



When you see Clare on the dance floor her look of studied concentration is no different than that worn by many beginner level dancers and yet there is something about her that attracts your eye. "Hotshots" DJ Steve Weymouth commented, "she's

Engage Clare in conversation and you notice that she watches you with rapt attention. Her eyes seldom straying from your lips except to scan her immediate surroundings to see if others have also joined the conversation. It comes as a surprise to learn that Clare is profoundly deaf and has been since she suffered an attack of meningitis at the age of ten months. That she has completely overcome the loss of one of her sensory skills is a tribute to her own efforts and to the love and support of her parents, Cynthia and Trevor, and her sister Louise (13). Clare's ability to feel the rhythm of the music

through the floor is an extraordinary talent and reminds those in the "hearing" world that such an acute perception is a skill and not a handicap.

Clare has been lip-reading all her life and has remained within main stream education. She is not a special case but she is "special". In addition to Line Dancing Clare has been swimming since the age of eight and will represent Great Britain (along with her seven team mates) at the 18th World Games for the Deaf to be held in Copenhagen, Denmark in July. Her personal coach, Andrew Downing, hopes that Clare will achieve, "some personal best times and hopefully some medals." Clare has her own plans and, "is aiming for a gold medal in the 200 metres breast stroke."

Clare is focused on the competition but also has her sights set on The European games for the Deaf in Russia in 1998 and the next World Games in Italy in 2001. In the meantime her, "aim in life is to become a PE Teacher," and naturally when she gets back from Copenhagen she wants to get straight out and do some more line dancing! Good luck Clare we'll be thinking of you.


The Funkiest Line Dance Album in the World

K-Tel ECD 3374 000 LLL

A wolf in sheep's clothing!

This is actually a pretty good album, including original and, on the whole, well recorded material by a number of new artists, delving into the worlds of Blues, Honky-Tonk, Western Swing and Zydeco. But 'The Funkiest Line Dance Album in the World' it very definitely ain't!

Twenty tracks make this an excellent value for money purchase at under a tenner and dance notations for Cajun Mambo Walk,



Boogie Bop, Walkin' Wazi, Four Star Boogie and Wild Wild West (although uncredited to the choreographers) are a welcome inclusion as is the brief glossary of basic steps.

Stand out tracks are
Corridor 38's,
Zydeco, Bo Diddley
inspired Born in
Britain, The Swamp
Honkys Why'd Ya
Pick On Me, a superb

blues country cut reminiscent of Mary Chapin Carpenter's I Feel Lucky, Hank Williams Jr. sound-a-like Freddy Weller's R'n'R Time Capsule, Simon Richmond's honky-tonk flavoured I Don't Do Sad Anymore and Capricorn's Thinkin' About You, a new country strutter of instant appeal.

There are all sorts of influences on the other sections. Echoes of Faron Young on Goodbye Love (Hello Heartache) by Simon Richmond, of The Stray Cats on Don't Let Go by Shot To Pieces and the Western Swing of Bob Willis on Capricorn's tongue-incheek Arlene.


Full credit should be given to the compilers for avoiding the usual cover versions and offering opportunities for new talents to be heard, but a slap on the wrist for the marketing department at K-Tel for misleading the buying public.

The Bellamy Brothers - Over The Line

Start SCD30 OOO BELLE

This newly recorded album of 12 fresh tracks will not disappoint fans of the Bellamys. There are no real surprises, with the usual blend of traditional country tunes, amusing lyrics and a quirky inclusion or two.

The opening track, Over The Line, is a mid paced chugger which kicks off with a driving blues harp and is almost Creedance Cleerwater Revival in it's feel. Next up is the cleverly written Slow Hurry, a mid tempo driving song which will work well on the floor followed by a wonderful shuffling cha cha, Afterglow



which borrows much from Roy Orbison's early styling.

The 'must play' song on the album is Catahoula, a song about a faithful canine which features Cajun heroes Joel Sonnier and Eddy Raven in a c c o m p a n i m e n t. With lyrics like "My Cajun Queen went to New Orleans and

spent up all my moula. But I don't give a damn, I'm a happy man, I gotta dog call Catahoula", how could you possibly go wrong? A definite hit.

The 'must do' song on the album is Mama Liked To Reggae, following the Bellamys' long standing fascination with this West Indian musical genre. Unfortunately, it sounds like they did it because it was expected and is not the sequel to Reggae Cowboy one would have hoped for.

Of the remaining tracks Tough Love is another pleasant Orbisonesque slow cha cha, Hanging In an excellent uptempo tush-pusher and My Wife Left Me For My Girlfriend a novelty slow twostepper with an interesting variation on a theme!

The Bellamys' previous offerings have always spawned a hit dance or two and this will surely be no exception so consider an investment and stay tuned.


MCA Records - MCD11585 00000+

Heaven oh heaven! Undoubtedly one of the best country albums of the past five years by one of the most exciting new finds on Music Row.

With a voice somewhere between Loretta Lynn and Kitty Wells, Lee Ann Womack has produced a modern sounding album which pays homage to the roots of country with respect, authenticity

and breathtaking song writing and vocal delivery.

Without exception the songs are all first class, with several classics-to-be show, in particular Am I The Only Thing That You've Done Wrong, The Fool and Make Memories With Me, a duet with Mark Chestnut which offers everything and more that would



expected from the heyday of George Jones/Tammy Wynette collaborations.

For dancers who like a slower tempo, plenty of cha cha and shuffles are on offer with just two or three uptempo rhythms to balance the scales. But of these, the girl-needs-cowboy tale Buckaroo is an absolute winner. If you play Vince Gill's What The Cowgirls Do, this offers the same kind of feel and a perfect lyrical compliment. It will fit many dances and is sure to be a floor-filling winner.

The cajun enhanced two-stepper Trouble's Here is another valuable inclusion which will put a smile on your face and a spring in your heel. And if you like country with a good clap along gospel flavoured Hallelujah chorus then Get Up In Jesus' Name is just the ticket - beautiful harmonies and a Ricky Scaggs-ish production which even agnostics will appreciate.

Highlight of the set is Never Never Again, a slow cha cha which has received praise from every critical corner and which will surely be played on US radio for many a long year.

A definite recommendation for country fans. Superb.

The Cheap Seats - Call It What You Will

Gemini Records - Gemini 02 0000 4444



Recorded earlier this year in Nashville, with Music City musicians, this is a noticeable step up in class for the Cheap Seats who prove without a doubt that they can seriously compete with the big guns on the Row.

This is a fabulously produced album

with a high standard of musicianship, a fine selection of songs (14 in all) and the best country vocals the UK currently has to offer in the form of Ethan Allen.

Unlike some of their peers, the duo have not fallen into the trap of customising their recorded material for use on the dance floor alone, so this album offers a strong ballad or two, some gorgeous shuffles and a pure honky tonk two stepper against just a smattering of real hit-'em-hard line dance thumpers.

It's Just Love, Sometimes They Do and From Where I Stand are all useful cha cha's, and the first of these, written by Ethan, is another first class example of songwriting which would not be out of place on any album by Alan Jackson or Tracy Byrd.

Cover versions on the album are well chosen - the Keith Whitely original, When You Say Nothing At All, recently a hit for Alison Krauss, the tear-jerking Water Into Wine, the clever, play on words, uptempo strutter Broken Heart Attack and the honky tonker, Hank Thompson's Drop Me Gently which is an instant smile and sing-a-long tribute to country's roots that works just fine to the dance One Step Forward.

Two ballads on the album justify individual comment. If I Lose You (I Lose Me) is a love song from the pen of Mr Pettifer that borrows some magic from Bobby Goldsboro's Summer The First Time with its haunting summer piano and romantic Spanish guitar. A first class 'wave the cigarette lighter' song to smooth to. And After The Rain, Ethan's other offering is begging for a George Strait or Tracey Lawrence cover, an 'I'll be there when

you're over him' song that gets another ten out of ten.

There is just one small glitch which nearly prevents this album from getting five ears, namely the version of the Hank Williams classic Rambling Man. An extraordinarily difficult song to which to do justice, with its wailing, anguished yodelling and soul stirring acoustic guitar, Ethan for once doesn't quite cut the mustard. A case of one song too many at the end of a session maybe?

That small criticism aside, this is the best contemporary country album from a British act that I have yet heard.

Ricochet - Blink Of An Eye

Ricochet's debut album was one of the best of last year, spawning classics such as Daddy's Money, I Can't Dance and Rowdy, all perfect line dance accompaniments. This is a very satisfactory follow up, if not quite living up to the high expectations set by its predecessor.

The title track, Blink Of An Eye, is a terrific fast paced rompin' stomper, reminiscent of Vince Gill's One More Last Chance which will be put to good use as will the 'God Blessed Texas' influenced You Still Got It. The only other boot belter is You Can't Go By That, a neither here nor there song of forgettable quality.

Don't Forget To Feed The Jukebox (While I'm Gone), however, is a swaying, throw back your head and holler, barroom honky tonk redneck party anthem which is the album's stand out track - Garth's Friends In Low Places and Joe Diffie's Prop Me Up Beside The Jukebox rolled into one. If you're not hoarse from self inflicted karaoke on this one, you just ain't no good ole boy! (Sorry girls, but this is definitely a boy's song).

The rest of the album is made up of cha chas and ballads, the pick of which are The Girl Formerly Known As Mine, He Left A Lot To Be Desired (the current US top 20 hit) and The Last Love In This Town.

Ricochet are a versatile collection of musicians who include in their number Eddie Kilgannon who co-wrote George Strait's One Night At A Time (It is somewhat surprising, though, that despite that number one single he contributes nothing to this collection!) and the powerful, intelligent vocals of Heath Wright who was at one time (and may still be) cradling the affections of 'Fever' choreographer Parry Spence. But they may need to look for stronger material if they are to stand the test of Nashville time.

This is unlikely to get a UK release so you may want to think

twice before parting with a heap of cash for the import, but the 'Jukebox' song is almost worth the money in itself.

She will bring with her a reputation she has earned on her nationwide tours of the States for no holds barred, knock 'em dead club performances. "Kimber smokes! We would like more of her, much more!", "Kimber is fast becoming the Queen of Dance on the club scene", "Kimber Clayton is getting ready to blow your house down!"."This girl has what it takes" and "A fiery storm has just passed through our town...the hottest country act to ever set foot on the club dance stage...left us begging for more! Known in the UK mainly for her upbeat dance releases on the Line Dance Fever collection of albums, Kimber's repertoire extends to varied styles of music including some beautiful ballads like I Know That Car. But it is tracks like the burn-it-up Good Girls Love Bad Boys and If Wishes Were Horses that have really set the scene for Jose Cuervo which was produced by the revered Steve Keller/Wynn Jackson partnership, whose talents have been employed by just about every respecting New Country act on the block. Interaction with her audience is the key to Kimber's success. Everyone feels part of the show. And several thousand satisfied customers all across the States can't be wrong. AMERICANA INTERNATIONAL

Americana International, staged at the Newark Showground, Nottinghamshire, July 11th-13th, was billed as "Europe's premier Auto and Music Event," and is the British equivalent of an American County Fair. Judging by the size of the crowd it seems that three days of Country Music, Rock 'N' Roll, R&B and Line Dancing in company with an assortment of stalls, Fairground amusements and freak shows is a guaranteed crowd

puller not only for "vehicle buffs" but also for every poseur with a gunbelt!

Visitors were presented with an astonishing line up of "RV's", pick up trucks, law enforcement automobiles, 65 Mustangs, Dodge Vipers, vintage Cadillacs and rigs in all shapes and sizes from cab-overs to semi's (whatever they are!). The bikers were also out in force, including a chapter from the Hells Angels (nuff' respect!), along with static displays of motorbikes like the classic Harley Davidson "Easy Rider". Paul Parry, a trucker from Ilkeston in Derbyshire, had brought along his Honda Goldwing GLI000 KZ which included a colour TV with quadraphonic sound, telephone and CB! Talk about travelling in style!

The event, organised by Chris & Bev Jackson, is best described as a microcosm of the US way of life or, as they put it, "the heartbeat of the USA in the UK." All aspects of American culture were represented including Line Dancing which was provided with its own dedicated venue in the Cedric Ford Pavilion. In spite of the blistering heat inside the building which was more akin to the Arizona desert, the temperature must have been well into the 90's, the line dancers (dehydrated but undeterred) stomped and grapevined their way through a procession of big name acts like the Dean Brothers, The Honest Truth, Young Country and the TJ McCall band interspersed with regular sets from a country disco. The TJ McCall band are a five piece group who are fronted by Tony McCall a veteran with 25 years in the CW industry. His Morecambe based band played some excellent cover material and the dancers were quick to show their appreciation.


Over on the Country Stage "The Felsons" were in full swing accompanied by three year old Liam O' Beirne, a lead guitarist in the making, who played along with them in front of the stage. 

Tony was bitten by the line dance bug in 1993 when he dropped in to the Acapulco Country Music Bar whilst on holiday in Tenerife. As he recounted, "I've always loved Country music but there I witnessed American Line Dancing at close range and my wife Val and I were immediately hooked." On his return Tony booked himself into line dance classes with none other than Linedancer's Betty Drummond.

Tony began teaching at charitable dance events in 1995 before deciding, in July 1996, to operate from a specific venue. A beginners class at Bagillt was quickly followed by classes at Hawarden, Queensferry and Ewloe. Tony's teaching philosophy helps to explain his success, "I believe, first and foremost, that line dancing should be fun," and it comes as no surprise that he teaches four happy and very well attended classes. Tony's style of teaching has been described, amongst other things, as "Relaxed, laid back and humorous" and as he says, "My aim is to make my classes enjoyable and satisfying evenings out."

As many instructors know, teaching varied ability classes is never an easy task and Tony believes that, "My role as an instructor is to provide the facilities to make the dance session enjoyable for all, without being overpowering, but with the right amount of guidance and direction." In this respect Tony's background with the Police Service obviously stands him in good stead, "I rely heavily upon an abundance of patience and a well developed sense of humour, the two being basic requirements of my former profession."


Tony enjoys the camaraderie within the CW dance community and, "has made a great number of friends, both fellow instructors, dancers and Country music fans." His one complaint is, "the tendency of a small number of instructors to engage in verbal attacks on their fellow professionals," which he believes is, "ultimately destructive to the dance movement as a whole." Whilst Tony admits that there is good and bad in all things he thinks that, "If we are to maintain the credibility of line dancing we should all be pulling together and helping each other in order to improve standards and work towards the creation of a universal code of conduct for instructors."

Good Country and Western music is also an essential element in Line Dancing and Tony feels that, "exposure to live music makes the dancers think for themselves." He is not a supporter of, "the trend towards the use of disco music." Instead he thinks, "Modern Country music embraces everything from Blue Grass to Rock & Roll".

The naval base at Norfolk and quite a number of the warships are open to visitors on most weekends.



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
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HONEYMOON IN VEGAS



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
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'What's the use of sitting alone in your room... when you could be Line Dancing?'

Those were my thoughts when I had to make a four day visit to New York, so I posted a message on the Internet, and before long I had received a reply. Into the suitcase went my boots.

I was staying about half an hour's drive north from Manhattan, and judging by 'Cowboy Beat', the local dancers' newspaper, I had arrived at a world centre for Line Dancing. Max Perry lives nearby and everyone I met seemed to know him, and were delighted to hear how well he is respected in England. But the best

surprise happened when Susan, my hostess,

collected me in her car at the hotel.

She introduced me to her friends, and invited me to listen to a cassette tape.

'Steve,' she said, 'these guys are the hottest thing in Line Dancing right now they're called the Dean Brothers.'

'Oh really,' I said, 'I'll tell them that next week. They'll be really pleased.'

'You know the Dean Brothers?'

I explained how we often saw them at the Manhattan Club in Harrogate.

'Wow!'

It was a good start to my new role as Voluntary Ambassador for British Line Dancing, a task that had really begun the previous week when I had faxed Susan the step sheet for Black Coffee. She had then taught it at her club, and I had a copy of the CD with me as a present so that we could do a demonstration that evening. The dance was held in the local fire station, which seemed rather appropriate as it was air conditioned and the air outside was very hot and humid. It was like dancing in a 'fridge, stepping outside occasionally to warm up - not something you do very often in Yorkshire!

So we danced... Fly Like a Bird, Copperhead, All Aboard... it was just like being at home. There was instruction from a very good dancer called lanet Humphrey, and I learnt a lot, both from her

and informally through my new friends. I was very interested in the number of dances with a fast Latino beat. 'OOO! AHH!' was one, but there were others that were unfamiliar to me. One was by Max Perry - 'Jose Cuervo '97' - which

is danced to a song of the same name by Kimber Clayton. This will be a hit of the future, and there was a very dramatic one called '13MWZ' where Samba

meets Linedancing!

I danced again the following night in a bar with a small dance floor, and the atmosphere of small town America was marvellous, but I caused some amusement when the DJ announced 'Flying Eight'. Mary-Ann Cromeek, Susan's fellow instructor, looked very puzzled. 'Steve, she asked, 'how come you know the New Jersey version?' I explained that as far as I knew this was what everyone did in England. The other dancers there were apparently dancing the New York version. So, next time you go Line Dancing ask the

Instructor for 'Flying Eight' and insist on the New Jersey version!

I returned home with enough CDs and dance sheets to keep me going for years, and with happy memories of the warmth of the welcome and the hospitality. I was also highly impressed by the quality of the dancing. As Susan put it, 'Why go to Nashville? We've got Max!'

The truth is... by Scooter Lee

As I continue my travels around the world, I hear things that are just not true which was the reason for this column to begin with. Most of what I talk about has to do with legal stuff but...l also get questions about things that I feel I have the knowledge to answer (and only because I travel worldwide, so I do get to see 100's of dances) but then this is only my

Subject:- The most popular dances in the world.

Myth:- Because everyone in your state or region is doing a dance and it has shown up in a few magazines, then it must be one of the most popular dances in the world

Truth:- Almost anyone can get a dance published. Many magazines have to fill space and when they print current dances they have no idea where or how many people are doing that dance. It also doesn't mean every instructor who reads that magazine will teach it. As line dancing continues to grow, dancers are get-ting better and seeking new dances to keep their attention. Many instructors are creating their own dances and next thing you know there are new dances everywhere and everyone is saying mine is or this one is the most popular and everyone is doing it, and so on, and so on.

Truth is:- 80% of line dancers around the world are beginners so it stands to reason that the most popular line dances in the world cater for the "beginners" Now you might have a class, or go to a class of advanced dancers but believe me that is not the norm. I meet many instructors who are great dancers and most of the dances they teach are intermediate to advanced. They don't travel a lot so the class is moving at their pace which leads to the belief that

most dancers are that advanced Blessed be the instructor who still caters to beginners as they will keep this business alive. The more deposits (new dancers) you keep adding, the longer your account (your floor) will stay full. You will see by the following list that the most popular dances in the world are beginner to intermediate. That is because we will always have beginner dancers (thank you) who will learn, maybe become advanced and move on to become instructors and presto, we have new begin-ners again and the cycle keeps on.

The most popular dances in the world are ones that I see done in every country I travel to. I have also called upon instructors in countries I have not travelled to for their input. (Japan, Vietnam, Israel, Finland, Sweden, Norway).

These are dances that are done the same around the world with the same name everywhere.

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

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

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
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Just a great excuse to dance!

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



Geraldine, a former showgirl and photographic model, reports that the article featured in the Grapevine column has generated a, "really amazing response." I 20 line dance groups and clubs in England, Wales and Scotland have already pledged their support and she predicts that many more groups will soon be hitching their wagons to this charitable fund-raiser.

Gerri has over twelve years experience in aerobics, bodywork and step, she represented "Asset" (The National Association of Dance and Exercise Teachers) for six years before moving into line dance instruction twelve months ago. Whilst the WRVS may have been a bit surprised by her idea to involve the line dance community in a fundraising attempt they cannot fail to be impressed by her tireless promotion of the event and the wholehearted support that she has received from the Country Western movement in the UK. Gerri is sure that the event will succeed, "because of the enjoyment factor of line dancing and line dancers everywhere." Geraldine has paid the line dance community a great compliment by asking us to support the WRVS in this endeavour. Indeed she herself was first attracted to line dancing because, "It brings communities together in a fun and friendly environment and I believe that this is very much part of the line dance success story." Linedancer wishes the WRVS every success in their fund-raising efforts. We are sure that readers will do everything they can.

There are a lot of new instructors nowadays who do not attach much importance to dance floor etiquette. Consequently their dancers do not know when they go to a dance and they "sharpen their elbows" when the couples dancers "dare" to invade their space on the floor.

Perhaps you could highlight this issue of dance floor etiquette once again in Linedancer to keep hammering the message home.

I read with interest the letter in Issue 13 entitled 'Frosty Welcome'. I do not know the writer personally and I obviously cannot judge her company's dance floor etiquette, but I recently attended an event where the conduct of certain dancers caused problems to many other dancers on the floor, and can't help wondering if a similar thing had occurred.

I have been line dancing for 18 months, and what I enjoy is the fact that you can go alone or with friends and be part of a larger group of people, all doing pretty much the same thing, with no one 'showing off' or being competitive, like you can get at discos. On this particular occasion though, a minority of dancers were taking a huge amount of floor space in what amounted to exhibition dancing, with high kicks (which honestly were a danger!) the splits, and various other ostentatious variations on line dancing steps. In fact, there were two separate groups of dancers doing this, and as one group kicked a certain height, the other group kicked higher! Unfortunately these dancers were so intent on doing the fastest spin or the widest splits, that they hardly seemed aware that there were others on the floor who kept having to avoid colliding with them. I'm all for the odd extra monterey turn or rolling vine thrown in to add interest to the easier dances, but every single dance seemed to be another opportunity to show off the dancers' undoubted athletic skills!

I don't begrudge anyone having a good night out in whatever way they wish, I want my line dancing socials to continue to be places where you laugh and apologise if you accidentally go the wrong way and bump into someone, and where you help out a person who is trying to get the hang of a dance you know well yourself, not where you feel you are on the edge of an energetic display and are in danger of being knocked over. Let's not lose the

friendly and courteous atmosphere which has been such an important part of line dancing. Yours

Other basic rules which people seem to ignore are dancing in lines - not in blocks - and starting a different dance only if there is sufficient room to do so.

Whilst I'm not suggesting that Caron and her friends were hogging the floor I have been to clubs where half a dozen people race onto the dance floor and spread out, thus stopping anyone else from getting up to dance.

A lot of bad feeling in clubs and at Country events could be avoided by two things: firstly, if all instructors were to teach dance floor etiquette as an integral part of their class and secondly, at the beginning of each dance night the DJ/instructor/organiser should announce how to 'use' the dance floor.

We are all in line dancing for the enjoyment of it and with a bit of consideration we should all be able to have a great time.

Finally, I hope Caron has managed to find a more welcoming club and that she and her friends now have a place to go with a less 'frosty' atmosphere!

There are lots of different Schools of Western Dance (and of course, I am slightly biased), but the one I am a member of is the D&G School of Western Dance, which has been established in this country for over 10 years.

To become a fully qualified Western Dance Instructor, can take anything up to three years, but this of course covers all aspects of Western Dance.

But, can I please just say, don't forget all the old classic dances, eg One Step Forward, Elvira, Waltz Across Texas etc., they are still being done all over the country.







There are optional arm movements in this dance which help to give it a certain eye appeal.

When dancing it to Cry of the Celt from Lord of the Dance, the music lends itself to the first four walls being danced in vanilla fashion (i.e. as written). On the fifth wall the music kicks in as the Lord of the Dance troupe begin their step-dance routine (you can hear the taps). At this point the arm movements can be introduced as follows:

Section One. Counts 1 & 2.

Hold your arms straight out to the left side and turn you head to look along the line of your arms. Return arms and head on count three for the remainder of that section. Finishing this section on count 8 change the single clap into two claps (double time).

Section Two. Counts 1 & 2.

Repeat above instructions with the arms and head to the right (no hand claps).

Section Three. Counts 1, 2, 3, 4.

Holding arms at your sides, swing them from the elbows to the left, right, left and right again in synchronisation with the foot patterns of (Apple Jacks) or Fancy Feet steps. At the same time turn head left, right, left and centre.

Section Five. Count 8.

On the last beat of the dance you can step the left foot forward bending knees and extend left arm forward, right arm back holding position for a dramatic finish!
