

Robert Wanstreet

When news came at the end of March that Robert Wanstreet had died, the shockwaves in the Line dance community were felt all over the world. Robert was a true pioneer of Line dance, one man who made a difference to thousands of dancers, especially in France where it is widely acknowledged he was the one who started it all. Maureen Jessop was one of Robert's best supporters through his life and in 2009 she wrote an article (published in Linedancer Issue 157) about her best friend in the world. As a tribute to this extraordinary man, we are reprinting part of the feature as Robert had read it and approved it at the time.

Imagine a dreamer dancing alone in the middle of an empty dance floor. Slowly other people join him, try to copy his movements. As the floor fills up, still more and more dancers appear with different levels of prowess, he still dances in the middle like the hub of a wheel.

A transposition of this image will give you the state of Country and Line dance in France today. The dancer in the centre is Robert Wanstreet. Born in Utah USA, Robert, from an early age was attracted by music.

Robert's grandparents often took him along to the local square dance. The changing figures executed to the caller's instructions, the swirl of the dancers enchanted the young boy.

The family moved from ultra conservative Utah to Fresno California when Robert was 12 and a new phase of his life began. It was the age of the hippies, peace and love and California was the centre. He discovered the piano at 15 and enrolled at the local music conservatory learning to play principally classical music. He was named Musician of the Year three years later and played Schubert to a standing ovation from 2000 people at his high school graduation

The American high school system also gave Robert the opportunity to develop in the performing arts by lending his musical talents to the theatre group's musical comedy productions.



Thinking about his future, his undeniable aptitude was as a teacher. At this time, his favourite academic subject was French. To complete his studies he had to spend two years in France and he arrived in Aixen-Provence in 1983.

To the brash young American provincial France was very different from California or Utah. The seemingly refined good manners and discreet intelligence of the local bourgeoisie was a revelation. So enchanted was he with life in 'Old Europe' that he decided to return once his degree was obtained. Little did he realise that his return to California would prove to be another crucial turning point, for it was then that he discovered the new craze, Country Western dance!

True to his word, Robert returned to France in 1987 and settled in Paris furthering his studies in French at the Sorbonne. There was just one thing missing – Country Western dancing!

It would be three years later that the opportunity for Robert's dream began to come true. Organising the end of year party at the language school where we both taught, he pulled together a team to demonstrate Line dance. Several of us begged him to teach us and thus, Country Western Line dance started in France.

Euro Disney opened his theme park near Paris and among the attractions, was Billy Bob's, an authentic Country Western Saloon! This was to play a big part in the development of the dance. It was here that we, as Robert's first pupils, took our first stumbling steps on the tiny dance floor. It was here that Robert was engaged to teach the bar staff to dance as part of the show, where he later became the DJ and where a couple of years later our new club Les Amis du Far West held the first International Competitive Festival and set the first 'longest Line dance' Guinness record in France. It was here that more and more people were introduced to the dance and thus our image of the lone dancer takes shape.

Being an authentic American did greatly help Robert's renown. That American belief in oneself was always there beneath the surface and drove Robert from being a simple social dancer to the teacher trainer and Southern European director for NTA. His musical training and eye for detail made him an excellent teacher and demonstration choreographer. His sense of humour also gave him all the right qualities of a good MC. With his charismatic personality he was a natural leader. Generally, what Robert said went and he competed, judged and was a UCWDC Festival Director.

In recent years, he kept on forging ahead but still kept an eye on the latest trends, he was in great demand all over France to teach workshops and train teachers. His weekly class in Paris was principally based on improving technique for advanced dancers. He welcomed the emerging come back of couples dance in France especially his favourites, two-step and West Coast Swing.

As he travelled the country, he marvelled at the number of people who became 'hooked on country' Many were direct descendants of those early Parisian days. Robert also influenced many younger teachers who will see him as a role model for many years to come. I don't think he really realised just what his dream has brought to people in their everyday lives, how dancing has helped them overcome difficulties, bad health, loneliness, or stress. So many people have discovered hidden talents in teaching, performing, leadership and organisation. Many others have made new friends, fallen in love, had children, travelled and competed through the dance.

With many more plans and thousands following his inspired steps, the lone dancer is not alone anymore. His dream and the dance will go on.

The next pages are testimony of what Robert meant to Line dancers and we could not print everybody's words, though every comment came from people's hearts.

Maureen said: "I have written many times about Robert, but in this final tribute I wanted other people, that he has touched in his life, to express their feelings at their loss. Goodbye my old friend. Rest in Peace Bo." *Maureen Jessop*

Friday 11 March 2011 is a date I will never forget. This is the day the French Line dance community discovers that Robert Wanstreet, their mentor, spiritual father and guide and my best friend of 20 years has been felled by a severe stroke. On that day, there is not one dancer in France who learns this news who does not feel bewildered, in shock and totally helpless.

It is on March 22nd, a sunny spring day at 4.30pm, that the sunshine at the centre of my life danced quietly over the horizon, leaving only darkness and an unfillable void. Robert has left us.

Friday 25 March 2011 in the quiet of a Parisian morning my old friend, surrounded by his mother, eldest sister, his closest friends and many, many dancers had his life celebrated in a touching ceremony at the crematorium of the famous Parisian cemetery, Père Lachaise, where his ashes will lie. The ceremony ended with the country ballad 'A Love Song' by Anne Murray. Robert had choreographed a beautiful dance to this song in 2009. This dance is being performed all over France as a tribute to my friend. You can find its script in this issue of Linedancer magazine.

What follows is simply the outpouring of grief from the many, many people who knew him and respected him.

Robert Bradley Wanstreet, NTA (National Teachers Association) Zone Director of South Continental Europe, unexpectedly passed away on March 22nd. The news of his passing raised a wave of grief throughout the world of Country Western dancing in France.


When Robert became NTA Director for France, it eventually led to his appointment as NTA Zone Director for South Continental Europe until the end. In 2009 he resigned as an English teacher to dedicate all his time to his passion: teaching, training teachers and choreographing Country Western Dances. He was the initiator and one of the founders of NTAFS (the NTA French Services) a non-profit association whose sole and entire mission is to facilitate the diffusion of NTA knowledge and training to Country dancers in France.

Robert was widely recognised as a kind, generous and impassioned man, with an outstanding talent to explain country music and dance techniques simply and creatively. Throughout France, Country fans have come to realise how much they owe Robert and consider him as the Pilgrim Father of Western Country Dancing in France. The tragic news of his death was first received with incredulity and shock and then the deep feeling of an immense loss by each and everyone. There is now a Facebook page entitled 'Hommage to Robert Wanstreet' where many, many other tributes can be found.

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How to search for a script

You can search for a script two ways. The simple and easy way is to start on the Home page itself. One of the first things you will see is a large red rectangular box with the words 'Search over thousands of dance scripts' and a blank space. Enter your dance title or part of it and it will give you some suggestions. Click on your chosen title and hey presto! The script will come up.

Though this is fine if you know both script and spelling of the title, there are occasions when you have only the title of a song, an artist or a choreographer's name.... In that case, look at the menu on the left of the screen and click on 'Dance Scripts'. The next window gives you a multiple choice when you can enter a title or a name, a song, a style of dance, wall number, counts and you will soon find THAT elusive dance.

If you are after suggestions for a class or see what is new, you also have the facility to consult new dances this month or the last week, most viewed scripts and most viewed videos, giving you a real idea of what is popular and new.... The choices are definitely up to you!

How to enter a script

If you have a dance you would like to appear on our website, there is no easier way than entering it yourself. To do that, again click on 'Dance Scripts' on the menu, then 'Enter A Dance Script'. You will now see two choices. Fast track and Upload.

Fast Track is when you enter the dance yourself. Fast Track offers many advantages. By entering your script yourself, your new dance is uploaded immediately and you can correct and amend it yourself at any time if you are a subscriber. You can still use the system if you are not a subscriber but you won't be able to edit it so be careful! The process is simple and guides you along in a simple and easy way, so there is no need to be a computer whizz either.

Uploading your script is particularly useful when you want to upload the script in its original format (though be aware that we do prefer MS Word or text). We will then enter the script on our database as soon as we can and this can take a few days. Amendments can be done through you sending us an e mail but again this may not be instantaneous. That is why we always recommend the Fast track Option.

Online shop



This new single from the Jive Aces reflects the sunny natures of band members lan, Ken, Vince, Alex, John and Peter. These guys just love what they do whether playing for jive and swing dancers or a sit-down audience. I had the opportunity to attend both types of events recently when I went along to the third 'Jive Aces All Dayer' at Lakeside Country Club in Surrey, include a couple of great Skiffle songs in their show, the change of instruments and music style adding yet another string to their bow.

Watching the dancers at the 'All Dayer' I spotted professional Lindy Hopper, Simon Selmon enjoying himself. I had a quick chat to him when he came off the floor and we both recalled the Lindy Hop session he taught at one of the very early Linedancer Crystal Boot Awards. He told me his recollections of that event, "the number of dances that Line dancers have to remember". Even then the quantity of dances stood out, so he would be amazed by the number of dances around today. He told me that he was at the 'All Dayer' because he loves the Jive Aces. He explained why he loves dancing to live music, "when you dance to a live band it always gives you a little bit of something unexpected, a little bit more interpretation, there's nothing wrong with records and DJs as you get to dance to some of the best music in the world but I am a great supporter of live bands.

Between chatting to people I was able to enjoy listening to the music and watching the dancers thoroughly enjoying themselves on the floor. Some were dressed in keeping for the Jive and Swing era and others were comfortable in jeans and t-shirts showing that everyone can choose the style they wish.

The fundraiser at Saint Hill Manor in East Grinstead a couple of weeks later was a theatre style show and the calibre of the performers was outstanding. The show opened with Peter Huszar playing Hungarian violin. He immediately took the audience with him as he blazed





his way through some very lively music. A very polished performance by Jazz singer, Heidi Vogal, with guitar accompaniment from Robin Banerjee, was amazing.

Perhaps the most unexpected performance of the evening was the truly incredible soul singer Louvain Demps. Louvain is leader of the legendary sessions group 'Andantes' and sang background vocals with so many of the Motown greats. What a treat. Cody 'Boogie Boy' Lee, at 13 years old, played a wonderful boogie woogie piano session and put heart and soul into his performance. I first saw him at the Jive Aces Summertime Swing and he just gets better.

After a short interval the show resumed with the Jive Aces giving another brilliant performance. These guys never give anything under 110 percent. A bit of Skiffle showcased their new talents and they were joined on stage by actress, Rebecca Grant, who is a terrific singer and dancer too, a great all round performer. Also joining the Jive Aces on stage was trumpeter Anthony Socci, another delightful performer who added to the wonderful vibrant mix of musical talent. Kenny Ball and his son Keith Ball joined the Jive Aces on stage for the remainder of the show. Kenny, a true legend in his own lifetime showed that at 80 something he still loves to perform. The Jive Aces did what they do so well by sharing the limelight with

other musicians passionate about the music they love to play.



Josh Keley

After spending the majority of the past ten years as a successful pop and contemporary artist, Josh Kelley returns to the Southern sound he's loved since childhood with his upcoming MCA Nashville country release, 'Georgia Clay'. **Richard Kirk** spoke with Josh.





S Country



Josh has a great affinity for his home state Georgia and often visits Nashville but he calls Utah home. He is married to actress Katherine Heigl. "Me and my wife fell in love with Utah. We live on many acres of land, it's quite isolated and we do a lot of snowshoe skiing and hiking. In the summer it doesn't get too humid, a perfect summer there. That's why we love it."

Kelley has become the man, father and husband he always knew he was meant to be, an evolution that couldn't have occurred without great reflection on his Georgia roots and the values and principles on which he was raised.

"I have been making music since I was 12 years old. During our early teens, my brother Charles and I decided to form our own band called Inside Blue and we released a five track CD. It played on the local radio and caught the attention of the Godfather of Soul, James Brown and his manager. He loved our songs and wanted to sign us but wanted to change everything, so we declined. We needed to grow up and see the world and really have things to write about."

"Over the years of producing my own independent albums I have learned what I like and what others like. My motto has always been vocals are the boss, it creates the emotion, everything else is secondary. The way I like to put it is, you want the vocals to be sitting on the cloud not laying in it."

"I wrote my first song when I was about 13 and I have written ever since. I now prefer to co-write. I had been by myself for many years and to write with other people is fun. Two songs on the new album 'A Real Good Try' and 'Two Cups of Coffee' I wrote by myself. The others I co-wrote, a couple were with my brother Charles, who is with Lady Antebellum. We have been writing since we were kids."

"I have had several artists record my songs and there's more of my songs out there like movies and TV shows. It's fun and I like doing it, I write every day. If you get it right publishing can be both fullfilling and a lucrative business. Georgia Clay is a time capsule. It's by far the best thing I've written and I've never been more proud. I'm finally in a genre where I can write lyrics, tell stories and be a man."

It's evident that this latest project is very much autobiographical. I asked Josh, was it true he wrote from his own experiences? "Absolutely. I got married three years ago and my wife and I adopted a little baby girl from South Korea a year and a half ago. She is the cutest thing in the world. The song on the new album 'Naleigh Moon', I wrote about her. I write things I relate too." The title track 'Georgia Clay' recalls the carefree summers of Josh's younger days when he and his brothers used dad's '77 Chevy Sikverado truck and headed down to the lake. The song goes back to the garage and looks at the old truck that has not been driven in years and still has layers of mud stuck on the tyres. "That is the mud from my childhood days, those memories are still there just like the mud. My favourite song on the whole album is 'Gone Like That'. That song started the whole thing going."

These events created the album and the stories he tells on it. With a modern country feel Josh recalls his life experiences with songs like 'Great Idea', 'Ain't Letting Go', 'Two Cups of Coffee' and 'Gone Like That'. Each of these songs embrace the familiarity of times gone by. From the memories of 'Georgia Clay', the raw emotion of 'Naleigh Moon', the humour on 'Raining Whiskey' or the lyrical seduction of 'Learning You' and every song in between, Josh Kelley simultaneously renews cherished country music traditions while bringing a refreshing energy to his latest release. Josh's final words to me for the future were: "This is where I'm going to be for the rest of my career, writing and singing Country songs."

That is good news, for unlike a number of new artists who claim to be country Josh Kelley is country. I wish him well.



Maggie's first time

At the beginning of March this year the U.S debut of the Maggie Gallagher Experience was held in Orlando. John Korman and Sandy Albano sent us their report.

The event, hosted by Diane Petoskey and Sandy Albano, along with Big Dave Baycroft and his wife Pauline was Maggie's first time back in the States since her guest appearance at the 2009 Tampa Bay Line Dance Classic in Tampa, Florida. Unlike most other large-scale U.S. Line dance events, this one was more intimate with only one workshop room and only one lesson per hour so everyone participated together. This was combined with extra activities planned nightly, along with pre- and post-parties. Many of the dancers commented on how much they liked this idea.

Daniel Whittaker has come from a background of 15 years of dance, he has been choreographing, judging, djing, event organising and teaching dance for the past 12 years, all over the world.

He teaches all aspects of dance, West Coast Swing, Waltz, East Coast, Cha Cha, Funk, Rumba, Latin, Charleston, Zumba etc.

Daniel shares his memories and dreams with Linedancer.

What is your first memory of dance in your life?

When I went to my first ever festival. WOW, it was amazing! I even remember every time each festival ended I couldn't wait for the next one, so I was frantically looking to see if there was any other event on.

Before you got into Line dance did you have another favourite genre?

Well if you mean music then I can honestly say I used to listen to everything. I remember my Nan use to always listen to Country music. If you're talking about hobbies then I use to enjoy cinema, golf and bowling.

When did you discover Line dance?

I discovered it in 1996, about a year after I left school and I fell in to it by mistake. It was the best mistake I ever made. Well I mean I fell in to it, I never in a million years thought I would Line dance, let alone make a career of it!

I thank each and every one of my very loyal supporters, without them I wouldn't be where I am now! I actually have a job that I love, how many people can actually say they love their job! What did Line dance bring to you that other dance genres had not?

Well I can certainly say it brought me excitement and a massive network of friends that are just an absolute privelige to be around.

Did you know there and then that Line dance was your favourite style?

I didn't even know I would like dancing and when I fell in to it, I thought wow this is great.

What did you instantly like about it? Did you have any dislikes then?

Everyone was friendly, It was like a big family. The music then was very Country and there were some songs I hated but equally there were some great songs and then I fell in love with Country music.

You are well known in the Line dance world but can you tell me about growing up and a little of your background before Line dance?

When I left school I did an apprenticeship in Joinery and Carpentry. At this stage I just started Line dancing as a hobby. I have always been ambitious in life, when someone says you can't do something, then I will rise to the challenge and I will prove I can.

What do you think makes a good dancer?

Musicallity is very important also practice makes perfect and I think even if your not the best dancer, it's the effort you put in to it that counts.

When did you decide to take your interest further and become a choreographer/instructor?

Well I decided after about a year into my dancng, I realised that I loved teaching people. I had many experiences with other dancers who asked me if I could teach them a dance at the side of the room and then I thought I would love to do this.

I then approached my teachers Lyndon and Mona Foster and not forgetting Phil and Angie and asked them if they could teach me to teach dance.

I will never forget my very first class, I couldn't even swallow, my legs were all wobbly and I thought I was going to be sick but within minutes I took a deep breath and everything was great and I felt like I should be up there and loved every minute.

Where and how do you find inspiration to choreograph a dance?

I can't just write a dance, I have to feel the music and if I don't release anything for a while that's because I have not found anything. I like to not just hear the beat when choreographing to music but I listen to all the instruments in between each of the beats.

Do you have a certain process that you follow, do you have to find the music first for example?

Hours and hours and hours of research, finding the right track sometimes can take weeks. Sometimes you find a great

song but then you realise that you would have that many tags in it, that it wouldn't be worth writing a dance to, so then it's back to the drawing board.

Then you have other times you may find four great tracks and firstly I will check to see if there are any other dances done to that track and secondly you work very quickly to choreograph and write up the dance before another dance comes out... very challenging and fustrating at times!

In your opinion, what is your biggest achievement?

Wow the biggest achievement. I have two that will stay with me forever, dancing 'Chill Factor' at the closing ceremony of the Commonwealth Games was a MASSIVE achievement, it felt like a dream! I never wanted it to end, over a billion viewers watching 1000 Line dancers doing 'Chill Factor', amazing! 

Tim's album of the month

BURNS & POE BURNS & POE

BLUE STEEL RECORDS BSR - 0003

Keith Burns met Michelle Poe when she auditioned as replacement female vocalist in Trick Pony. Michelle got the job but the band split after just a few months and so it was that Burns & Poe was born. They have been on the road performing from coast to coast and signed with Blue Steel records in 2009. Their first single has been a big hit and now they release a 14 track two CD debut album.



Opening track **Don't Get No Better Than That** (120bpm) is a great country rocker with a solid beat and it's easy to see why this was a big hit. All it needs is a good dance writing to it and then would have all the right ingredients to be a big dance hit.

How Long Is Long Enough (106bpm) Michelle takes the lead on this one and Keith provides powerful harmonies. This is a superb country music track, west coast swing in style and another with potential as a good dance track.

Ain't It Amazing (74bpm) once again it's Michelle on lead vocal on a powerful nightclub two step and this too would be delightful as a dance track.

Big Truck (96pm) is a song about a big truck! This is a fantastic boot scootin' country rocker and again I can see this song tempting choreographers to write to it.

Is This Lonely (72bpm) this is the only song not written by the duo and it's a gorgeous nightclub two

step on which Michelle's voice is simply outstanding.

Life's Too Short (104bpm) could be right out of the Trick Pony catalogue and the first CD's closing track *Gone As All Get Out* (148bpm) is a rocking east coast swing number.

The second CD 'Duets' opens with **Second Chance** (108bpm) Keith sounds very much like Don Henley on this superb cha cha and this is my favourite track on the album.

Slow And Easy (94bpm) is a beautiful duet and is described as Kris Kristofferson meets Dr. Hook.

It's Always A Woman (70bpm) a stunning track, a classy nightclub two step in style, whilst *Move On* (108bpm) is a harmonious number in the style of The Byrds.

Can You Do It Again is another wonderful duet, it's delightful.

Macon, GA (100bpm) is the last studio song and this beautiful nightclub two step just needs a good dance writing to it and it could be a massive hit.

Michelle and Keith close with a live medley which they play on the road and includes *Islands In The Stream* and *I Got You Babe*.

This is a fantastic album and is country music at it's very best and I guarantee you will not be disappointed with it.

s a teen Josh formed a band with his brother and they released a five track CD which got some good airplay. Some of Josh's songs have been featured in movies and now he releases a new album on HumpHead.

Tracks that may interest dancers are; title track *Georgia Clay* (106/212bpm) a superb two step track with a solid beat and will surely tempt someone to write to it; *A Real Good Try* (76bpm) this is a beautiful nightclub two step with some gorgeous harmonies; *Gone Like That* (78bpm) is a powerful rocker with some awesome guitar solos; *Rainin' Whiskey* (142bpm) this time the tempo changes to east coast swing and I love both the music and the sentiment behind this track; *Great Idea* (106bpm) bounces along with some great musical backing particularly the fiddle playing; *Learning You* (142bpm) Josh spoils us

Stalwart for a few decades and it doesn't seem that long ago that we were dancing to 'Copperhead Road' although it is probably around 16 years ago! Steve must be doing something to please country music fans as he keeps delivering albums just about every year and his last one 'Townes' won him a Grammy. Steve now releases his first album of original music since 2007.

Dance floor possibles include; *Waitin' On The Sky* (146bpm) this has a distinct Cajun flavour with strong leanings to roots country and it has a good beat; *Little Emperor* (112bpm) has a decent beat but is a bit of a dirge, this is a beautiful nightclub two step with some gorgeous harmonies; *The Gulf Of Mexico* (132bpm) Steve starts this song

ountry superstar Tim McGraw has been one of the top country artists since the release of his first album back in 1993. His music has been used extensively in Line dancing and his fairytale life, being married to Faith hill has captured the hearts of country fans worldwide. Tim has had hits packages released before but this two CD album set is the definitive collection of the very best of his work.

Highlights of CD 1 are; *Live Like You Were Dying* (82bpm) there is a beautiful sentiment in this song; *It's Your Love* (72bpm) which is a beautiful nightclub two step and a stunning duet with wife Faith; *Just To See You Smile* (94/188bpm) to which we have two stepped many a Line dance to; *Something Like That* (96bpm) which has great lyrics and a powerful beat; *My Next Thirty Years* (98bpm) is a feel good number; *The Cowboy in Me* (72bpm) from Tim's best now with an absolutely beautiful waltz track; *Ain't Lettin' Go* (168bpm) is a fast paced track that is a very contemporary song and *Don't You Go* (72bpm) a moving and poignant nightclub two step that will be an absolute delight to dance to.

Great listeners include; **Baby Blue Eyes** (76bpm) a beautiful song written like all the album by Josh; **Naleigh Moon** (95bpm) on which shows fully the range of his powerful voice; **Two Cups Of Coffee** (72bpm) a strong and powerful country music song which could easily be a crossover hit.

Josh Kelley just adds to what I keep saying about there being a plethora of fantastic country music available from Nashville. Josh not only wrote or co-wrote all the tracks but he was joint producer too. On any other month this would easily have been album of the month. A superb album of high quality country music!

accapela and then it turns into a surprisingly good number with a catchy beat; *Molly -O* (99/198bpm) has an unusual two step beat; *I Am A Wanderer* (86bpm) is a nice little song with a gentle beat and we have danced to a lot worse than this; *Heaven Or Hell* (128bpm) is a duet with his wife Alison Moorer; *God Is God* (74bpm) has a gentle litting rhythm whilst *Meet Me In The Alleyway* (134bpm) is a very unusual track, hard to describe but I would have to say it is interesting.

The featured non dance tracks include; **Every Part Of Me** (104bpm) this has beautiful lyrics and is for me the best track on the album; **Lonely Are The Free** (78bpm) is a Dylan-esque style number that sounds like a sixties protest song; **This City** (70bpm) has a nice horn section accompanying Steve's gravelly vocal.

album 'Set This Circus Down'; **She Never Lets It Go To Her Heart** (112bpm) a great country cha cha and **I Like It, I Love It** (126bpm) which was a massive Line dance hit.

Highlights of CD 2 are; **Southern Voice** (112bpm) this is a west coast swinger; **Everywhere** (104bpm) is one of Tim's bigger hits; **Angry All The Time** (64bpm) this is one of my all time favourite songs; **Last Dollar** (106bpm) which is a real fun track; Where **The Green Grass Grows** (80bpm) which Tim reckons is one of his best ever songs; **Indian Outlaw** (108bpm) which propelled Tim to international fame and finally **Felt Good On My Lips** (136bpm) a superb upbeat country track.

There are 24 superb country music tracks on this album and it is a 'simply must have' so why not add it to your collection now?


In February Pauline Lason contacted Linedancer magazine wanting to highlight the fantastic charity work in Rwanda her fellow Line dancer Jules Langstaff was involved in.



We wanted to know more and so *Louisa Austin* got in touch to find out about this amazing lady ...



Distributing goods from the container



The Rwandan genocide of 1994 was one of the most horrific events in recent history.

In the late noughties the devastation was still plain to see and the Rwandans, many living in poverty, were relying on the help from kind foreigners. In 2007 Jules, who has been Line dancing for 15 years and teaches five classes a week was contacted by a fellow dance teacher Ailish Darcy. Ailish had been to Rwanda to study the Genocide and came across a Genocide widow, called Anne Marie, in desperate need of help. Back home Ailish asked Jules if she would help raise some funds to hopefully give this lady a better life.

Jules says, "I agreed to help Ailish because she asked me. I felt her concern and her need to do something urgently." From that point things moved very quickly and Jules adds, "While a trust called Aegis assisted Anne Marie with receiving medication and temporarily housed her and her son, my Line dancers and I set about raising the £6,000 needed to buy her a new house." They were successful, which was no mean feat considering the amount of money needed. The following year Jules visited Rwanda to see the part completion of Anne-Marie's new house and to help paint it.

"A relationship between myself and Rwanda was born at that point. I explored the possibilities of doing similar projects and found so many needy causes whilst I was there. I fell in love with the people and the country." Jules says.

On her return Jules began to fundraise again, this time for another widow, Mamma Serge who had two boys and again was desperate for decent living conditions.

Jules says, "I visited her house and it had no water, electric, windows or drainage.

The rains the country was enduring were literally washing the house away but I fell in love with her happy cheery ways despite her situation."

INE DANCE MADE



She adds, "Line dancers and friends raised £3,000 very quickly through raffles at socials, coffee days at my house, donations and selling anything we could."

Another £3,000 was later raised and in July 2009 Jules made a trip to Rwanda to oversee the completion of Mamma Serge's house.

Jules said, "It now had secure windows and doors, a bathroom and toilet, cook house and electricity in all rooms. She was overjoyed and at peace."

On top of all the amazing lengths she has gone to in order to provide a better life for the people of Rwanda, Jules didn't stop and many projects followed. Her Line dance classes now sponsor six Rwandan children and Jules has pledged to continue for the five years that they are in school. She adds, "We had visited a school called Kinamba Nursery while in Rwanda, run by an English woman and a Rwandan woman from one of the poorest communities. We wanted to help and now we send £600 every January to them."

She also fundraised for a street boys centre, a place young men who have experienced all manner of terrible things can come to seek refuge and be educated. Jules says, "Rafiki ran this struggling centre for 130 boys aged five to 18 years of age with just a few poorly paid staff.

Rafiki is a man of immense passion who works tirelessly finding sponsors. We wanted to help and have fundraised to cover the cost of items such as medical bills."

The latest completed project is the purchase and shipping of a 40 foot container filled with items the locals could use.

Jules says, "I obtained 'wish lists' and after nine months with the exceptional help of Line dancers, family and friends we filled a container with school equipment, furniture, bedding, clothing, shoes, football kits, school books, toys, outdoor play equipment, sewing and knitting machines, beds, printers, 30 computer systems, the list goes on! The most rewarding thing is asking people for something that is needed, receiving, packing and shipping it, meeting it at its destination and taking it to the person it was intended and absorbing the true love and happiness felt by the recipient."

In October 2010, fellow Line dancer Chris Higham, Jules's daughter Jessica and friend Paul flew out to distribute all the items. "We realised however, that it was going to take a lot longer than we had anticipated and so we stayed and lived the Rwandan lifestyle while it was being done.

We had no electricity, cold water every other day, insects in everything, torrential rains and we worked in the community cleaning drains and scything land in the searing heat. But we laughed and enjoyed every moment! We left in Jan 2011 and it was an experience never to be forgotten."







If you want to be involved with this amazing charity, you too can make a difference.

Jules has told us: "The most needed items are shoes, for both children and adults, educational items such as pencils, rulers, geometry sets and clean towels and bedding. Sanitary towels, sewing accessories and toys for all ages are also needed, the list goes on! I know they would hugely appreciate outdoor toys as well, such as climbing frames, slides, swings, bicycles, tricycles and scooters as well as all football related items.

Hospital equipment and ward furniture such as bed pans, dry medical aids, crutches and wheelchairs are also desperately needed.

Currently we are saving up for new fridges and washing machines and are looking for donations to help us along our way. Anything at all is greatly appreciated!

Our rule of thumb in Line dance classes is, don't chuck it out until you've asked us if we want it first!"

So as you can see you can help in many, many ways.

The charity has a processing warehouse so you can send any size goods to Jules who will be glad of your help. If you ring her on 07956 599201 she will give you the exact details.

Linedancer readers have always been known for their kindness and generosity and we are sure that many of you will be able to contribute to what Jules and Chris are doing. Remember that everything will help, from towels to outdoor climbing frames!

Country in his heart

×

Country music is a genre clearly defined by its US roots for most fans. Yet UK country is a clear contender in terms of quality and musicality. Stephen Bayliss certainly does not fit the archetypal image of what a Country musician should look like but he is predicted to be the next big thing on the UK country scene. Louisa Austin had to find out more.



Stephen Bayliss is not a name you may have heard before but as he makes his mark on the country scene it may not be long before he is a Linedancer household name.

As Stephen explains, starting out in his career was not an easy task, "As a child being influenced by TV, a career in Country Music was something that black people in the UK where not encouraged to pursue. Which is why for many years singers such as Nat King Cole, Bob Marley and the Jackson's, was the path my peers steered me towards."

For twenty years Stephen, along with his band Watch This Space performed locally around the North West doing what they thought was expected of them, mainstream pop music and soul.

"Watch This Space never got to world domination, but we had a great loyal North West following, We performed covers and original material at music festivals and private functions around the country." Stephen adds, "We had an opportunity to be published by an independent company but our inexperience and naivety of dealing with record companies resulted in us not moving forward and it was to be our undoing."

After the band parted company Stephen continued to perform solo at corporate events and in the pub and club circuit, however, he was always tied to certain genres of music and couldn't embrace what he really wanted to sing.

"I started writing songs in my early

twenties after teaching myself a few chords on the guitar. Often the songs were Pop/Country but again through peer pressure I thought I had to conform to stereotypes and sing Soul music. It wasn't until my mid thirties when I became pigeon-holed as a Soul singer that I decided to follow my heart and write and record songs that felt right to me - Country!"

Stephen's brave decision was the realisation of a life long dream as he had listened to country all his life, ironically influenced by his peers who listened to Nashvilles best regularly.

"My first experience of Country Music was as a child listening to Jim Reeves, Slim Whitman, Glen Campbell and Charlie Pride to name but a few, at my grandparents house. Seeing the reaction on my Grandmas face as she listened to the laid back dulcet tones of Reeves and Pride gave me an overwhelming desire for music."

So how was the reaction when Stephen finally decided to stand up to the sceptics and go against the grain?

"I still waited several years before I plucked up the courage to go ahead in what I wanted to sing and I have to admit that I was a little nervous at first but encouragingly the majority loved the idea and gave me the support I needed."

For the singer, deciding to adopt a style that was always in his heart, has now removed the chains and shackles of before. No longer does he need to conform to stereotypes and can really let his personality shine through in his work.

"When writing songs in the past," Stephen remembers, "I'd first try and force a style. For example, if it sounded anything other than pop or soul I'd dispense of it and start again but these days it's hard not to let my voice do the talking because the style that seems to come out above any other is the Country sound."

Although Stephen has only started out on the scene he has high hopes for the future. "I really believe the UK Country music scene is as good as our counterparts in the US, hopefully in the next few years my name will be amongst them. Linedancer magazine has opened a new world to me in respect of meeting and talking to people who share the same love for all styles of Country music."

Stephen is also using his position to do great things for charity and has decided to primarily devote his time to the SPACE centre, a multi sensory centre in Preston for adults and children with learning disabilities. Stephen says, "I was asked to become involved in helping to raise £3 million for a new and bigger centre to meet their high demands. I am now a patron of SPACE and in September 2011 we'll be holding the 2nd Stephen Bayliss Golf day, after a very successful first event last year."




Sweet Defeat

Dead Man's Suit was one of those albums that, once heard, you don't really forget.... So we were delighted when we received a brand new album from Jon Allen.

"Sweet Defeat" is his latest release and the album is astounding.

Laurent Saletto speaks to Jon in this exclusive Linedancer Interview ...



JA: Favourably. It was new for me to get reviews for a record. I must say that I try not to read too many now as I don't want to believe some of the hype but I was lucky not to get too many nasty shocks.

LS: What has happened to Jon Allen since?

JA: Lots of touring and quite a lot of success in Netherlands for reasons unknown to me. I have done a lot of things I only ever dreamt about before. For example, appearing on Jools Holland show was a high point as well as touring with Seal, gigs in Glastonbury and all on the back of the last album. So, yes, I have done some good stuff.

LS: Retrace for us how it all started for you, your early influences, your role models, your early career?

JA: It all started with piano lessons at seven. Like the song says I could sing before I could talk and my parents recognized I responded to music when I was just a wee creature. My piano teacher recognised very early I was a natural! I got into all the songs in the charts but eventually I discovered music had started before me and what a surprise that was. I know all there is to know about The Beatles, believe me! It is also when I discovered James Taylor, Van Morrison and Dylan, all great influences.

LS: Tell me a little about the writing process. How does it work with you? Is it words first, music last? And how do you get inspired?

JA: These processes have evolved for me. I work in a few different ways. I can find a melody and that will guide me towards a lyric. Sometimes lyrics come first and the songs will be less melodic. My inspiration can be an emotion, a response, a groove even. Inspiration comes from my life, arts, movies, readings... LS: What is Jon Allen about? How would you describe yourself to someone who has not heard you before?

JA: Good question. I ask myself that question every day. I am a gravelly singer, a bit like Rod Stewart at the beginning but I am also a traditional songwriter like Neil Young.

There is an acoustic element in what I do, I like melodies and I am accessible. I am a rambling figure, sometimes a touch beardy.

LS: Sweet Defeat is yet again a brilliant album. How did it come about?

JA: Thank you. I tend to collect songs as and when I write them. When I have about nine I get to the point when I can see a record taking shape. The first album was almost like my "best of", a series of songs it had taken me years to write and choose from.

LS: Though your songs are lyric led, the melodies are really strong. Is that important?

JA: Yeah, vital. I respond to melodies. McCartney and people like him are those I respond to. I care more about lyrics these days but there are a few different sizes to me.

Some of my songs are not as melodic but I like that too, it all depends on their contents. It is ying and yang and all important.

LS: Like the first CD I think your music is very accessible, how would you feel if a Line dance came out of the selection?

JA: I'd be quite pleased and maybe slightly bemused. I'd love to see how it works, I would have to see it on youtube to really understand it all. And I certainly wouldn't know which song either.... Lucky I Guess is probably the tune. Good luck with that! Maybe you guys can say Jon Allen is the future of Line dance.

Cheque in the post to you!

LS: I struggle with the "Dylan" tag as I can't really see or hear it. Is that a problem to be tagged in such a way?

JA: The tag is what media does. It is a series of signposts like Lady Gaga is the new Madonna.... But I think there are certain similarities between Dylan and me though he is such a huge figure to be compared to. I do draw from the same musical palate though not the same quality of lyrics. I love his work so I am influenced by him. I am a little easier to get than him though I think. He is an acquired taste but some comparisons are fair though.

LS: And how do you get rid of that label imposed by others?

JA: By succeeding and surviving on your own terms and carving an individuality which comes over time. Dylan was tagged with the Woody Guthrie label when he first started and so I am searching to achieve whatever Jon Allen is. Keeping at it is the way to break free.

LS: Where can we see Jon Allen?

JA: A service station near you! Truth is I am all over the place, here and the rest of Europe. Check my website at: www.jonallenmusic.co.uk

LS: What are your plans for the future, short and long term?

JA: The new album is released in May and I am doing the tour. There is some stress now that it is coming out with some songs going to radio, it is a bit worrying to wonder whether people will still like Jon Allen. If all goes well, hopefully I will do some of the things that I did with the last album, realising some dreams and hoping for many interesting things to happen again.

I answered the first part of your letter about recognised teaching qualifications last time.

This time I will answer your other query about Line dance medals.

Qualified dance teachers who are members of recognised dance teaching organisations can, as part of their membership entitlement, enter candidates for medal tests with the said association. There may also be independent organisations that provide medals. You can check with teachers offering a medal system which examining body the medals are taken with and whether it is a recognised association or awarding body.

Teachers preparing candidates for medal tests help their dancers to perform the chosen dances to the best of their ability. When working towards taking medals some teachers will offer medal candidates the opportunity to take additional classes to work on improving technique and have extra practise time - especially when taking higher awards. These additional classes may also be offered because not all social dancers want to do medals and so a teacher might put on special medal classes only for those wanting to take a medal. For adults. the term 'medal test' can be a bit daunting and so I tend to use the term 'progress medals' rather than scaring them with the word 'test'.

Taking medals can be great fun and of the hundreds of Line dancers I have successfully prepared for Line dance medals the majority thoroughly enjoyed the whole experience from working to improve their technique to doing extra practise and then performing their dances for the examiner on the day. When we had a Line dance team I also entered it for team medals and although this was a lot of work all round there was enormous sense of achievement when the team did really well and earned their medals working together as a team.

As I am also a dance examiner (in many dance genres) I understand what it is like from all sides. I should just say that social dance medals are there to encourage social dancers to progress and are not the same as perhaps doing a technical ballet exam.

medals offers another Doina dimension to Line dancing for both teachers and dancers - it might even help some dances to stick around longer if they are dances being practised over time for medals. There is a vast range of medals and awards that can be taken from the basic bronze, silver and gold medals on to gold stars, trophies, cups and higher awards. Medal opportunities in social dancing exist for all, from children right through to older adults. These medals are aimed at recognising progress and of course are not in any way teaching You can contact qualifications. teachers in your area to find out if they offer medal opportunities.

Finally John yes I do receive a few questions from the male Line dancing population. Mostly questions do come from female dancers and teachers but of course questions for this page are most welcome from male dancers and teachers too.



A new name in the world of Country is always welcome. Especially when the name is UK based. Claire Butterworth chats to Thorne Hill, whose single Come Undone, is riding high....

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Claire: Nice to meet you, I am curious about your name...Why Thorne Hill?

Thorne Hill: Simple really... the label suggested that I change my original name (Paul Thornill) to Thornill so that it would have a better Country connection. I thought that it was too much like a band's name spelt in just one word, hence Thorne Hill... I love it now though, sounds real cool.

Claire: How did it all start?

Thorne Hill: I actually started as a holiday coat when I was 18 for three years then went onto cruise ships and it basically progressed from there. I always loved singing, it is what I do, and after I got the travelling bug out of my system, it was time to get on with it.

Claire: You also dance and I am wondering how you got into that side of things?

Thorne Hill: I actually learnt to dance on my first production show job. Though I had auditioned as a singer and had got the job, I was told that I had been booked as a dancer! As I had never danced a step in my life, I was petrified and didn't say anything. I was certainly thrown in the deep end and learnt loads of different styles in the first year. I just had to pick it up.

Claire: How and why did you choose Line dancing?

Thorne Hill: Funnily enough I actually started Line dancing when I was 15, when it first started. I used to go with my mum, then when I went away I actually taught a bit. As part of cruise staff, you know how you get lumbered to absolutely everything and anything, so when I told the management I had Line danced they were overjoyed. They told me that I was going to teach a Beginners dance class each week. When I returned home I started up in the class I'm in now and this was about a year ago.

Claire: So did you keep up with Line dancing specifically for your career?

Thorne Hill: Not to begin with. It was really for the fun of it, but then I got into Country music and though I didn't actually make the connection when I joined the band I realised that being a Line dancer would be good to put the bands sets together. In effect, we would keep both the Country clubs and Line dancers happy. I was right I think as it has all moulded together over the last couple of months, so it's all good.

Claire: So how's your career shaping up?

Thorne Hill: Career wise we are still at the beginning though I have had a big itunes single that people seem to really like. This is the biggest thing that has ever happened to me but yeah, it is still just the beginning. Thank god for Adrian (Churm) who stepped in and choreographed the dance for us. From a marketing point of view, the dance has helped with the sales of the single and vice versa the single sales has helped with the Line dance act side of things. Though it is still a long way to go, we are enjoying the whole thing to the full. I'm still writing a lot of music and the band are continually getting better. We have Wolvestock in July so we are just getting ready and preparing for that.

Claire: Any other plans?

Thorne Hill: For me personally it is about being able to represent British Country music and show the world we can be every bit as good as our US counterparts. It has never been about being rich or a star, it's about doing what I do well.

Claire: What kind of things inspires you to write your own music?

Thorne Hill: Oh, quite a few things really, mainly real life, I like to write real and believable because ultimately we all go through the same things and the same emotions whether it be love, breakups or money. I try to write stuff that's going to appeal to everybody, we all share similar experiences don't we? Those are the topics that inspire me as well as personal experiences and experiences of people I know.

Claire: Your band is called Arizona Storm... how did that start?

Thorne Hill: I auditioned for them last year in April after finding an advert on a web site for someone to sing Country music. They called me up the same night and asked me to come back. To my amazement they then said... "Don't join our band". They thought the age gap was too big and that I might just cut my teeth with them and then go, but no chance. I wanted a good band and that is exactly what those guys are. A band is a team after all and the characters in Arizona Storm are fantastic. Huge personalities, I am really happy to be with them and stay!

As we are all aware in Line dance circles, dance is a universal language and no one knows that more than ex pat Line dancer Alison Sandes. *Louisa Austin* chats to her about her new start in France



Line dancer Alison and her husband bought a house in St Sulpice Les Feuilles in the county of Limousin in France several years ago and have never looked back. She says, "We had been watching those programmes on the television about relocating to a different country and just decided to do it!"

It took guts and time but they now live in a charming village surrounded by countryside and have no regrets.


Before this radical move, Alison was a Line dancer and had started way back in 1997. At the time, she attended a class run by Jane Johnson in her hometown of Ross – on – Wye. Line dancing was a natural progression for her. She admits: "I have always loved dancing and so found that I really enjoyed the classes..."

After taking the plunge and going to live in France Alison, who works at a

holiday camp, realised she was missing her Line dance. There was no other way but to set up her own class and as she is a very determined lady, she went ahead.

However, things didn't take off quite as she had planned. "It was so quiet at the beginning," she remembers. "I used to sit and think, what have I done!" But good things come to those who wait and true to form, more dancers started to take an interest until Alison found herself with a healthy number of students.





"Every thing is working out really well, to the point where I have two regular classes a week." she says proudly.

Although pretty much fluent in French now, Alison didn't know the language when she arrived in France and so had to try and pick it up as she went along. "There are about three English people in each class but the rest are French. In the beginning it was difficult to get the rapport other classes have because of the language barrier but we are fine now." And like every class in the world, everyone gathers each week, with their problems, their joys, their news, Alison says: "When we get together for our two or three hours a week, we don't just dance, we laugh too! " She adds with a giggle: "As a matter of fact I always have tissues with me because we all end up crying and laughing all at the same time!"

Line dance passion has clearly taken

over Alison and her class, aptly named by her members as Alison's Girls! And the group now regularly perform at events.. "We love performing, the atmosphere is fantastic when everyone gets together." They are also celebrating their fifth birthday soon and Alison says, "I'd like to thank everybody who has supported me since I started."

Alison remembers how she started and wants to pay her dance respects; " I have to thank Jane Johnson, my teacher back home in England, as I know she reads Linedancer. Without Jane, I know I would have never become the Line dancer I am today, nor would I have had the chance of starting something as special as my class in France."

And it is that love that has opened a real window not just for Alison but her dancers as well. "I don't know what I would do without my classes, Line dancing is the best thing in my life."

A Unique Experience

Tribute bands are all the rage it seems these days but only a few survive as the tribute has to be better than the original to satisfy an ever demanding public... Meet Colin Fidoe and Geoff Bate who are better known as the Everlys Experience. A lot of Line dancers may be surprised to know they have already met them under another guise....



Both Colin and Geoff have been performing since they were 12. Colin played bass guitar with The Whirlwinds while Geoff's first band was The Young Ones which was aptly named! All this took place way back in the Sixties and the pair would have to wait until the early Eighties to find chart success, albeit separately. Geoff's band Quartz was a Heavy Metal band and Colin was in a funk band called Capidici, both bands making it in related genre charts in Europe.

Having played for so long, the two men have fond memories of supporting acts like The Searchers, Alvin Stardust, David Bowie, Albert Lee and the Bellamy Brothers amongst many others through the years.

Colin and Geoff, though busy musicians most of their adult lives, still managed to find time to obtain degrees in engineering, leading to successful careers in design, teaching and lecturing.

1997 proved to be a decisive year as the pair, who had met once over a period of 35 years, met again and decided to form a Country/Line dance combo, Easy-Rider.

Though Colin was already well versed in Country as he had spent ten years being part of various Country outfits, Geoff was new to the scene. In July



98, he took the final plunge, left his job and became full time member of Easy-Rider allowing the duo to become a fully professional act. Not only were they then able to travel the country and earn a living but they soon acquired a string of followers and finally, got a nomination for the Linedancer Crystal Boot Awards.

Then in 2000, Colin and Geoff decided to recreate one of their favourite bands of all times. The Everly Experience was born. Both musicians were keen to recreate the well known harmonies of Don and Phil Everly as the original act had been top of the world charts for decades and was still a loved household name.

In 1983, after a ten year bitter split, Don and Phil Everly made a huge comeback at the Royal Albert Hall to universal acclaim. It was that 1983 show and its atmosphere that both Colin and Geoff tried to replicate with The Everlys Experience.

I worked beyond the pair's dreams! With TV and radio appearances all over Europe and guests in theatre shows like 'Country Legends Of The Grand Ole Opry', 'Red Hot Country' and 'Rockin' On Heavens Door', The Everlys Experience became a full time occupation for both Colin and Geoff. Both are currently working with 'In Dreams – The Voice Of Roy Orbison' another show tapping into the magic era of the Sixties.

Both performers wanted to also do something new and decided to up the ante with a new take on what had made them famous. They incorporated both Easy-Rider and The Everlys Tribute in the same show, giving two very different sides of their talent a chance to impress Country lovers and dancers alike. This was a very wise decision because, to date, neither men are complaining as the crowds in attendance to their new show have broken all their previous attendance records number wise.

It certainly seems that the pair's long enduring success is set to continue. It is also a tribute to both musicians of the quality of their prestations and ability of tapping into what their fans like, that they are one of the longest playing duo in the UK and Europe right now.


