

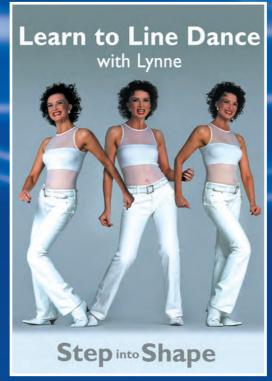

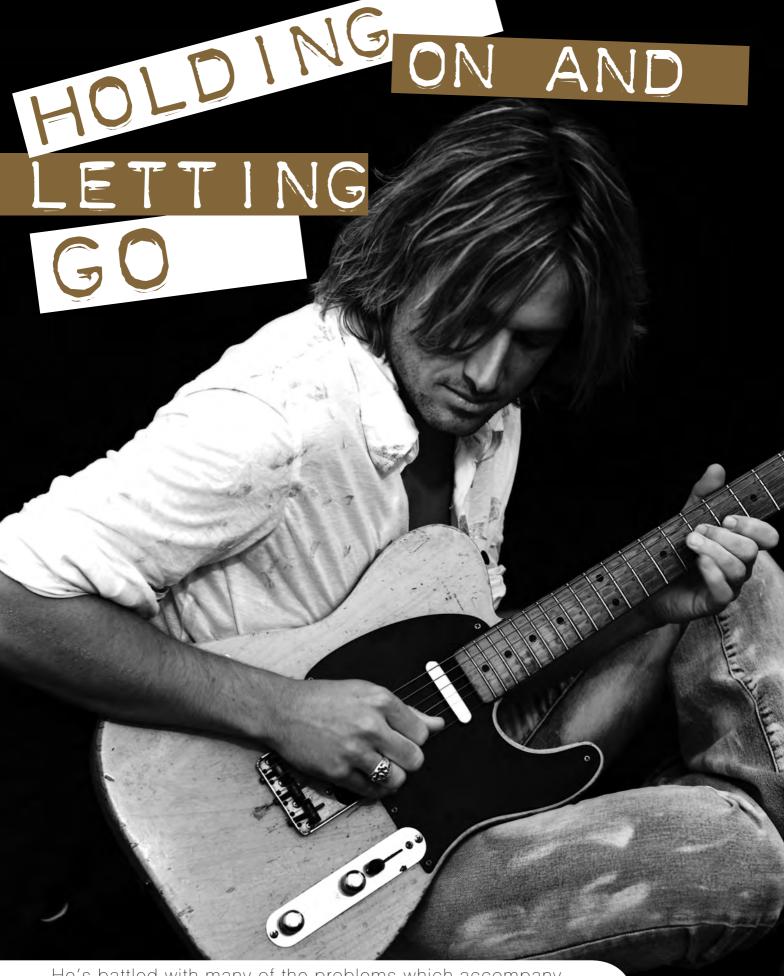

He's battled with many of the problems which accompany superstardom but Keith Urban is still churning out toe-tapping music. As he releases his latest album, *Linda Willis* delves into the troubled soul of this golden-haired, blue-eyed boy

ince he left The Ranch in 1997, Keith Urban's unique brand of Aussie/US Country music has catapulted him to multi-award winning status. His self-titled debut album supplied a string of Top Five singles and Golden Road lived up to its name by going gold in eight weeks. And we have all danced to Somebody Like You and Who Wouldn't Wanna Be Me. Urban is a good-looking heartbreaker cloaked in an air of mystery - yet the only heart he seemed intent on breaking was his own - the unfathomable reason a secret only he knew the answer to.

Now the 37-year-old Scorpio born in Whangarei, New Zealand is back *Glad to Be Here.* This is an album born of the moment. Filled with the realisation that life is happening – right now.

Urban has battled his own personal demons over the last few years, fighting cocaine dependency and alcohol abuse. But, backed by a new band, he appears to be rejuvenated. Along the way he's learned some pretty big lessons. This usually private person is prepared to share at least some of the secrets. *Nobody Drinks Alone,* he confesses, "came from being that guy. It's being about accountable for your actions in this life. The point is — no matter where you are, and what you are doing there's always another presence. Call it your conscience, call it God. But it can be what you need to turn to when you're doing less than healthy things".

Urban's depression and his drug dependency led him to Nashville's Cumberland Heights Clinic. He could have done what so many before him have done – kept quiet. But he decided to speak out because "if you deny stuff like that it just gets worse and worse." Keeping on the straight *Golden Road* is a constant balancing act. "Any addict will tell you that you never beat it. But I don't struggle with it. I don't get up in the morning and go, 'Oh, I've got to have some cocaine'. I've had no desire for the longest time for any of that. But it's important not to get blasé about it. I know where I'm at. God knows where I'm at."

Loneliness also took it's toll on the young man who can set a guitar alight simply by feeling it. Asked if he's happy his reply is typically enigmatic. "I walk by a piece of happiness every now and then, there it is." He smiles, adding. "I think to some degree, with certain artistes, there is comfort in the struggle." Drinking and partying has been put on the back burner. "It's a different kind of fun for me now." he says. "My whole focus is on the show, whereas it used to be on some of the 'extra curricular activities.' It got to the point where sometimes the gig was in the way of partying.

You'll get your talent taken away pretty quick if you keep treating it like that. I was in a place in my life where I took everything for granted, and I was struggling with some powerful demons. It was the support of my family that pulled me back out of the hole again. Made me stronger. I also lost a relationship in the middle of it. But it made me realise you can't do anything alone. If you try the more isolated you get."

When his right vocal chord haemorrhaged last January he was forced to face up to bleak and bitter reality. "I had to sit at home and think about performing. If it got taken away from me. How would life feel. It really shook me up. Because I live to play. If that's what you've done all your life, then it's a huge part of who you are. If you've been blessed with the ability to do it, it's part of who you are, and there's nothing wrong with that. When you have a God-given talent to perform in front of people. That's what you do."

Urban is still seriously single. Since parting company with The Ranch he admits he enjoys the creative freedom of being solo. "It's much easier to accomplish a lot more in a shorter period of time. He who runs alone runs the fastest. I don't have a relationship. I don't have kids. I'm a bachelor. I rent my house and I'm pretty much able to spend all my time on music."

I Thought you Knew was written after his eyes were opened wide to the misconception that all females are mind-readers. "I'd been in a relationship with a girl for five years, and it had fallen apart for many, many reasons. The bottom line was my girl was leaving that day to move to another country. It really hit me hard what was happening. I wanted to write a song called, The Man Who Assumed. I took it to a great writer and storyteller, Skip Ewing. He asked what the song was about. I said, It's about a guy who assumes that his girl knows how he feels about her although he's not very good at telling her'. Skip asked - 'In what context did you not tell her?' and I said, 'Well, I always thought she knew'."

Urban reckons it's a 'guy thing'. "We end up getting so preoccupied with other things in our life that we neglect some of the home front. We assume that our partners are confident and strong enough to know that we're just busy but that we still love them. Unfortunately, my girl and I had already gone through some rocky patches and this was not a great time to assume anything.

I think guys also say things in heated situations that they don't mean. I would tell women to — listen between the lines." It didn't get them back together but it was therapeutic. "And at least she now knows how I felt," he laughs.





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The eyes have it for Urban - it's the first thing he notices about a woman. And he believes he's romantic. "I like to buy cards. Usually the ones I like the best don't say anything on the inside. The picture on the front says everything." Champagne and roses are not his style. Perfect romantic evenings for him are more real than that. "One of the best was at home. We had a really great dinner and watched a movie. After the movie we went to bed but couldn't sleep. So we got up. And went outside and lay in the hammock with a quilt wrapped around us. A storm came over and we were being thrust around in this hammock by the wind, watching the trees blowing above us. It was just beautiful. The rain started pelting down and we didn't move. We just stayed there and cuddled. It was great."

It takes something special to keep Urban interested. "A combination of confidence and humour. When that blend is right it's extremely sexy. They go completely beyond aesthetics because you don't have to be good looking to have those qualities."

Does he consider himself a sex symbol? "No," he laughs. "I take it with a grain of salt. As Mel Gibson once said when someone asked him what it was like to be the sexiest man alive: 'Well, it's better than being the sexiest man dead'. I'm also very well aware that when I was going to school, I couldn't get a girlfriend. All of a sudden when I started doing musicals there were hordes of women around. I learned early on that they weren't interested in me, they were interested in something else. That has helped me keep a reality check about who I am and what people want from me."

We may be happy to jig along the hardwood to the Urban vibe but some fans have told him they like doing something else entirely to his music. Making love. "I think that is a huge compliment," he smiles.

Keith Urban may look more like a rock star but Country is where his roots are firmly planted. "That's certainly the music which is at the core of what I do. It's funny, often

the Country audience goes, 'I don't think he's that Country' and the rock audience goes, 'Of course it's Country'. I think Country is really a spirit. It's just an indefinable thing. You either have it or you don't. I think I do."

Just like Urban, the hooky choruses of *Live to Love Another Day* speak volumes to me. "It strikes a chord with anybody who's knocked down," he says. "I think we're all continually learning the importance of getting back up."

This man can make his guitar cry out with fiery passion, his lyrics hit your soul. He is also a mean drummer, keyboard, gango, banjo and sitar player. "I'm a showman," he says modestly. "That's what I do. And that's what I live for. To entertain. Making people comfortable and them having a good time is much more important to me than my own good time. It makes me happy. I love playing. I love singing, I love recording. The love of all those things propels me forward and takes me places I could never have dreamed I'd be."

Before we can deal with the tax issues arising from Line dancing activities, it is important to distinguish whether you are actually trading or not. If you are not trading then there may be no tax to pay, for example, people who teach Line dancing voluntary and receive no payment.

There are various criteria to determine whether or not you are trading. The most important ones for Line dancing are the frequency and the profit criteria. If you teach Line dancing regularly, make a charge for this, rent a hall, and advertise your class, then you are running a business and you will be trading. It is impossible to go into every scenario, and separate advice may have to be taken for your specific situation.

If you are trading, you will have to notify the Inland Revenue by a certain date. Accounting years and tax years may not always co inside with each other. The tax year always finishes on the 5th of April but your own accounting year may end at a different date. If you fail to notify the Inland Revenue by the deadline then there could be a penalty if there is any tax outstanding by 31 January following.

The Inland Revenue is very good in sending out tax returns to anyone who has registered and as soon as you have registered you are in the system. If there are any changes in circumstances, for example, you have moved address or you are no longer trading then you will have to notify the tax authorities on your tax return.

The tax return is many pages long as it provides for all types of earnings. You may also need to complete supplementary pages. It is understandable that many people get stressed out filling in their tax returns.

If you return the completed form by 30 September, the Inland Revenue can calculate the amount of tax you owe from the information you have provided. If you miss this deadline then you will have to provide the Inland Revenue with a calculation showing how the amount of tax due has been arrived at.

In order to calculate the amount due, accounts need to be prepared for your business. The accounts can be prepared by yourself or an accountant to show the amount of profit/loss you have made during the year. These accounts then need to be adjusted for taxable profits/losses. Not all expenses can be claimed against tax. There will also be cases where the expenses are partly business and partly private.

You also have to bear in mind that your earnings should reflect your specific standard of living. If, for example, your combined, declared income (spouse and yourself) does not cover your household expenses then you could be in trouble.

The Inland Revenue will not just accept any figures on face value and, on occasions, they will ask you to provide evidence of certain expenses you have claimed. It is therefore important to keep your business records: receipts, cheque stubs, cash books, bank statements and so on. It is a legal requirement that if you run a business then you have to keep accounting records for at

safe side and keep them for an extra year.

If you thought that there was only tax worry about, then you need think again. to What the about National Insurance contributions? employed need to register and pay National Insurance class 2. If your business makes a profit in excess of the tax free amount, which is £4,745 for the tax year ending 5th of April 2004, you also need to pay National Insurance class 4 contributions.

Every year the tax authorities investigate a number of tax returns at random or following up information received. Also the Inland Revenue monitor local papers, shop windows, websites and so on. They are specifically interested in businesses advertising their services and who are not registered with them.

Finally, don't be scared but be prepared. Now is the time to get your affairs in order, believe it or not but the 31 January 2005 is looming around the corner and if you do not get your return in on time, there is an automatic £100 fine, plus interest on any unpaid tax.

A good Tax Advisor/Accountant can take the strain off your shoulders and leave you free to get on with the job of Line dancing.

The Inland Revenue has different schedules for each type of income. For instance if you are employed by a company, you will fall under schedule E if you are self employed you will fall under schedule D case I [income from a trade] or case II [income from a profession]. If you only have casual earnings you will fall under schedule D case VI. Why are these schedules so important? For each schedule there are different rules relating to the treatment of losses, the payment of national insurance contributions and the deductibility of expenses.

There are situations when a person's earnings fall under more than one schedule. For example you can have a part time job [schedule E] and also have your own part time business [schedule D case I or II] at the same time.

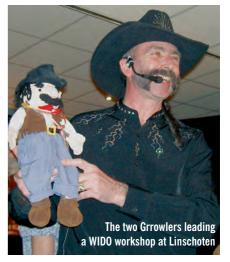

Grrowler goes Dutch

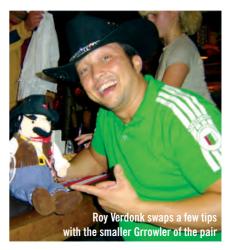


Bob Grrowler has completed his first tour of Holland, taking with him his doppelanger lucky mascot, John Grrowler, to help with some dance instruction.

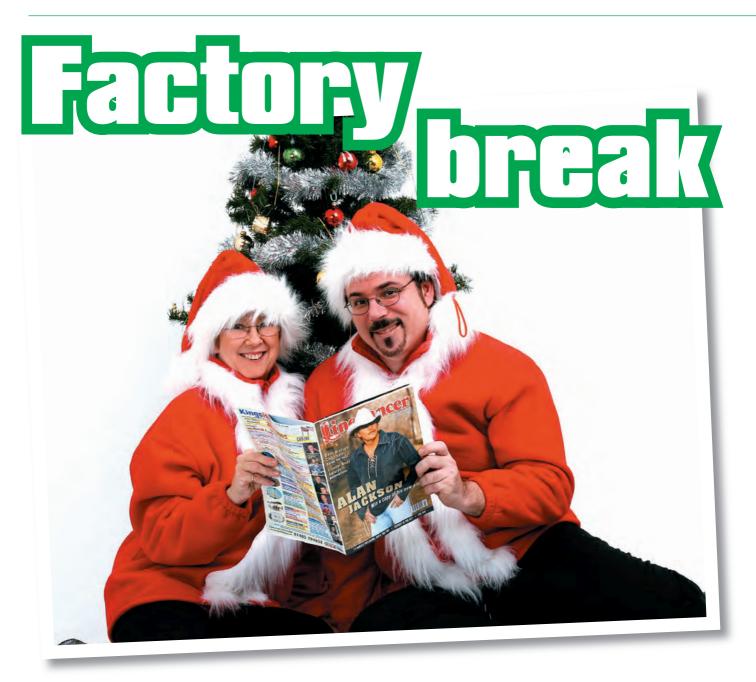

ike most factories, the Line dance partnership of Peter Metelnick and Alison Biggs will be closing their doors for Christmas. The pair have had a more than usually busy 2004 and, after returning from a month-long tour of the United States in mid December, they plan to pack away their dance shoes and enjoy some well-deserved R'n'R at their St Albans home.

Because they spend so much time on the road, Christmas at home is particularly special for them. Despite the hectic seasonal schedule, they choose Christmas gifts together and enjoy wrapping them together while listening to a few favourite tracks. Peter is particularly good with gifts and always includes a little dittie on the label which give a clue to the contents.

Alison loves to prepare a tradional Christmas Day meal with all the trimmings and Peter enjoys eating it before talking to his family in Canada. But the pair are never far away from the work they love - last Boxing Day they created five dances.

Despite such prolific creativity, the couple don't care for "The Factory" nick-name and point out that, compared to some other choreographers, they don't produce an excessive amount of new dances. But the name sticks perhaps because of the quality of their routines and the enthusiasm with which dance clubs pick them up. Whatever they say, their dances seem to be everywhere. But with each hit, with each award, the pressure to deliver the goods intensifies.

"It gets harder and harder," says Peter. "When you're coming up, everyone is behind you. When you've won one or two awards it gets harder to sustain. If we didn't love Line dancing we couldn't do it. It's a very stressful profession, you're always putting yourself on the line as a choreographer — you never

know if people are going to like your stuff. You have to have a certain fortitude and be really thick-skinned."

The couple have little to fear, however, as the rank and file Line dancer shows no sign of tiring of their steps. Last year Peter won his fifth Linedancer magazine Crystal Boot award for choreography and Alison has is gaining respect all over the world.

"When I won my fifth choreography award I was really thrilled because I was the first person to win five," says Peter. "I had set myself that goal and was delighted to achieve it. We hear people saying 'it's the same people winning awards' but you must be doing something really well to keep winning.'

However, he knows that all the awards in the world won't save them from the ultimate verdict – what the punter wants.

"You go to a lot of places and a lot of people have never heard of you," says Peter. "That can be a bit deflating but there's no reason why they should have. A lot of dancers don't know who the choreographers are - they may love the dances but they don't take an interest in who was behind them. It's rare you go to places and feel like a star. You have to work to win people over."

Perhaps it's the pair's humble Line dance beginnings that immunise them from becoming too big-headed.

Alison was a fitness instructor who drifted into Line dancing at the request of some of her pupils, spending years on the sidelines before teaming up with Peter and pushing her ideas to the fore.

Peter, meanwhile, was a recreational planner for older people in his native Canada and only became a Line dance teacher when his seniors demanded a class and he couldn't find a teacher in time. As things snowballed, he eventually decided to take a year's sabbatical in order to explore a dancing career - and never looked back.

"We both began at the start of the Line dancing boom," says Alison. "In those days you didn't dance a lot of dances in one evening and everyone was basically beginners. Those were the days when people thought they had to do it in Western wear."

Peter shudders at the memory: "The move to wearing more dance-friendly clothes is a positive change. When I first started I was expected to dress the part, wear Country clothes and a cowboy hat. I used to sweat terribly and felt very uncomfortable in country gear. It looked good, and I have no problem with people wanting to dress like that, but for me it is impractical for

changed?

awful. But people who didn't think they could dance were suddenly putting steps together and thinking 'wow' I can do this. The enthusiasm was so great and people's expectations weren't what they are now. Everyone was happy with what instructors had to give.

"Back in the beginning it was all Western music. I love Country music but it's not everyone's taste. Peter and I try to give Country and non-Country alternatives to the same dance. Often, as much as people enjoy dancing, their enjoyment is music driven. A lot of the time, the success of a dance owes a lot to the success of the track it uses."



Tips from Peter and Alison

We see some great dances in our travels. Here are a few you might want

Playing Honky Tonk by Robert Lindsay. Good country music by Heather Myles and some interesting steps.

Auto Moves by Judy Cain. This simple dance packs floors in the US. Music used is not the original music for the dance but Rod Stewart's The Motown Song. Our improver class really like this dance

Mood Swing by John Dembiec. We've taught this to one of our intermediate classes and it was well liked. It's a good 32-counter with some interesting moves. Great music as well

Funkalicious by Masters In Line. Very well choreographed by Rob & Co. We were impressed by how music and choreography were so well matched. This dance is really taking off in the US.

And here are a couple of our dances which fill floors when we teach them:

Alison's Bad Moon On the Rise has had a good response from the dancers and favourable reviews. Classic music by Creedence Clearwater Revival. Also alternate tracks by Olsen Bros and Josh Turner (for the Country lovers).

Dreams of Martina has had a phenomenal response. Beautiful Country music by Hal Ketchum

8-9-10 Let's Do It Again and Turning Up The Heat have both been crowd favourites as well and hits in the US for the past year.

"I have a music background," says Peter. "I know how to listen to music and phrase and so I'm always conscious of trying to get the dance to fit the song. We always have a bank of music sitting on the shelf and we'll listen to songs and see what catches us. We're always looking for the perfect song - for Line dance purposes that is always going to be one that's 32 counts or 64 or 48, something that's perfectly phrased. We are always looking for our dream song."

When they find that magical track - like the Sugarbabes recent hit, Round, Round Baby, - they go into the studio to work out how to express the feeling the music gives them through dance. However, while some choreographers strive to push the boundaries of what is technically achievable, Peter and Alison always have the average dancer in mind.

"When we are testing dances, anything that

feels awkward

or we have

Peter. "We try to make sure everything is going to flow. Dances that take you in one direction and all of a sudden lurch you in another are one of our pet peeves. It doesn't feel natural. This puts a lot of dancers off the pastime. They'll do it but they won't understand it or enjoy it because it doesn't feel right.

"I see in parts of certain dances a weight change that's really awkward, or a step pattern is rushed or too much syncopation in the steps and overall it is too fiddly and not enjoyable."

Luckily, there's no shortage of work for Alison and Peter. They are touring in the UK more and are invited over to America so much that they considered moving over there - but decided that Alison's college-age daughter would flourish more in her home country.

"We joke with all the other major

choreographers that we're like

got along fine with other choreographers, everyone's professional. There's a courtesy that most of the choreographers extend to each other. It's essential - you don't know who you are going to work with from one week to the next."

And what is next for The Factory?

"Right know, we've just come out with some new dances so there's no pressure to come up with something new at the moment," says Peter. "We're going to have a break for Christmas. We're always aware of the complaints some people have about there being too many dances so we try not to have so many - which is funny because people call us The Factory. There's this idea that we choreograph dances every day, that we eat sleep and breathe dancing and we're choreographing non-stop. It's not true".

Protests aside, which dances stand out from the pair's massive output.

"I've got many favourites but one really stands out," says Peter. "It took me up from being a nobody to at least up a rank, and that was a dance called Going Once, Going Twice to John Michael Montgomery's Sold. That won me a choreographer of the year award in Canada and had come second in a competition in the States.



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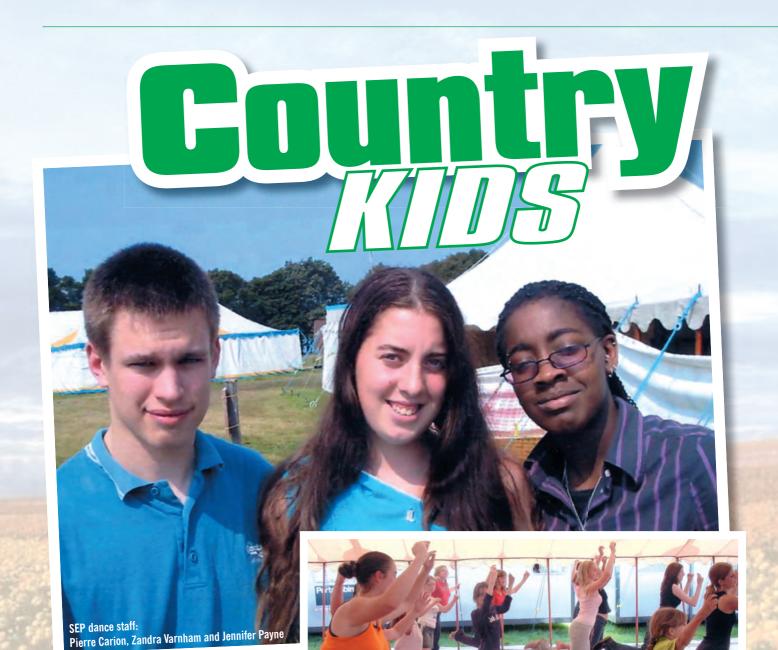
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Summer camps used to be about all that great back-to-nature stuff – all that hill-walking and sailing. Until, that is, Zandra Varnham took Line dancing to a young people's camp in the Scottish Highlands. Linedancer's youngest writer – 14-year-old Jenna Sherwin – sent us this report

he Summer Educational
Programme (SEP) is a Christianbased organisation which runs
a yearly summer camp in
Loch Lomond, Scotland. The
purpose of SEP is to help
campers aged 11-19 to learn
new skills like team building,
patience, tolerance and social skills.

Learning Turn Up The Heat

The liveliest and loudest activity on camp is Dance. It has been run by Zandra Varnham for the past two years and includes Line dancing, cheerleading, Irish dancing and Western partner dancing.

Line dancing has brought fun and smiles to the dance floor of SEP. Last year dances taught were Cheeseburger, The Kabouterdans dance, Cha cha slide, Turn up the Heat and many more – the most popular was Phloor Philla.

Unfortunately there was a power cut and batteries wouldn't last long enough for Zandra to give a whole lesson on a small CD player. So Zandra jumped to it and taught cheerleading, the campers were then taught how to choreograph routines. This was another success of the camp and she saved the day.

Zandra returned this year and taught: Hold your horses, Slappin Leather, Tush Push, Anybody Wanna and Dream On as a partner dance plus a recap of everything done last year. The most popular dances this year were Dream On and Slappin Leather.

The dance lessons turned out to be great fun for everyone. They all respected the rules of dance floor etiquette and got on with what they were supposed to be doing. All of the campers seem to prefer Country music to modern. Which to Zandra was surprising.

As an added extra, Zandra introduced a new evening activity this year: Inter-Dorm dance contest. Each of the 10 dorms was given a type of dance that they had to perform in outfits and as close to the dance type as possible. The winners were one of the boys' dorms who performed ballet in tutus

made from bin liners and tights and received the loudest cheer throughout the whole of camp.

A demo was performed to *Phantom of the Opera*. It was a mix of ballet and Line dancing choreographed by Zandra and her assistant dance teacher Jenette Clothier. The dance they performed was absolutely brilliant, I could hardly speak after that, I had never seen anything that truly beautiful before.

The staff who come to SEP are all volunteers and work for nothing but food and board. We are very privileged to have had so many qualified dance teachers over the years. Zandra; in Line dancing, Irish dancing, Cheerleading, Western Partner dancing, Jennifer; in Hip Hop and Street dance. Pierre for rock'n'roll and swing and Jenette; for ballet and jazz.

SEP is costly to run at £52,000 a year and relies purely on fundraisers throughout the year to pay for it. Zandra and Craig Cooke held a dance social night back in March to help raise the money and put it towards camp fees. They raised £260 which was greatly appreciated by the organisers of the camp.

Zandra fund-raises often for SEP, and will be doing some fundraisers this year as some of the equipment does need to be replaced. Please support her and her dancers if she is teaching in your area, and maybe we will be bringing you a report on teaching in Scotland next year as she has been asked to return for a third year.

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A panel of 'experts' with sharp tongues and bad attitudes will provide the cheeky comments for a little bit of fun BUT the winners will be chosen by audience vote.

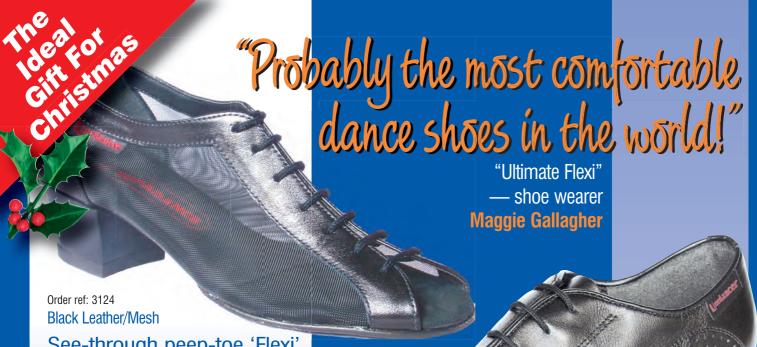
Caught In The Act Ann Wood

Most of the tracks here have been, or could be, used for Line dancing like: Crazy Little Thing Called Love (89bpm), Guitars, Cadillacs (86bpm), Suspicious Minds (124bpm), and my favourite Dwight Yoakam song A Thousand Miles From Nowhere (116bpm).

There are many good dance tracks including: *Honky Tonk Man* (144bpm) a cool east coast swing, *Little Sister* (146bpm), *Little Ways* (132bpm), *Please, Please Baby* (166bpm), *Streets of Bakersfield* (107bpm), *Long White*

Cadillac (126bpm), You're The One (96bpm) – a rare waltz from Dwight – Ain't That Lonely Yet (107bpm) – a good cha cha – I Want You To Want Me (98bpm), and Things Change (109bpm).

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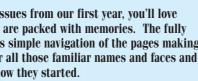
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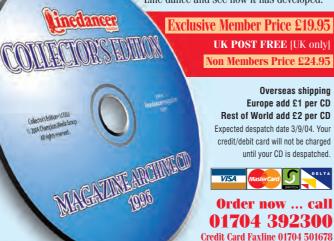
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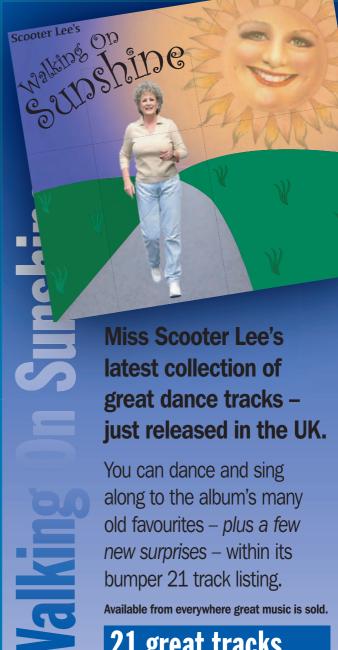

tips and suggestions to help you step your

about it can often spoil their enjoyment.

Having a theme is a great way to inject some fun into a party. *Linedancer* has published hundred of photographs of dancers in all manner of outlandish costumes. From grass skirts to snowmen, you never know what your dancers will pull out of the stocking given half the chance. One year we had Cats: Top Cat, Sylvester – you name it, they were all there. They were the cat's whiskers with fur flying everywhere and tails we simply can't tell.

CABARET

Line dancers love to perform. At the first party we held many years ago, two of my dancers surprised us all by dressing up 'na-



ked' – white long-johns and vests did the trick – with pan-lids for hats and balloons to cover their modesty (See above). They danced Ski BumpUs in contra lines to In Dulci Jubilo. It was hilarious and, ever since, impromptu cabaret spots have become a tradition with each performance getting better, funnier and more entertaining. There's talent in those lines. Encourage it, join it and have fun with it.

KARAOKE

Last year we hired a karaoke machine and I was so thrilled when it coaxed a few back-liners into the limelight. (Scooter Lee and Glenn Rogers are quite safe from the singing talents at my class.) Be sure to balance the night with enough dancing – just take a two-song break every now and again unless, of course, your class sing as well as they dance.

PARTY GAMES

Traditional party games are a must. Mix the games and the dancing together. Try playing Pass the Parcel whilst dancing *Hooked On Country* or any other favourite track. Pass a parcel through the lines and stop the music to remove a layer of wrapping until the lucky winner gets a packet of Wriggles. How about a Line dance Spot Waltz — get a volunteer to dance 'steps' through the lines when the music stops to locate a winner. Give really naff prises for added fun.

PANTO

The year we pinched the routine from the Crystal Boot Awards show: 'If I were not a Line dancer, I'd tell you what I'd be' proved to be so funny that years later it still makes me laugh just thinking about it. Our dance editor, Steve Healy, will never make an actor but he did have a large 'part.' Oh yes he did. Laugh – I thought I'd never stop. Drop a hint a few weeks before your party that you have a five minute Panto spot fill and let the dancers come up with their own ideas. I bet they won't disappoint you. Give them the stage and let them shine

GOLDEN OLDIES

One of the things I love about parties is the freedom to be different. And I just love to dig out the really, really old golden oldies, — the ones that may cause a groan under difference



circumstances. I won't name names but Achy Breaky Heart springs to mind. Dig 'em out, dust 'em off and, because it's a party, watch the smiles.

TRADITIONAL PARTY DANCES

Call a current favourite dance to get everyone on the floor and then cheekily play a party dance. The Macarena is still a favourite, I remember watching Steve Healy (again) and Helen O'Malley trying this as a side-by-side partner dance. Give it a go — it's so funny. Staying Alive is a must, as is The Music Man, YMCA and The Time Warp — but be careful when you play them. It is better to mix party dances with general dancing, unless of course, your name is Tim Ruzgar or Ed Lawton and you can bring the house down with your hour-long version of Party Time.

LINE DANCE FUN AND PARTY MIXERS

Party mixer dances often have us falling about laughing at ourselves. Cottoneye Joe Mixer is good for a giggle as is Cheeseburger and don't forget Dancing Shoe Mixer. Also, be brave and pick a two-wall dance that is likely to convert badly for a mad contra Line dance. Ever done Fly Like a Bird in two facing lines? How about Wishful Thinkin' or Cheek to Cheek? All the better if everyone has forgotten the steps and can't go right for going wrong.

CHRISTMAS CONVERTS

It a nice idea to play a selection of 'Christmas Converts.' By this, I mean find suitable Christmas music to fit your best-loved or popular Line dances. You can have great fun experimenting and making your own discoveries. And you can make it into a bit of a sing-along set too. *Mary's Boy Child* is good for Black Coffee.

QUICK QUIZ

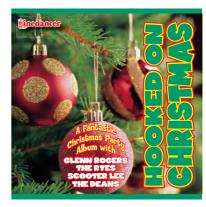
A quick team quiz to 'Name the Dance' can add a note of amusement too. Play a brief introduction of a few Line dance songs and ask teams to 'Name the Dance' or do it the other way round, dance the first eight counts of a dance and ask the teams to either name the song, the dance or the choreographer. Make it short and sweet, they won't want



to be sitting down too long but they will enjoy being Line dance anoraks for five minutes.

Merry Christmas everyone





After a few dances your guests will be feeling peckish. Here are a few suggestions to stoke them up for the second half of the party

measuring 25.5 x 23cm (10 x 9"), brush lightly with butter.

For each cracker, place about three dessertspoons at one end of the pastry, leaving 4cm (11/2") clear at the sides. Carefully roll up then twist the ends. Place the crackers on a greased baking tray. Repeat the process with the rest of the filling and filo pastry. Bake the crackers in the pre heated oven for 20 - 25 minutes until golden and crisp. Serve hot or cold with crisp green salad. Makes 12.

1 packet filo pastry (thawed) 2oz (50g) butter, melted

Method:

Mix turkey with relish or sauce, cheese, onions, parsley, soy sauce and cream. Season lightly.

Cut sheets of filo pastry into squares about 15cm / 6oz. Make the pouches one at a time. Take three squares and keep the rest covered with a clean, damp tea towel to prevent the filo from drying out.

Lay three squares on top of each other brushing lightly in between with butter. Place a spoonful of filling in the centre and draw up the filo into a money-bag, pinching the edges together well.

Repeat until all the pastry and filling is used. Place on a non-stick baking sheet, brushing the sides and tops with more butter. Bake in the preheated oven (190C/375F/Gas mark 5) for about 20 mins until golden brown.

Makes 12.



Ingredients:

50g (2oz) butter

1 small onion, peeled and finely chopped

1 clove garlic, peeled and crushed

1/2 tsp tumeric

1/2 tsp ground ginger

1 tsp ground cinnamon

1 tsp ground coriander

450ml (3/4pt) stock

150ml (1/4 pint) orange juice

1 tsp grated orange rind

125g (4oz) couscous

50g (2oz) sultanas or raisins

50g (2oz)pine nuts, lightly toasted

1 thsp freshly chopped parsley

300g (10oz) cooked turkey, diced

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

6 sheets 275g (9oz) filo pastry

Method:

To make the filling, melt half of the butter in a medium saucepan, add the onion and garlic and cook 3-4 minutes to soften. Stir in the spices then add the stock, orange juice and rind and bring to the boil. Add the couscous then reduce the heat, cover and cook 5-6 minutes until most of the liquid has been absorbed by the couscous grains. Mix in the sultanas or raisins, pine nuts and allow to cool. Just before assembling add the parsley and turkey and season if needed.

Heat the oven to 190C/375 F/Gas Mark 5. Melt the remaining butter. Take a sheet of filo and cut in half to give two pieces



Ingredients:

225g (8oz) cooked British Turkey, finely diced

2 tbsp cranberry relish or cranberry sauce

100g (4oz) Edam cheese, grated

2 spring onions, chopped

2 tbsp freshly chopped parsley

1 tbsp soy sauce

2 tbsp double cream

salt and freshly ground black pepper

LAST MINUTE CHRISTMAS CAKE

Ingredients:

675 g (1 1/2 lb) mixed dried fruits
75 g (2 3/4 oz) glacé cherries, quartered
Zest and juice of 1 lemon
Zest and juice of 1 orange
4 tablespoons dark rum or brandy
225 g (8 oz) butter, softened
225 g (8 oz) light soft brown sugar
4 large Lion Quality eggs, beaten
1/2 teaspoon mixed ground spice
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
50 g (1 3/4 oz) flaked almonds

Method:

Place the first four ingredients in a medium pan. Bring to the boil. Remove from the heat and stir in the rum or brandy. Cool.

Preheat the oven to Gas Mark 3/170C/320F. Grease a 20cm (8-inch) deep round cake tin and line with baking parchment.

Purée one third of the fruit in a food processor. Cream the butter and sugar together with an electric whisk until soft and fluffy. Gradually add the eggs, beating well between additions. Stir in the flour and spices.

Stir in the fruit purée and then the almonds and fruits. Spoon into the tin and level the surface. Bake for 2 - 2 1/2 hours. Cool in the tin. Serves 12.



LIME & COCONUT CRUNCHIES

Ingredients:

50g (1 3/4 oz) butter, softened 75g (2 3/4 oz) icing sugar zest and juice of 2 limes 1 large egg 100g (3 1/2 oz) plain flour 1/4 teaspoon baking powder 50g (1 3/4 oz) dessicated coconut To decorate: 25g (1oz) large coconut shreds 65g (2oz) icing sugar

Method:

Preheat the oven to Gas Mark 4/180C/350F. Lightly oil two baking sheets.

Cream the butter and icing sugar together until fluffy. Reserve 1 tablespoon of the lime juice. Add the remaining lime juice, zest, egg, flour, baking powder, dessicated coconut and mix well to form a soft dough.

Place six spoonfuls of the mixture well apart on each of the baking sheets. Flatten with a fork and sprinkle over the coconut shreds. Bake for 10-12 minutes until golden. Cool on a wire rack.

To decorate mix the reserved lime juice with the icing sugar to make a thin icing. Drizzle the icing over the biscuits. Leave to set. These biscuits can be stored in an airtight container for up to three days.



LOWER FAT FRESH FRUIT GATEAU

Ingredients:

4 medium eggs
125g (4 1/2oz) caster sugar
few drops vanilla essence
125g (4 1/2oz) plain flour
4 tbsp reduced sugar raspberry jam
6 tbsp half fat creme friche or
whipped half fat cream alternative
450g (1lb) assorted fresh fruit such as
strawberries, raspberries, redcurrants,
blueberries
1 tbsp icing sugar

Method:

Preheat the oven to 190C/375F/Gas 5. Lightly grease and base line two 20cm/8" sandwich tins. Put the eggs and sugar in a large bowl over a pan of hot water. Whisk using an electric hand whisk until the mixture is doubled in volume and thick enough to leave a trail in the surface of the batter when the whisk is lifted.

Remove from the heat, stir in the vanilla essence and continue whisking for a further 5 minutes until cooled. Sift half the flour over the mixture and fold in lightly using a large metal spoon. Sift and fold in the remaining flour in the same way. Pour into the prepared tins and spread evenly. Bake for abut 15 minutes until the cakes are risen, firm to the touch and beginning to shrink away from the sides of the tins. Turn out and cool on a wire rack.

When the cakes are cold, spread one with the jam put on a serving plate. Top with fruit then spoon over the creme friche or cream alternative. Sprinkle with icing sugar and chill until ready to serve. Serves 8-10

Stop grumbling and dance

Why do so many people feel Line dancing has to be regimented? Everyone is different and we all have our own tastes but isn't that what makes us all so special and individual? Wouldn't it be boring if we were all alike?

So many letters are written about what people wear, what music is played and which dances are taught and choreographed. Does it matter what you're wearing? If you prefer Western wear or if you prefer the casual look, does it make you dance differently? Surely with such a wide choice of clubs to visit, it must be nice to do a variety of dances to different music rather than do the same at each venue.

My husband and I have been Line dancing for 10 years now and during this time have learned many great dances. We originally started for our love of Country music like many others but, as with everything, times change and we move on.

We still very much enjoy our dancing and run four classes a week here on the Isle of Wight, all of which are very well supported. We feel our success is on our relaxed and easy-going approach to teaching to a variety of music which appeals to everyone. Although we still very much prefer our Country music we also love some of the alternative music and enjoy playing both at our socials. We believe in not forcing our views and taste of music onto others but make it enjoyable for everyone by catering for all music tastes.

I was saddened to read the article *Bowing Out* in the October issue and about how Jean has given up most of her classes because it's changed so much and she can no longer keep up. We feel the reason our system works so well for us is by catering for the clientele we have. We teach different dances at each class and if we introduce an alternative dance we also include a couple of Country and choose beginner and intermediate dances. One of my biggest bugbears is people who won't learn a dance because you've announced it as "a beginner dance". What difference does it make? If you like the dance and enjoy the music does it really matter what level it is?

Lately it feels Line dancing has become a competition – who's teaching what and how many are in the *Linedancer* Top Ten. I see

the magazine's Top Ten as a guide – you don't have to learn every dance printed. After all, it is supposed to be a fun social hobby. Who can learn five our six dances every week, remember them all and competently dance them at the next social event?

Another bone of contention is those who criticise clubs who play nothing other than Country Music. They are doing so because they don't want to see the original Country and Western die out. Let's not forget, if it wasn't for these clubs, Line dancing would never be what it is today and those who slate clubs are very short-sighted. If it works, don't fix it.

Everyone has their own idea of what Line dancing is today and you'll always have those who prefer alternative music over Country but if your club is well-supported and the dances are well-received then this speaks for itself. Let's not criticise others for what they enjoy.

It would make a refreshing change to read positive letters rather than everyone focussing on the negative. There are many great clubs around but we never hear of their good points.

Telford's Line dancing world record attempt

Whilst not wanting to further exacerbate the situation, I do feel that the two letters (Crossing the Lines) included in the November issue of your excellent magazine should not go unanswered. Carping over who received the lion's share of the publicity will do nothing to enhance the reputation of the Line dancing community in Telford.

As a participant in the event, who was present for the full three hours, I state categorically that Alan and Barbara Heighway (Feel the Beat) not only gave full recognition of the invaluable part played by Silver Star but they also ensured that they received the recognition they deserved from the assembled dancers and small audience. Silver Star logos and posters were displayed with equal prominence on the stage and at all times Alan went to great lengths to heap genuine praise upon Paul and Madeleine's contribution both prior to and during the record attempt. He concluded the demonstration by thanking both Silver Star and all their members for their efforts without which Telford's contribution to the world record attempt would not have been so successful.

During both of Alan's radio interviews he mentioned Silver Star several times and again was very gracious in acknowledging the important contribution made by Paul and Madeleine and their members.

At no time did Alan or Barbara ever intimate that the 103 dancers were all from Feel the Beat. The only reference to that number was to inform the Telford public how many local Line dancers participated. In fact, a perusal of the register reveals that approximately 70 were from Feel the Beat and 33 from Silver Star.

Finally, I feel that I must say that what was a really fine effort by the Telford Line dancing community, should not be marred by the uncharitable comments of a small, ill-informed minority.

We have always made our phone number and address available to everyone, especially in the Telford area and welcomed constructive comments on many occasions. Unfortunately, you have both decided to make comments in *Linedancer* magazine about us that are just not true. At no time whatsoever have we claimed that the dancers present at this charity event – or any other event – are all Feel the Beat dancers.

As a matter of interest, Mr Dave Thomas does not appear on the list of recorded dancers so he did not even do the record attempt dance. I have spoken to Paul Jones

of Silver Star and Mr Dave Thomas is not known to him either – to his knowledge, he does not go to any of his classes or socials.

As Madeleine and Paul of Silver Star are close friends of ours, we asked them to take part. On the day, for about four to five hours, they assisted in building the stage, registering names and doing a warm-up session before walking through the record attempt dance but were not organisers of the event.

We advertised Silver Star on posters, flyers, on local radio and in the local press. And, after the event, we thanked them and everyone concerned not only verbally on the day but in local magazines and the press.

It is very sad and upsetting when somebody has to anonymously pass comment this way, with no chance of being asked to account for their accuracy. If taking credit for the event is such a big issue and so important to Dave Thomas and Disgruntled Dancers, perhaps they should spend more than two months – like we did this year – organising the next one and trying to beat the £430 raised this time.

We stand by our motto: Feel the Beat, putting Telford, The Wrekin and Shropshire on the Line dance map. It would appear not everyone appreciates it.

We have used Riviera for three years now. This is our fourth year. We had 30 people booked on it and have lost in excess of £3500.

All our members are devastated. They have lost trust in the Line dance scene and some have vowed to stop dancing over the matter as they feel the money has been robbed from them. Riviera have taken the pleasure and ruined it for our members, and this is what makes it even worse.

I very much doubt that any money will be seen again, resulting in the annual trips which our club, Kountry Kickers, put together, will attract no more interest. Which to be honest, I can see happening. So in the end we all lose out.

We can only sympathise with those who have lost their monies and a greatly anticipated holiday. Ed.

Rhyl fights back

Watching our step with John Wayne

The cover of the October 2004 *Linedancer* brought back memories to me of the first job I had when I left school in 1950.

At that time I was a great movie fan and tried to see every film that was doing the rounds. As I lived in central London at that time there were plenty of cinemas to choose from and all within walking distance.

As soon as I finished my schooling, at the age of 15, I managed to get a job in Warder Street which was the UK home of the film business. I worked for British Lion Films who were also distributors for some American film studios.

The first task they gave me was to tidy up their archive which was in the basement across the street and was full of movie memorabilia consisting of thousands of movie posters and photos of the stars. I spent days totally alone gazing at these old photos — as well as tidying up. And when I asked if I could keep some I was told to help myself.

My first selection was a large poster and a glossy 12x18 photo of John Wayne and Gail Russell. These were posed publicity stills for the film *Angel and the Badman* made in 1947 and exactly as featured on your October cover. I kept these for many years afterwards.

Many people believe John Wayne and Maureen O'Hara starred together in several of Wayne's cavalry movies. In fact, they were together only in one, *Rio Grande* (1950). They starred together in only one other western, *McLintock*, (1963) and again she was his wife.

Maureen O'Hara played a very small cameo role in *Big Jake* (1971) as his estranged wife and she was way down the credit list as an "also ran". They were together again in two civvy films: the memorable *The Quiet Man* (1952) and the forgettable *Wings of Eagles* (1957).

The action picture on page seven shows a scene from the movie *Stagecoach* which was made in 1939. The driver jumping onto the horses is not John Wayne but his stuntman and long-time friend Yakimo Cannut. Yakimo performed many stunts for John Wayne and indeed many others, including the indians in this film. Poor old Yakimo never got an on-screen credit for stunts.

The picture on page nine is a posed publicity still showing Ben Johnson to John Wayne's right and the burglar is Frank McGrath. The other two in the back are unnamed extras.

It is ludicrous to suggest that John Wayne was "second only to Montgomery Clift" as the ultimate macho hero. Monty Clift was gay. Monty Clift macho? Gosh, what next?



John Wayne was second to none as the macho image in films and in real life. But I will concede that perhaps Burt Lancaster and Kirk Douglas were his equals.

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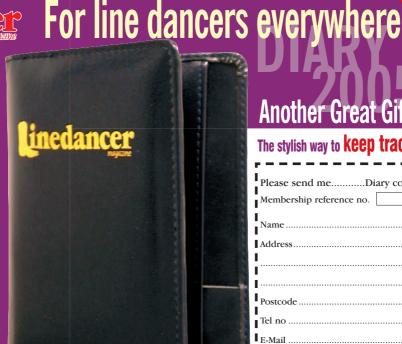
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Let's get physical

We all have them but do we know how to use them? Show Botham turns her attention to muscles.

Anyone who has taken up a new form of physical activity probably knows what it's like to be reminded of muscles that have not been used for some time. This can range from a gentle twinge to mega pain if you have really overdone it.

Virtually, every movement we make is the result of the contraction or relaxation of a group of skeletal muscles. Muscles pull on our bones, making them move. When a muscle contracts, the muscle fibres shorten and pull on the bones causing them to move together around a joint. Bicep curls are a good example to demonstrate this type of action. Without muscles moving the bones we would not be able to walk, run, dance, eat or drink.

Muscles need to be used regularly if we want them to be able to do their job effectively. Healthy muscles have strength, endurance and flexibility. However, they respond to the 'use it or lose it' principle and can become weak very quickly when they are not used. This is why it is so important to be active, regularly.

If you play racquet sports then you probably notice that the muscles of the arm that holds the racquet are bigger and stronger than the other one. This is because the muscles in that arm are doing more work.

Starting a new physical activity can mean that you are exercising different muscle groups or muscles that you don't usually use much. When this is the case, it is likely that you will be aware afterwards of the muscles you have been exercising. Even people who are reasonably fit and active can experience



this if they try something they have not done for a while and especially when trying something new.

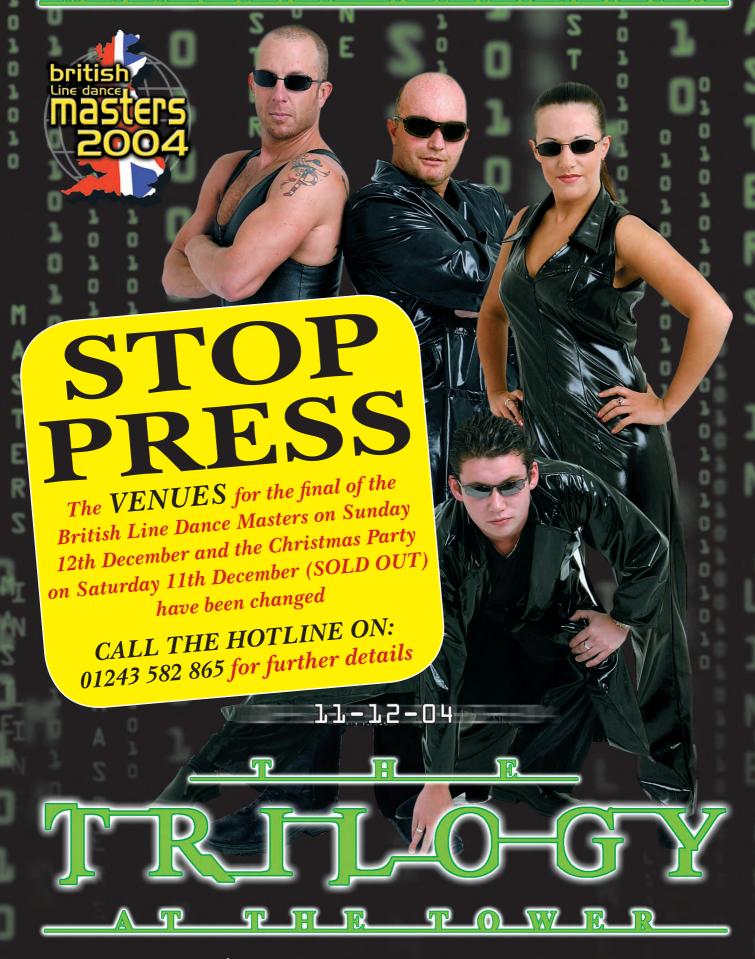
Did you have any aches following your first Line dancing sessions? Did they quickly go as your muscles adapted to the new activity? Taking it easy and making sure that you don't do too much too quickly will help to ease the muscles in without too many twinges. Your instructor can help you to do this in a structured way that takes into consideration any injuries or health conditions that might affect your participation in Line dancing.

The principle of building up muscle fitness gradually, also applies to experienced Line dancers learning new types of movements, steps and styles where different muscles are used or greater demands on muscles might be made. If you've ever danced on a floor that is much faster than what you are used then you might have had a hard job getting out of bed a day or two afterwards because your legs felt as if they had seized up? This happens when muscles tighten up trying to adapt to dancing on a different floor surface.

We can try to avoid muscle problems before, during and after line dancing by making sure we:

- Warm up before each session
- Build up time on the dance floor gradually
- Avoid overstressing muscles through development of self-awareness
 - · Cool down at the end of each session
