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# Dear Dancers



There is often confusion about how a dance is defined as either a Beginner, Intermediate or Advanced dance. There are so many different views and opinions that no one seems to be able to agree.

For me, it's an unhappy circumstance that we have just evolved the present system rather than developed it with a formal agreed structure. Because we don't have an 'industry' standard of definitions for choreographers to comply with we often see a dance level set way out of kilt with majority opinion. As it currently stands levels are based entirely on choreographers' opinion rather than on any agreed formula.

Imagine how much clearer it would be if we had an agreed structure. For example, for a dance to be defined as Absolute Beginner it would have to be 32 counts or less. Be of slow to medium tempo. Would not have any cross body movements. Had no syncopations. Did not have more than one simple quarter or half turn etc. etc. This would make defining dance levels a piece of cake. Other level could follow similar criteria.

Please note, I am not dictating to the line dance world what should or shouldn't be done. What happens beyond the world of Linedancer Magazine and Linedancermagazine.com is not for me to manage but, with this particular problem in mind, I announced at the Crystal Boot Awards that in future, we would change the structure for dance classifications to the following five levels:-

Absolute Beginner, Beginner, Improver, Intermediate, Advanced.

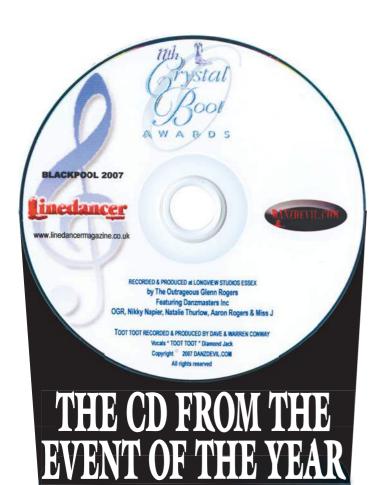
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Of course, it will still be at the choreographers' discretion but I hope it will help us to achieve more accurate definitions and it will enable us to present more Crystal Boot Awards to worthy winners.

It's not perfect I know but I hope it will help lead the way to a fair and sensible solution in the future. Perhaps one day we will be able to introduce an agreed description for each level but for now I guess it's best to take it one step at time.

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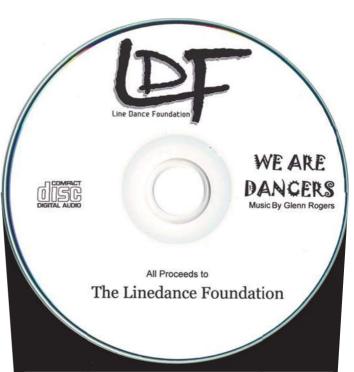




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# Track - We Are Dancers

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Sitting behind a desk unnoticed didn't stop Julie Roberts from having her dreams, *Linda Willis* chats to the Country singing sensation.

Hot on the heels of her debut album, Julie Roberts whose deep, soulful Country voice doesn't mix 'n' match as you'd expect, was dubbed Country Music's Cinderella. Bursting with a talent she kept hidden from her bosses at Universal Records, once discovered Julie's album went gold leading to two CMA Horizon Award

Nominations and one for Top New Female Vocalist from the Academy of Country Music. She wakes up the US every day singing *Good To Go*, the theme song of the TV show Good Morning America.

I caught up with her while she was appearing in her inaugural showcase with best friend Jace Everett in New From Nashville at the Carling Academy, Islington. It was her birthday and she greeted me with the most radiant of

grins, even though she'd been in Dublin the night before, had spent the whole afternoon being interviewed and working on last minute sound checks, due on stage in a couple of short hours. We talked about her new album, *Men and Mascara*, and she let me in on a few girlie secrets.

She must have read my mind when choosing songs I tell her. It's an album brimming over with female-friendly lyrics that you connect with instantly: "Well, you know people tell me their stories, and I listen and try to help them," she admits. "I've seen people who are real close go through things and they mean a lot to me. They love those songs and I am just drawn to songs

like that. I always will be. Songs that are about life, and just sad songs. I just love 'em! And I'm not sad. They're just about real life and people relate to them."

Julie co-wrote three of the tracks and says she is much more comfortable about putting pen to paper these days: "I moved to Nashville years ago and started writing when I moved. I wrote songs on my first record but I just didn't feel that confident, but I continued writing and when I started recording my second I just felt like my songs were good enough — to be on that. And now I'm writing songs for my next record. My own songs."

Her singing voice doesn't match her looks: "No – a lot of people tell me that!" She also had a lot of people telling her that maybe she should give up her dreams of singing for her supper and "find another career – but I carried on writing." She insists. "I ended up playing shows and travelling, all over the World now, which is what I always wanted to do. But I really love it – it's my life. So, I hope they take me seriously now," she giggles.

Julie started singing in Church: "I worked at Dollywood you know, singing in live shows, and I worked at another theme park singing in shows for the summertime. It was a Country TV show. To get paid to do what you love — it seems like that's what you're supposed to do. But I knew all along what I wanted to do."

I love the lyrics of songs like the title track, *Men and Mascara* – always run: Is that true for her too?: "Well, I've found some good mascara, finally!" she giggles and it echoes round the room like a cracked crystal: "Maybelline's a great lash – and you get a comb too – I've got one in my purse right now."

For a man to get her to notice him he needs, "A sense of humour. I like intelligence. I like smiles. I'm quite short, only 5'2" but I love a tall guy. Looks are OK but you know – conversation is so important."

She's happily single right now: "I just don't have time," she says simply.

On Jace Everett – "We've known each other for one or two years now. They asked if we'd do New From Nashville together and, of course, I said yes."

She sounds at times very much like Bonnie Raitt: "Thank you. I love Bonnie Raitt. I used to cover a lot of Bonnie Raitt songs, but I haven't done in a long time. I would say the person who has been the biggest single influence on me musically was Patsy Cline. And I love Dolly Parton. But on the soul side I like Otis Redding. I like a lot of soulful music. But I also like classic Country too."

What would people be surprised to learn about Julie Roberts? She laughs out loud, "Oh gosh – what do other people say to that one? What did Jace say?" I tell her not to worry we'll skip the question, but she decides to tell me the story of how she acquired the Cinderella tag in the first place. "You know, a lot of people have asked me about how I got to be where I am today? And they're surprised that I worked for my record label for all that time without anyone ever assuming it was me that was singing. And I never told them although I wanted to. Probably 'cos I thought they'd fire me!" The job she was terrified of losing was as an executive assistant to Luke Lewis, co-chairman of Universal Music Group Nashville. Her workmates had no idea, but at night she would sneak off to sing in the local clubs winning a legion of admirers one of whom turned out to be producer Brent Rowan who began secretly recording her when she was not tapping her fingers on the keyboard at her day job. Eventually the producer played the demo disc for Lewis who was knocked out by it. He asked who was this mystery artiste? She happened to have been sitting outside his office door all the time. He signed her up, and as they say, the rest is...

Country music has always been so special to her: "I think it's very relatable. It's just the stories. The songs – all of it," she says. "The music moves me emotionally. Nothing moves me more musically than Country music."

Most memorable performance so far has to be, "The first time I sang on the Grand Ole Opry. I'd always dreamed about singing at the Opry. So the first time was real special."

I ask if she dances at all? "I used to try," she confides. "My older sister taught dancing for years and I took dancing classes until I was 12. And I tried — but it's definitely not my first talent. But I love Line dancing. It's fun."

# In the evening Julie Roberts and Jace Everett gave the London crowds something to cherish

ater that night turned out to be a dazzling and sensational showcase for the stunner whose name was on everyone's lips – not to mention clothing. "Wow! You're wearing my T-shirt - thanks!" she beamed, before launching into Paint and Pillows, blue jeans tightly wrapped around and black leather belt clutching tight to her hips. Her voice resounded like it's been around forever. Smile, and All I Want is You were welcome inclusions from the new album. I found sweet and lovely what she referred to as a Two-step and we down South do as a Line dance - Come Love Me. Having whetted our appetites she was determined to prove she is not a one-horse pony. The Everley Brothers' classic When Will I Be Loved?

picked up the pace but what truly set mine, and everyone else's pulse racing, the megawatt brilliance of the Tina Turner inspired Proud Mary. She bounced her brilliant voice off the walls and beyond as took command of the tiny stage like a superstar who's here to stay. "It's my 28th birthday," she told us. "And I never dreamed I'd get to sing on stage in London on this day!" Someone at the bar started to sing, "Happy Birthday to you!" and it took off like a Mexican wave as we all joined in with her band and raised our glasses to salute her. She wiped away the tears: "You've made me cry! I'm so happy! I don't think I can sing another note!" By this time Jace Everett had returned to join her - tall, and everything a girl could ask for: "Are you going to sing with me?" she asked him. "Well it's your birthday and everything - I can't really say 'no'can I!" he laughed. If you've seen Walk the Line you've seen the duet of Jackson. But this version was sensational. It brought the house down. We jumped to our feet yelling for more. It was absolutely fantastic.

Country Play List describe him as being "James Dean sexy!" does he see himself that way? He laughs out loud and smiles engagingly, "Not at all, not at all! No, he's cool and everything, but I see myself as a singer, songwriter and musician. And I guess I'm not really that interested in the celebrity aspect of things."

Would he like to do movies at some time in the future? "I wouldn't be against that. I think that could be fun. I wouldn't wanna do it just for the money. It would have to be a film that I felt - good about."

Last year, he sang a medley of Johnny Cash songs in an encore with Dierks Bentley, I remember goose bumps ran down my spine. Was it planned? "He mentioned that we might do it. And it was actually quite an embarrassing experience for me," he smiles. "Because I have to admit that during his set I was actually upstairs drinking whiskey with some friends. And I wasn't exactly sober when I hit the stage," he chuckles, "So, I had a little trouble remembering some of the words."

Did he admire Johnny Cash? "I LOVED Johnny Cash," came the instant reply.

I guess he's seen Walk the Line, then? "Oh yeah, many times."

Does he see any similarities between himself and the Man in Black? "Yeah. You got some hard-hitting questions don't you? There are some things in my past that I'll never speak of. That are difficult, but, there's a definite similarity. He and I both have a serious spiritual side, otherwise we're both wild and crazy so I think that part of me is what we share, more than anything."

What message would he like to think Country music gives the rest of the world, about Americans? "What I'd like my Country music to say is... I'm the same as you. I have hopes, dreams, heartbreaks, loss — you know, just sort of stuff that is the human condition. It's not about politics — that's for damn sure! It's not about flags! That's for damn sure!"

He states emphatically. "It's about the human heart and the human condition and how similar we all are, not how different we are That's what MY music's about."

Future plans are, "Just to keep on keeping on, you know. Keep writing songs, and performing, and hopefully get better at both. I'm organising a UK tour for later this year, so with some luck I'll be back soon."

Bad Things is still doing good things for Line dancers everywhere. Has he ventured onto the hardwood yet? "No," he replies with a grin. "I haven't tried it. But I'll hopefully write another song that they can have another Line dance to. I'm very grateful to the line dancing community," he tells me. "Grateful that they like my music and that they're out there having a good time while they're listening to it."

Making his music was what he was all about when he stepped on stage with his brilliant guitarist Chris Raspante a few hours later. *Gotta Have It*, and *Half of my Mistakes* proved over and again what a talented new comer he is. Guitar duels with his partner were acoustic fantastic. No frills – just consummate, pure skill. He finished his set to a standing ovation with the Rolling Stones classic, *It's All Over Now*. But it isn't – for Jace Everett it's only the beginning.





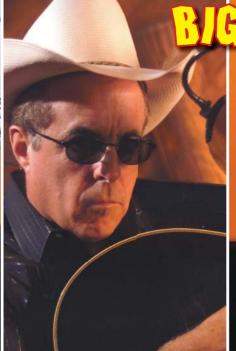

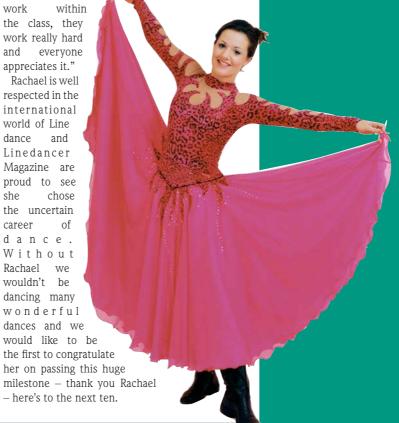
Mum and Jill Ward for all their hard work within the class, they work really hard and evervone appreciates it."

Dear Dancers was delighted to announce yet more dances being published and generally more articles to read.

It was April Fool's and we reported noise pollution and politics rearing their ugly heads in *Grapevine*. Our joke was a possible ruling from the EC to stop too many people wearing cowboy boots in their classes.

Page 13 told us all about Bridget Taylor and Tricia Teagle from the Country Line Hoppers and their great work on behalf of orphans in Moldova. This was the club's first charity fund raiser and they hoped to be able to invite the England Star Teddy Sherringham to their dance night. This showed then as it does now what a noble, selfless lot Line dancers are.

One group taking the Line dance world by storm was the BR5-49 and we meet them on page 17 where they told us about their lives and careers so far as well as looking at their roots and what the future may hold. A professional fitness instructor named Joy Ashton explains on page 19 why she has decided to become a line dance instructor. She confided that her favourite dance at that time was Black Coffee. Judging by the results of our recent Dance Of The Decade this is still true today for many of you.

There were six albums on review that month and four of those were compilations showing what the market at that time really demanded. None of the Cd's discussed seemed the perfect compilation according to the "Redneck Rebel" (our resident reviewer at the time).

Youth Zone on pages 26-27 highlighted a few more of our talented young dancers who took part in ITV The Sticky Programme aired on Thursday 27th February 1997. Michael Gleave from Warrington aged 10 and a half then was with the Liberty Dance Group. Does Michael and his friends still dance one wonders.

The Pet Shop Girls was (and still is) a unique Line dance charity which through its relentless work and fund raising activities provide a little bit of sunshine for less fortunate people. We met June Yates, their driving force, and she explained why the charity had come to exist on page 30 and 31 and what their hopes were. We also chatted to some of the people who had directly benefited from the charity excellent work.

On page 39, In Between The Lines, someone was looking for the very first three issues of Linedancer Magazine in the hope of completing their collection. Proof enough of its already fast growing popularity!

Finally a staggering 10 dances were published and featured amongst others Be Bop A Lula by Denny Hengen, Grundy Gallop by Jenny Rockett), Cherokee Boogie by Jo Thompson and H2O by Rob Fowler. This was one of the finest magazines we had produced so far with a wealth of articles and subjects making it a fine read, even some 10 years later.

# The Finnish Masters

Masters in Line travel the globe organising competitions and events. We caught up with *Paul McAdam* after a Salmaki Corsu, intimate performances with Sydney Smyth and all in all a great weekend on the Finnish tiles...

s the majority of Britain suffered with freezing temperatures caused by a brief snow storm, Rob, Rachael and Paul headed to somewhere where the temperature was even colder. At -26, the Masters were welcomed in Finland.

After arriving, with the rising star and Masters Invitational World Champion, Sydney Smyth, an eventful weekend lay ahead.

The Finnish people ever eager to dance descended in their droves to support the first Finnish Masters weekend.

Although freezing outside, inside the atmosphere was warm and friendly as the Masters taught their hottest new dances – look out for – Swing, Grace Kelly and Voodoo Child.

Along with friends from Sweden and Norway, it appeared nothing was too difficult for the Finnish natives. Saturday turned out to be a resounding success jam packed with heats of the competition and plenty for dancers to enjoy off the floor.

The show was nothing short of spectacular. An eye opening square dance kicked off the proceedings, which was followed by Masters' special guest Sydney Smyth performing her magnificent winning solo medley direct from the UCWDC Worlds in Nashville. Polished and perfected

right down to her facial expressions, she was very well received as the audience screamed for more.

This was then followed by the Masters Phantom of the Opera routine, which received rave reviews at The British Championships in Prestatyn. There was a quick wardrobe malfunction on Rachael's behalf as she was changing in between the guys performing and Paul decided to change his routine on the spot. Rachael and Rob both agree that Paul dances better when he makes it up on the spot but that is still up for debate. The Phantom routine went down exceptionally well as everyone took their respective bows.

At a Masters event it is usual for the party hard crew to go on into the night. This time it included trying the Finnish traditional drink Salmaki Corsu — a mix of liquorice and cough medicine — we'll say its an acquired taste.

An early morning rise the next day and the Masters were preparing for a day of competition as the Scandinavian countries got their chance to impress. It was a fantastic day and the dancing on show was a testament to the competitors work ethic and the hours of endless practice.

It was a wild weekend and a really enjoyable one at that. Look out for adventures in France with Paul and Rachael coming up, followed by the Norwegian Masters in March. From now until then, we hope to see you on the dancefloor.









# Do you feel like dancing?

This year if one dance has been on the tip of every dancers toes it has to be Pat Stott's Dance of the Year – Don't Feel Like Dancing. Thanks to the massive amount of bumping hips, clicking fingers and the number one song by the Scissor Sisters Pat, from Wilmslow, Cheshire, is celebrating: "I have three ambitions and I have just fulfilled one," smiles Pat.

She was chatting the day after winning her three Crystal Boot Awards (Dance of the Year, Intermediate Dance of the Year and Rising Star): "I have always wanted to achieve three things — to teach in America, Australia and also to win Dance of the Year.

During her acceptance speech Pat thanked her two girls, Lizzie, 22, and Jennie, 18, who kindly told her about the track as soon as they had heard it on TV: "They listen to the music channel. It drives me mad, but they find me music and without that, I suppose I wouldn't have won.

"When I choreographed the dance Don't Feel Like Dancing I put lots of the experience and advice I have been given over the years into it. My Ballroom teacher talked about putting light and shade into your choreography so I did that. Peter Metelnick once said if you find a step hard then the dancers will find it 10 times harder — so I tried to remember that. A few months ago Tim Ruzgar wrote, in his column, about making tags fun. In Don't Feel Like Dancing there is a tag but

I make the dancers call out 1–2–3–4 when they do the clicks. Everyone finds it easy to remember and it always makes them smile. I am so grateful to all the people who voted for me and to all the teachers who have taught the dance."

In 2001, Pat was interviewed by *Linedancer* and revealed her inspiration comes from behind the ironing board: "These days Lizzie does the ironing, she also finds all the music. We have started choreographing dances together – we have done Grace Kelly – which seems to be doing well in the charts."

Pat has been dancing for most of her life and has been hooked on Line for the past 13 years: "I started with ballet and tap when I was just nine, then at 16 I began learning Ballroom and Latin American.

"13 years ago I heard about Line dance from a Ballroom examiner. Not long after that exam, I entered the choreography competition ran by *Linedancer* Magazine and Dave Sheriff. That is when I really got the bug. I went on to choreograph a dance for the Deans called Rock Bottom. Since then, I have taught in Spain, Sweden and Denmark."

Daughters, Lizzie and Jenny, have both taken dance lessons so I imagine the household is always moving in time to the music. Pat adds: "They have taken Ballroom classes and other dance lessons. They have both tried choreographing, Lizzie and I have got

a new dance named Top Of The Pops. It is to Pop Muzak (64 count intermediate). Next year, all being well, I will be going to Florida to teach. This will achieve another of my dreams. Jennie is also planning on going to Australia for a gap year so I hope to go for a month and maybe I'll get chance to teach."

In fact her daughters are not the only help Pat has enlisted, she has also teamed up with other choreographers, as well as a group of Swedish dancers: "In August 2005 *Linedancer* printed a choreography feature after I had returned from an event in Sweden. I had been asked to teach the Swedish dancers how to choreograph and write a script and it was well received. I thought it would make an interesting article so I contacted the magazine. I really enjoyed giving the workshop and was even more pleased with the outcome. We choreographed a dance called All Together – it was a fun experience."

It was the second time Pat had taught at the CBA weekend and her dance Toot Toot went down a treat. The steps are danced to a Diamond Jack track. People made lots of positive comments about it and it is a great one for beginners. Pat is planning on teaching and dancing at many events over the next 12 months: "I have plans to go to Tenerife to work with the Deans in September and I will be in Scarborough for the weekend in November with Diamond Jack and Robert Lindsay. Maybe I'll see you there."

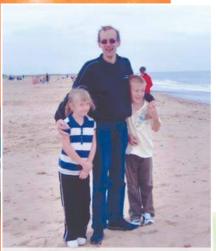

Most youngsters are forever getting into mischief but Daniel Chapman has proved any kid can be an *Ordinary Boy. Pamela Edelston* spoke to the Chapman family, whose two young children are already choreographing and teaching... all Mum asks is why are there not more clubs for the youngsters?

Are we really the worst Country in the world when it comes to the welfare of our children? A survey report by UNICEF, which ranks 21 industrialised nations, places the UK and US at the bottom of the pile. Apparently in regards to assessing the welfare of our children we rate extremely poorly and as parents, teachers and adult influences we should be ashamed of ourselves. Apparently our score is down in the pits when it comes to eating dinner as a family and interacting

with other people in the school playground. UNICEF are talking about the majority but thankfully *Linedancer Magazine* have found a family who are very much together and do all the things that would make UNICEF proud.

In a back street of Milton Keynes we found a Line dancer who at age 12 is already published on the *Linedancer* website. Line dancing comes naturally to those who dance as a family, the kids pick up the steps and

rhythms with ease. When Mum and Dad enjoy a hobby it is easy for their off spring to get involved too. Daniel Chapman and his little sister Nicola, who is nine, have been Line dancing for a year. Daniel says: "I really love it. We go together as a family once a week and I enjoy it very much."

"My dance is to the Ordinary Boys -I like the Country stuff too but the Rock and Pop is more of what I am into."

We joked about making Line dance cooler, Daniel added: "I don't tell my friends at school because they don't think it is cool, but I do. Actually, I started at my sister's school, I go to high school now (he states sounding all grown up). My favourite lesson is PE because we don't get any homework."

Daniel is a regular 12 year old who hangs out with his mates and goes for sleep overs, but he is also a talented kid who has already got a dance to teach: "I liked the song by the Ordinary Boys and I thought I would have a go at choreographing something.

"My teacher at Karry on Linedancing said I could try teaching my dance to the class. I was a bit nervous and I made a few mistakes but once I got into it I found it came naturally."

Daniel found calling the steps childsplay and the dancers seemed to enjoy his lesson: "When I grow up I would like to be a Line dance instructor. I had good fun taking the class."

Mum works at the local school, she tells me about a friend who teaches the kids Line dance: "A colleague teaches the Year Ones a few dances like Acky Breaky Heart and other golden oldies. They are only little but they can all pick up the steps.

"My daughter started learning to Line dance in school and since has decided to come along to class. As a family, Line dancing helps to keep us interacting and is a social activity we can take part in together. I don't know how long it will last but for the moment they both seem to really love coming along to class and joining in."

I congratulate her and her husband for the great example they are setting to the kids. In a world which is obsessed with gang crime and young people picking up Asbos, it is refreshing to see a family working hard to keep the kids occupied. Line dancing is a hobby they all can join in with.

Daniel's sister Nicola is a bit on the shy side but she agrees to chat with me: "My favourite dance is the Scissor Sisters. I like Girls Aloud, they are my favourite group. I wanted to follow in my brother's footsteps so I choreographed a dance to No Good Advice." (The dance is on the *Linedancer Magazine* website).

Nicola wasn't too sure what the future held for her but the present involves lots of fun on the Line dancefloor.

It is a crying shame that there are not more classes aimed at the younger generation. Mum Wendy says: "There are not enough classes for the kids. We have another youngster at our classes, Sammy is the daughter of our teacher. She has done some choreography too. It would be nice if they had a class with people their own age. They love coming along with Dad and me but I know they would like to mix with younger kids too. There are just no classes in the Milton Keynes area."

I ask our aspiring teacher Daniel if he will be teaming up with his class mate or his sister in the future: "I might..."

I guess we will have to wait and see - go to Linedancermagazine.com and search for Daniel's dance Ordinary Boy or Nicola's No Good Advice.

It is billed as the best festival ever — Linedancer can only guarantee that it will be big, bright and attempting some ground breaking tasks — but will you be part of it?

e may not drink in the Vic and have friends like Pat Butcher and Peggy Mitchell but Allan Barker and his wife Irene are true Eastenders. Allan is the brains behind the operation and decided to start a brand new event from his workplace – the North Weald Airfield, in Essex. Allan's nine to five involves being an operations officer so his attitude towards getting things right is always turned on, he says: "Day to day my responsibilities are very diverse, I organise everything from boot sales and markets to music events and motorcycle trials.

"I am no stranger to organising events on this scale. Many years ago I ran a pub in Great Yarmouth, the events we put on there were much smaller but it is the same principle.

"I had a friend who asked me to drive a coach full of excited Line dancers to an event on the Isle of Wight. It was the first time I had seen Line dancing in this light and I was completely bowled over by the atmosphere. Everyone was having such a great time and this is where I first had the thought why don't I organise an event for Line dancers.

It is a daunting task and Allan needed some aid from people in the business. When it comes to booking entertainment acts Allan thought he would do well to look no further than Les Evans from NAM. Les was the right person to speak to and filled in any gaps that were in Allan's grand plans, he commented: "I have many artists on my books and we have been delighted to work with Allan to pull this event off. Calico, Gemma Fairweather, Tony Rouse and Muddy Boots are just some of the acts you'll enjoy watching if you get to the airfield."

There is a warm buzz flying around between the organisers and promoters: "We hope that this will be the biggest and best festival dedicated to Line dancers. I know I am positively looking forward to it and intend to work hard to make it the first of many. If it goes to plan I am asking everyone to keep hold of their ticket stubs for a discounted price off a one day event I hope to organise later in the year," said Allan.

The highlight of the event will be an attempt at the Guinness Book of World Records. The aim is to get the longest Line dance dancing along the runway... can it be done? Well only with your help: "We want as many people there as possible to make this World Record attempt... it is going to be such a laugh and I know that you'll want to be part of it. To end the event we also intend to let off fireworks — which I promise will go with a bang — you don't want to miss it."

Choreographers who are held in high regard are booked for the occasion, including Kate Sala and Ed Lawton. Also Funky Country UK disco with Jo Conroy and Richard Edlin will be providing some interesting entertainment. There is sure to be never a dull moment over this weekend. Allan added: "There are camping and caravan facilities available which will incur a £10 pitch fee. If you are after something a bit more upmarket we are offering an all inclusive hotel and transport package in conjunction with a quality hotel nearby. The package costs £179 per person for three nights and includes passes to the festival. If you prefer to come along for the day booking early will save you money, prices rise after May 1, 2007.'

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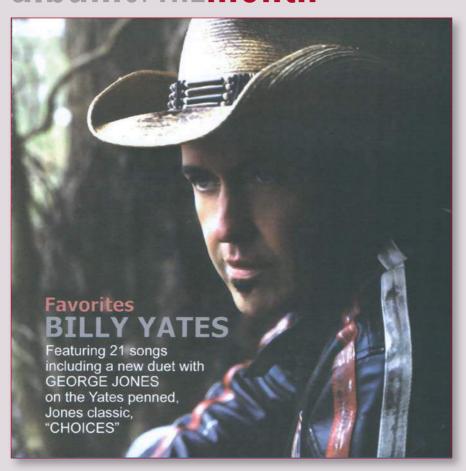

# Billy Yates FAVORITES

M.O.D. RECORDS – 34479 40407

In his own words on the album sleeve notes Billy Yates says "After much thought I decided to compile some of my own Favorites from my previous four albums." There is also a re-recording of hit Flowers2 and a duet with George Jones on Billy's own Choices which was a big hit for George. There are 21 tracks on this album.

Billy kicks off with **Better Every Beer** (114bpm) which like, the entire album, Billy co-wrote. This is a cool west coast swing and

Gaye Teather wrote a dance to this.

**Choices** (66bpm) is the duet with George Jones and east coast swinger Too Country And Proud Of It (144bpm) had a dance to it by Ellie Hill and Brenda Humphrey.

There are a few slow songs *In The Light Of Day* (86bpm), *A Better Place* (67bpm), *My Infinite Love* (55bpm), *The Circus Is Over* (97bpm) and the remade *Flowers* (87bpm).

**Daddy Had A Cadillac** (140bpm) is a superb east coast swing and it needs a good dance writing to it.

**Down At The Station** (144bpm) is polka in style and this is another cracking dance track.

*Me Marie* (121bpm) this too is a great dance track and Mel Fisher wrote a 32 count, four

wall, intermediate dance to it.

**Daddy's Radio** (141bpm) is a clever song with nice lyrics and is at the right pace for dancing and the last comment also applies to Smokin' Grass (135bpm) which is referring to Bluegrass music!

**Dreaming Out Loud** (124bpm) is brilliant Country track and one of the album's highlights. Dance track? You bet!

**Anywhere But Nashville** (70bpm) could be autobiographical as it tells of a singer who wants his own identity.

**Roxanne's Bayou** (141bpm) has a Cajun feel to it, I just love this style of song and so did Rafel Corbi as he wrote a beginner dance to it.

**This Song Doesn't Rock** (various bpm) oh yes it does! Well in places. This is a fabulous dance track that varies in tempo, it's a Country rocker, a two step, a waltz, and maybe more. What a challenge to choreographers!

**All By My Lonesome** (129bpm) this too is east coast swing in style and it is one of those tracks that makes you want to dance to. DJ Dan and Wynette Miller wrote 32 count beginner/intermediate dance to it.

**Alcohol Abuse** (158bpm) is a superb Country rocker and John "Growler" Rowell and Pete Harkness wrote Ain't Got A Clue a 64 count, four wall, intermediate dance to it. Check it out now!

**The Perfect Woman** (146bpm) I can't find any dances to this brilliant track so what are you waiting for?

**Harmony Man** (98bpm) was the title of one of Billy's previous album and Mel Fisher wrote a 64 counts, four wall, intermediate dance to it.

This is a superb album of fine Country music with most of the tracks ideal for dancing. There are many of the tracks that already have dances written to them and you can find them on Linedancer magazine's website. This is a great introduction to a very talented Country singer/songwriter and I highly recommend this album to you.

# DESPITE OUR DIFFERENCES

Indigo Girls

After releasing albums for twenty years Indigo Girls, Amy Ray and Emily Sailers, have not mellowed with age. They are devoted environmental and social activists, known as music mavericks. This is the girls 10th album but a first for us here in the *Linedancer* reviews section.

I was just getting into the opening track *Pendulum Swinger* (135bpm) when unfortunately the "F" word appeared in the song. You know my feelings about foul language in Line dance music.

*Little Perrenials* (83bpm) is a nice song with a good steady cha rhythm and the harmonies are a joy.

**I Believe In Love** (116bpm) begins steadily but when the beat comes in this is a delightful track which shows it's possibilities as a dance track.

**Three County Highway** (68bpm) is reminiscent of the Counting Crows. It lacks a strong beat so doesn't have much merits as a dance track.

**Run** (96bpm) is an altogether different proposition, it's a lovely track, laced with harmonies, and could, with the right choreography, be a delightful dance track.

**Rock And Roll's Heaven's Gate** (140bpm) is more rock chick from the girls and it has a good hook in the clever lyrics.

*Lay My Head Down* (134bpm) is a fast paced waltz track and it could be a surprise hit with the right dance. Emily sounds somewhat like Sheryl Crow.

*Money Made You Mean* (132bpm) is a good powerful song but as it is an acoustic track.

*Fly Away* (90bpm) Emily sounds like Christine McVie on the Fleetwood Mac Rumours album here. This track begins with piano accompaniment before the drums kick in but for me it is the best track on the album.

**Dirt And Dead Ends** (76bpm) is a poignant song about a young guy who turns out bad after a tough life. Not really suitable for dancing too.

The closing track *All The Way* (84bpm) is a nice dance track, a gentle cha with a good beat and harmonies.

Indigo Girls would not like to be labelled as Country or probably put into any other pigeon hole for that matter. I believe this non conformist duo would have been at home in the sixties rebelling against society. As a Line dance album there are a few songs that could be dance tracks. For those of you who like to try something different, this could be right up your alley!



THE CALLING

Mary Chapin Carpenter has had a ten album career, selling over 12 million albums and winning five Grammy awards. In the early days of Line dance we used several of Mary's tracks, most notably Down at the Twist and Shout. Mary now joins the Rounder Records stable.

A waltz, *The Calling* (103bpm) is the opener and it is a fine track that should have choreographers falling over themselves to write a dance to it.

*We're All Right* (127bpm) is cha cha in style and this melodic number should also delight dancers.

**Twilight** (76bpm) is a delightful night club two step with some wonderful musical backing.

It Must Have Happened (122bpm) is also a cha cha and a musical track with a really good beat to it. By my reckoning this is one of the better dance prospects.

On And On It Goes (86bpm) it is hard to define the rhythm of this gentle song and that may preclude it from attracting dancers to it. Your Life Story (123bpm) is an altogether different proposition, this has a really good driving drum beat and will make a good dance track.

*Houston* (96bpm) opens with some gorgeous piano playing, it too is a cha cha, but a slower one.

**Leaving Song** (103bpm) Mary's beautiful voice is the big feature on this song and whilst not great as a dance track, it is a wonderful song nonetheless.

**On With The Song** (119bpm) is a great Country dance track with a good strong beat.

**Closer And Closer Apart** (77bpm) is a stunning song, a night club two step, but as it is only Mary and a piano it doesn't have a good beat for dancing.

**Here I Am** (141bpm) this track is deceptive in that it is a fast paced waltz although it does sound fast as you listen to it. while, *Why Shouldn't We* (95bpm) lacks a strong beat. It is delivered at a slower pace.

We end with *Bright Morning Star* (85bpm) – a beautiful song but, again sadly it is not a dance track.

The Calling from Mary Chapin Carpenter could hardly be called a great album for Line dancing although there are a few decent dance tracks, not least the opening waltz. However, this is high quality album of fine Country music from a lady that has lost none of her ability or appeal. The Calling is for someone who appreciate quality Country music as you have it in spades here.



# THESE DAYS

Vince Gill MCA NASHVILLE

Vince Gill is a legend in Country music. As well as his own numerous recordings Vince is always in demand by other Country artists for his unique voice and guitar skills. His music has been a good friend to Line dancing over the years. Vince now releases a four album set *These Days* which contains 43 tracks. Obviously there are too many tracks to review them all individually so I will highlight a selection.

Workin' On A Big Chill (120bpm) opens CD1 (Rockin'), Kate Sala wrote a cool dance. Cowboy Up (105bpm) with Gretchen Wilson is a west coast swing.

**Nothin' For A Broken Heart** (84bpm) is a duet with Rodney Crowell and Vikki Morris. Karl Cregeen has written a super dance, Broken Hearted Rock and Roll.

**Sweet Thing** (100bpm) inspired Francien Sittrop to write an intermediate dance called That Sweet Thing.

**Smilin' Song** (118bpm) is a brilliant track, Robbie McGowan Hickie uses this for his dance Crazy Cha.

CD2 (Groovy) kicks off with LeAnn Rimes *What You Don't Say* (71bpm) – a nightclub two step.

**The Reason Why** (180bpm) is a fast waltz which features Alison Krauss. **The Rock Of Love** (104bpm) has the brilliant Bonnie Rait accompanying him.

What You Give Away (86bpm) features Sheryl Crow and Vince sounds like Roy Orbison. These Days (96bpm) closes this CD and is a wonderful waltz.

CD3 (Country and Western) begins with *This New Heartache* (110bpm) a traditional sounding Country song. *Don't Pretend With Me* (88bpm) inspired Robbie McGowan Hickie to write Foolish Heart.

**Sweet Little Corrina** (86bpm) has Phil Everly with Vince and this recaptures some of the Everly's magic.

CD4 (Acoustic) starts with a Bluegrass number *All Prayed Up* (152bpm) ideal for Applejacks.

Girl (109bpm) features Rebecca Lynn Howard. The final song on the set Almost Home (72bpm) has Guy Clark adding some spoken word on this poignant song.

This unique four album set features many of Nashville's finest musicians. I could use many superlatives to describe the albums but I don't have the space. There are several dances to tracks already. It is a journey that is everything good about Country music and I will simply say, buy yourself a copy, you will not be disappointed, Trust Me!

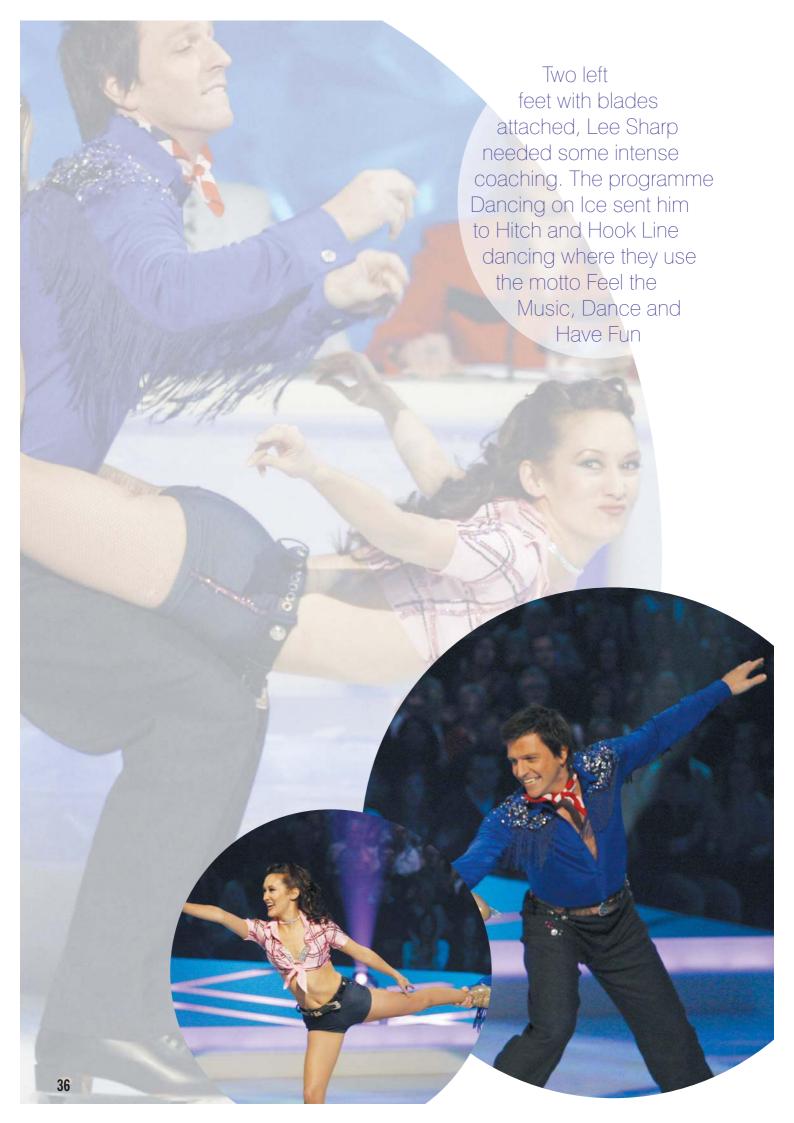

What do you get when you take an ex footballer, a pair of ice skates and a stetson hat... Lee Sharp on *Dancing on Ice* with a Country theme. The successful ITV1 show *Dancing on Ice* was getting into the Country thing with lots of yeehaws, gingham shirts and cowboy hats. The show was as typical looking Country as you can get with tunes like *Stand By Your Man, Nine To Five, Rhinestone Cowboy* and *Crazy*. Talk about slap your thigh!

Ex Manchester United player Lee Sharp had been getting some stick for his performance and so the show decided he needed a helping hand. The perfect place for Lee to go was a Line dance class... so the producer Amanda Wood set up a date at Hitch and Hook Line dancing which holds classes in Barnet, Hertfordshire with Janice Hoy and Kay Greig. Janice said: "He had been receiving poor comments about his lack of smiling and presentation skills from the judges, particularly Jason. This had knocked his confidence and he needed a boost. They thought learning a bit of Line dancing would raise his self esteem, enhance his style and perhaps we could help him to relax, dance and have fun."

On Saturday evening Lee would be dancing to King of the Road and thankfully we all know the Jo Thompson and Pedro Machado dance to the track. At the regular Thursday mixed intermediate class Kay and Janice got everyone on the dancefloor to do some easy warm up dances. Lee and his partner Frankie were expected at 8pm and Janice told me: "We were all dancing when Lee and Frankie arrived. We even had the camera crew up trying a few steps, we were in fits of laughter at that point. When he walked into the class Lee was wearing a woolly hat so Kay stepped straight in and handed them a stetson each. Usually

the teachers wear hats but the class is a mixed class we dance to many styles of music and the students wear whatever they want."

Frankie is a professional Ice dancer and so was a little more uneasy about the lesson, Janice added: "She was uncomfortable to begin with, she felt she should be able to do it. Once she picked up the steps she enjoyed it much more."

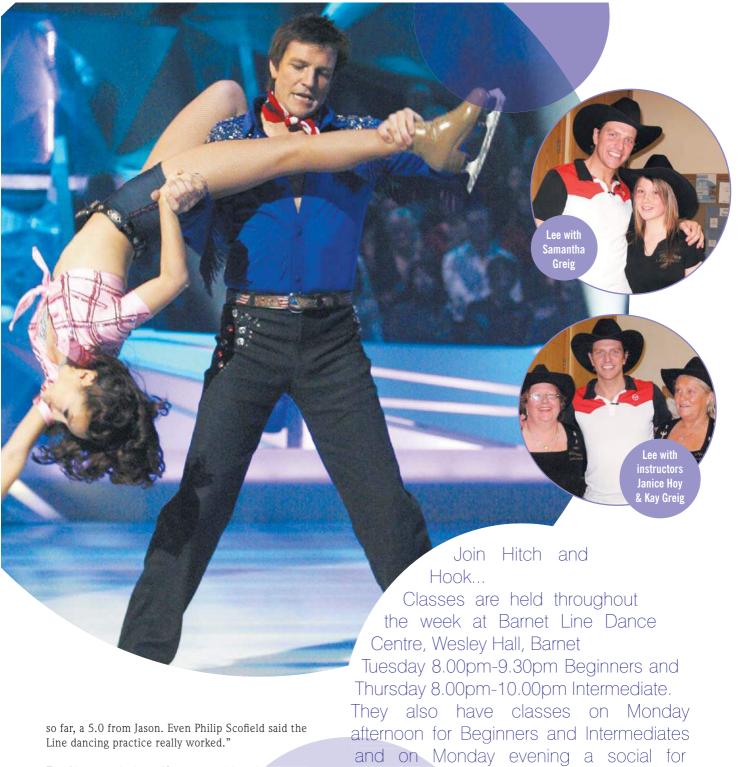
As for Lee: "He was a fast learner, he really got into it. He loved the bit at the end when I told him about the Elvis knees with the clicks. He was such a cool dude."

"For his first time Line dancing, he gave it lots of attitude with his hips and knees really going. We wanted to sing along but were vetoed by the TV company. Never the less we all had lots of laughs and fun. Both Lee and Frankie said they enjoyed the evening and it was a pleasure to have them in our class."

When informed of his role as a firefighter Lee was impressed and signed an autograph for him, telling us how much he respects fire-fighters.

If you watched the show you may have noticed Philip Schofield mentioned the Line dancing really helped, Janice said: "We would like to think that his evening with us helped with his presentation on Saturday. He was smiling, singing along and got his highest marks

(I think you may just have got yourself another two members!). It was an absolute pleasure to meet you all and I do hope we get to work together again in the future."

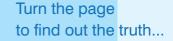

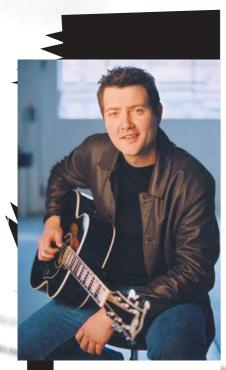








## Music Matters

Country music should be celebrating. At this year's Grammy Awards **The Dixie Chicks** stole the show, including, winning the covet Album of the Year Award for *Taking The Long Way*. The Chicks have suffered since lashing out against President Bush a few years ago. Natalie Maines joked: "I'm ready to make nice."

**Carrie Underwood** also took home a couple of Grammys for Best New Artist and Best Country Vocal Performance for *Jesus Take The Wheel*.

**Kimberly** and **Brad Paisley** announced the birth of their first child William Huckleberry Paisley. Their healthy baby boy was born on February 22nd at 5:00am central time at a Nashville area hospital.

Brad is currently in the studio working on his next album and will be touring starting in Chattanooga, Tennessee from April with Bonfires & Amplifiers.

**Billy Ray Cyrus** has been selected as a celebrity contestant on the new season of the popular ABC-TV series, Dancing With the Stars.

#### Am I a dance snob?

To be a dance snob is to think you are a better dancer than other people. To be honest, as a classically trained ballerina I feel I can dance better than the average dancer, but does that make me a dance snob?

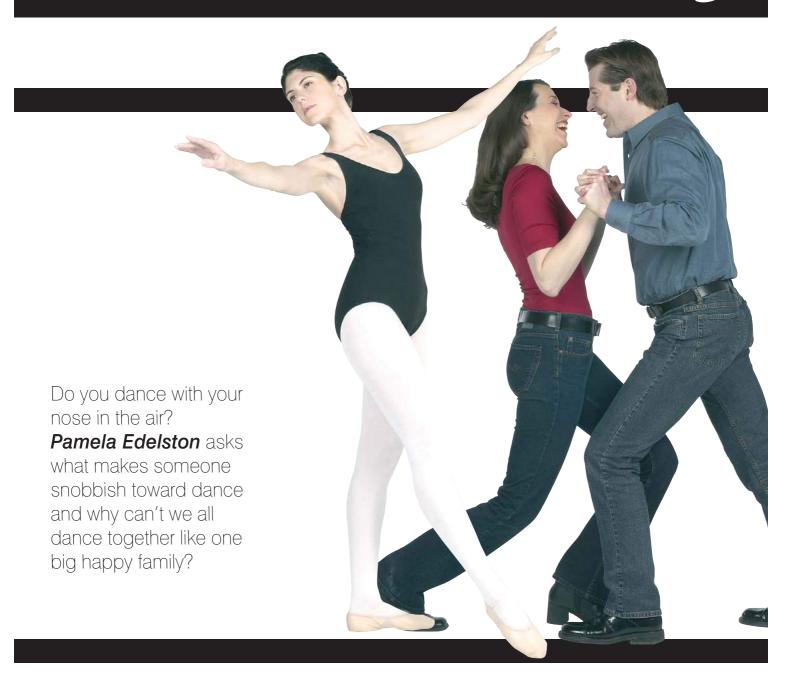
I have taken ballet class since being three years old and so my technique is, and may I add should be, flawless. You can call me arrogant but the way I see it — it costs an absolute fortune to take dance classes intensely for so many years and I would be embarrassed if I couldn't dance, not to mention how disappointed my mum would be.

Week in and week out I would take myself to class to soak up more knowledge that would help me improve. For example to increase turnout in the hip joint, we would squeeze a tiny bit of paper through our thighs until it dropped on the floor in front of us. I remember sitting along my bed frame with my feet positioned in box splits and pulling my body closer to the bed. Other girls in my class would put bricks — that's right house bricks — under their feet while they were in the splits. One girl could sit in the splits with three house bricks under each foot and her body touching the floor. I hope that image doesn't put anyone off their food — it did make my stomach turn.

I truly believe dancing is so difficult. It takes hours of practice and such dedication. I suppose when you've been through all that training perhaps its easy to see how social dancers might think I'm a dance snob? Ignoring other dance forms for a moment, let's take a look around the world of Line dance to see if we can spot any dance snobs there.

Unfortunately, these days we may see people who could be called Line dance snobs. Perhaps you know one or two of them yourself. Like the person who dislikes competition dancers and really objects to them attending regular class. They claim they only come

to show off or say they can't dance beside them because it is off putting.

Perhaps it is someone who refuses to do certain dances because they dislike the music, it's not by their favourite choreographer or at their level. What about the dancer who uses arms movements all the time and gets completely up your nose? Or the dancer who sits with arms tightly folded because they are playing something from over a year ago?

I have witnessed people who wouldn't dream of dancing a beginner dance because they are intermediate or advanced dancers. There is nothing wrong with dancing a simple dance old or new. There's more to be gained from joining in than sitting out. So do we now regard these people as dance snobs? Perhaps we do.

To my mind, a true Line dancer will join the floor no matter what music plays or who is dancing alongside them. Providing he or she knows the dance they will simply get up and have a jolly good time, enjoying all the wonderful variety that Line dance offers. These dancers will be perfectly happily to share the dance floor with everyone else.

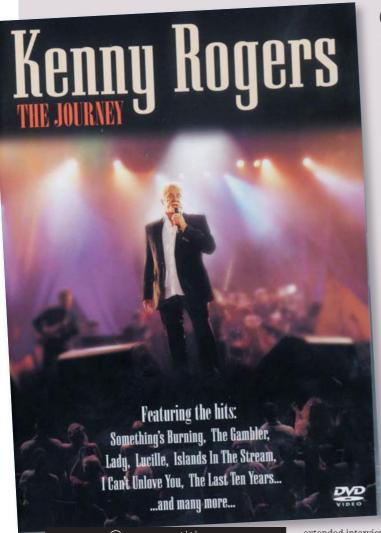
For me, I love watching dancers who just love

to dance. I'm not a snob because I would never eliminate myself from enjoying the dance floor. I join in no matter what level of dance or what the music choice may be, although I recognise that we all have preferences and indeed sometimes you just need to sit one or two out.

I am setting a challenge to all the dance snobs out there to make a concerted effort to enjoy dancing. Forget about what you like and don't like. My task for you is to listen to the music, get up on your feet and dance the night away. Or as Jo Thompson would say dance like no one is watching... let's see if we can return our dance floors to the happier places they used to be.

One of the things that I love about DVD's are good extras. And this one is worth the price just for all the bonuses it has. But more of that later.

Kenny Rogers: The Journey is an amazing record of an amazing singer, available at Asda. It uses a lot of concert footage, as well as Kenny's own words on his life and career. It is much more than just a retrospective though, as it shows so much of the man himself through his music and aspirations. This is a very engaging record of a man who seems to have always been a gentleman throughout his career and life. It does reveal a few surprising facts too such as, Sheena Easton and Kenny not getting on too well. Yet the fabulous song We've Got Tonight still packs a punch. We see Kenny meeting up again with the very first group he joined right out of high school (jazz vocal Bobby Doyle Group) and he sings the beautiful Irving Berlin's Blue Skies with Willie Nelson in what must amount to one of the best version of the tune I have ever heard. The dvd also features performances from Kim Carnes, Dolly Parton, Sheena Easton, etc... and interviews with the likes of Lionel Richie, Jim Mazza, David Foster and many more, this DVD will appeal not only to Kenny Rogers fans but anyone who loves good music.

No less than 23 tracks are featured including The Gambler, Lady, Lucille, Islands In The Stream, The Last Ten Years, Coward Of The County, to name but a few. We also hear four new songs from Kenny's latest hot selling album Water And Bridges showing us how the performer has grown and how still dazzling his music truly is. I particularily liked how you can access each song by chapter. So if you have a favourite - you can go straight to it, hear a little about the tune and see the performance.

And now for those great extras. They include Kenny On His Music an extended interview, The Photography of Kenny Rogers showing some hidden talents of a man who is already blessed by so many, an interesting bonus feature "The Hits That Got Away" with

extended interviews with Lionel Richie and Brent Maher.

## The Classic Story on Stage

The musical which has broken all box office records and night after night is still a complete sell out. *Linda Willis* enjoys the pulsating sex appeal that is Dirty Dancing

f you love dancing — then you will love the brand new show currently burning a hole in the stage at the Aldwych Theatre in the Strand. Since it's inaugural performance in the UK last September it's been sold out night after night. Tickets are like gold dust. So when Pam asked me if I would like to go and see it and report back on it for Linedancer — I didn't hesitate for a second. Believe me — Patrick Swayze might be the Master — but hunky Aussie look-alike Josef Brown who takes over the role of Johnny Castle has taken lessons, learned them well, and added a few tricks of his own.

Dirty Dancing, the movie celebrates it's 20th anniversary this February and is being re-released in cinemas. A special edition DVD is being launched in October. Starring the aforementioned Patrick Swazye as the hottest dancer on the planet, and Jennifer Grey as the teenage girl on the brink of discovering what life and love are all about. Brainchild of writer Eleanor Bergstein, no one, least of all her, could have envisaged the huge cult following and affection this film with it's simple and honest message would embrace.

Bergstein based the story on real life. As a teenager she spent vacations with her parents at the Grossingers Hotel in the Catskill Mountains of New York State. Under the direction of Jennie Grossinger it established itself as a glamorous haven for New Yorkers and celebrities, entertainers, diplomats, and ambassadors from around the world. Grossingers became Kellerman's and

Eleanor rummaged through her collection of old '45s before starting to write the script. She made a cassette recording, EB's Dirty Dancing, which she trotted around to movie executives in an effort to get one to take the bait. None did. In fact, every major studio turned it down. Dirty Dancing became one of the most successful independent films ever made. The soundtrack has sold 42 million copies worldwide.

So, you might be wondering why anyone in their right mind would dream of messing with perfection? Well – it seems the continuous overwhelming response from people from all walks of life across the globe, led her to believe that what audiences really wanted was a way to be more physically involved in the story. It seemed blindingly obvious to her - live theatre was the way to go, bringing together as it does the dancing and the story and the music, in a totally new way. She boldly decided to add new scenes that were not in the original movie, along with some songs she had desperately wanted to include in the film and been unable to obtain

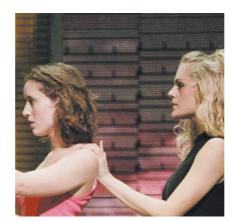
It was a chance meeting with producer Kevin Jacobsen in New York in 2001 that was to set the first steps in motion for Bergsteins' Baby — Dirty Dancing — The Classic Story on Stage. Eleanor Bergstein was convinced that dancing was the key element. "Our characters love, grow, change, explore each other's souls through dance as an integral part of their lives romantic confrontations and character revelations take place at dance

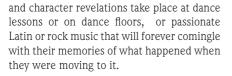












His legs stretch out longer and wider than Swayze's and his balletic training is evident, plus an intriguing element all too often missing – pure style. He's gracefully taking complete charge – and he doesn't care who knows it. However, Nadia Coote is too pretty a picture to be discarded, proving that she can fling her legs up much higher than Cynthia Rhodes ever did in the film.

Meanwhile, back at the Aldwych we were perched on the edge of our seats where the azure blue Dirty Dancing logo was scrawled and hanging tantalisingly before us. Not a spare seat in the house. And as This Magic Moment trumpeted out - so did something else - yells and cheering - and that was before anyone even started to dance. As the Houseman family arrive at Kellerman's in a car, with a very clever backdrop of travelling scenery that continues throughout the show, weaving film with live stage action, suddenly the doors open at the back of the room and three young men stride in – but all eyes are only on one young man, all in black with a sleeveless T-shirt and leather jacket slung from one hand - Johnny has arrived - Josef Brown and what an entrance. Screams and wolf whistles echoed from all the young girls around me and beyond, and it has to be said - quite a few more senior members of the audience. And it didn't let up all night long. It got louder, and louder and louder.

Back to the present, and as Penny's pregnancy starts making waves we cry for her. As Frances 'Baby' Houseman staggers across the bridge helping to carry water melons we sigh for her. The door opens and in the red-hot lights of orange and scarlet we are swept up into the sizzling stuff that is pounding out of the orchestra pit and steamy bodies gyrating across the stage — Do You Love Me? Not yet — but we're getting there!

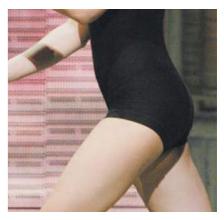
Merengue blasts out and as the circular stage rotates and the middle comes skyward, we know what is coming next. But it doesn't stop everyone screaming again. Johnny, now wearing a white tuxedo and black bow-tie matching the black trousers swirls Penny Johnson, alias fellow Aussie blonde and beautiful Nadia Coote up, up and around in a flurry of red chiffon to Johnny's Mambo.

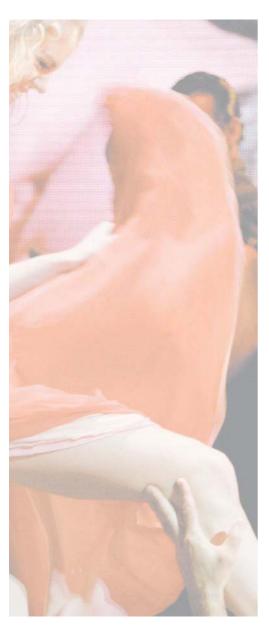
Onto the Mambo and our heroine is having a spot of bother connecting her brain to her body. "Feel the music", Johhny whispers — we all start to scream again. Lifting her small hand up and placing it on his chest he tells her — "It's like a heartbeat — ba-boom, ba-boom!" Hungry Eyes. Yes — and everyone in the room wanted to swop places with her. Me included.

I was wondering, as you do, how they would manage to do the scenes in the water. I decided – best left alone and they probably wouldn't. But I was oh! so wrong. Hey Baby, and as Johnny prances about on the log balancing as only a ballet dancer could – poor Baby is left struggling on her hands and knees crawling towards him. The water bit is done









brilliantly using film behind gauzy curtains and splashing noises from the orchestra pit. But hey – it works.

So as poor old Penny heads for the back street abortionist we follow our young stars into the night-club where they perform their party piece, De Todo Un Poco. And she does a credible version of not being very credible, but just credible enough. And he is still pretty sensational. Coming back in the car, again is used to remarkable effect with back drops and moving imagery. But bad news is about to wipe the smile - not to mention lipstick, off of Baby's face. For Penny's encounter has gone perilously wrong – and only one person can sort it. Baby runs to her father. And he is not a happy bunny. "I want you to have nothing to do with those people," he demands. But, of course, she's love struck and strong-minded. So she's not taking much notice of that.

Putting her arms around Johnny as he is now stripped to the waist: "Most of all, I'm scared of walking out of this door, and never feeling the rest of my whole life, the way I feel when I'm with you," she tells him. He removes her top and they fall onto the bed, and the lights dim and we all sigh, ooh and aah.

The second act sweeps away quicker than you can say Save the Last Dance. But it's the rousing finale when we get the chance to really get carried away. Baby sits in the corner table with her Mum and Dad while her ditzy blonde sister Lisa played by Isabella Calthorpe attacks our senses with the ear-splitting Hula Song. It's brilliant and stops the show momentarily

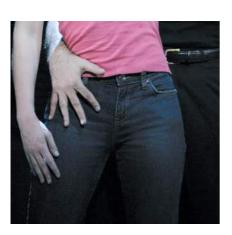
with it's intentional excruciating awfulness. Suddenly amidst all the cacophony of noise and the rendering of the Kellerman Anthem, there is a loud bang. A black clad slim figure skims through the stalls like a highwayman, jumping on stage and striding straight over to the Houseman's table.

"No one puts Baby in the Corner," he cries. And we all cry too.

I Had the Time of My Life is movingly sung by Brian Saccante. But it's the dancing – oh the sheer brilliance of it that has us almost falling out of our seats to reach out and touch them. To be part of it, just as Eleanor Bergstein dreamed we would. He sways, swaggers and she bends into his body like a feather in the wind. He flings her backwards, sideways down is leg and then we all sit with baited breath as he walks away from her and looks back over his shoulder – she fluffs the flounces of her pink silky dress - will she or won't she - she moves forward and in an instant she is soaring towards him like a bird in flight. And he catches her and holds her high up in the air above his head. Yes - she did the lift. And yes - she was pretty amazing.

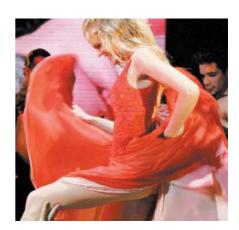
Everyone on stage starts to dance and the reception is tumultuous with two curtain calls. Massive glitter balls are suspended from the ceiling and lights spin like millions of diamonds cascading down the roof, the walls and the floor and we are immersed in the spirit and sheer joy of dancing. Did I have the time of my life - yes!















## Desert Island Discs meets Desert Island Dancers

Along the lines of the famous Radio 4 programme, Desert Island Discs, we are asking Line dancers which dances they would take on a desert island. Choreographer, Diddy Dave has sent in his choices.

hen you live in a big city, like Leeds, it is hard to know where to start when thinking of packing your dances and going to a deserted island. I know many tracks from deejaying, teaching and choreographing – I'd need a really big suitcase to take all my favourites. I have been Line dancing for many years, my first dance (Walk In The Park) was published by *Linedancer* in 2005. There are so many dances which have a special place in my heart and they would have to come first.

Most definitely a few classics would have to go with me, such as County Line Cha Cha, Just For Grins, and Texas Stomp, simply because they bring back very happy of memories of when I first discovered the world of Line dance. At that time, I just couldn't get enough and would try and learn every dance going.

I am huge fan of all dances to night-club two step rhythm, so I would have to take dances such as Inside Your Heaven, What I Need, Evidence, Stay Forever and one of my own Dilemma, which enjoyed some success in the UK, and in the USA.

Now dare I include this next dance — it is not a Line dance but I would have to take The Sway danced to *To Be Loved By You* by Wynnona Judd. This brings back lots of nice feelings, especially of a certain someone who had a really big impact on my life, sadly this person is no longer around. 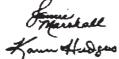

## All in a day's work for a professional dancer — poor Lana Williams is side lined — but the show must go on...

## **MindYourHead**

The Crystal Boot Awards are over for another year and already we are well into the planning for the 2008 event. Yes that's right, as soon as the Awards are over we have a post event meetings, a debriefings and then start straight away on the next one. As well as deciding the theme there is the process of sorting out all the production – the lighting, the sound, and the stage. When we get hold of the Norcalympia ballroom at the Norbreck Castle hotel it is just an empty shell

Once the theme is selected we plan the actual Awards ceremony and show. This year the theme was "We Are Dancers" and the Awards show was built around this. We decided to have a special opening to the show and enlisted the help of Glenn Rogers to prepare the music. I wanted to have the routine based loosely on the song Do You Wanna Dance and last May I had a meeting with Glenn to discuss the idea. A couple of months later Glenn sent me the first draft of the music which was to have an opening section for a solo dancer, and three other dance styles; Latin, Eastern, and Swing. After discussions, Betty and I decided to add two more dance styles, waltz and funky. Glenn added these and after some more drafts and discussions we had what we wanted. It was then down to selecting the dancers, inviting them to be part of the routine and sending the music to them. They were from all over including USA, Holland, Norway, Wales and England.

The first time they would come together was on the Saturday afternoon of the Awards for rehearsals (whilst the Norcalympia was being set for the evening). The routine came together brilliantly and Glenn had also recorded an ending which we choreographed there and then. So all was set for the opening, or so it seemed. As I was eating my dinner I suddenly realised that due to Lana Williams' accident during their own rehearsals for the main show, that we had lost Darren and Lana from the opening. I jumped up from the table and consulted with Betty. As there was only 30 minutes or so to the opening it seemed likely that we would have to cancel the opening routine. 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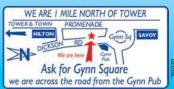

# What should the deejay play?

I am writing in response to the comments in the February issue of Linedancer relating to deejays at events and the playlists therein.

Firstly Mick, thanks for the appreciation and recognition of dj's at all kinds of events. I myself, as a dj, instructor and dancer accept that is a very difficult job but I wouldn't change it for the world, honestly. To see the floor full and knowing that you are playing a part in keeping people up on their feet is very satisfying. In preparation for events that I have undertaken, I ensure that I have got a playlist for the first set before the band comes on. This playlist usually consists of classics and known floor fillers at the particular time. I make sure that I liaise with the bands so as not to repeat any particular piece of music during the course of the evening/weekend. I often throw in golden oldies that sometimes need a quick walk through, whilst the music is playing, and the dance is quickly remembered, and appreciated for being revived. I am aware of floor splits with beginners and intermediate dances and will often invite the intermediates to join in with beginner dances to remind them that everyone was once a beginner. I mix the music to the best of my ability with something old, something new, Country music, pop music, irish etc. I still require the requests which can come in thick and fast and I work through them during the course of the evening/weekend. At weekend events, there have been repetitions of certain dances, usually the very popular, up to date, chart dances, which can't be helped. I would consider myself, as a deejay, to cater for mainstream Line dancing at beginner and intermediate level. Any advanced dances that are requested usually only apply to a handful of people at the events I have deejayed for and these particular people are respectful of the fact that they are in the minority so actually ask me to play their requests at the end of the night when the rest of people have retired for the evening (usually round about 12.30am to 1.00am, one that springs to mind at 1.00am in the morning is "The Beast"). Early on at an event, I invite people to make requests and announce that I will get through as many of the requests as I possibly can and if I haven't got the music, I apologise and ensure that another of their requests is played. Sometimes the requests can last me right the way through a full weekend event. Fantastic.

# The problem with Line dance is...

My name is Susan and I live in Sweden, a big Line dance country. I receive my monthly Linedancer Magazine and can't wait to read your latest observations about problems in Line dance. I agreed with almost everything you say but maybe I have a new spin on the thoughts of Country verses everything else in music. I personally like to dance to all types of music. However, Line dance started out and is associated with Country music. I was ok when they first started to introduce alternative music to Line dance. Like most folks, I thought it would draw in more kids, which it has.

Here is my thinking. If we tried to go to

a salsa class or or a disco and play Country music we would be booed out of the place. So why do we have to face the extinction of Country music in Line dance? Why can we not stand up and fight for a little more Country music?

I'm not saying eliminate all alternative music but don't eliminate Country music either. I was at a recent instructors meeting here in Sweden. At the intermediate / advanced level there was not one dance presented that had Country music. Maybe it's time we boo the younger choreographers a little bit.

As you have observed, dances choreographed to Country music seem to stay around longer.

# What on earth are some choreographers thinking?

I really do not understand what some choreographers think a beginner is capable of. We teach beginners and have to show them what a shuffle is, what a jazz box is and how to do a vine. They are called 'beginners' because they are at the beginning of their dancing and don't even know the steps. How on earth can you call a dance beginner if it has 'kick ball point', 1/2 monterey turn, shuffle half turn, 1/4 turn sailor, point towards 1.30 point back towards 7.30 etc – it is totally beyond my comprehension.

Personally, I enjoyed the dance, but if beginners can handle a 64 count, four wall dance then they are an improver and upwards not a beginner. If we tried to teach a dance like this at our beginner classes we would empty our halls not, as we like to do, encourage people. We have written some of our own beginner dances 1st Steps, 1st Turns and 1st Stomps, which we use at our classes to encourage learning new steps.

# **Preparation**for**Performance**

An area that I am increasingly asked to lead workshops in is Preparation for Performance. Traditionally improving dance performance has been about practise, practise, practise of dance technique and dance content. But there are other ways of improving performance which involve a whole range of physical and mental training techniques to help dancers achieve their optimum performance. These techniques have been developed from the tried and tested methods used to optimise the performance of top athletes and sports people for many years.

Teachers and coaches of competitive dancers as well as the dancers themselves are particularly interested in learning ways that performance can be enhanced. When competition is fierce dancers need to have an edge on their fellow competitors. This is where Preparation for Performance skills can help. They can help dancers to consistently, perform at their best.

A popular topic at recent workshops I have given has been exploring ways of dealing with anxiety related to performance. Many dancers find their performance is negatively affected by nerves before they dance as well as while they are dancing. A few butterflies in the tummy can be a boost to performance but too many can ruin it. Anxiety can cause many different symptoms in dancers including:

- breathing too fast
- muscle tension and tightness
- lack of concentration or focus

Dancers who have attended workshops and have practised the skills taught report a big improvement in being able to control their anxiety levels and symptoms. One dancer told me that for the first time ever she had a good night's sleep before a competition. Because of this, she danced better, felt more confident and had great results in the competition too.

Regular practising of relaxation techniques is an excellent way of helping dancers to deal with symptoms of anxiety related to performance. These techniques can slow the breathing down and improve the oxygen supply to the working muscles. They can increase body awareness and reduce muscle tension. And they improve concentration and focus.

You might want to have a go at trying a basic relaxation technique that I teach which helps to develop body awareness. Although this exercise can be done using various parts of the body we will just use the hands for this example.

Sit comfortably in a chair that supports your back. Feet parallel and flat on the floor. Hands resting on your thighs. Make a fist with your right hand using maximum



effort, focus briefly on how your hand, arm, shoulder and body feels. Then release your fist and let your hand relax. Focus on how it feels now. Is your hand and arm tingling? Clench you right fist again but this time only use half the effort. How does it feel this time? Is it tingling or not? Once you have felt the amount of the tension created then release your fist and relax your hand as before. This time you are going to clench your fist but using minimal effort - just a hint of tension. Take a moment to focus on how it feels before releasing and relaxing your hand. Repeat all of this with your left hand (the clenching actions should only be held briefly especially when using maximum effort). Being able to recognise different degrees of tension in our muscles can lead, with practise, to being able to prevent our muscles being too tense when we dance. By recognising the tension starting we can learn to release it before it becomes a problem. And in this way leads us to a better performance.
