

Dear Dancers



Can I just say a huge thank you to all those "drivers" who gave us the encouragement we needed to keep the Awards going. I am so glad we listened to you as this year's 11th Crystal Boots Awards weekend has been a wonderful event.

I hope it will be remembered not just for the dancing, the fun we shared, the great workshops, fabulous costumes and wonderful shows not to mention the amazing line dancing dogs, but more importantly I hope it will be remembered for it being the time and place when we launched LDF (Line Dance

Foundation) the very first Line Dance registered charity.

The purpose of the Foundation will be to raise and distribute funds to provide practical and financial assistance to any person who has earned their living or a significant part of it through the development of Line dance, and for whatever reason are no longer able to do whether temporary or permanently.

As you know, most people involved in Line dancing generally do not earn sufficient money on a consistent basis to provide cover for sickness or emergencies let alone their future or pensions schemes. In fact, many simply live from day to day enjoying what they do while they can. But what happens when sickness or accidents come along? The answer is this ...they fall on hard times and in some cases it has serious implications for them and their families too.

Every month in Linedancer we see pages of line dancers involved in fund raising activities for various charities but we seldom see an event or fundraiser that is dedicated to supporting dancers in distress and the sad things is we have many of them. This is something I would like to change but I need your help to make it happen. I believe we should continue our work supporting all the charities that we usually support but I am asking that we try to host at least one event, hold one raffle or one fundraising activity **once a year** to support the work of the Foundation.

Glenn Rogers was the first to support the charity by writing the song 'We Are Dancers' and donating all the money raised through sales to the Foundation. During a workshop at the awards we collectively created a cool little dance called **LDF 83149** to go with the song. Hopefully it will be a dance everyone enjoys and can generate the first income for our charity.

The name of the dance is also very important. Every time anyone sends the text **LDF** to the number **83149** they made a donation to the Foundation. Messages are charged at £1 plus standard charges from your network provider.

So please, start supporting the Foundation now - buy the song for a minimum of \pounds 2.00, and do the dance then encourage all your friends and family to send the text LDF to 83149.

Also, this is an open invitation, if anyone would like to become more involved in the work of the Foundation please let me know. In advance of your efforts and support may I take this opportunity to say thank you all very much.

Steppin' Off The Page

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
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
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Linda Willis talks about Vince Gill. A Country legend who took on a huge challenge, collaborating with stars like LeAnn Rimes, Bonnie Raitt and Sheryl Crow, his voluminous recording was to make the ultimate musical ensemble and what's more it is truly diverse

"My mom taught me how to waltz when I was a little boy," declares Vince Gill, a man whose career has spanned too many years to mention and included 19 Number One singles, two Platinum and six Multi-Platinum albums. I Can't Let Go is just one of the waltzes he has penned during his long career, and having Alison Krauss and Dan Tyminski singing with you is not just any old Waltz Across Texas. "Guess I'm a sucker for a waltz" he continues

"I live in a nice house, I think, because of a couple of waltzes I recorded over the years, so I have a great love for a waltz feel. I don't know if my mom teaching me made it special for me, but it always has been. Most of my records have had a waltz in them."

Something endearing in the sentiments shared and so too in Gill's latest offering – a four CD set entitled, *These Days*. If you like your music rocky and dancey you cannot fail to be impressed – as I was with *Workin' on the Big Chill*, a fabulous mix of music you just cannot sit still and listen to. If jazz and soul are more your thing you can chill out to *The Reason Why, The Groovy Record. Little Brother* is the acoustic record and *Some Things Never Get Old* is the Country offering. The title song features guest vocalist Emmylou Harris.

"Tia Sellers and Big Al (Anderson) wrote this song with me. I just love the throwback to all these things that never do get old," says Gill.

"It's so true. I've been playing this music for over thirty or thirty-five years, and I feel exactly the same, at nearly fifty, as I did at eighteen or nineteen years old. I feel like I look the same. I look in the mirror and I still see that kid, even though I know he's not there. I love the sentiment of this song and all the things are cool, old cars, John Prine, watermelon. Emmylou's voice is so important to me because it takes me back to where I started, where I felt I had a real direction for the first time, not just trying to learn to play."

The line-up of guest singers is staggeringly awesome ranging in style and age from Phil Everly, to Gretchen Wilson and Le Ann Rimes, and all stops in between.

Surprisingly though it was not one of his fellow Americans who inspired the new set of songs, but English musicians Eric Clapton and The Beatles. In 2004, Clapton rang Vince Gill asking if he would agree to appear at Crossroads Guitar Festival in Dallas. It was a call that lit the spark that became a flame. "That was a big life changing thing for me," recalls Gill. "Here was someone who saw me as a fellow musician, not as a Country star. And he's one of the finest musicians who ever lived. For him to invite me to this festival as someone whose work he admired — I was inspired to go play again." Clapton's influence was cathartic. For once in his life Gill found himself really able to let go. "If I wanted to be rocking, I let it rock as hard as it wanted to," he says. "Instead of feeling like there were lines I shouldn't cross — I took the lines away!"

So how do The Beatles come into this incredible journey?


It was while recording at Nashville's Blackbird Studios that he noticed a poster advertising three Beatles albums released in the same year. "I knew I wasn't going to be satisfied picking ten songs, and I was trying to figure out how to not lose all this material we had done. So I thought — why can't I release all these records since they're stylistically different from each other?" Gill approached Luke Lewis the Co-Chairman of UMG Nashville who jumped at the chance to change the direction of a lifetime, suggesting that a fourth album be added and releasing it as a boxed set. An unprecedented idea featuring all new material.

I have to confess that I do have a favourite record, and that is *Workin' on the Big Chill, The Rockin' Record.* The title track opens the door and invites you into the party of your life. And what a way to make an entrance!

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Cowboy Up features guest vocalist Gretchen Wilson and is the business. "Al (Anderson) plays the intro guitar part on that, and I'm just done when he plays that cause the groove is so greasy and so funky," says Gill.

"That's the kind of music you want to hear when things are getting ready to get kinda fun," he laughs.

"Gretchen dog-cussed me when she heard that song. She started calling me all kinds of names. She said, "I had that title. I had that same title. I was about to write it and you beat me to it!" both going to sing. The fun factor in that Cherry Bombs record was also kind of life changing for me, and the way I approached recording again this time. The fun factor had been a big part of it. The songs and the lyrics of these songs had to have my sense of humour in them. I wanted that badly.

Bekka Bramlett joins him for the up-beat *Rhythm of the Pouring Rain*. "This record's all about locking the door with the one you love, and not coming out for a while." he laughs.

"You get caught up in all the stuff going on in life, every now and then you want to just turn

you try to do a big band version of some of those changes and it can get a little too schmaltzty. I took some of the chords and straightened them out a bit. That's me playing the acoustic guitar that defines the feel of the song. I was inviting people I admire to be on the record, and that's certainly true here. The song felt like a great fit for her. I knew how great she'd sound, and I love singing with her."

However many years he's been around – he's still one of the original and best. No matter what his bathroom mirror might be telling him. Music is his whole life. "This is an interesting business," he says. "When you finally get that faucet running you don't want to turn it off, you know?

"I've watched artist after artist, myself included, become caricatures of themselves because they find something that works and beat it into the ground. I'm still trying to have hit records and be as big a part of this as I ever was. But I can't control it. And I've learned to let go of all that. I believe if I make a record that sells 10 million or sells 1,000 either way none of the notes are ever going to change.

"Anyone who knows me, knows I live in the moment and fly by the seat of my pants. Some people need preparation and structure... Amy needs those things. We're total opposites in that way. She likes knowing what's going on. I

You can jive or West coast swing to *Sweet Thing*, one of the most dancey tracks.

Bet It All on You has a Mustang Sally kind of vibe. "It turns into some cool R and B," says Gill. "Then my daughter Jenny and Betty Bramlett sang together. They sang in unison, not harmony. It's just a little bit of a different take on a lot of things for me musically that I haven't done."

Keeping it in the family is something Gill finds exciting. Singing *A River Like You* with his daughter brought tears to his eyes. "Something happens when people of the same blood sing together," he maintains.

"Jenny really got to shine and I can't even describe how much that really undid me. To hear those two voices shake in exactly the same way." He also sings with wife Amy. Phil Everly is no stranger to keeping it in the family either. Gill describes his duet, *Sweet Little Corrina* as being, "One of the greatest musical moments of my entire life. I revere their music so very much. I am so drawn to that family harmony. When two people sing together and it becomes one — that's when it's really magic."


Magic Moments indeed is the duet with Rodney Crowell, Nothin' For A Broken Heart. You can jive, ceroc or honky tonk rock to it – but whatever you do you will dance to it – trust me! "It was a treat for me to finally get to do something with Rodney Crowell on my record. It's taken way too long but for us to finally cut loose and get to do a duet was a really big thrill for me. I think it was a little bit of a carry over from the (Notorious) Cherry Bombs project (2004). The mentality of that record was, nobody's the lead singer, we're

it all off and lock the doors. The first time I ever heard Bekka sing was on a record of mine called, *Down in New Orleans*. She opened her mouth and sang the first line, and I took a chair and threw it out of the studio. It was one of the greatest things I had ever heard in my whole life. I want the notes that everybody else sings and plays to inspire me. That's my wish. She's got a thing she does that nobody else does, and for certain songs, it doesn't get any better."

To miss out on a track by track listing is a crying shame, but I'm not allowed to fill up this whole months *Linedancer!* Believe me when I tell you that all four quarters of Gill's musical pie are well worth savouring. What You don't Say features LeAnn Rimes. "I love the whole mood of this song. LeAnn sings on it and just kills it. We orchestrated four songs in this record. David Campbell is a great strings arranger. He did a lot of work with Sheryl Crow. He's Beck's father. He called me about writing the string charts and orchestrations. I begged him, I said, "Please don't look at this as a Country record, in the terms, whatever they are, that you might perceive Country music to be. Just do what you would do, no matter who you were doing it for. Don't let the fact that I live in Nashville affect you."

Alison Krauss is harmonious and lovely on *The Reason Why*. Musicianship throughout is superb, but the hauntingly beautiful duet with Jenny Gill, *Time to Carry On* stretches them both and they win.

It doesn't get more classy than the fabulous harmonies with Trisha Yearwood on *This Memory of You*. "Originally it was a bit jazzier in some of the chord structure. Sometimes

(Staffordshire Newsletter) and a great feature was published a week later.



On page 15, we covered the very first *Linedancer Magazine Awards* (all three of them) and the winners were Rob Fowler for Choreographer of the Year, Black Coffee for dance of the Year and the Dean Brothers

for British Country Artists of the Year. The world would have to wait until 1998 to see a Crystal Boot as our worthy winners got a trophy on our very first year.

Page 28 and 29, sees intrepid reporter Stephen Worsley following a special Style Challenge program (on BBC 1) where four Line dance instructors (Karl and Helen Cregeen and Mandy and Adam Thwaits from the Silver Star Western Dancers in Sutton Colefield) were made over. The pictures looked really great.

Max Perry was packing them in with his incredibly successful tour and in the article *The Max Factor* on page 32 and 33 we set out to find out what makes a star like Max.

Our postcard from America took us to Pigeon Forge and Dollywood on page 41.

We had eight dances published in our tenth edition and all of them are still standing the test of time. They were The Freeze, Stroll Along Cha Cha, Hooked On Country, Just For Grins, Cajun Mambo Walk, Saloon Scissor Stomp, Lamtarra Rhumba and Popsicle.

We asked for no more new entries after six very full pages of Stomping Ground – we simply did not have the space to print any more addresses. Good to see this feature still remains as busy as ever and that clubs send regular updates on their whereabouts.

ach and every Line dancer who came to the Opryland hotel to Line dance had a great weekend. How could they not? Coming home

The British are back on the dancefloor in Nashville and the rules are working in their favour. Two World Champions at the top of their game *Pamela Edelston* chats to Sydney Smyth and Lee Easton

orlds has always been the place where the best Couples dancers perform to clinch World titles but it seems the Line dancers have found a place to boogie on US soil too. This year once again the British competitors flew to Nashville to dance on the American dancefloor. Two time World Champion Lee Easton said: "It was great to see both Superstar titles coming back to the UK."

The competition was fierce both for Couples and Line dancers, I spoke to the new female World Champion Sydney Smyth, she said: "The event unites everyone, it is a fantastic hotel and looked even more spectacular because of all the huge Christmas trees on display. America is a great place to go and compete but it is expensive to travel over there.

"This year was the first year I was eligible to compete at the top level with the UCWDC. I have been training for months to get up to scratch and I think I may even be the youngest ever World Champion. I took on a lot before the competition, with A'levels, Christmas and other Free Style competitions. I didn't get enough

sleep or food and ended up spending three weeks in hospital.

"In Nashville, I danced a Waltz which I first had access to last July, we have to dance two classic dances and a melody. I guess the melody is a free for all, we are given music requirements but it is a show piece."

The UCWDC put on a well organised event, Lee commented: "The competition ran for six days. I competed myself but also entered students in three other divisions. The standard was excellent across the board with world class performances throughout in many different styles of dancing."

Sydney added: "I see that the technique from one style really helps when I dance a different way. I also enjoyed watching the other competitions, including the Couples dancers."

The Couples dancers attend Worlds in the States because it is what puts them at the pinnacle of their game. This obviously brings a quality of dance to the forefront and it is nice to know that Line dancers are gaining the same respect.

Linedancer wants to keep you in the know..

The legendary singer **Dolly Parton** has written over 3,000 songs. Dolly is a singer, actress and song writer and is due to arrive on British shores on March 19, 2007.

The tour is going to London and Manchester to mention just a couple and already some dates are sold out. This will be Dolly's first UK tour since the 1970's and to accompany it Sony BMG will be releasing three classic albums and three brand new ones.

Star of Music, Film, and TV **Reba McEntire's** 30th release on MCA Records is a two-CD set of all her Number 1 hits entitled Reba #1's. The project contains two previously unreleased songs *You're Gonna Be* and *Love Needs A Holiday*. Reba's career has lasted the test of time and the track list tells us exactly why.

Heidi Newfield, award winning vocalist, has officially launched her new website www.heidinewfield.com to keep fans up to date on everything she has planned for her solo career.

"I am very excited," says Newfield. "I can not wait until January to get in the studio and begin the creative process of making the kind of music that I've always wanted to make." Heidi Newfield will release her solo album on Asylum/Curb Records in 2007.

The man who will always be known for his massive trucking hit *Girl On The Billboard*, **Del Reeves**, has died after a long illness. He was born Franklin Delano Reeves in 1933 in North Carolina. He had his own radio show at the age of 12 and by the time he was 27 he had his own TV show. The hits started in 1961 – his first hit was for Decca – a song called *Be Quiet Mind*. His move to United Artists four years later gave him his big number one hit *Girl On The Billboard*.

Del had 50 songs in the charts as a solo act and had hit duets with Bobby Goldsboro and Billie Jo Spears. He also appeared in a number of movies. He was very entertaining — with some comic acts. In the 90s he moved into management and was the man who discovered Billy Ray Cyrus.

Doyle Holly 1936–2007, the bass player in Buck Owens' backing band, the Buckaroos, died Saturday after a battle with prostate cancer. He was 70.

Keith Urban gave his first performance since entering an alcohol treatment centre at a concert in Chicago. Keith also plans a European tour in April.

Former Nashville Star champ **Brad Cotter** has signed a new contract with Nashville-based independent record label Adobe Road.





Rimes new album comes this spring and is called *Family*. She's written every song on it except one, which was written by her husband.









ew on the Line dance calendar 2006 was The World Country Dance Federation World Championships. The European based organisation was hosting an event in Dublin at the magnificent Citywest Hotel and Golf complex. Christmas was cut short so that event organisers could find their way to Dublin and start preparing for the competition. You may have been at home stuffing your face with left over turkey and chocolates but these Line dancers had a party to co-ordinate. So much was to be organised - dancefloors were being shipped in, huge lighting rigs and sound equipment were being erected. After many hours of intense labour the main ballroom was ready for action.

Getting everyone to the hotel was crucial, event deejay Tim Ruzgar said: "Almost everyone who was coming to the event was greeted at the airport and buses took them to the venue. Some of the event directors spent up to 16 hours at the airport to ensure all the guests were taken care of.

"The competition began with Pro Am, while the Line dance workshops, covering new dances and technique, were taught every day in the lobby." Competition prizes are generally given at the end of an event but in Dublin they were given intermittently. Tim added: "The award ceremonies became a daily occurrence. They are for many the highlight of the event. Here they were quite spectacular."

In order to make all the winners feel special a fanfare played for the first five placing as the first three took their place on the podium. All placed competitors received a trophy and in true Olympic style the winning country heard their national anthem.

This wouldn't be a true World Championships without a parade. With so many countries involved it was essential that the international flags were held up proudly around the main ballroom. The competitors wore their competition outfits and it proved to be something special.

For social dancers 70 entries were submitted to the choreography competition. The big winner of the event was Holland's Raymond Sarlemijn. Raymond had several placing and a few wins including the ABC Division with Bella Bella. (He wrote the dance with Kate Sala, printed in *Linedancer Magazine* January 2007.)

To give the competition an Irish flair the Irish Cup, open only to Irish citizens, was included. The Irish theme continued with an Irish party night, featuring special guest Maggie Gallagher. Maggie performed with her volunteers from around the world, The Maggie G All Stars. One onlooker said: "They were absolutely magnificent and it was hard to believe they had put this routine together in one hour. It brought the house down and the standing ovation carried on long after the dancers left the floor."

As the year came to an end the highlight was the pinnacle of Line dance. The Megastars and Rising Stars are what all young Line dancers aspire to be. Fred Whitehouse qualified for the Megastar division by winning Male Open in the Line Showcase competition. He said: "I started off by training in Holland with Roy Verdonk, now I train with Steve and Yvonne Dunn. I also run a social class in Birmingham. My sister and I have danced for many years and it is a great achievement to reach the Megastar division."

The Megastar competitors were asked to perform two classic Line dances and a solo medley. The powerful ambience was created as Ben Hur played on the sound system and one by one the competitors marched out onto the floor as Gladiators going to fight for their life. LeeAnn

Forsen of Sweden took the female crown while Giovanni Coenmans from Holland beat off the stiff male competition. LeeAnn said: "I started dancing about nine years ago, I moved to England to train regularly and have since achieved some fantastic results. I firstly won Intermediate Open Female in 2005, then Advance Open Female in 2006. This made me feel I wanted to try to achieve Showcase in 2006.

"Winning the Megastar title is something that most competitive Line dancers only dream of. A year ago I would never have believed I could achieve it. I could not have done it without the support of my fiancee Matt Oakley, my very large Swedish family and the support of Steve and Yvonne Dunn. Winning Megastar is a dream come true and something I will never forget."

The deejays worked heroically long hours to keep this party swinging with Alex Boone, Tim Ruzgar and Mogens Sorensen all taking turns on the stand. Head of the World CDF Herman Falkenberg was delighted with the event, especially with the effort put in by all the event directors, judges and volunteers.



Jake Mathews TIME AFTER TIME

OPEN ROAD RECORDS ORCD7204

Jake Mathews is another excellent Canadian Country artist. Jake hails from a town near Ontario and was brought up listening to Haggard, Jones, and Owens. He moved to Calgary and made several trips to Nashville and was invited to appear at the Bluebird Café for a full session. We now sample his music in the UK for the first time.

The opener *Time After Time* (85/170bpm)

is a good two step and Anna Balaguer has written a good beginner dance to it called Howdy which has 32 counts and is a four wall dance

Signs Of You Everywhere (94bpm) is a lovely song about lost love. It is also a cha cha so will make a good dance track.

Payin' Your Dues (101/202bpm) is a good paced two step and Jake sounds quite like Clint Black on this cool Country track. Well I told you it's a two step so what are you waiting for?

Arizona On My Mind (106bpm) is of four tracks that Jake co-wrote and what a gem this one is. It's a beautiful Country cha laced with smooth harmonies. Vivienne Scott and Fred

Buckley have written a wonderful 32 count, four wall beginner/intermediate dance to it.

It's A Better World (81bpm) is also a track that clips along at a good pace and another fine dance prospect.

Kings For A Day (125bpm) is another of Jake's compositions and this is a great Country cha that showcases Jake's smooth voice. Brilliant!

You Got Away With Love (110bpm) again Jake's vocal delivery is superb and the Dobro on the backing make this haunting number another highlight on this album.

How Many Days (84/168bpm) this is another good solid two stepper and again it will make a wonderful dance track for both couples and line.

That's Why They Call It Cheatin' (82bpm) is a beautiful Harley Allen song and it is a superb Country track, a delight to listen too, but why not dance to it too?

My Heart Won't Let You Leave My Mind (136bpm) is the last of Jake's song writing contributions. This one is a good east coast swing on which the musicianship is superb and it will make for a brilliant dance track.

The closing track *He Never Learned How* (76bpm) is poignant cowboy song about an older rodeo rider that just didn't know when to give up and eventually it cost him his life. Not sure of its merits as a dance track but a superb Country song nonetheless.

Jake Mathews' Time After Time is a proper new Country album and it is surely only a matter of time until he is recognised a top Country artist. Whilst many of Nashville's finest are losing their way with the fans, and the record companies there don't seem to know what to get their artists to release, Jake Mathews shows them all how to do it. This is a superb new Country album and I highly recommend it to you

LOVE, PAIN, AND THE WHOLE CRAZY THING Keith Urban

CAPITOL RECORDS

Keith Urban's music has been used for many Line dances, most notably the Alan Birchall nomination for Dance of the Decade danced to *Somebody Like You*. Keith's last album *Be Here* sold over four million copies in the US alone. Keith now releases a new album.

We start with *Once In A Lifetime* (132bpm) which is an awesome track and Phil Johnson hands us a phrased 64 count dance.

Shine (73bpm) is more upbeat than a typical nightclub two step. This track highlights Keith's ability to produce infectious melodies.

I Told You So (106bpm) is a Country cha cha with a Celtic sound. The banjo and the fiddle helps add to the track and it would make a nice Line dance.

I Can't Stop Loving You (85bpm) sees Keith do a great job with the old Leo Sayer hit. I love to hear the clarity of Keith's soulful voice on a number like this.

Won't Let You Down (105bpm) this angst ridden number, written by Keith, is probably a true reflection of where he was in his personal life at the time.

Faster Car (132bpm) is described as a contagious rocker with a contemporary sound. This east coast swing would make a good dance track.

Stupid Boy (97bpm) steadies the pace to a slow cha. It is excellent but far too long as a dance track.

Used To The Pain (140bpm) is a lively song and Geri Morrison has written an intermediate dance called Nothin' Stays The Same with 56 counts and four walls.

Raise The Barn (110bpm) is a new Country track and I am astounded that there has not been a rush to choreograph to this superb track, it's simply brilliant.

God Made Woman (67bpm) is a tribute to women. Musically it has everything but the kitchen sink thrown in. Listen for big choral harmonies and guitar solos.

Tu Compania (96bpm) is a nice track and the The Girls were inspired to write an intermediate dance named Eclipse, which is 64 counts and two walls.

We finish with *Everybody* (99bpm) which includes Keith's trademark staccato beat. This could be a fine dance track with the right choreography.

This is good album but not a great one. Keith will probably never better *Golden Road*. However it has some tracks with dances and there should be a few more too, so get yourself a copy.



ONE MORE MIDNIGHT Hal Ketchum

CURB RECORDS

Hal Ketchum's music was used extensively in the early days of Line dancing and he has long been a personal favourite of mine. I have to say that I was very disappointed in Hal's last album *The King of Love* coming after his previous superb release *Lucky Man*.

Kicking off with *One More Midnight* (77bpm) you are instantly alerted to the rare qualities of this album. A cracking Country rocker, crying out for a dance.

Just This Side Of Heaven (121bpm) is a good Country cha, a toe tapping song.

Travelin' Teardrop Blues (97bpm) there are strong influences of Willie on this song. Hal plays a mean harmonica on this delightful track which reminds me somewhat of *Past The Point Of Rescue*.

Save Tonight For Me (73bpm) Tim Mensy, a superb Country artist in his own right, wrote this stunning nightclub two step. There are harmony vocals from Susan Ashton and Hal is simply brilliant.

Gonna Start Livin' Again (125bpm) is a perfect west coast swing dance track – full of bounce.

Alamo (72bpm) was written by one of my favourite songwriters Gary Burr. Talks about the Alamo, but not the battle. It is a lovely song.

Poor Lila's Ghost (74bpm) is not a dance track but it is an interesting song. More folk than Country.

My Love Will Not Change (93bpm) is a good up tempo number with a good beat – lets get dancing.

Forever Mine (68bpm) Hal wrote this with his wife Gina. It is a beautiful nightclub that you will love.

One Of The Things (142bpm) is a duet with Katie Cook. A catchy east coast swing, perfect for dancing.

The Moment (101bpm) is Hal Ketchum at his very best, his voice is magnificent. I am not sure if you will dance to this but I can't stop playing it.

Little Red Dress (78/156bpm) fools you into thinking it is a slow song but suddenly it kicks into a fast Country rocker. A definite dance hit.

Finally we have *Medal Of Honour* (73bpm) it is a moving song, not necessarily for dancing though.

This album puts Hal Ketchum back to his very best. There are some excellent dance tracks and some wonderful songs. This superb album is a must have for all those who like new Country music so get your copy today.



SONGBIRD

Willie Nelson

Willie Nelson needs no introduction. Suffice to say that he has released countless albums and appeared on just about everyone else's at one time or another. This latest album from Willie was recorded with Ryan Adams (also the producer) and The Cardinals. We don't seem to have used much of Willie's music in Line dancing, could that be about to change?

The first track *Rainy Day Blues* (110bpm) is a classy blues number as the title suggests and Willie's voice is as good as ever. You bet you can dance.

Many people only know *Songbird* (110bpm) as Eva Cassidy's song but it was originally done by Fleetwood Mac on their classic album *Rumours*. Willie does it as a perfect cha cha. Someone please write a dance to it.

Blue Hotel (131bpm) was written by Ryan for Willie. A waltz which should have a dance.

Back To Earth (68bpm) is a new night-club two step from Willie and it could inspire a choreographer.

Stella Blue (114bpm) will be known to rock fans as a Grateful Dead classic and I can't see this being used for dancing, although it is a great track.

Hallelujah (92bpm) is a Leonard Cohen song and again I am not sure of its appeal as a dance track.

\$1000 Wedding (67bpm) afficionados among you will know that this is a Gram Parsons song although Willie does sound like Dylan on this powerful song.

We Don't Run (93/186bpm) Willie fans will know this song from his *Spirit* album although this is a cool new version. A two step, it will be a good dance track.

Yours Love (90bpm) is a Harlan Howard song and this too is a waltz. Very traditional in style it will appeal to the Country fans and will be ideal at festivals.

Sad Songs And Waltzes (116bpm) is another reworked Willie number from his *Shotgun Willie* album. This is classic Willie Nelson, yet another waltz.

Lastly *Amazing Grace* (90bpm) — Ryan Adams did the arrangement for this song. It is very interesting and I will let you make up your own minds about it.

Willie Nelson is 73 years old and turns out at least two albums a year. He pushes the boundaries and you cannot take away the immense contribution he has made to Country music over the last five decades. I am a big fan of Willie and if you want to hear and dance to something different then *Songbird* is the album for you.

Full House Michelle Risley Gambler - Kenny Rogers

I first saw this danced on a holiday in Cyprus and couldn't wait to get up and join in. The steps fit the music well and even fit the words. If the lyrics say walk you walk and if the lyrics say run you run. How convenient. I found it to be an easy, quick teach. It's a perfect dance to fill floors in between popular fast dances. I noticed that most dancers, including the choreographer, substitute syncopated rocks (rock forward, replace, rock side, replace -1&2&) instead of forward and side touches (1-2). I think this is a good alternative.

To Love You More

Neville Fitzgerald

In Your Eyes - George Benson

At 32 counts and basically a two waller you might think this dance would be a quick teach... BUT the timing and the two short walls that turn it into a four wall dance should make you think again. Don't be put off though because it's well worth the effort. The steps fit the musical phrasing well. The one and a half turns done on syncopated counts appeals to the twirlers in the class and to my mind is a highlight of the dance – but it's easy to cut it down to a simple half turn for folk who are intimidated by this part.

Say Hey *Teresa and Vera*

Hit Me Up - Gia Farrell

I found this to be a bouncy little number that was a very quick teach despite being intermediate level. This kind of heavy beated music is not everybody's choice but fortunately it appealed to most of my class. The final rocks and turning hip bumps caused some confusion. Most people gave the dance a thumbs up.

Foolish Heart Robbie McGowan Hickie Don't Pretend With Me - Vince Gill

A cool and easy two step to a great Country track. Great dance for all levels dancers, with whom good two steps are usually popular. Our Beginner/Improvers really enjoyed it.

Rob Fowler & Paul McAdam Rudebox - Robbie Williams

The music is not everyone's favourite. But the dance hits the beat really well and has been really well received by all. A hit funky dance for sure . Like the cool 1/2 twist turn and the Kick/Split steps. If you are not keen on the music it will grow on you because it's a great dance. A big hit for Rob at the Worlds in Nashville.

I enjoyed teaching this one at Worlds. A neat pop dance by Dee with some really cool moves that hit the beat really well. Funky styling. Really like a cool unwind/twist/ball cross sequence and the hip bumps at the end which you can feel in the music.

Boogie 2Nite - Booty Luv

The class love this one. At our workshop the dance filled the floor with a mixed crowd of dancers. The combination of dance and music just hits the right spot. It flows well with a good mix of easy traditional steps that just makes the best of a great pop track. Cool box/turn start and a bit like Pumpin' For Love, a neat restart that comes out of a pivot turn into the box turn. Neat (Just one restart in this dance).



SHARON BRIZON

Laughter Lines Linedance Club, Banstead

Rubitin Maggie Gallagher Rub It In - Jeff Bates

Featuring the brilliant Anchor Step which I personally haven't seen since Shiv-a-ree, and which I've sorely missed. The music has an old-style rock feel, with some upbeat Country thrown in. At only 32 counts, I thought my intermediates might find it too easy. However, it has a lot of sophisticated timing and plenty of action on the "& counts", making it very much an intermediate dance.

Urban Living

Val Myers

Live to Love Another Day - Keith Urban

A splendid two-wall dance, perfect for introducing beginners to a Monterey turn and a rhumba box. The music's fine, but lately we've taken to doing it to the Dean Brothers version of True Love, which my class enjoy singing along to. The only problem is that when we get too stuck into the singing, it's easy to forget that there's only one monterey turn and we often end up doing another one ... ooops! Well, at least that gives the dancer an opportunity to face the rest of the class and say hello. Lots of fun to be had with this one, and definitely gets beginners smiling. I suspect that's exactly what Val had in mind when he wrote it.

Feel the Magic

Hungry Eyes - Eric Carmen

Any music from the film Dirty Dancing is always a hit for me, and my class. We love this dance. 64 counts, no tags, no re-starts and thankfully only two walls. My new intermediates struggled with the "Lock-Step&Heel&Cross" part, but after the second teach, they were absolutely fine. The music is fabulous and has long warranted a good dance to it.

SWEET DREAMS The Story Of Patsy Cline

Released for the first time on Region 2 DVD (suitable for Europe) this excellent film retraces the life and times of Patsy Cline.

Patsy Cline's (Jessica Lange) first break came after an appearance on a national TV talent show in the USA during the late Fifties. She met Charlie Dick (Ed Harris) a self confident printer who became her second husband. However soon, his infidelities, jealousy and drunken violence started to dominate the marriage. A series of tragedies for the singer culminated in a road accident in 1961. After a lengthy convalescence, Patsy hired a new manager and her career hit the big time again, winning national awards in 1961 and 1962. She died in a plane crash in 1963.

This is a life and a story that could have easily been filmed as some kind of soap opera but in the hands of Karel Reisz (Saturday Night And Sunday Morning, French Lieutenant Woman), the film is powerful and riveting, exploring the life of one of the most well known singing icons of the Twentieth century.

Pulling no punches, Jessica Lange and Ed Harris give power house performances in demanding roles. It is to their credit, that as a viewer you feel deeply involved and totally understanding of both characters, she with the dreams of her "big house with roses" and he with the violent character that he tries so desperately to shake off. You do understand the love between those two ill matched people and the script is never condescending or simplistic.

Of course the music plays a huge role in the film. She's Got You, Walking After Midnight and Crazy are some of the hits we get to hear and I for one was relieved to see Lange lip synching perfectly rather than attempt a pale imitation of the original.

Sweet Dreams is as timeless and as much destined to be a classic as ^patsy Cline herself. A wonderful, gripping, never sensational, never over sentimental, remarkably acted and directed movie. This is a perfect gift not only for Country fans but for anyone who loves a great story and fabulous singing. I really encourage you to seek a copy out, you will not be disappointed.






All of the Awards were announced and presented by our very own Fred & Ginger, Betty Drummond and Steve Healy.



Crystal SurpriseSurprise

Following the launch of the new Line Dance Foundation announced on the Saturday night

> by Betty Drummond, a surprise fun session on the Sunday afternoon gave the dancers at the weekend their first chance to show support for the charity.

During the brilliant (if unusual) workshop all the dancing guests where turned into choreographers with just a little help from some of our experts.

A new dance was going to be created at the end of the session, a dance that would hopefully kick start LDF and create global awareness throughout the Line Dance community. Betty took control using Tim Ruzgar's catch phrase 'Trust Me'. She split the dance floor into four sections and a



captain was nominated for each of those teams. They then had to write a section of a brand new dance to a brand new track called "We Are Dancers". The track was a totally original swing, written, composed and produced by the big hearted Glenn Rogers who donated it to LDF free of charge.

Because the song was totally unknown, it meant that the first section's captain, Rob Fowler and his two volunteers from the dance floor, felt under quite a bit of pressure. Nevertheless, the team put together the first part of the script, which comprised a little weave and some Dwight steps.

Next, Liz Clarke and her team took over. They settled on a couple of Kick Ball Change steps and some ½ pivot turns. As all of the options were being discussed, tried out and agreed upon, dancers were able to see their script take shape on the big screens either side of the stage, as it was typed up and displayed almost instantaneously.

Dynamite Dot and her quarter of the dance floor took over for the third section and Ed Lawton's team tied it all together with the last section, making sure to finish on the correct foot to start the dance again. As the dance was stepped through in its entirety everyone was a little surprised to find that out of the organised chaos, they had created a very nice little dance.

Finally when the dance had been created in its entirety, Betty announced the title. It was going to be named LDF 83149. A little perplexing until it was explained the letters and the digits where a text charity number.

All dancers have to do to show support the charity is grab their mobile phones and text LDF to 83149. This text costs just £1 (plus your service provider's normal charge) and all profits will go to the Line Dance Foundation.

You can also buy the We Are Dancers track on a CD Single for a minimum donation of £2, which again will add to the funds of the LDF charity, a charity we hope will become an important part of, and offer significant help to, the Line dance community.

The 11th Crystal Boots Awards were a great success as you can see by the reports in this magazine but we think that the launch of LDF is a historical moment for our industry.

Line dancers are most generous and giving people, relentlessly working for charities, helping the poor, the sick, the vulnerable.



This is an opportunity for us all to look after the very people who are bringing so much pleasure and joy to so many of us.

Betty made a request for instructors to hold just one raffle or event each year to raise funds for LDF. Obviously the more funds the foundation can raise, the more help it can offer to those in need, but just one event a year in every club would be an amazing start.

If when instructors teach the LDF dance they can also encourage dancers to give their support by texting, we would be well on our way to setting up a very worthwhile charity to support all those dancers, choreographers, instructors who make it possible each week, rain or shine, for us all to take to the floor and dance.

As Betty told us during the Awards Night, we are the first generation of Line Dancers. It is vital for us to leave behind something tangible that the next generation can build on and continue.

The Line Dance Foundation will help to ensure that Line dance will always be present and will be able to continue and thrive. LDF means that those who dedicate their lives to dance and who help so many will know that they too will be supported in their time of need.

Please be generous ... not only with your texts and CD buying, but with your time. LDF 83149 is the very first step.

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
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
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From upstate New York but a real Country boy at heart, Hal Ketchum has given Line dancers great tunes to work with. Here he chats to *Pamela Edelston* about his plans for a rockin' Country European tour

A night to remember awaits many Country fans as legend Hal Ketchum is bound for the UK and Ireland this spring. Hal will be predominantly in Ireland with a number of shows scheduled: "I have got 24 Irish dates lined up, four English and two Scottish and I am so excited to be coming over to the UK," he said.

"I am thrilled to be bringing my nine year old daughter along with me. Her name is Fani Rose and she is going to be out of school for the whole month of the tour. I just thought it was a great opportunity for her, she is very excited to be coming along. She is really into books and horses so I think she wants to try and see some horse farms. But we will be doing whatever she wants to do (he laughs with a telling laugh that says this little girl has Daddy wrapped around his little finger). I have two other children aged five and two but they are staying home with Mummy.

"I was going to ask if we should bring some rain gear. I hear it is very wet over there at this time of year."

Without a doubt. The night before last the rain was pouring outside and the weather has been typically English. I tell him, "if you don't mind wind and rain you'll be just fine."

It is an honour to chat with a Country legend who has a bubbling voice that brings any venue to life: "I find that it comes from inside the heart. I play the five string banjo,

the mandolin and the harmonica. I have about 20 guitars and each guitar I pick up has a new song in it. It always comes from inside my heart."

It is not just his voice that draws in the crowds Hal also plays the drums: "I play every day, just for enjoyment. I don't play on my records, I have some very talented guys who do that for me in Nashville. Occasionally I will play on stage."

Hal is originally from Upstate New York: "I maybe a Yankee by birth but I'm a Texan by choice."

Finding his way down to The Lonestar State was a new beginning for the star. Second only to Nashville as the home of Country, it was in Fort Worth were Hal found his dancing shoes: "I can do a pretty good two-step but like lots of musicians I spend more time up on the bandstand and don't get to dance much. I have played lots of time at Billy Bobs in Fort Worth Texas and I have joined in a few Line dances there. I have played for the Line dancers too."

We listen to his remarkable voice as we move around the dancefloor and are very pleased with what we hear. Do you remember Stay Forever choreographed by Masters in Line? Another famous Hal track is Hearts Are Gonna Roll. It is going back some years but Roy Aspey choreographed The Renegade (published July 1997) — can you remember that one? It is well known that artists love a

full dancefloor and Hal is no exception: "It is the most beautiful thing I've ever watched. It is so inspirational to any musician to see people dance to their music.

The new album One More Midnight has just been released. Can Line dancers find anything juicy here? "On this record One More Midnight and Little Red Dress fit the bill. They are real good. Little Red Dress has a slow intro and then speeds up."

You'll see in this month's Album Reviews that Tim agrees that One More Midnight is 'a bit special'.

What else is special about this album? "Family is the most important thing to me. I wrote with my wife Gina on this album. Gina is not a musician she just came up with the opening line and I though wow that is beautiful — let's go. We enjoyed the process of writing that together.

Reaching out to Line dancers what should they expect from the show? "I think they should bring their dancing shoes. If they have room then please dance. I would love it if they did. I love it when people get up and dance, it really elevates the energy in a room. And lastly: "I just want to say come out and enjoy the show."





hen packing my dance chest for my desert island retreat I realised there are lots of dances to dance. So many are my personal favourites that it is hard to choose which ones are the ultimate dances that I have to include. Over the years I have learnt so many great dances but first on my list every time would have to be Amazing Faith. It is one of the first dances I enjoyed teaching and even after all this time I still never tire of it. Each time I hear it play I feel a huge urge to run to the dancefloor — it wouldn't matter where I was or what I was in the middle of doing — I would still want to dance this dance.

Without a doubt second on my list would be Let Me Love You. This is a masterpiece. Perfect choreography from Masters in Line to a beautiful song by Tim McGraw. If I am being truthful I think this is the dance which inspired me to have a bash at my own choreography - so thank you Masters and Tim. More recently Last Man Standing and Poetry In Motion have been two enjoyable dances so I would bring these along just for fun. A trend is emerging and it is clear to see that I prefer smooth dances. It takes a smooth track to motivate me and I find I lose myself in a moment of dreamy splendour hopefully I can dream as I dance on my idyllic island.

Back to my inspiration which takes me back to Masters in Line... A dance which holds special memories for me is the first dance I ever choreographed namely Just Say It. It was danced to a Michael Bolton track and clinched first place at the 2003 Masters in Line choreography competition. I suppose I have to admit Masters in Line are responsible

for my inspiration and what led me to pursue the choreography path. I am a choreographer so my list would not be complete without

one ot two of my own dances. I would like The Right Way, When You're Around and Walk The Earth. People tell me that I am well suited to this type of music (smooth) and inform me that I have



found my niche. It can be a little too relaxed at times though so I should hope to be allowed something to lift my spirits (except for the odd vodka and diet coke!). I would select Bad Boy Tango, Hideaway Cha, Have Fun Go Mad, Funky Cha Cha and Crazy – all done with a Smiley Face of course! These dances are great fun.

After all that dancing I would probably need a lie down and maybe a chance to lift a few more spirits!

As the day draws to an end, I would like to dance my favourite dance of the moment which is Inside Your Heaven. This dance is beautifully styled and the song by Carrie Underwood is amazing. More Than Anything, an all time favourite dance of my own, would be the perfect end of a perfect day. By now I would really miss my friends and family, so I would wave a white flag and dance I Surrender and also one my favourite waltzes, by this time I would be Ready To Fly back home to my loved ones.



What Line is it anyway? Tim Ruzgar seeks a solution to the divide and conquer rules of the dancefloor

Resolution Or Revolution?

Here at *Linedancer Magazine* we have to write copy sometimes between four and six weeks ahead of the actual date the magazine hits your doorsteps. Often what is hot news at that time is old news by the time it reaches you and some things like "hot new dances" are somewhat "old hat" by the time you are reading the magazine. Much of this is due to the wonderful worldwide web and of course these days so many dances come and go so very quickly. Whether this is a good or a bad thing will depend on each individual or the instructors and yours and their likes and dislikes. Of course you have to factor in what levels and styles of dances you like and how often you dance.

Last month I wrote about Line dance Socials and the fact they should be advertised correctly to state exactly what folks can expect when they get there. This got me thinking about some major events where the dancers are divided into category either by the style of music or the level of the dances played. Last year, I had the great pleasure to deejay at the wonderful Western Experience in Holland where there are many thousands of dancers and Country music lovers. For Line dancers they have two huge halls one is for "Country only" where it is very strict that absolutely only Country music is played, and the other is the "Disco Hall" where just about anything goes. I had the opportunity to work in each of them for a whole day and many dancers spent time in each of the halls. For that event this seemed

to work very well, although there were some interesting ideas from some dancers on what is or is not Country music.

Over the last few months there seems a trend to try to create divisions in Line dancing. We already have the established "Newline" sector which is primarily aimed at those that like more funky and advanced dances, but not necessarily to the exclusion of other dances. I hear some people refer to "mainstream" Line dances and Line dancers and along with that the possibility of the term "Mainline" (they are a Bus Company where I live!). So what will we call those that like beginner dances, "Easyline" and those that like Country music "Countryline"? Or how about "Irishline" and "Latinline" and for those who like the fun element in Line dancing, "Happyline" or "Funline"?

I would be interested in your views on this but for me, whilst names and I.D.s for the differing levels would be good for social and weekend events, do we really need all this division of what is essentially for the most part, a fun hobby? Where will it all end?

I personally believe that what many refer to as "mainstream" is simply Line dancing in all its wonderful glory, with all levels and styles coming together. If we allow folks to keep trying to divide it up into little pieces it will only harm our beloved pastime, Trust Me!

How 'Bout You is a 64 count, four wall, intermediate dance by Dave "Brokeback Waltz" Munro. It is to the excellent Eric Church song How 'Bout You from his Sinners Like Me album.

Head Over Heels is a nice new dance from Andrew, Simon, and Sheila. Danced to ABBA's song Head Over Heels. It is 56 counts, two walls and easy intermediate.

Baby Bye Bye is a super dance to Rockie Lynne's Country rocker Baby Bye Bye. It was choreographed by Steve Mason and Claire Ball and this intermediate dance is 64 counts and four walls.

Songbird is a fabulous new slow Foxtrot from Phil Johnson. Phil's dance is 32 counts, four walls and intermediate. It is choreographed to Willie Nelson's superb rendition of Songbird. Worth a try — it is different.

Nothin' Stays The Same from Geri Morrison is a new dance to Keith Urban's Used To The Pain from his latest album. This intermediate dance is 56 counts and four walls. A fine dance to fine Country music.

Before You Leave was choreographed by Diana Dawson. It is a good dance to the Hacienda Brother's song The Last Time from The Fever 17 album. This intermediate dance has 64 counts and four walls.

Happy Angels from Roy Verdonk and Wil Bos. It is a nice dance to Tavares's Heaven Must Be Missing An Angel. This easy intermediate dance is four walls, it has 64 counts and is easy intermediate.

Before They Cheat is a good Country dance from Glyn Holt and Stephen Rutter. It has 32 counts, two walls and is intermediate. It was written to Carrie Underwood's Before He Cheats.

Disco 'Round is a cool new east coast swing dance from Kathy Hunyadi to the Alicia Bridges' classic disco song I Love The Nightlife. Kathy's dance is 32 counts, four walls and classified as a high beginner. I love this one.

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

What happens when you ronde? *Sho Botham* ponders hips, joints and flexibility...

Aiming for a Clean Sweep

Trends occur in Line dance choreography. After a movement or step is introduced in one dance it often starts popping up in other dances too. Some of these moves are more challenging than others. And they can require a fair amount of practice to dance them well both aesthetically and safely. For example, the ronde or sweep action is found quite regularly now in Line dance choreography. The ronde presents a number of challenges for the dancer to master. Freedom in the hip joint is required so that the leg can rotate in the joint as it is makes the ronde action. This is true whether the ronde action is danced with the foot of the working leg staying in contact with the floor or raised off the floor. The dancer needs to be able to remain balanced and controlled as the ronde action is danced. This can be achieved through good posture and alignment.

Balancing on one leg is not new in Line dancing. Absolute beginners will encounter this at their very first class. Hitches, struts and the like require weight changes and balancing on one leg for a brief, transitory moment. In this type of balancing, the dancer aims to stay upright and steady. As the free or working leg is staying in the same plane of movement the dancer can concentrate on the adjustment of the weight from one foot to the other. When we introduce a movement such as the ronde there is the additional challenge of the free leg traveling in an circular motion through space to cope

with. Often in an effort to maintain the free leg as it performs the ronde action the dancer will tense the muscles of the leg, hip and torso. The result of this is a heavier action that takes more effort to perform. What we are ideally aiming for is an effortless ronde action that is smooth and light and one which feels good and looks good. To achieve this, the dancer's body needs to be able to adjust, maintain balance whilst the leg is actively moving in a sweeping action and all with minimum effort.

What happens to your body when you perform a ronde action? You can do a couple of quick tests to find out. One method is to stand on both feet and place a hand on the font of each hip. Then perform a ronde action from front to back with the foot just off the floor paying particular attention to any movement happening in either hip. Is one hip lifting as you do the ronde action? Is the hip on the side of the ronde action carrying round with the working leg? Does the leg feel light and free in the hip joint or does it feel heavy and tight? Is the body twisting to accommodate the ronde action? This test can also be performed in front of a mirror to see what is happening. Or it can be done with a partner. Each taking turns to watch the alignment of the other as the ronde action is performed. If you try the test out on both right and left, you will probably find that the movement feels and looks different on each side. This is because we often have a greater



degree of flexibility on one side than the other. You are aiming for a ronde action that does not cause the body or pelvis to twist to achieve it. This is essential to avoid straining for example, the knee joint of the standing leg or the lower back. Conditioning exercises are an excellent way to improve your range of motion in the hip and enhance posture and alignment generally.

We are creatures of habit and don't stray from our formula. In the spring and fall, we love to get up early and go out in our backyard with our two dogs, Sadie and Sophie. Life is full of exciting chapters and we feel that our Line dancing experience has brought us to new heights in what we do. Hopefully, they will eventually take us onto new adventures.

I would also like to set the record straight... it has come to our attention that we are no longer traveling to the UK. This is not true. We decided that we had been over there so much during the past three years that it would be in our best interest not to wear our welcome out. So, we have taken a break and have been traveling to many other countries during the past year. We miss our UK dancing family and look forward to seeing you all soon.

What is for breakfast?

We are usually quiet in the morning. We don't eat a large breakfast... just enough to jump start our day.

Living in Nashville Tennessee – the home of Country – you must have a hectic social life?

Ironically, we like to spend our evenings at home. Sounds boring, but this gives us a chance to have friends and family over. We love to entertain guests and treat them like it's a holiday.
