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Dear Dancers



Yipppeee! As I write these lines I am counting down the hours to my holidays. You see, I am off in the morning to a bit of sand and sea... Ah! The palm trees, the azure skies, the Mediteranean, the smell of sun lotion, I can't wait!

There are of course a few things I could do without. People's MP3 players that I can hear as a never distant enough tinny rattle, the mobile phone conversations

where it seems necessary for all the sunbathers to be involved somehow (aren't some people loud when they speak on the damned things?), the seats around the pool forever empty apart from the towels draped upon them all day long, lads behaviour and language as they eye the girls... As a matter of fact, as I continue writing this I am beginning to wonder why I am looking forward to this break.

Some people on holidays can be a pain. There you are, minding your own and they pollute your space without so much as a thought. I am sure most of them have been given a low down on manners at some stage but the miracle of sunlight seems to make them forget do's and don'ts that make life bearable for us all.

If indeed some people are not aware that what they do is simply not on, perhaps it is time someone calls time. And the answer is quite simple. If someone is unkind towards a beginner, go out of your way to be welcoming and thoughtful, if someone cuts across a floor or brings a drink on the floor, a group of dancers should take them aside and gently prompt them that it is disruptive. Sometimes we are just as guilty by saying nothing and tutting away.

In short, let us try to be a friend to those dancers whose manners are a tad annoying. Let us find a way to point out that being a Line dancer is as much about caring for your mates as it is to have a good time. In the end, honesty is always the best policy. Let us just tell'em. And if enough of us speak up, who knows? Maybe these poor practices will stop and we can all start enjoying what we have come out to do. Dancing.



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AMERICAN RICAN

Success for *Toby Keith* has not been an easy journey. And yet he is now one of the most successful artists of all times. *Richard Kirk* chats to Toby in this EXCLUSIVE interview for Linedancer.

Toby Keith is no overnight success. It took seven years of playing bars and honky tonks for him and his Easy Money Band to finally sign a record deal in 1992. He says: "It doesn't matter how much talent a horse shows in training. If it doesn't have heart and desire it will not win. My worst moment was our first time out of Oklahoma. We got a gig and went to Pascagoula in Mississippi, which was down off the Gulf Coast. We left about noon. Took off in our vans and trailers. About half way there the weather changed. When we got down there a great hurricane hit and blew the town away. We really only had enough money to get there and were going to live on what we made to come back home. We were just heart broken."

And for a long while, the band played all kind of places. But the heart and desire to succeed still carried the singer through and it was a simple tape containing original self-penned songs sent to Harold Shedd the well known producer and Mercury Nashville vice-president which would give him the break he so badly needed. A recording contract. "I joined the label the same time as Shania Twain and John Brannen. Three new artists sent out together on a 15 city promotion tour. You know, there are lot of talented people out there who never get the opportunity to be heard by the masses. I'm very grateful that I did." He is very aware of his luck "You can be the best singer, best writer or guitar player on the planet and yet it does not mean the world is going to hear you. I did very well at school with creative writing. My teacher called my mother and said "You really ought to encourage him at home." My dad was more like 'I don't want my son to become some writer...'

I ask him about the writing process, How did he start and has it changed?

"For so many years, I watched people playing and singing their songs and I thought I could do better than that. At 16 I had my first guitar. At first I would write two hundred songs. And maybe get a good one. Now it is more like write 100 songs and get one good one." He laughs: "You improve all the time."

As for inspiration..." Merle Haggard and Jimmy Buffett are on my list of favourite artists. They are singer /songwriters and both rebels in their way. Buffett always brings the beach to your home town. He wasn't afraid to be himself. He played concerts in his shorts. He filled our rebellious needs and was a great songwriter on top of it. I always wanted the attitude deal to my songs. And for a long while, I was handcuffed and unable to make it. Everything runs in cycles." He adds: "I would never take the fiddle or steel guitar out of my music to produce a pop record. If it's good or if it's not good I live with the results. That's what I record. I am totally, not to some extent, TOTALLY my own man."

Following the instant success of his first album in 1992 Toby's follow up, the highly acclaimed Boomtown, received rave reviews and found a special release in the UK and Europe. Toby, aware of the interest in Country Music in the UK wanted then to visit." We had thought about coming over three different times. The powers that be always came back and wanted to change things around. I refused to do that. People would have been disappointed if they didn't hear the music they knew from my records. In

the past year my albums have been doing well in Europe. So finally we have broken through. Visiting Europe is going to be very different for us." He looks forward to the tour enormously. "I have been successful in the States for 15 years and I have never played a note in Europe. The venues are different. The population is not so exposed to my music. It's really a challenge to us. In the States we are doing fifty-five shows a year. They are the biggest ones in the US. It makes sense to visit now but it had to be on my terms. I'm a country rocker. That's all I do."

Toby Keith has now recorded 14 albums and since the year 2000 has proved to be one of the most successful artists in the USA. With over 30 million albums and millions of concert tickets sold he is the fourth best selling artist this decade, across all musical formats, ahead of Britney Spears, Madonna and Bruce Springsteen. On its release the new single, 'American Ride' shot straight into the Top 10 of all major charts in America. The album is a mix of country rock, Blues, ballads and promises to be one of the best albums of the year. Toby Keith's name is set to soar in Europe with his new set of concerts. This first ever tour of the UK and Ireland, staring in November will take in Glasgow London, Dublin and Belfast to link up with the release of the new album. Catch Toby Keith if you can, his music is the stuff of legend.

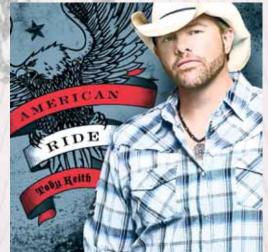

The cabaret had the audiences gasping in amazement and cheering with delight. Daniel is a true Megastar."



Weekend Of Success

The 13th Creetown Country Music Festival was hailed as a success. The festival took place in September and is Scotlands biggest and most established country music festival. The relocation to a bigger site allowed the addition of a second marquee, playing a mix of traditional and tribute music. Stepping back 10YEARSago

In Grapevine we had a hot tip sent in by Kelly Smith from Merseyside who said: "Try dancing Message In A Bottle to I Fall To Pieces by LeAnn Rimes from her new Classics album. It's just a tiny

bit faster than the recommended track but the song is such a great hit you can't help singing along." Grapevine also announced some new releases, they were The Mavericks new single Things I Cannot Change, a new album from LeAnn Rimes called Classics, Gary Allen's third album Smoke Rings In The Dark and Alan Jacksonis new album Under The Influence.

In a feature on Page 21, new instructor Robert Lindsay, was asked about some of his favourites. "My favourite choreographer is Peter Metelnick," he told us. "He always brings something different to his dances. Though they can be hard to dance they are easy to break down and teach." Robert's favourite music artists were The Mavericks, Shania Twain and Hal Ketchum and he told us The Heartbreak Express was his favourite dance. Robert had only been an instructor for eighteen months but was already running six Line dance classes a week.

On pages 22 and 23, Teresa and Vera told Linedancer how stunned they were to be called in to help with the steps on Sir Paul McCartney's new video, Brown Eyed Handsome Man: "It came totally out of the blue, the director came to look at our Linedancer Crazy team during our Wednesday evening class. Almost 400 dancers were auditioned and we were pleased to say that three members of our own club made it through to the filming, Neil and Clair, who are both sixteen and Joyce who is 65. Despite the constant re-drilling of dance steps and long hours, we all had a ball."

An artist review on pages 26 and 27 covered one of the most popular winners at this year's CMA awards, Martina McBride, who finally took the Best Female vocalist award. On the eve of the UK release of her latest album, Emotions, Martina said: "There's a lot of love on

the album. We auditioned over a thousand songs and sometimes the most harrowing songs can be the most uplifting."

On pages 30 and 31, 16 year old Jamie Smith told Linedancer how he started in Line dance. "I was watching it at Pontins Prestatyn holiday club. When my family got up to dance I saw how much they enjoyed it so I got up too. I'd never danced before but I thought, this is different." The Rodayos trick-riding team, who practise at the Greenacres Riding School in Kent, are as at home on the dance floor as they are in, or hanging out of, the saddle as explained on pages 38 and 39. Jane Lake who is the show's commentator and fill-in trick rider also Line dances regularly and has choreographed many dances. She said: "I started choreographing because I wished to create a dance to fit Bruce Springsteen's Dancing In The Dark as it is one of the songs the trick riding team use as background music for the shows."

With a love of teaching dance and a taste of travel, Judy McDonald was in her element when she toured Europe. The Canadian creator of After Midnight and The Trail told Linedancer on page 43 about her choreography: "When I hear music I hear everything that's going on within it. When writing a dance I'll follow the music's rhythm, the lyrics and some little innuendoes within the music," she laughed. "When I heard After Midnight by the Groove Grass Boyz I just loved it and it's my favourite song to sing at Karaoke."

Among the Stepping off the pages ten years ago were, Roller Coaster, Rock n Roll, Vertical Expressions, Break It Loose and Snowbird.

LS: I am really pleased to be talking to you. When I first heard the album, I knew that it would be a huge success for Line dancers everywhere.

OL: I love that. I didn't know it was so well received. Terrific!

LS: Tell me a little about you and how it all started?

OL: I grew up in Southern California and I had some lucky breaks I guess. After travelling quite a bit I finally made my big move to Munich to perform in musical theatre. I started to dabble in singing on my own and I was looking for a new sound I could pour myself into. I was meeting lots of people trying to get my "demo" out. Somehow or other Alex Christansen's manager got wind of me. Alex is a very well known music producer in Germany and a meeting was scheduled, out of the blue. We hit it off straightaway and he played me "Miss Kiss Kiss Bang". I loved it and we recorded the song in about an hour. The rest is history.

LS: The sound of "Alex Swings, Oscar Sings" is really different. It is quite ground breaking, a mixture of Pop/Swing. Whose idea was it?

OL: Alex is the mastermind behind the idea, he wrote and composed the album, I am just the guy who put his soul into the vocals and plays it out on stage. I think Alex is brilliant and I think the combination of pop dance and big band swing is way dope.

LS: You most certainly have the voice for both Pop and Swing. Who inspires you?

OL: I just love to sing. I am inspired by great vocalists. I love Marc Anthony, Bill Withers, Donny Hathaway, Brian McKnight, Freddy Mercury, George Michael, Mika, Robbie Williams... The list is endless.

LS: Got to ask about Eurovision night. How did that feel?

OL: Singing in front of 25.000 people live as well as 150 million TV viewers watching is a never to be repeated experience for sure. It was larger than life. The fans are way intense, the media coverage insane, we were on CNN entertainment the only Eurovision band to ever be covered on that show. It was incredible but it's funny in that I was not so nervous. I mean I was anxious but I just wanted to go out there and have fun. I even had my earphones go out on the final dress rehearsal before the big show on the big day and I still did not let it shake me. I just kept telling myself fear cannot exist where love is, I know it sounds corny but its true and it helped a lot.

LS: I remember watching and really feeling wowed, especially when Dita Von Teese joined in... It really added to the visual impact!

OL: Dita, yeah... WOW. She is great, Stunning in person, and gentle as a kitten. Such a lady. It's funny though, cause we have mutual friends so we both got to hear a little about each other before we met so that broke the ice. She is super super sweet. I love me some Dita!

LS: Now that you know Line dancers love you, how do you feel about the success of the album in dance terms?

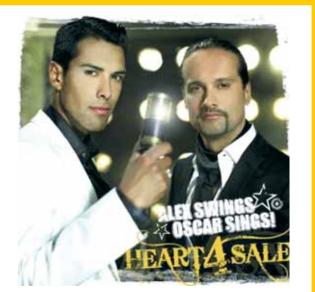

Darren Bailey is a well known name in the Line dance community. A respected dancer and terrific choreographer in his own right, he demonstrated very publicly what a Line dancer could do in the BBC smash hit "Strictly Dance Fever". Laurent finds out what made Darren the dancer he is today.

Portrait of

Darren Bailey is a class act. Those who tuned in every Saturday night to watch him and partner Lana Williams in Strictly Dance Fever in 2006 will attest to that.

And yet, in the early years, dancing was more of an accident than a plan! "My dad DRAGGED the family and I along to the Ponderosa Stompers class in the Welsh valleys. He thought it would be something to do together. Trust me! As a teenager, I was not impressed with the thought of going dancing and definitely not with my parents there!" He admits that the lady in charge of the class, Marguerite Lewis was instrumental in his becoming a dancer. "She has followed me all through my career and even came to the BBC studios to support me for Strictly..."

Originally Darren wanted to be a sports star. "In my early days as a dancer I did

think of it as a sport, trying to get the best out of myself physically, and push myself to the limits. But as I got older I realised that it is as much an art as it is a sport." So after this first lesson, why did Darren come back. He smiles: "I did notice there where a lot of attractive girls, and I really believe that enticed me to come back a week later."

Darren soon discovered he enjoyed dancing though his journey was not always easy. "I was always very small as a teenager and had problems with bullying so if anyone found out that I had started dancing my school days would have been a living hell." That thankfully never happened though he remembers a defining moment. "I went to a social evening and saw one of my teachers there. I tried to avoid her all night, but she came to me to say that she wished she could dance like me and not to

worry as she wouldn't mention anything back in school classes. Which was a huge relief."

Darren had come across Line dance for the first time in Florida as his Dad had taken him on holidays for his 13th birthday. "I remember being sat upstairs in the Rosie O'Gradys Saloon when all of a sudden Country Music started playing downstairs. We looked down over the balcony on to the dance floor, to see a sea of cowboy hats flowing in the same direction like a huge formation team, it was a great sight to see and one I will never forget."

Darren's dance journey had to start from within. He had been forced to go to a class but something changed. "I discovered that I could get all my frustrations out when I danced. After class I always felt really happy as if I had left all my troubles on the dance floor." He also became aware that he

was a natural mover and when his teacher asked him to "have a go" at competing in Line dance, he could not resist. "I was always into competitive sports and I soon found myself in America competing in my first World Championships. That whole experience was something else, here I was surrounded by Line dance celebs. People like Pedro Machado, Roy Verdonk and Tom Mickers!" And the event was a happy one for Darren. "At the awards ceremony, I remember collecting my first pace and walking off the floor to meet my dad who had tears in his eyes. I could not believe it, there I was, a World Champion." And though he has since won ten further World Championship titles, Darren admits that "none of them will ever compare to the first one."

Then Strictly Dance Fever put him and his partner Lana in the public limelight. "Since that show, things have been manic. I can

definitely say that my life has changed." Dancing with Lana all across the world and working for a company called "Swing Extreme" are not just great honours but a way of life for Darren today.

I am curious about why Darren started to write his own choreographies. "I found that as a Line dancer I wanted to make some variations when I could hear breaks and musical elements that some dances would simply ignore. I really believe that choreography should come from the heart and so I had a try. Today, I really like choreographing for big groups as you can really let your mind break free and show so many different feelings and emotions." Working with the likes of Roy Verdonk and Raymond Sarlemijn is also an added bonus. As for music, Darren, perhaps surprisingly, is a true Country fan and loves Garth Brooks and Toby Keith in particular. "Dancing is all about music. I take care

with my dances and I choreograph them with a lot of pride, sometimes it can take minutes, other times it can take weeks. I don't write something because I want to be the first to do something to a piece of music. Its important to make your dances as good as they as they can be. The Line dance public deserve it."

Darren's career today is a far cry away from being a Line dancer three times a week but he still loves it. "From what I see and hear, the dance scene is still the same, people going to have fun and cut loose, which is what Line dancing is all about. I am definitely freeing up some more time that will allow me to got to more Line dance events and teach as I miss it so much. Since turning professional I can tell you there is a lot of pressure when you are dancing for your living. That's why it is important for me to keep Line dancing, It keeps me sane...."

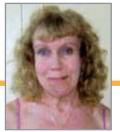

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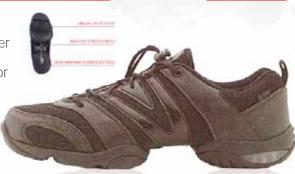

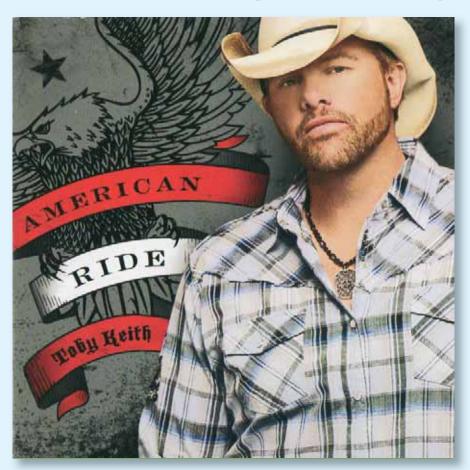

TOBY KEITH

AMERICAN RIDE

SHOW DOG NASHVILLE
HUMP067

Toby Keith became a country superstar around 1999 when he moved to the now defunct DreamWorks label and released "How Do You Like Me Know" which was an international hit single and album. He released several superb albums over the next few years before branching out with his own Show Dog record company. Here we have Toby's latest offering.

Title track *American Ride* (87bpm) gets the ball rolling and this was the fastest selling single in eight years in the States. This is a butt kickin' anthem of a song that Toby specialises in and it is awesome!

Gypsy Driftin' (132bpm) was written by Toby and he had a hand in writing all but the title track. This just demonstrates that Toby retains his ability as a great songwriter, this has a good solid dance beat.

Are You Feelin' Me (132bpm) is a waltz with a brisk pace. It has some gorgeous lyrics which Toby delivers brilliantly. It only needs good choreography.

Every Dog Has Its Day (78bpm) has the potential to be a massive dance hit with the right choreography and I can see choreographers fighting over it!

Woke Up On My Own (70bpm) Toby can deliver a love song to rival most and this is a great nightclub two step with great potential as a dance track on. The guitar solos are stunning!

If You're Tryin' You Ain't (95bpm) is another powerhouse of a track with some great backing from girl singers and superb musicianship. Another fantastic track!

Cryin' For Me (Wayman's Song) (78bpm) is a bit special. This is a stunning song delivered beautifully by Toby with some fabulous sax playing and a wonderful string arrangement. As a nightclub two step it is a good dance prospect.

If I Had One (78bpm) dramatically changes the mood and this is a super Tush Push track that merits a good dance of its own.

You Can't Read My Mind (82bpm) Toby delivers another good solid rocker of a track that should make strong appeal as a dance track.

Tender As I Wanna Be (64bpm) this too is a powerful nightclub two step with a good strong beat and delivers this heartfelt song with great emotion.

Loaded (86bpm) is exactly what this track is, think Big & Rich meets Montgomery Gentry and you know just what I mean. Country rock at its very best!

Toby has chosen *Ballad Of Balad* (116bpm) as the final cut and this is waltz with some tongue in cheek lyrics and it could inject some fun into Line dancing.

Toby Keith proves with this album that he is still at the very top of his game. This is one of the very best country albums I have heard in a few years and you simply must get yourself a copy as it is packed with dance floor possibilities.

SERIAL LADY KILLER RECORDS

Last summer I reviewed an album by a band called the Old 97's. The band's critically acclaimed lead singer Rhett Miller has released a new solo album on which he has self penned all but one of the tracks.

Rhett's opener *Nobody Says I Love You Anymore* (98bpm) is waltz in rhythm and is a contemporary angst ridden song with lyrics that could have been written by Lennon.

Like Love (89bpm) has a powerful, almost military style, drum beat throughout the track. Not too sure of the viability of this one as a dance track as it endures several tempo changes.

Caroline (140bpm) is delivered in a staccato style reminiscent of New Wave style music a la Elvis Costello. This has a great

I Need To Know Where I Stand (133bpm) Rhett delivers a very contemporary song that could well be a hit single. The lyrics are a bit of Lilly Allen with some Beatles style harmonies and this for me, is one of the highlights on the album.

Happy Birthday Don't Die (88bpm) a punky sort of number sounding very much like a Pulp track. I am sure that Jarvis Cocker would have loved to have written this one!

Bonfire (86bpm) is almost a lullaby which precludes it from being of any interest as a dance track.

Haphazardly (96bpm) A track somewhat New Wave in style but that soon builds up to a decent pace.

If It's Not Love (138bpm) is a very lively number and Rhett once again reverts to the early Elvis Costello style of vocal delivery.

Another Girlfriend (110bpm) a brilliant little song on which the simple backing compliments Rhett's vocals.

Temptation (126bpm) I love Rhett's voice here which shows how versatile an artist he is. The Hammond organ and the solid drumbeat complimented some cool guitar riffs make this a standout track.

Lashes (80bpm) has some good lyrics and the rawness that Rhett delivers vocally contributes to what is another fine track.

Sometimes (110bpm) which is rather mellow and Rhett does sing the song extremely well.

So there you have it, a decent album with some good songs and a few that might interest as dance tracks. Give Rhett Miller a listen you have know he may just fleat your beat! never know, he may just float your boat!



DAVE RAWLINGS MACHINE - A FRIEND OF A FRIEND

ACONY RECORDS

Dave Rawlings has collaborated with the likes of Ryan Adams and Gillian Welch on the tracks for his new album.

We start out with Ruby (60bpm) a very harmonious number which is nightclub two step in style and there are strong influences of Neil Young in Dave's vocals. A gorgeous song and a great opener.

To Be Young (Is To Be Sad, Is To Be High) (90bpm) has a strong bluegrass influence and would appeal to those that like to dance to more traditional music.

I Hear Them All (130bpm) Dave's voice is a delight on this acoustic number but it doesn't have much merit as a dance track.

Method Acting/Cortez The Killer (108bpm) the aforementioned Neil Young's song is featured here. Dave's smooth voice delivers the deep and meaningful lyrics perfectly.

Sweet Tooth (100pm) features Gillian Welch on harmonies and this is a bright and breezy little song with some fine guitar picking by Dave. This has some potential as a fun dance track.

How's About You (118bpm) is a sing along number with simple lyrics and with some good choreography this could make a nice track for a beginner dance.

t's Too Easy (98bpm) this whisks you to the Smokey Mountains of Tennessee with its simple lines and bluegrass flavour. It's a lively track, very traditional in style.

Monkey And The Engineer (74bpm) is a brilliant song with some fun lyrics. You just have to listen to all the words and you will soon find yourself singing the chorus. A fun party track for sure!

The closer here is Bells Of Harlem (82bpm) is a complete departure from the rest of the album as it has a full production with orchestral backing to accompany Dave's superb vocal. For me this is without doubt the best track on the album.

To be totally honest I am not sure what you will make of Dave Rawlings Machine. This is unquestionably a very good album to listen to but there are just a few tracks that make any appeal for dancing.

Opening number I Know You Better Than That (98bpm) has a gentle cha cha beat and wow! this lady can really sing.

So far So Bad (92bpm) Leslie has been likened to the great Carole King and upon listening to this track it's easy to see why.

Rest Of London (76bpm) is a nightclub two step on which Leslie demonstrates not only her beautiful vocal talents but also her strength as a songwriter. Simply superb!

I See Myself With You (116bpm) has a sort of contemporary 60's feel to it and is a cracking little track and could well become a dance favourite.

Easy Love (78bpm) I absolutely love Leslie's voice on this brilliant song, there are undertones of Dusty Springfield and Corrine Bailey Rae. The backing band is outstanding

Hit The Spot (112bpm) is a sassy little number, jazzy and very cool. I can definitely see choreographers loving this one.

If I Don't Stop Loving You (80bpm) this song showcases how beautiful Leslie's voice is. A stunning song!

Turn It Over (106bpm) is a lovely cha cha track that has dance written all over it.

No Easy Way Out (82bpm) the string arrangement compliments Leslie's vocals beautifully and this is a track that you will play over and over.

Be My Baby (110bpm) is a cover of the Ronnette's smash hit, but boy have you never heard it sung like this before! It is stripped right down and it is the kind of song that could catapult Leslie's career in the same way

that Eva Cassidy's music was.
Leslie finishes her album off with the aptly named *Goodnight* (75bpm) a beautiful song with some very nice acoustic guitar and squeeze box on the backing.

Every now and again an album comes through for reviewing that you know from the first few bars is going to be a bit special and Swan Feathers is without doubt something very special. If you like good quality music you will love Leslie Mendelson's work.

Fran Maddocks had an interest in Indian culture since childhood. "I have always had a feeling within myself that I had to know more about these people. I just felt that they were greatly misunderstood."

Throughout her life, she studied Indian history and traditions. What she discovered truly shaped her mind and being, taking the great Indian spiritual culture to her heart alongside the love of a certain way of living, close to nature and all that surrounds us.

She says: "The way Indians lived was destroyed by the Europeans who came along and changed everything. They took away their whole lifestyle, and decimated the tribes."

Because of her profound interest, Fran started to perform Indian dances with another group at holiday camps around the British Isles for several years. When that group dispersed, she simply decided to form her own group with other dancers from the Telford area.

This was twenty years ago and Fran says: "There was about 12 of us then and we performed at venues and festivals around the UK and the Isle of Wight. We camped in our tipis at many festivals and also performed as well as giving talks at schools and making TV appearances. We were just glad to be able to show what a real Indian dance was like to as many people as possible."

Dancers in the group dwindled down to just six and she says: "In recent years the groups numbers did change after the deaths of our male dancers Bill Sinclair and Dougie (Quannah)."Fran's husband Keith also passed away last August. Today, the group's numbers may be reduced but what remains is a wish from every dancer to portray different tribes in traditional and modern costume and their dances.

Fran adds: "We try to give people an idea of what life was like in our dances and show

how Indians lived in their tipis." Every member of the group has an Indian name. Fran explains: "I was given my Indian name during regression, exploring my past life. I was told that I was a Cheyenne Indian boy in a former life, and my name was Many Rivers." After getting permission, Fran decided to use the name for the dance group.





Dance groups exist in many shapes and sizes and in general is one of the purest form of expression. Laurent Saletto recently met Fran Maddocks, the heart behind a dance group like no others.

RIVERS



The group members all have specific tasks. Fran says: "We have two hoop dancers (Cloud Bird and Spirit Wolf) who perform intricate dance patterns with 17 hoops each. Husband and wife (Moaning Bear and Many Hands), also known as Jim and Marie, have been with us from the beginning and Paul has been our compere from the start. They are all an invaluable part of our group."

Keith who was Fran's husband was very well known for his portrayal of the eagle in the eagle dance, a sacred dance where the eagle takes the prayers of the people up to the Great Spirit in the sky (Waken Tanka).



He also sang, drummed and played the flute for our shows and is greatly missed by everyone in the group.

Many Rivers has now joined with Lonestar old west re-enactment group and the resulting show is one of the American West's living history. With more dancers joining Many Rivers as well as a falconer who displays his birds of prey to the public, the demand for the group is getting huge.

Fran says: "This summer, we appeared at the Welshpool C&W festival, the Three Counties Showground, Malvern, Folkstone and Windsor. These are some of the bookings for 2010 and many other dates to be confirmed."

It is a tribute to Fran and Many Rivers that her passion is not only shared by the many lucky people who get to see their demonstrations and shows, but that perhaps at the end of a day with her and her dancers, people can take home a more informed view of a largely unknown civilization by so many.

In our second instalment of how Linedancer magazine started, *Betty* looks at how the magazine progressed...

Open Arms

Following the official launch, subscription started to slowly creep in and the response to our first edition was just fabulous. Judging by the comments of the few dancers who had seen it we were being welcomed with open arms. It was as if Linedancer was exactly what dancers had been waiting for and they took the magazine to their hearts. We knew it wasn't perfect but it was a successful start.

Then something wonderful happened. As more and more people were beginning to take up Line dancing the national media took an interest. One weekend a full-page article appeared in You magazine and because I had helped the journalist she put our telephone number at the bottom of the page.

On Monday morning I walked in to absolute chaos, The telephone never stopped ringing – as we answered one call and put the receiver back, it rang again and again and again. People had read the article but didn't know there was a magazine for Line dancing and wanted to know where they could buy a copy. At that time we only printed 1,000 copies and we were not available in shops. We sent out copies enclosing fliers hoping that people would like the magazine and subscribe. They did and we quickly had to

increase the print run.. We didn't know what had hit us and the office became a mad house. The newspaper team watched in amazement and we were all thrilled as the subscriptions grew and grew. I remember the Financial Director and I placing bets on how high the circulation would go. We laughed together as I said 5,000 being modest but hoping for more. He said 10,000 being ambitious and still hoping for more. As the months went by we became more confident in what our readers wanted from us we focused on delivering a magazine that Line dancers could be proud of. Not for us a tatty little newsletter but a full-blown quality publication that would enhance and promote the image of Line dance and the people who enjoy it.

Whilst Line dance and the magazine were growing steadily so too was the Internet. It couldn't be ignored and I knew that we had to move with the times. I realised that we had to become Internet pioneers. My knowledge of this new media was almost nil but in 1997 we began the work on our first site.

I was certain the Internet would play a major role in the future of information sharing and I wanted our site to be a reflection of all that was good about Line dancing and to be a reliable and accurate source of information on all aspect of Line dancing around the world. It was important that dancers themselves had a say in how the site operated and I involved them in the concept and design from the earliest stages responding to suggestions, comments and input whenever possible.

Unlike the magazine that we put to bed safely every month the website is never finished. It's a living, breathing, feeding, talking, dancing diva. She knows no beginning and she knows no end. She just is.

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The Ultimate Leading Man



Patrick Swayze, the dancer, actor, director and choreographer who brought a vigorous athleticism, casual grace and an earthy masculinity to stage and screen, sadly passed away on 14 September 2009 after facing the challenges of pancreatic cancer.

Patrick was a Texas born movie actor whose background in ballet and gymnastics gave him a physique well suited for his roles as hunky love interest or macho action film hero. He was born on 18 August 1952. His mother, Patsy, was a choreographer and his father, Jesse was an engineer. Patsy steered Patrick when he was a boy, towards a career in dance, specifically in ballet, which could not have been an easy choice for a young Texan male

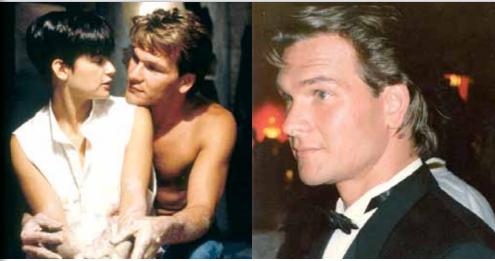
In 1972 he moved to New York and became the principal dancer at the Eliot Feld ballet company but recurrent injuries brought on a move into the theatre. It was on Broadway that Patrick tore up the stage as Danny Zuko in Grease and attracted the eyes of Hollywood. His break then came, thanks to Francis Ford Coppola, who allowed Patrick

to develop his role in the teen drama The Outsiders, the movie that also launched Tom Cruise and Rob Lowe.

In 1975 Patrick married his childhood sweetheart, Lisa Niemi, a trained dancer, actress, writer and musician. Patrick described Lisa as: "The smartest chick I'd ever met." Lisa was his inspiration for the song She's Like The Wind, which he co-wrote and which featured on the Dirty Dancing soundtrack. His breakthrough in 1987 with Dirty Dancing played perfectly to Patrick's dancing strength. He played Johnny Castle, a dance teacher at a holiday resort set in the early 60's who falls in love with one of his pupils, Frances 'Baby' Houseman, played by Jennifer Grey, who is attracted by Johnny's steamy dance moves. In his biography Patrick said: "I really identified with Johnny. His soul was stirred by the







beauty of dance. He combined a tough exterior with a gentle soul, the kind of man my late dad was and the kind I was trying to be. I didn't play Johnny, I was Johnny."

Three years later, in Ghost, he played Sam Wheat, a yuppie banker deeply in love with his fiancee Molly, played by Demi Moore. Sam is killed but returns as a ghost who communicates to his fiancée through daffy psychic Oda Mae Brown played by Woopi Goldberg. It became the most popular date movie, with a much loved scene in which a half-naked Sam embraces Molly from behind as she caresses an oozing brown pot upwards into shape, to the accompaniment of the Righteous Brothers singing Unchained Melody. After Ghost, People magazine voted him one of the most 'sexiest people alive'.

After these movies, Swayze never quite progressed to the A-list, though he did well as the charismatic surfer-dude in Point Break, he was the decent American expatriate in City of Joy and the wacky drag artist in To Wong Foo among many other films.

There were occasional excursions back to his beginnings as a song-and-dance man. In 2003 he appeared in the Broadway production of Chicago, and in 2006 he took on the role of Nathan Detroit in Guys and Dolls in the West End. In 2003, he also fulfilled a long-held dream of making a dance movie with his wife, called One Last Dance, based on her semi-autobiographical play about concert dancers in New York. It won several awards.

When asked in an interview in 2004 what he did in his spare time, Patrick told The Times

that he didn't have any: "Being a rancher, wildlife conservationist and actor-director-producer keeps me busy." In 2008, soon after he had filmed a pilot for the television show, The Beast, in which he was to star as an FBI agent, Patrick was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. He underwent treatment while shooting the subsequent series. Besides sharing the same middle name, Wayne, with his father, Jesse, they both died at the same age, 57 years.

Patrick's co-star in Ghost, Woopi Goldberg played tribute to him in a recent interview: "Because of Patrick Swayze, I got that movie, Ghost,' because of Patrick Swayze, I have an Oscar."

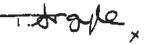

Lots of people like you Karen, who don't want to join a gym or do sport related exercise, enjoy Line dancing. And like you, at least some of them hope to lose some weight by dancing. Provided there are no medical or health reasons that affect your ability to lose weight, the good news is that regular dancing should be able to contribute to your weight loss plans. I will give you a few tips here to help you get maximum benefit from your dancing to help you burn off some extra calories.

It is no secret that if you want to lose weight you need to burn off more energy than you are taking in. That means getting the balance right between the amount of energy that you take in from eating and drinking and the amount of energy you burn off each day. Sometimes we think we are being more active than we really are. So being honest about how much activity we are really doing is a good place to start.

On paper you are doing at least six hours of physical activity each week in the form of Line dancing. And from time to time you increase this when you go to a weekend event. So it appears that you are already doing a reasonable amount of activity each week. Now you need to do the honesty test – that means looking carefully at each dance class you do and being honest about how much of the time you spend actually dancing, how much of the time is spent standing still or moving very little as you learn something new and how much time out you take to chat to friends, have a rest or enjoy a relaxed drink. Once you have done this you should have a clearer picture about the amount of time you

are actually dancing and moving. If you find that you are doing a lot less than you thought can you change that by monitoring how long you dance for at each class and making sure you spend more time dancing than sitting out? Remember to continue to have some water as and when you need it

At the moment you say you are regularly doing two classes each week. What would help you to burn off extra calories would be to do some extra Line dancing at home between classes. Put on some music (you can download some free from the Linedancer website or listen to Linedancer Magazine Radio - LMR) and do a few dances back to back so that you feel that you are getting everything moving. Doing this every day will help you to burn more calories more regularly and you will also have the added potential benefits of feeling good every day from your body's extra production of its 'feel good' chemicals.

Another way you can burn additonal calories is by upping the amount of energy you are using when you dance. There are a number of ways that you can do this, for example, try taking slightly bigger steps or travelling more when dancing (space permitting) and also through using your arms (especially when raising them above shoulder height).

By making sure you get maximum activity value from your Line dancing you should soon start to notice a difference. And if you also aim to have a well balanced diet without too much sugery or high fat foods then you should see results even quicker. Good luck Karen and let me know when you have danced that stone away.

I started Line dancing five years ago and go to two classes a week. I also go to some weekends.
I need to lose at least a stone in weight. I am already doing more than six hours line dancing every week. How much more exercise do I need to do to lose weight? I don't want to join a gym.

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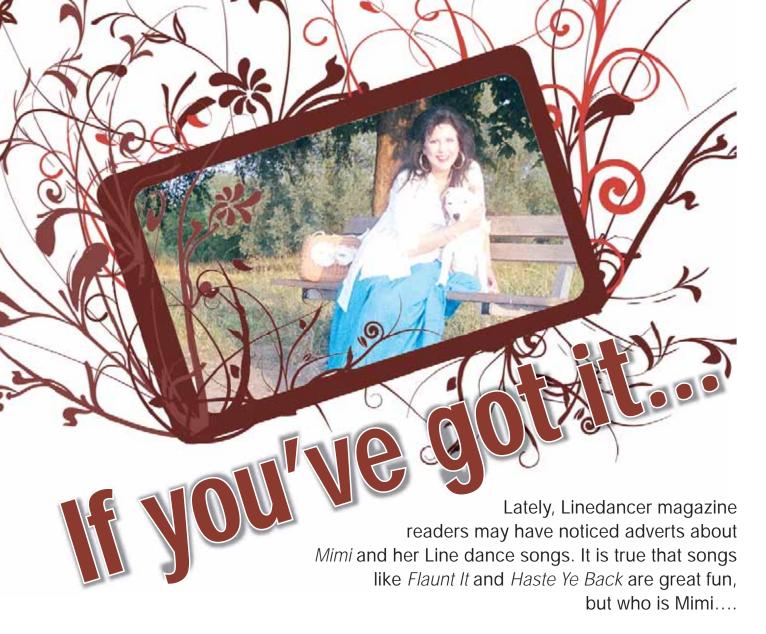
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Mimi lives in Camden where she was born and grew up. She learnt to sing, act and dance at a very early age (two and a half!), later this would allow Mimi to become a professional dancer and singer.

She says: "I guess I was most successful as a singer in the 80's, when I had five HNRG records out that were in the Euro Charts, including 'The Man's So Real'" This particular song made the national charts and Mimi was also the voice behind a national campaign of beauty products as the "Harmony" girl.

Mimi's talents mean that she has been working as a singer ever since doing gigs with rock and blues bands, pop, country, rock and ballads. But her love of dance music was best served with Mimi going solo. She says: "I really love all genres of music, all styles and I am blessed as I have been able to sing every song I have ever loved."

Watching the video of "Flaunt It" you can see Mimi dancing with a young child. It is clear that Mimi loves youngsters. She admits: "Well, I am also a qualified school

teacher and have taught in lots of schools in London. So, yes I love kids!" She also adds laughing: "Let me tell you that there are many similarities between performing and teaching, but we won't go into that."

Her new album is a dream come true. "I have for the longest time wanted to get involved with Line dance, it seems such fun. I haven't done any proper Line dancing as yet but I am learning fast." She laughs again: "I have even bought the Love to Line dance Beginners DVD so watch out on a dance floor near you."

She discovered Line dance as most do, by accident. "I wrote two songs Linedancin' and Linedance Blues, just after doing a gig in a club where the audience were all into Line dancing. They were really enjoying themselves, old and young. It was so inspiring to me." Her further dream would be to have someone choreographing a good dance to the tunes. Something which has already happened with Flaunt It (If You've Got It) using the song in its dance version. Mimi says: "All the songs on my album 'If You've Got It – Flaunt It' were written by

me, and some of the tunes tend to be a bit tongue-in-cheek." She pays tribute to her friend and talented producer, Mick West. "He is a brilliant guitarist and musician who has always believed in me, helping me to record my work at his studio, and providing the music, arrangements and production on all the tracks. I love his guitar playing, and he plays beautifully on the track 'Haste Ye Back'."

So far the album is doing well in Europe and the UK and also in countries as far away as Japan and the USA.

And if you are wondering what the album is about, here's the answer from the lady herself. "This album is full of happy songs. I would love them to become the sort of tunes that people play, dance and sing to at parties, clubs, nights out and special occasions." In truth, this could very well be Mimi's life philosophy. "I think that we all aspire to be happy, and it is quite simple really. If you promote happiness, it becomes infectious."

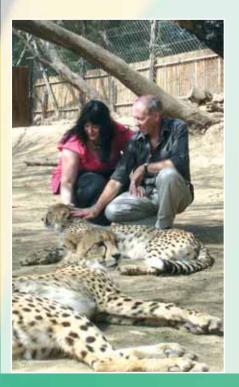
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South

From Fiona

We met Pam two years ago and have remained friends ever since, so to be able to have a holiday, teach Alan's latest dances, do some workshops and see a new country were just fantastic opportunities we could not miss out.

Our first glimpse of South Africa was amazing, from seeing our first shanty town to spending the night at a Warm Water Spa where you could relax in really hot mountain water in pools and private baths. All very welcome after a 12 hour flight.

We also visited a Wildlife Ranch with Crocodiles, Meerkats, and big cats too as well as the wonderful Cango caves.

Pam and her husband Martin live on a farm and it is a most beautiful area. On a Tuesday, Pam has a five hour class where people come in and out and the later it gets the higher the levels are!

Alan taught some dances at this class and everyone seemed to enjoy the experience. South Africa is a land where people learn to live together and there was a great sense of community at the farm. Pam and Martin know a family of eight who live in a shack and who walk for miles to get water.

So often Pam and Martin will share some

of their fresh fruit and vegetables with them. Coming from a country where often neighbours don't know one another. This was a humbling and uplifting experience.

I loved visiting the Kynsna Elephants Park, a sanctuary for those gorgeous animals. This was my highlight. Cynthia (originally from Blackpool and who has lived in South Africa for 23 years) hosted our first workshop in George. 60 people attended and we enjoyed the whole day.

On our second week, we stayed in Paarl (100km from Cape Town) and it was a lovely and quiet place we enjoyed very much. With an all day workshop on Saturday, Alan and the dancers had a well filled day with social dancing in between teaches.

We found that Cape Town in particular was a good reflection of the dances we like in the UK. There were some interesting differences with for example Amame Un Poquito, a great beginner dance to Amame and E Z Tango, a beginner dance to Tango Cha. And let us not forget some great dances to Africaans music!

Over that second week, we visited many other great places, wine and cheese farms, Table Mountain, Waterfront and of course some shopping!

South Africa is an amazing place, full of culture and incredible people. We had the most wonderful experience and we hope people enjoyed dancing with us as much as we did. Distance to a South African dancer means very little.

For example, Karin and her dancers are planning to go on an 18 hour drive to see Maggie G as apparently she will be in Johannesburg in 2010...

We can't wait to go back one day and I promise we will make it as soon as we can.

I came over to the UK in 2007 and attended a dance class with Alan Haywood. Both he and Fiona were wonderful. I had just left the instructor that I danced with back home and they both said "Go and teach".

So I plucked up the courage and taught. I then did my CWDA instructors exam. And I can honestly say, it is the best thing I have ever done. I cannot tell you how much I love what I am doing.

A couple of years later and Alan and Fi made plans and came up to see us. Here are some of the things we did.

My hubby and I drove to Cape Town (480 km) to fetch them and some of my students drove 200 km to surprise welcome them at a hot water spa.

We also travelled to the Cave, the Cheetah park and the Garden Route (near George) where our farm is.

They also enjoyed a tour of Sedgfield a town overlooking the sea. This is such a secluded area that when we had a walk on the beach, ours were the only footprints.

I found the Haywoods were an absolute delight to be with. For a start, they eat anything, and thank goodness as I am not the greatest cook! The only regret I have is how time flew. For me being with Alan and Fi was just the best thing. If it wasn't for them, my life would be very different today. I wouldn't be dancing for starters, let alone teaching and I will always be grateful to them both.











If you like your sounds mellow and sincere with a hint of sweetness and smoke, *Leslie Mendelson* is the girl for you. Swan Feathers is her first album and is an assured start to a promising career. In this exclusive interview she chats to Laurent.





LS: Hi Leslie. I really like the album, very cool sounds. Tell our readers a little about you?

LM: Hi, well, I come from Long Island, not too far from where I am now, as I live in Brooklyn. But it might as well be a whole world away. I had what you would call a classic upbringing, Mom and Dad, younger sister and a cat named Toby! We all loved music and I think we were one of the first people to get a CD player in our neighborhood. My dad is a trumpet player who used to teach music and I have great memories of music evenings at our house. I took piano lessons when I was young but listening to the radio and playing the Beatles a lot taught me most, I think.

LS: So music was always the key to your life?

LM: Yes and no. As I grew up I was changing careers every week (laughs). I knew the sky was the limit. In my junior year of high school I was hell bent on being an architect. I was also interested in acting but disliked the theatre people in my class so much, that it turned me off. I was always into music, but I didn't want to join the school band. I was that mix of hating everyone and wanting desperately to be loved. I knew I needed to do something in the arts, though.

LS: Swan Feathers is a very personal collection of songs. How do you go about writing songs like these?

LM: I get inspired all different ways. Usually doing something other than writing, like laundry or cleaning my bathroom. As far as the length of time it takes to write a song, it varies. The other day I finished a song in two hours and it's now one of my favorites. You never know. Usually, I'm really difficult and stubborn. I care a lot about the lyrics. It usually goes a lot quicker when I have a title or concept that is clear and focused. The song then will write itself. Sometimes it's not too clear and needs to find its way.

LS: Who are Leslie Mendelson's role models?

LM: My role models are usually great artists who never lived by the rules. People that have created their own destiny and identity and lived for their art, never letting people sway their artistic vision. Bob Dylan, Frank

Lloyd Wright, John Lennon and Woody Allen are some people who come to mind that inspire me daily.

LS: Trace a little of the journey that led to Swan Feathers for us please?

LM: I made a record in 2005 that was mastered by Gene Paul (son of Les Paul) at DB Plus. He was one of the great engineers from the golden era of Atlantic. He recorded everyone from Rolling Stones to Aretha Franklin. I made friends with the staff and started hanging out over there taking various little projects I was working on to them. During that time I met the late great producer Joel Dorn who also worked for and became vice president of Atlantic in the 70's. He was responsible for discovering Bette Midler, Roberta Flack and produced records for legends such as Dr. John and the Meters. We recorded a bunch of songs that garnered the attention of a few labels and then signed a deal with Ryko.

LS: On that subject, was it tough to get the music industry to take note of Leslie and the songs?

LM: Undeniably so. You really need a hit these days to get a career going and this record doesn't sound like pop radio. But I believe, no matter what the trend, that there will always be an audience for good songs. It just takes longer to reach them.

LS: Describe the album in a few words to us?

LM: It is a collection of songs that are personal, sincere and fun. A throwback to a time when singer/songwriters made pop albums.

LS: What are the plans now?

LM: Touring mostly. But I would love to expand in touring the world, having clothing and perfume lines out there and act in a few films. (laughs) Yeah, that would do...If I can reach an international audience this is all I can hope for...
