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# Dear Dancers



I'm amazed by the number of members viewing the new section on our website 'Watch and Learn'. Already it's proving a great way to learn a new routine and a fantastic way to promote choreography. As an example 'It's Up To You' had 700 views within four days of going on line from 30 different countries. Clearly, our members are enjoying this service and I expect it will become a very important facility in the future.

Instead of working your way through dance scripts to learn a routine you can click a mouse to watch the dance and hear a clip of music. It saves hours of research — no wonder it's one of the most popular parts of the website.

Instructors can quickly see if they like the look of a routine, judge its rhythm, tempo and style before deciding if they want to teach it or not. It also helps to eliminate mistakes too. Members can watch a dance any time 24/7 to brush up on difficult steps, practice at home or just remind themselves of dances they may have forgotten.

For those of you kind enough to send in your video clips I would like to say thank you, you're doing a great job. We're really looking forward to building a terrific library of dance clips for and from dancers all around the world. For those of you who haven't done so yet - I hope you'll try it soon.

Currently our database stands at 20,000 dance scripts so I don't expect we'll ever catch up with that number in video clips but, we'll add as many as we can, especially the hot new ones. We'll also add a few old favourites for new comers or just in case anyone needs a quick reminder.

We rely on dancers to submit footage and to keep the standards high so this month we've prepared few tips that we hope will help you with your preparation.














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
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atching Darren and Lana dance the Flamenco I was excited by the electricity between them. They connected with a sensual touch that gave them a spark and sent shivers down my spine. The judges couldn't praise them enough — it truely was a professional performance — which set the standard for what was to be the toughest final in *Strictly Dance Fever* history.

It was such a pity that the competition was so Fierce. Winners, Hollie and Darrien and third place finalist, Ben and Stephanie are oozing with talent. Each couple had their own individual style and on the night Hollie and Darrien felt right at home with the freestyle and Guapacha. Hollie is a trained Gymnast so can flip and tumble around the floor with ease, this style suits her down to the ground. She was sensational. Their freestyle was definitely the winning formula, it left the judges and the audience speechless, it was awe-inspiring. Wayne Sleep said: "Darrien and Hollie deserved it, they've worked so hard for this. From day one, they've wanted it, they were the most hungry couple and they really deserved it."

During the past few weeks the whole studio was on the edge of their seats as Line dancer, Darren from Newport, South Wales danced through the pain barrier. In rehearsals Darren and Lana had suffered a minor setback as they tried to produce an amazing performance. They found the freestyle routine difficult to choreograph and struggled to contain the

pressure. His injured shoulder didn't affect his performance on the night but, through no fault of their own it was a disadvantage. Climbing a mountain the size of Everest the couple had to dig their heels in to rise to the challenge of a lifetime, Lana said: "The training has been hard. It is long hours but it's all worth it. We just wanted to go out there and do an amazing performance."

Darren should be proud of his achievements, tens of thousands attempted to make the grade, including many Line dancers, but only a selected few were to appear on prime time TV. Darren was delighted to be paired with Lana saying: "She's a lovely person." The chemistry has brought excitement and intrigue to their routines and they have been a pleasure to watch. The images and pictures created by their movements and lifts are beautiful. Darren is a strong performer and Lana is a delight on the dancefloor.


They deserve to go on to be part of a professional company and if history repeats itself they will. Last year, Line dancers Jodie Binsteed and Danny Last came in second and have since been touring the country with Simply Ballroom. Arline Phillips seemed to be a Darren and Lana fan so maybe she will hire them but, the beard would have to go. Arline said they are a cut above and if she was hiring them they are near perfect. She added: "Offer them to me and I would say, yes please."

Looking back over the eight weeks Darren and Lana have been a dynamic duo.



Remember last week their American Smooth was stylish and sophisticated, Wayne Sleep said they are "as smooth as chocolate". I watched that performance from the Green room back stage at the BBC, sharing a sofa with Anton Du Beke. Anton is the master of this dance style and had worked with Darren and Lana back at the Dance Mansion, he said: "They are a lovely couple and are really well matched. I would give them 24 out of 10 for that performance."

For myself, other than Darren being a Line dancer, Lana has a balletic style and was the only dancer who truly performed the adagio with precision and beauty. They brought tears to my eyes as they gracefully floated around the stage with delicate footwork and eloquent extensions, all it lacked was the lifts, otherwise it was flawless. They have produced consitant performances each week and although they lost out to Hollie and Darrien they are our champions.

Darrien said: "it's amazing, I'm shaking - its not sunk in. It was the longest 20 seconds of my life waiting for our names to be announced."

Hollie added: "It's surreal, I don't know what's going on but I know I'm so happy. I want to put the prize money towards a dance studio so I can teach."

Host Graham Norton said of the winners:

"I'm just thrilled it has happened for
Darrien and Hollie, they've worked so
hard and I think out of the final three
couples they wanted it the most and in
the end they got it."

# Voice of a Generation!

John Fogerty is a legend on the music scene, Willie Nelson will be opening his schedule for any US tour dates and after an appearance on Jools Holland, *Linda Willis* feels privileged to learn about his return to music

Unstoppable as a runaway train, Creedence Clearwater Revival reigned supreme from 1968 to 1972 as the most successful rock and roll band in the USA. Singing and playing a unique blend of rock and roll, R and B and cross-over Country they were the voice of a generation. My generation.

Leader, John Fogerty has finally put one of the most vitriolic chapters in the history of pop music behind him. But he's hanging on tight this time to the good bits – the fantastic array of classic songs written by him. The feud between Fogerty and his record label Fantasy turned so bitter at one time that he completely lost heart and stopped playing his own Creedence Clearwater songs in concert for nearly two decades. But a trip to the grave of blues legend Robert Johnson in the Mississippi Delta put him back on track.

"The new album is called The Long Road Home. That's actually a phrase my wife thought of. She's lived with me and lived through this with me for a long time and watched the kind of struggle with detachment. With the sale of Fantasy and new ownership having come in the situation became perfect for me to reconnect with my own catalogue of songs and music. For years and years Fantasy Records for me was a source of almost incalculable pain and discomfort and even anger and bitterness on my part. I mean, there were folks doing stuff that was so nasty to me. So I never really thought I'd be making any new music for Fantasy Records or allowing my name to be connected in any current sense. The English language fails at times like these because it is, as I say, surreal. It's very happy for me. It's almost blessed because what's happened is my wife and I can now look forward to lots of happy events and occasions. It just sort of brings it all full circle and I think that's where Julie was coming from when she said, 'this should be called

The Long Road Home 'cos that's what this is for you.' And I agree with that."


We have all Line danced to Down on the Corner. John's recollection of the way this classic got started is almost as classic as the song itself. I wonder if Walt Disney or A.A. Milne have any idea their character has a starring role in the song: "There was no real band that I had in mind. The original idea started way back in the '60's. There was, I believe, a newspaper ad for Winnie the Pooh, and I think at some point the wording actually was 'Super Pooh Package'. I'm a typical creative person so I was messing around with vowels and sounds. Winnie the Pooh and the Pooh Bears eventually became Willy and the Poor Boys. So that was the name of the Band.

One day the imaginary band became the lead characters in a song who were down on the corner. This is all just wordplay, it's not a song yet, you see? Anyway, one day I'm messing about with music and messing about with riffs and Willy and the Poor Boys join that song and it becomes Down on the Corner.

What can you say about Proud Mary that hasn't been said a hundred times already? "I was and I still am so proud that Tina decided to do Proud Mary. I would imagine that she is too!

I did some liner notes for her Greatest Hits album years ago and I said, 'thank you for shooting my song into the stratosphere'. Because that's really what happened. It went from being sort of a rock classic to this whole other thing which she still owns."

Music has always been a strong part of anything John has done in life: "I must say Bo Diddley is one of my very favourite



artists. His first album was among the first five albums that I bought. As a matter of fact, there was a point where I had to explain to my other two High School band mates, I took the \$4 and instead of buying guitar strings I bought Bo Diddley's record, because I think it is more important that I have that than the new strings. All that spooky imagery. It's magical stuff," he laughs.

"Fortunate Son was and still is, a very strong statement. It's how I feel. Richard Nixon and his well-healed politicians in positions of power pissed me off. I wrote the song at the height of the Vietnam War, at a time when I was certain to be drafted. Anybody my age that I knew about was drafted and had the very real prospect of being sent to Vietnam and being killed. I did not like the policy. It was a stupid war. I suppose you could say that about most wars. I was very angry that people from my position in life were all being drafted and sent to war, yet you knew the senators son wasn't going. You certainly knew the Presidents kids and any of the people they were dating weren't being

sent. Aint it funny how they always extricate themselves from any danger when the big stuff starts happening? It seems exactly as relevant today as it did in 1970, and to tell you the truth, I'm just as pissed off. But also I have to say with some pride, or maybe even amazement, I'm still able to sing it with all the force that I sang it all those years ago."

You can Tush Push to Bootleg. "It's just a little chord thing, de, da, da, da," he sings merrily. "But it is unique and original." He describes how he would, "stare at a blank wall for hours" till sweet inspiration struck the right chord. "It was very late at night and I would just sit there and kind of meditate. Don't get me wrong, I wasn't altering myself with any sort of intake, I was totally natural, but what I was doing was allowing my brain to go wherever it wanted to. I can't say I had a design, I can't say I was clever enough to know what was going on. All I knew is I wanted to write some music."

Have you ever tried dancing Black Coffee to Rambunctious Boy? Who is the Rambunctious

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Boy? "The genesis for this is actually my own children. I have two boys who are now 14 and 13. They were born 53 weeks apart, basically twins. It's a joyous wonderful time of a family's life when you got these two kids so close together. But, as all parents know, boys are different than girls. Boys hit the ground running. They come from the womb all ready to conquer the world. Girls seem to be a bit more sugar and spice and everything nice. They both have their strong points of course, but I use that phrase, 'Oh my God here come the rambunctious boys'. So even without having a song it was a phrase in our family. All I did was switch the person to a kind of semi adult from 17 to 25. At a point when you're still not very responsible. Not really grown up. I was obviously identifying

as it was when I was a young guy. Airports in particular aren't the big fun adventure that I used to think they were when I was 22. So having my wife and kids along with me is a great support, it's a great feeling, that I get to take my real life with me and combine that with this sort of fantasy life of music."

"I think I know what I'm doing," he says. "But you know what? When you get done rowing the boat, because all you were doing is trying to get across to the other shore, I can't say that I really knew what I was doing in that sense. I'm trying to be true to

with that person. When I wrote that song I was far beyond 17, but I certainly remember what it felt like."

"When I was younger I would tell people all my influences were southern and what I like is southern. Isn't everyone? I just thought that was the way the world was. I didn't realise there was some other way, or many other ways to be. I just know that what really attracted me was music of people like Little Richard or Chuck Berry, certainly Fats Domino, certainly Elvis, all the guys on sun Records.

Many years later at the first ceremony for the Rock n' Roll Hall of Fame I was lucky enough to induct Buddy Holly. And there were ten people in that first class of inductees. I looked up and I could see that every one of them was from the south. I looked around and spread my arms, and said, "I rest my case." The first wonderful class of rock 'n rollers was all southern and I think that's a big part of the answer to what made me the way I am."

Fundamentally what's changed for Fogerty? "In the old days I was a young guy allowing all the diversions or rock 'n roll touring to, shall we say, distract me. Whereas now I travel with my family, and happily so. I just really have the best of both worlds. I love performing, I love playing music for people. Travelling is not near as much fun anymore,

myself, of course, but when you tell me things like all kinds of different people, radicals, conservatives, blue collar, several different generations all sort of enjoying my music and feeling that it's grounded, that it's true,

I'm humbled by that, 'cause I'm not sure that I understand why that is. I know that I've been all those people myself and sometimes my politics is way radical. I like to think I'm liberal, you know, I'm proud of it. I know I have a very strong allegiance to people that work with their hands, to working class people, because I have been that at phases in my life."

"I always thought I was a mainstream Rock and Roll guy," he concludes. "I've always thought that Rock and Roll is a great melting pot because there's no rules. In Rock and Roll you know, the purist police don't show up and say stuff like, 'hey you can't do that, you're breaking the rules!' You know bluegrass, Country, I'm sure gospel certainly jazz, they all got the police showing up and say, 'hey – you're not allowed to do that' But in Rock 'n Roll man, you can turn everything inside out, on it's head, say it backwards, front wards, or whatever. As long as it seems the truth, it flies – and that's what I love about Rock 'n Roll!"

and abroad and has friends around the globe. She has even talked her Canadian sister into joining the Lines.





any years have past since the Rattlesnake Roundup in San Antonio hosted the young Bellamy Brothers. To be exact it was 1968 when the boys supported their father, Homer, at a free concert. Only a few years later the song Let Your Love Flow catapulted them into a new stratosphere in their musical career. Howard said: "It was a number one hit in 14 countries, and we tried to go to all those countries at once. It happened so fast — we had to hang on for our lives, afraid to let go. We kept wondering, 'What are we gonna do now?'"

"In Europe, we were on all the pop TV shows with stars like Tina Turner and Rob Stewart," Howard adds. "We were treated like a Country – Rock act, almost a pop act."

Interestingly, that song isn't the one which got them started, their first release, *Spiders and Snakes* meant they were heard on the LA music scene. The idea came from back at their Florida ranch: "We slept on top of hay

to hear." He played me *Let Your Love Flow*. Man, I told him, that's great. Let me play it for Howard. Howard flipped over it, and we went on to cut it."

"It was an incredible time," adds Howard. "We had come from rural Darby to Hollywood, which was weird enough, and then we took off for Europe, and for two years we were in Germany and Australia and Switzerland more than LA. Our first big tour there we did 60 concerts in 63 days."

The brothers have always lived on the edge of Country music, crossing over into the realms of rock, reggae and even rap. Being so diverse means the critics have slammed their work but Line dancers love their music. The Bellamy Brothers song *Cowboy Beat* was the recommended music for one of the first ever dances published in *Linedancer* — Boogie Bop. Consistently their music has been heard on the floor with many Top Ten Line dance hits danced to their classics. It is probably down to their many talents which makes their music fun to dance too.

bales," says Howard. "One morning I woke up with a chicken snake in my sleeping bag."

David fondly adds: "He just came flying out of that sleeping bag and that gave me an idea for (*Spiders and Snakes*)." The song sold over three million copies world-wide for Jim Stafford and made the Bellamy's enough cash to get started. Once on the west coast they began to keep great company with huge names like Bob Dylan, James Taylor and Van Morrison: "We would play folk gigs at the Improv and places like that," David says.

"We had access to the studio in Jim's basement, so we were demoing a lot of songs. I was still pitching tunes to Phil Gernhard (Stafford's manager), but it seemed like every time I went there, Howard was on the road. But Gernhard's partner was on the road with Stafford, and he'd hear Howard singing during sound checks and apparently he liked it, because one day Gernhard called me and said, "Have you and Howard ever thought of being a duo?" I said, "We ARE a duo. All those demo tapes you're hearing — they're us. So all of a sudden we worked out a record deal."

David continues, "We had been cutting demos with Neil Diamond's band while Neil was on hiatus and one day the drummer said, 'Our roadie has got this great song I'd like you For these brothers if you have an instrument then they will play it, Howard plays guitar, banjo and mandolin. David plays the piano, accordion, fiddle, banjo, organ and mandolin. I was shocked to learn their talents don't end with music, they are also graduates of the University of Florida and surprisingly not with a music degree. The power of the mind led David to a BSc in Psychology, while Howard majored in Veterinary medicine.

Making waves over the Atlantic with *Let Your Love Flow* brought the band over to Europe for two years. Success in Britain, Germany and Scandinavia opened many avenues: "We owe a lot of our success to the European market. Quite a few of our records broke over there before they caught on here."

"I think that music is the one language everyone can understand. Everywhere we have gone people have loved us — and we've been to more countries than most ambassadors," Howard said.

Last year, they headlined the Americana Festival in Nottinghamshire and they are about to return to the UK for a one off gig in London: "We've been going over for so many years, we know all the best touring people and they make it real easy. The hardest part is the flight over," he laughs.

Billed as Britain's only dedicated dance exhibition, held at the Olympia convention centre in London, Move It Dance London was three days devoted to dance. The event was packed with opportunities to find out about different styles of dance, careers in dance, specialist dance clothing and footwear (including Pedro Machado selling his Leatherdawg range), dance books, DVD's, health services and advice from around 100 exhibitors. Sho was on the UKA (United Kingdom Alliance) stand, she said: "We were kept busy pretty much all of the time. Some retail exhibitors were so inundated with sales on the first day that they sold out and had to pull out all the stops to organise additional stock for the two remaining days."

Sho also taught at the event along with Carol Barnet from Caroliners in Surrey. It was a daunting task for both ladies. The











exhibition proved that dance is still hugely popular and the demand for it enormous. Despite the organisers putting on 40 additional taster classes, in response to advanced ticket sales, all the classes were overwhelmingly full with three, four or even more participants for every place available. Not wanting to miss out, dancers took to marking through the work and dancing on the floor areas surrounding each class, Carol said: "We were pleased to be invited to go to South Kensington to teach a taster session at this amazing three day public dance event. We witnessed something for all dance junkies, ranging from Ballet, Street and Hip Hop to Latin, Jive, and Oriental. Even Angelina Ballerina was on hand to take the very little ones for a charming taster. With three classes running simultaneously all day, every day the choice was awesome."

Saturday morning put Sho on stage, she said: "I agreed to teach a 45 minute Line dance taster class. Most of the group attending were experienced dancers or students and after a short warm up were fired up and ready for action. My husband, Josh and I kept the dances simple, introducing concepts of walls and contra lines. We encouraged variety in performance and personal styling through dancing the dances to different types of music. There were some highly energetic, fun, arm and body movements contributed by street and jazz dancers, during Symphony Shuffle. Especially when dancing it to Sham Rock's, Tell Me Ma and Ricky Martin's, Maria. The session finished with a short cool down before the dancers headed off to their next taster."

"The taster sessions had such a fantastic response and showed how keen dancers are to try new dance styles. Each time I took some time to see what was happening around the venue I saw groups of dancers focused on getting the hang of new movements or styles, performances given by dancers enthusiastic in their performances and dedicated presenters sharing knowledge and understanding with teachers and others wanting to further their expertise."

The dance enthusiast got the chance to try Line again on Sunday afternoon as Carol Barnet got the dancers back on their feet: "After being handed the mic and quickly shown the music system in the largest teaching area we were on. I had more than a few butterflies in my stomach and I was grateful for the support of the Caroliners club members. We set out to do our bit to promote Line dancing in a positive and attractive light while ensuring everyone enjoyed themselves."



"Over 100 queued to join our class children, complete beginners, dance students and professional who were all curious to have a go.

"We started with a simple warm up of Electric Slide and Cowboy Strut. Paying homage to our roots we danced in a cowboy style to music tracks Wild, Wild West by Will Smith and Swamp Thing.

"Finally, we added some funky moves, dancing to Crazy by Gnarls Barkley and S.O.S by Rihanna. We concluded our energetic 45 minute session with a cool down, the students thanked us before racing off to their next activity. Even the Caroliners took advantage of the

Argentinean Tango class that followed our Line Dance contribution.

"The whole group viewed it as a great opportunity to take Line out to the general dance world and hoped we have been good ambassadors, while enjoying an experience we won't forget."

The weekend brought much joy to the Line dance teachers and dancers, Sho added: "So often in UK we hear pleas for more boys to dance. So I was delighted to witness lots of boys taking part at Move It. One of the things that I thoroughly enjoyed was the small groups of young guys getting together and challenging each other to do various hip hop moves. This was reminiscent of past eras and the stories of how tap dancers used to challenge each other on street corners to do more tap beats than their friends or to devise a new tap sound. Seeing these young guys and girls too, following in the footsteps of dance masters of the past was a real joy."

"I had the opportunity to chat with lots of people involved or interested in dance. Conversations were as varied as the classes on offer at the event. Throughout the event there was an amazing range of free stage performances by professional dance companies. Free seminars and talks about a variety of dance related topics were available covering topics from photographing dance, having a career in dance, injury prevention to preparing for professional auditions. So there was something for everyone with an interest in dance. There was a lot of interest in what the UKA can offer the working dance teacher and I will be joining my UKA colleagues again next year on a stand at Move It 2007 to be held from March 16-18, 2007. Transferring the event to the larger National Hall at Olympia is testament to the popularity of this year's event. I am looking forward to it already."

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

#### DOIN' SOMETHIN' RIGHT

#### Billy Currington

Billy Currington's self titled debut album was a big success and catapulted Billy to the forefront in Country music. There were several dances released to tracks off the album, albeit that disappointingly, none of them were a major hit. Billy now releases his eagerly awaited follow up, the big question is can he better his superb first album?

First song *I Wanna Be A Hillbilly* (90bpm) is an awesome track, a foot tapping, hand clapping no nonsense Country rocker, and someone will surely write a dance to it soon.

**Good Directions** (122bpm) is a bouncy little number with some great lyrics and a good hook, and Lynne and Annette Richardson have written a lovely 64 count, two wall, beginner/intermediate dance to it.

Must Be Doin' Somethin' Right (85bpm) this is a gorgeous laid back song to which Canada's Vivienne Scott has written Dancin' Somethin' Right, a 32 count, four wall, beginner/intermediate dance.

Why, Why, Why (98bpm) is a good up tempo number with a great chorus and this too will surely have a dance written to it soon.

**That Changes Everything** (85/170bpm) is a brilliant two step suitable for both couples and Line dancers, it is simply a great dance track. Try Ribbon of Highway to it, you'll love it.

Little Bit Lonely (129bpm) is also a good dance prospect and Billy's voice is brilliant. I love the steel guitar; indeed all the musicianship is superb.

**She's Got A Way With Me** (65bpm) this is a gorgeous nightclub two step, think Billy Dean meets Ty Herndon. I can't stop playing this.

**Lucille** (128bpm) yes it is Kenny Rogers classic song and Billy's rendition is superb. As this is a fast waltz, you could be dancing to it soon.

Whole Lot More (130bpm) its right back to the up tempo beat with this butt kickin' rocker which would also make for a great dance track.

Here I Am (99bpm) is another of my personal favourites and Robbie McGowan Hickie was inspired to write a 64 count, two wall, intermediate dance to it, and like all the other dances mentioned, you can find it on the Linedancer website. Check out this lovely dance now.

Finally, we have *She Knows What To Do On A Saturday Night* (166bpm) and Michael Diven (USA) has written a cool dance What To Do to it which is 32 counts, four walls and is for beginners, and we don't get enough of those.

The answer to the question is... YES, Billy Currington has definitely equalled his debut album, and maybe even surpassed it. This is a fantastic album, and you could dance to every track on it. Every now and a gain a gem comes along, and this is an absolute diamond of an album. It has the potential to be the most important Country album of the year in Line dancing terms and I strongly advise you get a copy soon – you are going to need it – Trust Me!

Colin Amey ROYALTY RECORDS

Colin Amey is a Canadian Country artist who first sang at age three in a talent contest. His older brother taught him guitar and at fifteen he began singing on demos. In 1990 he had a Top 20 hit and releasing his first album in 1998. After honing his song writing skills Colin now releases his third album Getaway.

**Getaway** (136bpm) a brilliant upbeat number with a great sing-along chorus, a real summer track. You can use this track for Vivienne Scott's Dance Zone.

**Good Enough** (115bpm) Colin had a hand in writing all the songs on the album, highlighting just what a great talent he is. This is a cool Country cha.

**Look At That Truck** (88bpm) could well become a truckers' anthem. It is awesome.

**Revolves Around You** (112bpm) is a gorgeous waltz. Colin shows off his wonderful powerful voice.

**Love Looks Good On You** (128bpm) would be right at home on Bryan Adams album. It's got a great beat and a good hook, the right ingredients for a dance hit.

**That Hurts** (146bpm) is also a good up tempo song, a fast east coast swing, and I see no reason why this brilliant track does not have a dance to it soon.

*It's A Guy Thing* (128bpm) Colin kicks it up with this barn storming, honkytonker. Dance, dance, dance.

*Millionaire* (81bpm) has that Easy Come, Easy Go beat and there are some cool harmonies too. I love it.

**You Don't See That Everyday** (137bpm) this has Bruce Springsteen written all over it, all that's missing is the sax. Another great dance track.

*Is It Just Me* (124bpm) is a super Country cha – it opens with synthesised vocals – a hot dance prospect.

We end with *Fortunate Man* (82bpm) a gentle song which is a steady two step. Colin excels here too.

Colin Amey's Getaway is a superb Country album. It was a very close call with Billy Currington's album for Album of the Month. We are finding more and more that there are as many talented Country artists in Canada as there are in Nashville. If you think that the Nashville based artists are losing there way a little, then maybe you too should start looking to Canada. I really hope that Colin Amey gets the chance that he deserves, he would most certainly not be out of place at Fan Fare or on stage at the CMAs. I urge you all to give this album a try, I know like me, you will absolutely love it!

Tim McGraw needs no introduction, he is a Country superstar. He has consistently released first class albums for the last 12 years.

*Live Like You Were Dying* (78bpm) was the title of his last album and is a delightful nightclub two step.

*My Old Friend* (92/184bpm) also from that album is a great little two step – worth another look perhaps?

*Like We Never Loved At All* (67bpm) is the ubiquitous duet with wife Faith Hill, and this is a beautiful nightclub two step.

**The Cowboy In Me** (75bpm) is one of my all time favourite Tim McGraw songs.

When The Stars Go Blue (90bpm) is magic – the first of four new songs – it was written by Ryan Adams.

**Real Good Man** (90bpm) is a cool west coast swing. **She's My Kind Of Rain** (75bpm) is a nice nightclub two step.

**Grown Men Don't Cry** (102bpm) is a wonderful cha
– a masterpiece on how to write a great Country song.

**Not A Moment Too Soon** (121bpm) was the title of Tim's first album back in '94. This gem of a cha cha still sounds as good today.

There are a couple more from the Dancehall Doctors album *Watch The Wind Blow By* (63bpm) a nice Country song and Red Ragtop (77bpm) the best song from that album which caused a stir when it was released in the States as it is about getting an abortion.

**Over & Over** (80bpm) was the massive hit featuring Nelly which crossed over into the mainstream charts.

*Everywhere* (102bpm) was the title track from Tim's 1997 album and is another of his finest songs.

**Beautiful People** (74bpm) is one of the brand new songs and this too is a fine nightclub two step.

My Little Girl (72bpm) was the featured song on the remake of the movie Flicka and this was quite a hit for Tim in the States

*I've Got Friends That Do* (81bpm) is a new song - a "bonus track". A good song with a powerful message.

So there you have it, a fine collection of Country songs from one of the best in the business. There are a few danceable tracks, but this is a "must have" album for your collection. Tim McGraw fans will buy it anyway, but if you don't own any of his work yet, then this is a great introduction to a great Country artist.

#### **NEW TATTOO**

The John Cowan Band

John Cowan was the singer in the top bluegrass band New Grass Revival who enjoyed success in the late eighties with their explosive and experimental style of bluegrass. When the band broke up in 1990 John experimented with different musical styles until he established his new band and headed back into the recording studio.

The opening track *Carla's Got A New Tattoo* (153bpm) is a superb number and is a polka. You are instantly aware of the band's immense musical talent.

Love's Like Rain (112bpm) takes a little time to get going, almost a minute, but it is well worth the wait. John's powerful vocals along with the superb musicianship of the band make this a brilliant track.

*Misery & Happiness* (68bpm) has some wonderful vocals added by Patty Griffin, this haunting song is one of those that gets inside your head.

*Hurting Sure* (83bpm) has a nice steady beat and has some similarities to Keith Urban's work.

*In Bristol Town* (101bpm) has a Folk feel to it and I love John's vocal delivery. I am not sure it is that good as a dance track, but it is a great song nonetheless.

**Red Birds (In A Joshua Tree)** (130bpm) this track has a much stronger beat with a strong emphasis on fiddles and mandolin, another potential dance track.

*Working In The New Mine* (151bpm) is one of the strongest dance tracks – it is ideal for fast Applejacks.

**Back To Your Arms** (89/178bpm) is a beautiful two step in the mould of Tim McGraw's *Just To See You Smile*. It is my personal favourite on the album.

With A Memory Like Mine (145bpm) is another dance prospect. It is a powerful track, vocally and musically, with some awesome guitar pickin'.

**Tomorrow Morning** (86bpm) would be at home on a Keith Urban album. A feel good number.

**Drown** is the closer and is described as the emotional centrepiece of the album, dealing with the issue of child abuse. This stunning song is thought provoking with a powerful message and should be listened to by all.

New Tattoo is a superb album, different from the mainstream Country albums I usually review. It is a masterful album with some musical genius and whilst there are some good dance tracks, it is an album of high quality songs, music that you can really appreciate.



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ike many who have danced before her, Marisa D'Amato is a natural on the dancefloor. The singing Line dancer has sown her seed in her homeland on the Island of Malta and she is about to embark on a trip to the UK. Booked for many events during the month of July her biggest stage will be at the Wolvestock festival.

Marisa is no virgin to the bright lights: "I've visited the U.S.A. twice so far," she said excitedly. "The first time it was an adventure. I visited six States, starting from Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee and Georgia. I had a gig in Louisiana but the real reason for my visit was that I was to be a guest artiste in Steve Kaufmann's concert held at The Palace Theatre in Maryville, Tennessee. I was so thrilled. Kaufmann is a World Champion guitar player and also writes books and does camps for students. Working alongside him at the concert was Gary Davis, three-time National Banjo Champion, an artiste who owns many state titles as well. Gary is a dedicated banjo teacher, a 15-year Dollywood entertainer, studio ace - and more recently – band leader for Dolly Parton on her Bluegrass Album Tour. This was the most fantastic moment in my life."

She returned Stateside in 2004: "This time I had the opportunity to sing at the Nashville Palace with singer Pam McBeth, and at "Tootsies" famous bar in Broadway Street. This was a wonderful experience for me."

So how does she feels about her forthcoming debut on the British festival scene: "I am really looking forward to the Wolvestock Festival and meeting fellow artistes," she said.

"After that I shall be in Chaddesden, Derbyshire on Monday July 24, where I am booked for a concert at L&B Linedancing. The following night I am entertaining at the Rolls Royce Flyers Line dancing Club."

An obvious lean towards the Line dance scene comes from her appearance on TV in a show named Country Jamboree. The programme is broadcast each Sunday in Malta: "A lot of effort and research goes into the show," she said.

"We screen an hours Country Music Show where we show video clips, have Line dancing classes and do three dances. We also have guest singers and do a biography and calendar section as well as give information on local Country Music events." Marisa is proud to say it is one of the most viewed programmes, with top ratings at the moment. Line dancing groups on the show include, The Southern Country Linedancers, Forever Friends, The Sylvbury Stompers and The Reno Spiteri Dancing School.

Marisa is very enthusiastic about Line dancing: "It is very popular in Malta. I live in the Southern part of the country and you can find classes on different days during the week in different localities. I am a Line dancer myself and also teach a class of beginners once a week. I do it for fun as all the money goes to our Village Feast Club. The local dancers like the same as the dancers in England. The most popular dances at the moment are Kill the Spiders, Speak to the Sky, The World and Irish Stew. Popular requests by dancers are Red Hot Salsa, Waltz Across Texas, Tush Push and Pizzerico. I sing mostly all of the songs they request."

There are several good Line dancing tracks on each of Marisa's albums, including Islands in the Stream, Silver Threads &

Golden Needles, Hillbilly Rock, Hillbilly Roll, and Blue Roses. Her latest CD – as yet untitled – will contain 16 songs – three originals, the rest cover versions. Tracks for dancers include Commitment and Closer.


Her singing talents didn't derive from between the lines. Marisa was once a member of the Police Force where she sang as part of their band. "I used to sing practically everything, according to the occasion. We had mainly receptions that had to do either with the Force, Government or Diplomatic. I began to take an interest in festivals and got involved until I reached my peak, participating in the Malta Song for Europe, which is the biggest musical event on the island."

With all eyes on her, Marisa gave up her job in the Police Force, turned pro and released her second album Country Heart & Soul in February 2004. Her third album Heartaches & Roses included duets with J J Johns and local Country music singer Araldo. Her fourth will be released in time for her UK tour.

This pretty 34 year old is a CMA member and has established herself as a leading Country Music singer. Her ultimate goal is to hit the charts in Europe. "I want to take my music to as many countries as possible. I also want to produce a couple of songs which have potential in Line dancing and if I am lucky they may get into the top ten chart."

Marisa will be performing on the Main Stage at 3.25pm and on Stage Two at 4.45pm at the Wolvestock Festival on Saturday July 22,

Paul added: They whizzed around the room as the audience cheered and clapped the youngsters."

Lastly, Frankie taught Crazy by Neville Fitzgerald.



Joining June Sarpong for the BBC Three show LeAnn was the perfect guest, married to a professional dancer, she is more than qualified to give her opinions on the show. LeAnn also has dancing shoes of her own: "I danced when I was a little girl, but I don't know if I can keep up. I can move but that is some tough stuff.

"My husband is a classically trained ballet dancer, he is amazing."

You'll be pleased to hear she backed Darren and Lana: "I would have to say Darren and Lana they have this chemistry that no one else does."

## All singing and dancing

LeAnn has always been involved in dance and in the past has tried Line dancing, she told Linedancer: "I think Line dancing's great! I tried it a while ago, and it is a lot of fun."

At home LeAnn has a couple of Grammy Awards on her fireplace — she is touring Europe promoting her latest album — Whatever We Wanna. With her love of dance I expect that it will be packed with tracks suitable for dancing too.

Musically LeAnn is almost perfect, especially from a Line dance point of view. The Country pop singer has already had masses of success, selling 37 million records world-wide. You have to ask with so much achieved what is left for LeAnn, but at the tender age of just 23, LeAnn plans on being around for many more years and so we can only wait to enjoy her future, she said: "I'm really happy personally with my marriage and friends and family, but I'm always looking to better myself and to explore new things.

"I'm satisfied to a certain extent, but I want to push boundaries as much as I can, because if you don't, you lose that excitement in life."

Her album is due out on June 5, 2006 and LeAnn says this is the first time she has been

Her life has had some trials and tribulations, for every success there has been hard times. None more so than when she found herself embroiled in a law suit against her dad Wilbur and former manager, Lyle Walker. LeAnn finally settled the issue out of court: "My dad and I have a wonderful relationship, and everything is fine. He's great, he's just my dad now — it's easier."

"I think Line dancing's great! I tried it a while ago, and it is a lot of fun."

Living in Nashville, LeAnn prefers not to be in the bright lights of Hollywood: "I've always loved Nashville," she explains. "When I got married, I felt that it could be the perfect place to make my home. My mom and dad lived here, and my husband's family is in Michigan, so it's centrally located. It's a great place to work and also to be able to get all my priorities in balance."

able to write from experience: "It's very autobiographical and tells where I've been over the last 10 years, where I'm at now, and how comfortable I am to talk about it."

Born in Mississippi, raised in Texas, LeAnn has been singing a Country tune since the age of two. Her album Blue sold over seven million copies and won her several international awards. She was never one to take the easy option an worked hard releasing an average of one album a year, touring the world and making her film debut in Coyote Ugly.

LeAnn has always included a Country vibe but also appeals to the mainstream charts because of her willingness to sing other styles: "Country music has always been my home base," she says. "It always will be but that doesn't mean I have to put limitations on it. It's so much fun to be free."



## "When we got to the Hotel we felt like royalty – it looked rich and posh."



# Master of Line dance TV



Recently I was involved in the Line dance on the BBC. I will start by saying what a wonderful experience I had, and that the dancers were a pleasure to work with.

I have received lots of feed back, thank you for all the kind and understanding comments. I can also relate to what many of you are saying on the negative side.

The music and costumes were all chosen by the BBC though I did have an input in some of the music. *Achy Breaky Heart* was not my choice and I wasn't particularly fond of using it. *Show Me Heaven* by Maria McKee was my choice along with Dolly Parton's *Nine To Five*.

I'm over the moon, as it was so different from the other group dances, each non Line dancer I have spoken to has said the same. They thought it was brilliant and they were impressed at the performance.

SDF wanted to show Line dance from its roots to what it is today. It was a team show piece. I actually had to stay for an extra day because the producers wanted more lifts and more show styling in parts of it. I argued that Line dance isn't really about that but, some 'show stopping moves' is what they wanted.

In three minutes we used four songs to show the diversity of Line dance and it's music:

It began with Achy Breaky which we have all danced. I too wore a cowboy hat, danced with my hands in my belt and did heel hooks and applejacks. It was a team performance though so the movement of shapes was necessary.

Following this was a cha cha, the BBC asked for some couples movements in there, but the footwork was Line dance.

They went on to perform night-club two step, the team Line danced in the background, as Ben and Steph, Darrien and Hollie danced in front.

They finished with a funky – a Line dance, done in opposition with some show parts added.

If you go to a Lindy Hop Social or a Salsa night, a West Coast Swing, or a Ballroom/Latin night you would not expect to be lifted and thrown around the room nor to go into advanced technique. But *Strictly Dance Fever* is a competition, it has to show each dance form at its highest level.

I have a beginner class along with my Intermediates that has run for 10 years on a Monday night. I get over 100 people each week, they could have done Chill Factor for three minutes on television, would that have portrayed Line dance as it is today?

Line Dance is split in many different areas, I feel lucky that I am able to be involved in all of them:

Beginners, Country Music fans, Intermediates, Advanced, Non County Music only dancers, Competition dancers, Team competition.

There is so much diversity in Line dance, I have trained in other dance forms only to improve in Line. In my opinion it is the only dance style that incorporates so many varied styles.

That is what is so wonderful about this sport – we do everything:-

Waltz – ballroom background – Deeply Completely, Midnight Waltz

Cha Cha – latin background – Twisted, Islands In The Stream

Funky – street dance background – Pump It, Explicit,

Nightclub two-step – couples background – Amazing Faith, Stay Forever, The Way

West Coast Swing – couples background – Slow Burn, After Party

Lindy Hop – Couples Lindy – House Of Blue Lights, Swingin R's

Irish Dancing – Dancing Violins, Razor Sharp, Celtic Kittens

The list goes on: Samba, Paso Doble, Ballet, Tap, Jazz, Contemporary, Tango, Jive, etc etc...

I believe that is why there were two Line dance couples in the final of last year's *Strictly Dance Fever*, and the same reason

there were five Line dancers in this year's show, out of 80,000 dancers.

As a social dancer you enjoy the music, the friendship, the sport, the style as any social dancer in any form of dance would do the same.

Costumes — I was not involved in the design of the costumes, I requested no gingham. In competition, boots are still required along with a yoke on both male and female. Occasionally I still wear my boots for teaching and performances. The outfits were sparkling performance outfits — similar to that worn in competition (although no midriffs would usually be allowed)

Although a perfectionist I'm proud of what I did, I was pleased with the way it turned out. In the six hours I had with the dancers to choreograph and teach, I thought they did a wonderful job. However if I had the power there are some things I would have done differently, possibly some music and costume changes but as far as their dancing I loved the way they performed.

The dancers work from 7am until early hours of the morning, they worked really hard every minute I was there, giving it 100 percent concentration and effort, with utmost respect and the kindest heart. They were wonderful people to work with and opened they're eyes to what Line dance really is. I had comments from dancers that were knocked out of the show saying "Oh I would have loved that", "Is that really what Line dance competition is like?", "Do you really do all those different styles?"

The BBC showed a different side of Line dance, different to what has ever been shown before, I'm overwhelmed at the opportunity and pleased with what was produced. We would need an hour long programme to show all the sides to Line dance, maybe one day we will get that, but I think what was performed on Sunday evening was a positive step towards that direction for Line dance. I had a wonderful time and wouldn't hesitate to do it again.

See you on the dancefloor – any music any style.

# Layers of learning

The challenges that we face when learning new movement skills can range from being fairly insignificant to completely overwhelming. Breaking down the learning into logical layers can help us to learn in manageable stages. And it can make the learning easier to retain because you can get to grips with one thing before adding another.

Children are good examples of layered learners. As babies and toddlers their physical development progresses by adding one major skill at a time. Each skill is practised before adding the next one. Between the ages of nine months to about three years they pass through recognised development milestones such as:

- · pulling themselves to standing
- taking a few steps holding onto furniture
- walking holding arms out to balance
- walking without falling over, going upstairs holding onto a handrail with two feet on each step
- going upstairs with one foot on each step

The pattern of learning that emerges is like a pyramid. It has a good, strong, foundation at the bottom to support all the new layers of learning and progress that fits on top. Once the learning reaches a certain stage another new skill can be added.

This model can be useful for learning skills in Line dancing. We can use it to identify different, individual, parts of the learning required, for example, movements, steps, rhythm, musicality and enter the one chosen at the bottom of the pyramid. Let's take an example of learning to dance a shuffle followed by a rock forward and step in place. We can break them down to two individual learning tasks and start the process off by putting each into a pyramid model as shown. Once both steps are at the stage of being ready to add another skill then the two, individual steps or skills become the first layer of another pyramid and the development process can begin again. This time it is about combining two things learned earlier rather than learning something totally new. The new skill being learned here is about developing the ability to combine existing skills. The pyramid model can be used in a similar way for learning about a rhythm or dance style. And just as before, once the rhythm has been learned then it can be combined with another previously learned skill such as a movement or step.

If we apply this model to each of the aspects that say, a Line dance beginner needs to learn then he or she can use the model to develop a strong foundation of individual skills ready to be combined into Line dances. The benefit for



the beginner is that he or she gains a number of individual skills that can be used separately as well as being combined with other skills in an endless variety of ways. As the beginner progresses he or she will notice that many of the new skills to be learned are about adding to existing skills rather than starting from scratch. Just as we are able to recognise the layers of development of babies and toddlers we should be able to peel away our own layers of skills and recognise the basic building blocks of Line dancing.

Last month saw the launch of a brand new service on our website, Watch and Learn. It allows Linedancer subscribers to watch short video clips of dances. We currently have 80 videos live on the site and the number is growing daily.

Watch and Learn is proving extremely popular, we were shocked to learn a single dance was viewed 425 times in one weekend. If you are a choreographer it is essential you get your clips online. With so many dancers rushing to view the latest routines, we would like to give you a few tips for submitting what could be your new award winning dance.

#### WHAT TO LOOK FOR

The plainer the background, the better it is. Too many details make it harder to view.

Shaky cameras look terrible, keep it still. There is nothing more off putting than camera shake.

Shoot your video from the front of the class. It looks better and gives a clear indication of what steps and rythmn the dance uses.

Formats acceptable are wmv, mpeg, mov or avi. If you have never heard of these then have a *Google* on the Net or better still ask the nearest teenager.

To help get your dance instantly discovered send your video and script together.

Line dancing is about having fun, so smile please.

#### **X** WHAT TO AVOID

Please avoid filming at home. It is better to have a huge space filled by dancers, like a class environment, rather than beds and sofas.

Don't film in the dark – turn on the lights – Just make it bright.

Don't give a teach, keep your clip simple. It is better to stick to a straight forward dance through that is clean and precise.

Watch And Learn is sure to become the best way of getting your choreography on the dancefloor. If your latest script is to be given a fair chance you need to grab the camera, film your dance and upload it to us.

If you are a member all you have to do is click your mouse and Watch and Learn.

I could not be where I am today without the support of my students and my loved ones. For all that I am truly grateful.




