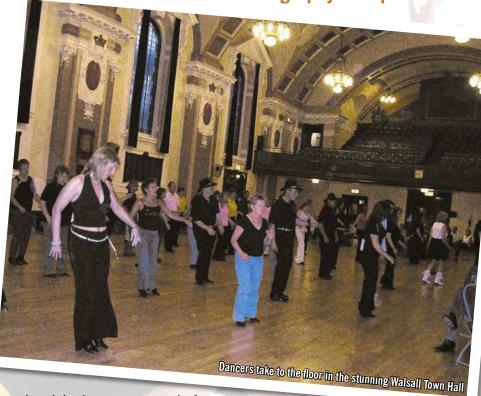

Choreography Competition

Behind the DJ equipment, Crazy Chris Adams played perfect host. As he called the latest floor fillers, little groups of dancers had already staked their claims to quiet corners around the sides of the room, in the hallways and even in the street outside where they feverishly practiced their routines in the few remaining minutes before the competition started. This, I thought, had the making of a really good Line dance event – good-humoured, cheerful people in love with the dance floor and happy to share a good time together. It was about celebrating our 100th edition and already the buzz of nervous excitement was building a great atmosphere.

Our decision to host the *Linedancer* Choreography Competition after such a long lapse was taken with some misgivings. So often we hear claims that there are already too many dances — why do we need more? However, on this night we saw first hand the answer to that question as the contestants began to showcase their routines.

In all the years I have been involved in Line dancing and in all the new dance showcases I have seen – this has to be one of the highest standards I have ever witnessed. As they shook hands and introduced themselves they exchanged laugher and chatter and wished each other success. It was a great start.

The competition was hot, the standard was very high and the results were so close it was unbelievable. But, based on the judges' results, I was honoured to announce the winners:

In first place was Lorraine Brown from Dysart, Kirkaldy, who danced Lightning Strikes to Last Thing I Do by James Otto. In second place they chose Christine Walker from Aylesbury, Bucks and her dance Rumba Linda to Staying In Love by the Bellamy Brothers. In third place we had a tie between Craig Cooke from Derbyshire with Sacred Trust to Sacred Trust by One True Voice and Jan Bayliss & Zoe Jenner-Jones from Bromsgrove with their combined effort called Forever Together to Forever Hasn't Got Here Yet by Toby Keith.

Whilst Lorraine's dance *Lightning Strikes* can be seen in this month's edition we have decided to featured more dances from the competition in future editions. The standard was so high it is a shame that many of the dances may not see the light of a dance floor beyond their local area. So watch the future editions of Linedancer for more of these excellent dances.

I would like to thank everyone who took part in the competition and in particular those who really entered into the spirit of the occasion. There were no big fancy prizes, no cups, trophies or awards – it was just an opportunity to showcase new dances created



by every day social dancers. It was great fun and we will do it again. We are even considering the possibility of including it into the schedule at Crystal Boot Awards in February 2005. As they say, watch this space...

Linda Willis caught up with Gretchen Wilson during her first UK tour

retchen Wilson came to Unlike Yankee London. Doodle she wasn't riding a Pony but she is riding the crest of the wave after the phenomenal success of her first album, Here for the Party, and the number one hit single, Redneck Woman. She hit town last month on her first visit to the UK-infact her very first trip anywhere outside her native rural Pocahontas in Kansas, where she grew up hopping from trailer park to trailer park as her mum's inability to pay the rent meant she had few places to call "home" for very long.

The Borderline is about as close to a bar full of cowboys that you're ever likely to find snuggled in the back streets just off Soho

Square. But it was still a far cry from Big O's, the rough and tumble kicker bar five miles outside her home town. This time she had no need for the double-barrelled, fully-loaded shotgun she had stashed behind the bar for protection when she was cooking and tending bar along with her mum at the tender age of 14.

She almost bounced on stage, beaming a dazzling smile of recognition and delight. Fronting her band of four, totin' nothing more lethal than a heavy, fully-loaded big red and black shiny acoustic guitar.

Like Dolly P she's tiny but, oh boy, — what a vocal power-house of fire and magnetism. *Here for the Party* rocked out from the tiny stage in a spiralling fusillade of down-home, gutsy, rootsy, crackin' good Country.

Wilson's audience appeared a bit "been there, seen, it done it," but this girl made them put down their pints and sandwiches, sit up and and take notice. She's not going to be overlooked, over-shadowed - or in any way ignored.

Redneck Woman, the massively successful single from the first album which spent three weeks at number one, was robustly, impressively belted out - with foot-tappin' self confidence and just a little bit of wellintentioned, self-assured pride.

"I'm a Redneck Woman!" she told us. "This is for all you Country gals out there."

The won-over Country boys weren't feeling left out either. She is seductive in the way only female Country singers can be, wearing a low-cut black embroidered waistcoat above her blue jeans, long chestnut hair loose and swinging, in a sexy sweep around her dainty featured face.

As neon blue lights shone behind her she slowed the pace, singing the ballad, When I Think About Cheatin' and there is all the pathos and eloquent conviction that ever there was in Patsy Cline, her heroine. She refers to another great Country kid Dwight Yoakham, and everyone cheers as she asks for a beer, handed to her by a bartender, which she drinks straight from the bottle. No airs and no graces from this sassy Redneck Woman with an attitude all her own.

"You know, girls, when we go out for the evening we spend a lot of time in front of the mirror making sure that when we walk into wherever it is we're going we'll be the best looking best dressed girl there, and make a great impression - right?"

We all nod back at her like puppets.

"Then what happens? In walks some woman with a mini skirt so short you can see right up to her neck. And low cut too. And you think – oh – forget it." She sighs and shrugs her shoulders, and we all laugh with her as we know just how she feels.

"And you know what? I've dedicated this next song just to her – it's called *Homewrecker*."

Gretchen reverts to jigging around, bouncy mode as she plays us a new number that has been going down a storm on her live gigs.

It didn't make Here for the Party; perhaps it will be first in line for the next album. Called California Girl, it's really cute and catchy. She finished the set with my fave track from the latest album, When It Rains, the West Coast Swing energised toe-tapper which would unglue anyone's soles from the hardwood. And that's all I was able to do in such a confined and crowded space - tap my feet and sway about a bit. Sensory deprivation of the worst kind when all you really wanna do is dance to the music.

Wilson admits that, when she used to listen to Tanya Tucker and Loretta Lynn, she could "feel the pain." And she's found the key to successfully expressing the motions held deep inside her. Soaring, plaintive vocals pierce and wrest your senses. Gretchen Wilson's 'first' was a deliciously tasty slice traditional Country with rock and soul.



edges, Wilson first set foot in Music City, Nashville, Tennessee, her best friend - fellow song writer and co-producer John Rich - told her sagely, "Well, you have to create a buzz." Now aged 95, Euphemia has been dancing since she was a child. She's very happy to tell people her age but is

amazed that anyone is impressed by her prowess on the dancefloor.

"Fast dances get me dizzy," she admits. "If I have to, I sit out but then I'm back on the dance floor."

Born in India, Euphemia began learning ballet and went to London to further her studies. Her dancing ambitions were thwarted by a leg injury and she returned to India.

"By then I'd met my husband," she explains. "He was a Methodist and he didn't hold with his wife dancing on the stage. When we came back to England we took up ballroom dancing and we went right to the top. We won competitions and medals."

Euphemia lost her husband two years ago and, after a lifetime on the dancefloor, found herself without a partner.

"I thought I'd take up Line dancing," says Eupemia who lives in Parbold, Lancashire. "I didn't need a partner for it and that was it really. I was introduced to Line dancing by my daughter, Joan Clegg - she's 74. My granddaughter, Joanna Taylor, dances too.

The late Dame Thora Hird's maxim was: "You don't stop because you get old. You get old because you stop."

And Euphemia plans to celebrate her 100th birthday by performing "a special exhibition dance on the day. I don't feel more than 50."

Age Concern England says Euphemia's attitude is what keeps her so fit and active. Since September last year, the charity has been promoting Line dancing as one of several activities which help older people stay fit and well. It's advice which 90-year-old Irene Banks has taken to heart.

For Irene (right) doesn't just Line dance. Her Tuesday nights are reserved for aerobics which prepares her for a two-hour workout at her local gym the next morning.

"We warm up and then I'm on all the equipment," she explains. "I'm on the full lot, the weights. Everything".

Age is definitely not wearying this greatgrandmother of nine.

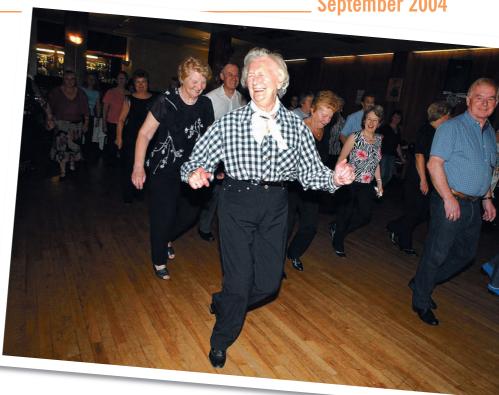
"I have a wonky knee but I just take the painkillers and get on with it," says Irene who lives in Cardiff. "I did have rheumatic fever when I was 21 but after six months I was back to normal".

Just last month Jean was jiving on a cruise on the new Queen Mary, a birthday treat from her children.

"I've always love to dance," she says. "If the music's going then I have to dance. As a child I was with "Mrs Clap's Joybells". We paid threepence a week. I remember being on on the stage with Tessie O'Shea at the Victoria Hall, Cardiff. She sang Carolina in the Morning and we tapped along with her. Oh she was wonderful. We wore these pink and black sateen costumes with little bells on. They were awful."

Irene's favourite Line dances are All That Jazz - "that's great" - and Elliott's Dream. Once she's hung up her checked shirt, she loves to cha-cha and rumba and she'd "learn Sala if I had a partner with Cuban heels".

Both Irene and Euphemia are going the right way to stay young and fit says Scooter Lee.

"Motion is lotion," she says. "And if we are living longer, we might as well have the most productive, active life that we can."

Scooter is best-known for her songs which resound around the world's dancefloors. But the woman behind tracks like *J'ai du Boogie* and *Ribbon of Highway* also has a mission: to tell the world about the benefits of Line dancing for older people. Just over five years ago, she teamed up with choreographer and instructor Jo Thompson, to found Dancing for the Dream, a non-profit making scheme to keep dancers "moving for life".

"Jo and I had both reached the point in life when you love what you do but you become bored with the way you are doing it," she says. "There's no "zing" anymore. We knew we loved the dancers and the part we played in the worldwide exposure of Line dancing. We both decided that we wanted to do something different that would make us feel good at night and put the "zing" back in it for us.

"We knew no one was getting any younger – even us – and if we could take what we both love and do and make a difference, a real *bona fide* documented difference in our nation or in our world, then we could leave a legacy of the wonderful things that Line dancing have actually done for us. Thus was born the Dancing For The Dream Non-profit Charity Corporation."

The oldest person to benefit from the charity a 107-year-old woman in Arizona but Scooter says she hears reports from people all over the United States who are using Line dancing to cope with the onset of Parkinson's Disease and Alzeimer's. She also cites a woman who was Line dancing at her doctor's suggestion while recovering from a brain tumour.

There's no doubt that Line Dancing is helping our two seniors, neither of whom show any signs of slowing down.

"I want to drop dead dancing or doing aero-

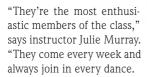
bics or keep fit," says Irene. "I enjoy every minute of my life — there's no trial run, this is it."

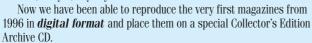

AARON WATSON The Honky Tonk Kid

aron Watson was born and raised on Country music in Amarillo, Texas. His influences include Willie Nelson, Waylon Jennings, Merle Haggard, and George Strait. Not yet signed to a major label, Aaron has secured the services as producer of the great Ray Benson of Asleep At The Wheel.

First Cut The Right Place (100/200bpm) is a cracking two-step with some fine fiddle and steel guitar playing. You are instantly aware that this album could be special.

The Hony Tonk Kid (118bpm) is a waltz featuring Willie Nelson. This fine track should have us all waltzing around the dancefloor.

Reckless (150bpm) is an awesome Country rocker and is surely a good dance prospect. Already I'm loving this album!

What She Don't Know (114bpm) is more of a traditional Country song, maybe a little too traditional, whilst *If You're Not In Love* (145bpm) is a good paced polka which you fast dance lovers will enjoy.

Let's Lose Some Sleep Tonight (114bpm) is the second waltz on the album; it has some really nice harmonies, should prove popular with dancers.

Honky Tonkin' Around Texas (104bpm)

features the aforementioned Asleep At The Wheel. If Texas swing is your thing, you'll love this track.

McKenzie Park (103bpm) is a gorgeous cha cha. Another lovely song destined for the hardwood.

Fool's Paradise (67bpm) is a steady number with some exceptional guitar playing, and Diesel Driving Daddy (125bpm) is a duet with Dale Watson, which is a trucker's anthem. A strong and powerful dance track.

Next To Heaven (68bpm) steadies the pace, and shows Aaron's ability to switch to smooth vocals.

For What It's Worth (148bpm) is another good dance track that again should tempt someone to choreograph to it.

Will You Love Me In A Trailer? (95/190bpm) is a wonderful two-step that will be ideal for Ribbon of Highway or Country Step, but it certainly merits its own dance.

Aaron co-wrote all the songs on this album, highlighting just what a versatile and talented young man he is. Ray Benson has done a superb job with the production, and the strong musicianship shines throughout the whole album. If dancing to Country music is your thing, you'll love this album.

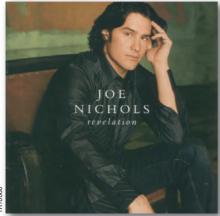

oe Nichols burst onto the scene a couple of years back with his brilliant album *Man With a Memory* which spawned such linedance hits as *Brokenheartsville, Joe's Place* and *Cool To Be A Fool*. Although Universal classed that album as Joe's "debut" he had in fact released a self-titled album in 1996 which included *Wal Mart Parking Lot Social Club*. Joe is as good live as he is on record.

The Shade (121bpm) sets the tone. This laid back, smooth song has already tempted Teresa & Vera to write a 40-count, four wall, upper improver/easy intermediate dance to it.

Singer In A Band (70bpm) is a nightclub twostep, and it is one to get your hanky out for, with lines like "Cos I've seen a third grade angel with dark circles 'neath her eyes. . . saying 'daddy don't you cry'."

Don't Ruin It For The Rest Of Us (101bpm) is a really good swingy number to which Teresa & Vera have choreographed Don't Ruin It, a 64-count, four-wall, and intermediate.

I Wish That Wasn't All (69bpm) is another smooth nightclub two-step, and would be a good alternative for Amazing Faith.

If I Ever Get Her Back (91bpm) is a nice steady cha cha, and a really nice dance track.

If Nobody Believed In You (64bpm) is another smooth song with some melancholy lyrics, which Joe delivers in a heartfelt manner.

Farewell Party (82bpm) is in a more traditional Country style with lots of twangy steel guitar, and it is a definite "buckle polisher".

Things Like That (These Days) (83bpm) is another song with a strong message, this time how parents should teach their kids values.

Revelation (95bpm) is "as originally recorded by Waylon Jennings on the Ladies Love Outlaws record in 1972", so you can compare the versions of this powerful song.

What's A Guy Gotta Do (170bpm) is the only song Joe had a hand in writing, and it's a cracker. Think of George Strait's Love Bug and you will get the feel of this song.

Finally we have No Time To Cry (72bpm), a poignant song written by Iris De Ment that many of you will relate to.

This album is new Country at its finest. If you are only going to buy one Country album this year then this should be the one.

hane Worley is almost 30 and lives in a small town in the Appalachian Mountains in Tennessee. He is Country through and through and, as well as having a fine voice, he writes great Country songs and plays a mean guitar.

The first song What's Goin' On (160bpm) also appears on the Most Awesome 9 CD and I believe Robbie McGowan Hickie has written a good dance to this track. This Country rocker is also ideal for Beethoven's Boogie.

It Took Both Of Us (128bpm) is a nice east coast swing track with some good harmony vocals, and great backing on piano, guitars, and fiddle. A fine dance prospect.

Soft Place To Fall (86bpm) is a waltz in which Shane's smooth voice is a delight. Should inspire someone to write a dance.

My Temperature Rises (108bpm) reminds me of Joe Nichols's Cool To Be A Fool. It has a laid back Texas Swing feel to it, laced with fiddle and steel guitar.

Operator! Operator! Put Me Through To Decatur (138bpm) is another good east coast swing number, with some cool harmonica playing and is destined for the dancefloor.

Barcode (126bpm) is in the Alan Jackson mould and is simply a good Country dance track.

Number One American Cowboy (101/202bpm) is a fine two-step and the sentiment of the song will endear it to many.

I Won't Even Miss You (75bpm), When The Hammer Falls (62bpm) and Me And The Whiskey Will Abide (72bpm) are all slower songs you will enjoy listening to and will interest those of you who like the slower dances.

Souped Up Purple Truck (150bpm) is a storming track – a real rocker – paying homage to custom car lovers and is one of the best dance tracks on the album.

Not Far From The Tree (100bpm) is a traditional Country song and, by contrast, Don't Say I Never Give You Nothin' (140bpm) is another cool dance track that I am sure given the chance could prove popular with choreographers.

Natural Born Guitar Man (78bpm) is the final song, and, as Shane wrote this one himself, I am sure it is autobiographical. As you can imagine, guitars feature strongly on this track.

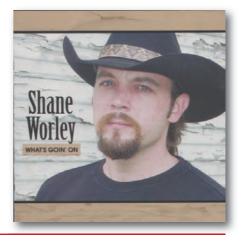
Shane Worley is a talented singer/songwriter and he could have a bright future. There are several good Country dance tracks on this well-produced album and at least a couple of them should be big hits with dancers. I recommend you give this album a try.

his album, *Restless*, was first released back in 1995 but was only available on import, and Curb feel the time is right to release it over here.

Slow Me Down (146bpm) a fast east coast swing which has been used for dances. If you check out the *Linedancer* magazine dance database, you will find several dances to some of theses tracks, although with the new release of the album, it may be prudent to have some new dances written to them.

Another Chance At Love (140bpm) is a good Country swing track with some nice fiddle and steel guitar playing, and it is worthy of having a new dance to it.

Talking To Myself Again (84bpm) is a slower track with some wonderful harmonies and you will enjoy listening to it.

Restless (144bpm) the title track has, I think, at least eight dances written to it over the years and it still sounds as fresh as ever.

Just For The Touch Of Your Hand (97bpm) Shelby's smooth vocal talents are showcased on this beautiful, smooth song.

Hey Now Little Darling (80bpm) is an awesome track, and I could find no dances

written to it. The swamp "harp" is brilliant. A must for the dancefloor.

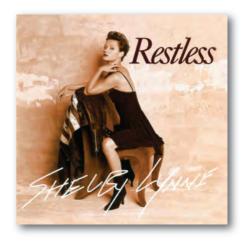
I'm Not The One (78bpm) Shelby excels in this style of smooth song, and I could listen to it over and over. If you like nightclub two-steps you'll love it.

Reach For The Rhythm (94bpm) musically this is a little to jazzy for me but from a dance point of view it is outstanding and could be a big dance hit.

Wish I Knew (58bpm) would make for a good "buckle polisher", you and your partner smooching around a dimly lit dance floor...wonderful.

Swingtown (104bpm) if swing is your thing, you will be in heaven with this one. Shelby excels vocally once again and the violin accompaniment is excellent. Dance to your hearts content.

Country music never dates. You can have a Country album for 10 years, not play it for a few, then pick it up and it sounds as fresh as ever. Shelby Lynn's *Restless* certainly falls into that category so, if you appreciate quality Country music, and fancy owning an album with several good dance tracks, may I suggest you invest in a copy today.

A Danish To Savour...



By Tim Ruzgar

I first visited Denmark about four years ago, when I had been asked to take dancers Roy Verdonk, Brian Barakouskos, Jodi Binsteed, and Glen Ball to an event run by The Outlaws, a large dance club based in Aars. They had put on big open events with people like Scooter Lee - and attracted over 600 dancers - and now they wanted to try something different. A club committee runs the Outlaws, and it was two of the members, Per Krogsgaard and his partner Gitte Kristoffersen, who organised the trip. At that time almost all of the Line dancing clubs over there would dance to Country music, and dress accordingly, the couple of exceptions being Niels Poulsen's Live 2 Dance club, and Benny Ray Naayen's club Cowboys and Angels

I think that the Superstar dancers were a bit of a shock to the system for the Danish dancers, most were used to having a curriculum of dances throughout Last month I told you a little about Line dancing in Norway, well this month I would like to give you an insight into the scene in another Scandinavian country, Denmark.

the "season", and at that time with the most popular dance in the country being *Ballymore Boys*. Anyway the event was somewhat a success, and the Danish dancers were very interested to learn of the Line dance scene in the UK. I struck up an immediate friendship with Per and Gitte and I invited them over here to a Maggie G event at Pontins, Southport, where they were amazed at how different things are.

Today, things are very different in Denmark. The Scandinavian Championships, a UCWDC event, has been run there the last two years: once in wonderful Copenhagen and this year further north in Aars. Benny Ray has run his own Danish Championships over the last couple of years encouraging people into competition. There are now many Danish competitors at UCWDC events throughout Europe and indeed at Worlds.

The Love 2 Dance club, are one of the forerunners, teaching many of the latest dances we have over here. The Outlaws have each year run a successful big event using Maggie Gallagher and her Irish dancers, and indeed they are having two events this year, one with Maggie and myself, in August, and

another in September, with Roy Verdonk, Darren Bailey, and Raymond Sarlemijn, again with myself as DJ.

I love to work in Denmark, the people are so warm and friendly to all, and they have welcomed us into their homes, and treated us with great respect. I have more events booked this year - and indeed for 2005 and I look forward to working there every time I go. With the bridge link to Sweden it is easy for Swedish people to attend the Danish events and vice versa. Now that EasyJet has started flying into Copenhagen, there are many bargain flights to be had and Denmark is the most reasonably priced of the Scandinavian countries. If ever you are fancying a Line dance break with a difference then you could do a lot worse than go to Denmark. You will be made very welcome, the Black Pig drink will have steam coming out of you ears, the Danish pastries are to die for, and you will enjoy every moment of your trip. Trust Me.

Kool and Fresh – is the latest from talented couple Mark & Jan Caley. The dance is to *Fresh* by Kool and the Gang & Liberty X, and its 64 counts, four walls, and intermediate.

Just Be Yourself — is to Enrique's *Be Yourself* and is the latest from prolific choreographer Alan Birchall. The dance is intermediate/advanced and is 64 counts and two walls.

Muskogee Okie — is a nice new country dance by John Dowling. This 64 counts, two walls, intermediate dance is to *Okie From Muskogee* by the Deans or Merle Haggard.

Let's Be Us Again – is a smooth country dance from Andrew, Simon & Shelia, to the gorgeous Lonestar song. This intermediate dance is 32 counts and two walls, and you'll love it!

 ${\it Country \, Fair}$ — is yet another to a track from the new Lonestar album. This 48-count, four-wall, beginner/improver dance is by Roy Thompson.

Enough Is Enough – is a new 32 count, four-wall, intermediate dance from Chris Hodgson to Eddie Rabbit's awesome song *Go To Sleep Big Bertha* available on the Most Awesome 9 CD.

Makin' Love And Music – is written to another track of the Most Awesome 9, this time by Dr Hook. The Girls (Maureen & Michelle) have choreographed a nice beginner/intermediate 32 count, four-wall dance to it.



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Angelique Fernandez. Unique designs, vivid golden cactus, spiralling lassoes, leaping flames, red, white and blue roses, all dancing up and down the sides of my size four feet. I had discovered boot-scootin' heaven.

I have it hot off the press that delicious designs like these, featuring this seasons colours of palest pink and lemon flower-strewn boots with embroidery can now be found in the back streets leading from Covent Garden. I'm not allowed to say where. That's up to you to find out.

Today what you stick onto your feet does not need to make quite such a crushing dent in your credit card balance. In fact today's Line dancers happily have so much choice it's almost impossible to decide what to slip your feet into each time they come into contact with the hardwood. It doesn't have to be leather, and it doesn't have to be 'cowboy' but it does need to be comfortable, and it really helps if it has been made especially with Line dancers in mind. For just as choreography has done a sharp grapevine away from mostly just kicking and slapping leather, we can now choose to groove as we cha-cha in sequinned Line dance shoes, shiny black patent, shoes that are gentle on your feet and even more gentle on your pocket.

We can chill out in high-topped or low-topped Line dance sneakers, bounce around like Shania in air sneakers with split mid soles and rubber airbag inserts in the heels to cushion our weary little toe-tapping tootsies.

Way back, when the craze for Line dancing in the UK was brand new and massively Popular, I enjoyed, along with many others, the chance to dance dressed like I a cowgirl. Where else could I have gone out dressed in a bright red Stetson, fringed suede skirts and scarlet boots with tassels dangling all down the sides, and not risk being thrown out for being improperly dressed.

If you are a forever in blue jeans kind of person, that's OK. But we Line dancers don't just get a kick out of being creative with our choreography, we took jeans and made black the new blue — and we discovered something magical to go with them: Dazzling diamante crystals, gem stones that we could iron straight on to our clothes, dreaming up our own unique designs, as complicated, or as discreet, as we wanted, to skid down the

our eager little mitts

seams of our trousers and sizzle across plain T-shirts and tops. What John Dean did with sequins to his black Spanish jackets inspired us all to overdose on glitter and head for the hot glue We started to dress in black a lot. Out went the frills, gingham and red, white and blue. In came "cool cowgirl", disco-driven but still giving a nod and a wink to her Country music roots. Stetsons were mostly black, silver glittering hat bands circumnavigating the rim. Kippy belts anchored around waists, groaning beneath the weight of Mexican crystal diamonds the size gob-stoppers. They were expensive - they cost a month's wages for some. But how we craved that belt. It lit up a pair of black jeans and top like a string of white lights dazzling down the Champs Elysee. When the crystals started to arrive in multi-colours we had simply arrived in Rhinestone cowgirl and boy Utopia. As the deluge of demand for Western wear increased High Street shops started at long last to cotton on. What had become a dance floor phenomenon was now becoming a fashion "must-have" too. Suddenly we could get



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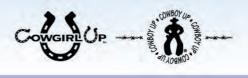

on imitation suede Pocahontas tops, fringed skirts, gypsy/Mexican styles – we could afford more, simply because now they cost less.

Meanwhile, our favourite choreographers were not only providing a glut of inventive new dances for us to try out each week, we could buy T-shirts from them, like we could at pop concerts, with their names emblazoned in bright skittish jokey writing or glittering sparkle: Maggie G with shamrocks, Rob F telling the world that "this is the future of Line dancing", urging us to dance with "The Beast".

We wanted Jo Thompson's black trousers and patent leather. We wanted Michael Vera Lobos's honey suede. And as for Max Perry's multi-coloured Hawaiian shirts... well, we weren't quite sure we all wanted that. And we had mixed feelings about Peter Metelnick's foray into kilt wearing.

Does it matter? Line dancing fashion is a wonderland of choice whether we feel like sparkling in sequins, digging our heels in denim, or just going with the flow of the special dressing up themes that are so much a part of the social Line dancing club scene that we all get such pleasure from. The weekly classes and dances that are simply Line dancing's lifeblood.

Competition dancing takes dressing-up to an altogether different sphere – the cost of these gorgeous one-off very special designer outfits in satin, silk and diamante trimming will send the most level-headed into a multitude of flat swivelling spin-turns. But the end results are so worth it! You can choose to dress in Western best – and many still do – or simply black and slinky, Day-Glo and kinky. Whatever you personally choose to wear on the dance floor makes no difference.

Like Line dancing itself, dancefloor fashion is there to be enjoyed and savoured, to give us a chance to go a little bit mad occasionally. And when you do — admit it — aren't you so glad that you did?

Developing Skills of the Dance Teacher

I am looking at some of the changes and influences related to the learning and teaching of line dancing that have occurred in the 100 issues since Linedancer was first published.

IN THE BEGINNING

Everyone could do it, everyone wanted to do it. This was Line dancing when the first issue of this magazine was published. If you could walk then you could Line dance. It was a challenge but not too much of a challenge. It gave people of all ages, shapes and sizes, motivation to get up and dance. Friends were made, fun was had and Country music was played in places it had never been played before.

DANCE SKILLS

So, what kind of skills did Line dancers need back then? Looking at the very early issues of *Linedancer* it is not surprising to see dances that have lots of grapevines, stomps, hitches, touches, scuffs, shuffles, digs, taps and walks. Turns at this time were mainly, pivot, paddle and unwind. Of course other movements were also around in dances at this time but the key ingredients were the basic moves that everyone associated with Line dancing.

TEACHING

Teachers at this time could focus on teaching all the basic moves knowing that once their dancers had mastered them they would be able to tackle a whole range of dances. The focus in my own classes at this time was to help everyone get to know the individual movements, independently of the dances. This helped them when learning dances because movements could be joined together, rather like building blocks. This system, based on the principle of breaking something down to its smallest component and then building it back up again to achieve sound foundations and understanding of what you are doing, worked really well and still does today.

CHANGES

Over the eight years that *Linedancer* has been published, changes in the complexity of the dances have influenced dancers, teachers and everyone else connected with Line dancing. There have been many debates within the magazine and on the website, message board, about the numbers of dances being choreographed, the level of ability needed to perform these dances as well as — dare I mention it? — the ongoing debate about music styles and preferences.

MORE DANCE SKILLS

To perform the latest dances today, dancers need many more dance skills than they did when *Linedancer* first arrived on the scene: They need excellent balance and dexterity of footwork. They need to be able to turn faster and in opposite directions in quick succession. They need to be able to combine footwork and use of arms. All of these skills require more injury prevention techniques to be incorporated within dance skills and performance.

MORE TEACHING SKILLS

For teachers to be able to help their dancers achieve these more demanding skills they have had to increase their own knowledge and ability. Teaching skills have had to develop so that teachers can help their

dancers to dance safely, with minimal, injury risk. In recent years, teachers have also had to address lots of non-dance areas like risk management and assessment and child protection for those teaching under 18s or vulnerable adults. In fact, I have spent a considerable amount of time during recent years in UK and internationally, educating dance teachers about many of these non-dance issues.

SHO'S DANCE CLINIC

If you are a regular follower of Sho's Dance Clinic, you will be aware of the variety of topics I have covered during the past couple of years aimed at promoting safe dance practice and good teaching practice including: reducing the risk of knee injury for line dancers, SAGCA model of five stages in learning Line dancing, treat your feet, post Line dance syndrome, Line dancing your way to fitness, slim line, risk and teaching and the smoking debate. Feedback since the column started two years ago has been very positive. Here's to the next 100 issues.
