

When you read the mixed bag of comments in this month's Between the Lines, regarding competitions I would like to remind you to keep things in perspective. This is a fledgling industry with a lot to learn.

The organisers, promoters, judges, DJ's & MC's who dedicate themselves to running competitions often find themselves in the firing line after the event. Many are regarded as stalwarts of dance and have formed associations, councils and

organisations to set the standards and rules for competitions, professional dance training and qualifications. The majority are motivated by the desire to 'contribute' to the future of line dancing and to them I tip my hat. However, I would be failing my duty to readers if I did not publish the letters of concern send to us.

I am certain that dancers are confused by all the different competitions and titles available and I can't help wondering if this isn't half the problem. Just how many British titleholders can there be? Sometimes it seems a case of too much too soon.

Meanwhile, happily the rest of the dancing community still dance for fun and would run a mile at the thought of a serious competition or title 'fight'. It is with this in mind that Linedancer has teamed up with Helen O'Malley and Rob Fowler to bring you more fun than you can handle in the Club Cabaret Charity Challenge.

This is a challenge with a difference - a big difference. Firstly it is not serious - it is just for fun. It is not for individuals, it is for clubs. There are no rules, just a few guidelines. There are no magnificent prizes, just a bit of glory and a simple trophy. There are no restrictions on dress, music or age, in fact it's a case of almost anything goes. The other big difference is that it is for local charities and every penny will be donated to those causes nominated by clubs taking the Challenge.

If this sounds like your kind of line dance fun, then 'round up' at least 16 dancers to represent your club, raise £10 sponsorship for each dancer and start rehearsing. Watch next month's Linedancer for details of when Helen and Rob will be hosting the Challenge near you. Every penny you raise during the Club Cabaret Charity Challenge will go to local charities. Nothing will be deducted.



Michele retains as Allan Gains

The road to Wembley was a busy and colourful one on Saturday 23rd May, as the red and white shirts, hats and banners of England football supporters mingled with the myriad of colours worn by over five thousand line dancers who converged on Wembley to attend this year's British Line Dancing Championships, held in the Arena.

The Championships, a culmination of a seven-month search for the best British line-dancing talent brought together over 200 finalists from across the land to compete for one of the most coveted titles on the line dancing circuit.

This was the second year of the Championships, the first culminated last October, and was billed as being bigger and better than ever, with special guest Lionel Blair a real coup as line dancing entered the main stream of national entertainment.

So, did it live up to expectations?

Getting things underway at 1.00 pm, DJ Alan Clarke invited everyone onto the floor to dance, followed by Dave Sheriff who introduced this year's judges - Ruth Alias, Liz Clarke, Lyndon Foster, Mona Foster, Hedy McAdams, Pauline Morgan, Pat Murray, Mary Nicholl, Malcolm Owen and Katriona Wiles.

The Junior, Junior Teen and Silver
Division Grand semi-finals were first
up, after which "The Sheriff" got
everyone back onto the floor again,
playing his own brand of country music.
Within minutes the whole floor was
packed with line dancers! A remarkable
sight. A multi-cofoured mass of dancers, all
doing the same steps at the same time - just what
line-dancing is all about!

Junior, Junior Teen and Silver Division Grand Finals came next. Kicking off with the Juniors, aged 12 and under, we were treated to some great dancing from the youngsters, with prizes eventually being awarded to Rosa Lampen in 3rd place, Siobhan Dunn - whose stetson-twirling caught everyone's attention, the white hat being nearly as big as she was! -and winner Scott Lawley from Craven Arms, Shropshire.

ED LAWTON

Winners in the Junior Teen division, aged 13 to 17, were Nichola Hill in 3rd place, Jodie Binsteed in 2nd place and Suzanne Pinder from Bradford on Avon in 1st place.







Will Faeber and his band, playing their original blend of country. Rockin' Western and Blues, provided some great music for everyone to dance to, before the competition resumed with the team semi-finals.

As two stray pigeons found their way into the lighting-grid high above us their timing couldn't have been better, as, right on cue and resplendent in short black skirt and bright red suede fringed jacket, came "Fly Like A Bird" choreographer Hedy McAdams.

Hedy invited everyone onto the floor once more, and taught a new dance "T and G Hurricane". From my high vantage point everyone could be seen to be moving together to Hedy's choreography. Like a conductor of some dancing orchestra, she instructed the assembled from centre stage, dancing around like a petite line-dancing robin!

Runner up was Ed "The Urban Cowboy" Lawton from Stoke on Trent, pipping Steve Dunn from Moreton in Wirral.

Soon the Division 3, Female intermediate competition was nearing its exciting conclusion, with a sparkling array of costumes that proved as eye catching as the routines themselves. But it was the dancing that the judges were here for and they, and the audience, were not disappointed. Coming off of the floor from the final 6, fast year's winner, Michele Etherington from Farnborough, Hampshire, was near to tears as she described the stress of competing.

She needn't have worried - Michele retained her title, thereby winning a holiday to

Nashville for her efforts.

Following the finals of the team competition, and more social dancing for everyone, Dave Sheriff re-appeared to introduce the Division 4 and Division 3 Male and Female Grand Semi-Finals. To the strains of The

Mavericks' Dance the Night Away dancers commenced "Scotia Samba", followed by "King of the Road" and "Any Way The Wind Blows".

Like gladiators entering an arena, competitors spilled onto the huge dance floor. In multi-coloured glittering groups they stood bravely in the glare of the spotlight to perform their dance sequences, and as each round ended, so the tension mounted. The competition this year was fierce - the standard of dancing amazingly good.

As 17 year old lan Hunt, from New Denham, S. Bucks, who made the last six of Division 3, Male Intermediate put it "The competition has a much higher standard than last year. Although it is very tiring it's been a great laugh".

Gavin Brewer, also 17, from Bedford who was competing for the first time, agreed with him and said that he was "enjoying it a lot!". Among the six finalists was Allan Hocking from Rotherham, last year's runner up. With sweat pouring off of him as he left the floor for the final time, he commented - "well - I did well to get into the last six - I can relax now, and go and watch the others!" His modesty and dancing were well-rewarded as later that


evening Allan received the winning trophy from Lionel Blair for the Division 3 Male Intermediate competition -limping onto the stage to receive his award - he had obviously given the Championships all he could. Competing for the first time this year, Anita Machen from Bridlington, East Yorkshire, was taking part in the Female intermediate division. Admitting that it was "nerve-racking", she also said that she thought the Championships had been very good and everyone had been very friendly, and there was a great atmosphere "backstage".

Breaking the tension for the competitors, and giving everyone the chance to return to the dance floor while the judges came to their final decision were The Cheap Seats. Dressed from head to toe in black leather, they kicked off their set with "Something in the Water", which soon had the whole floor doing "The Beast".

Encouraging everyone to stand "Status Quo" fashion with imaginary guitars, and to rock back and forth in front of them, "The Cheapies" orchestrated a mirrorimage of themselves as they swayed backwards and forwards with the crowd. Ending their set with "Brown Eyed Girl" there was a sea of hands, arms and boots, all swaying in time to the music.

As the judges deliberated behind closed doors, Heroes and Villains, dressed in flourescent outfits, not unlike a liquorice allsort, treated everyone to a fun filled display. They were immediately followed by The British Line Dance Display Team which consisting of some of country's most talented young dancers, including Nicholle McNiece, Tina Neale, Amanda

Douglas, Chris Gibbons, Karina Clark, Alan "AC" Clarke - who also choreographs the routines - Lee, Alan and, joined on this occasion, by Johnny Twostep.

After a long, exciting and exhausting day came the moment everyone had been waiting for -The Awards Ceremony and the results of the Championships.

Hosted this year by Lionel Blair, the long table in front of him was filled with a line of shining silver trophies waiting to be collected.

As the results were announced the competitors assembled on stage, received their award and formed a colourful semi-circle. There was little Siobhan Dunn, twirling her white stetson and Michele Etherington in a dress that glittered from head to toe. There was the limping Allan Hocking and the

Rebel Liners Team. But along with the winners were the other competitors who had made the event the success it was. As well as being a wonderful event it was a chance for dancers from across the country to meet and enjoy themselves.

Finally, bounding onto the stage to conclude the evening's celebrations came the petite and action packed



Kimber Clayton. Launching straight into the floor filling Jose Cuervo she looked stunning and sounded great.

As she danced around the Arena, leaping from side seats onto the dancefloor everyone felt part of the show. Finishing with her version of "Addicted to Love", she had everyone dancing and singing along with her.

It was a truly happy ending to the day.







Quality Verses Quantity

I had what I call a "spiritual revelation" a few weeks back. It's that feeling that keeps coming back again and again when I realise something just ain't right. I witnessed first hand at a very large event (2300 Dancers) something I have been hearing for months. Too much "techno" music and instructors who teach too much too fast and think the entire event is for Intermediate and Advanced dancers. Where is the Country Music that brought most of us to the dance scene? Where are the beginner classes? One DJ said to me "It's what they want to hear. They want upbeat and fast and they get bored if they don't learn 20 dances in a weekend."

I walked away shaking my head wondering what we were coming to. I realised it is not the dancers that are becoming bored, it is the DI's and Instructors! Now don't get me wrong, I like Techno Music and dances but not all night. I also know 90% of the dancers can't and don't want to jump. hop and run all night long.

For those of you who don't teach beginners, listen up...

The truth is... instructors, if you don't slow down and start teaching some basics you are going to be teaching less and less students. Dj's, if you don't lay off of some of the Techno Music, you will be seeing less and less dancers. Our industry depends on new people coming in all the time. As dancers become more advanced they become bored faster and may dance less frequently. In the early nineties we had ten new people for everyone who became advanced and left. By 1997 we had three for every one leaving. Clubs began closing and dancers began searching for the hot spots thus keeping some of the venues packed. This gave the illusion that Intermediate and Advanced dancers were the norm. WRONG!! It's amazing to me the numbers dancing who have no "basics" under their belt and fundamentals is a foreign word.


Whose fault is this? Well, some instructors who have become better are now bored and so they teach for themselves first and the dancers second. Your instructor may or may not be trained and she/he is busy taking care of the 15-20 advanced dancers who want to learn five new dances in a night. As a beginner you try to keep up but if you fail you may say "to hell with it".

Instructors, slow down and let those who are new benefit from your instruction. Those of you who are advanced, be kind to those who are now wearing the shoes you wore once. Don't forget to review the dance the next week for those who didn't make it the first time. It also gives those who did a chance to make sure they got it right. If you thought it was good enough to teach the first time, it should be good enough to review.

You may say I'm not a dancer but I am travelling around the world and I hear the same thing over and over again so all the dancers can't be wrong.

The truth is, it has always been better to deliver quality instead of quantity!

Have you it it. Color Harry Seddon Investigates the recent chronic outbreak of CLDS

That's it then! It's official! I can't deny it any longer! The diagnosis is beyond doubt and I've had a second opinion. Of course, I always suspected that I had it, but it still comes as a shock when it's there in black and white. In a way,

it's a relief that the uncertainty and walting are over and you just have to face up to the fact that that's it. I suppose that there's no easy way to break the news, but when the plain white foolscap envelope arrives there is no indication of

The Gowboys Sho



On reading 'Turn It Loose Fellas' in the May issue Harry Seddon also spotted the lack of 'fellas strutting their stuff' on the hardwood. There are two sides to every story, so the saying goes, so here's a 'Cowboy's Tale'.

Whilst, as a mere male, I would not dare to take issue with any of the points raised, I do feel that I should put a word in for us 'cowboys', not by way of excuse but as possible reasons why men stay away from line dancing. Even more importantly, if we can identify why men 'can't or won't dance', maybe we can come up with a solution to entice them to our classes and dances.

Clearly, if the 'angels' come to classes as a form of 'girls night out', not everyone will want to encourage more men to dance and if this is the case at your class, your instructor should respect your wishes.

If, however, you are an instructor running a small class, then it might be essential for the survival of your group to encourage more members, even if this means your new members are men!

There is without any doubt whatsoever, an untapped reservoir of potential new dancers out there in the form of men, and we, as an industry, would be foolish to ignore this opportunity.

It is fair to say that line dancing is female dominated. A review of Country Western Dance Council (UK) members, reveals that of the 360

who declared their sex, (that is, who did not identify themselves by initial alone), 45% declared they are female and a massive 85% are either female or are a female and male partnership, leaving a mere 15% as males. This does not justify the lack of male line dancers, but is maybe part of the reason why men do not beat a path to our doors, they perceive it as a female domain.

It is also a fact that some men think that dancing is not for 'real men' and there could be merit in John Stapleton's suggestion that we hold 'participative entertainment sessions', instead of line dance classes. Of more concern than the 'real men don't dance brigade', are those men who do not have strong views

against dancing, but go along with the male macho stereotype in saying that dancing is not for men. It is this category that might be put off by believing that line dancing is a female 'thing'. However, this group could be influenced if we approach the opportunity correctly. We must all, men particularly, nail our colours to the mast, or should that be flag to the stockade? And, whilst not actually wearing a big badge saying 'I'M A LINE DANCER', declare our commitment to and love of line dancing, without fear of ridicule.

If sufficient men stand up to be counted, more men could be tempted to give it a try and, as we all know, once tried often convinced.

Another potential bone of contention with men is the growing influence of 'girl orientated' moves in dances. In this I include hip bumps, sways, rolls, wiggles - and the scourge of cowboys everywhere - shoulder shimmies. A survey of the last 170 dances listed in 'Steppin' off the page', shows 21% contained hip movements and 8% shoulder shimmies. Knowing that Linedancer Magazine selects it's dances to provide a good balance, I suspect that these percentages are low, compared with the total of dances currently being choreographed.

So, come on choreographers, give the guys a break. Not too many of the moves we like to see the ladies perform but are unconvincing at ourselves.

It is strange that modern society should perceive dancing as a female activity, because a journey back in time would reveal a different story with a lot of traditional dances being male only.

If we are to believe that cowboys started line dancing, what sex were they, and who performed Indian war dances? In Britain you never saw a female Morris Dancer until a few years ago and at a time when dance was considered part of the courtship ritual, the Dancing Master was a very respected person.



In my opinion it is an image problem, a friend of mine thinks that I am rather strange because I dance in lines, surrounded by ladies, four times a week wearing cowboy clothes, (not that I do wear cowboy clothes, other than boots, but that is the image he has of line dancers). This from a man who spends his spare time

at the leisure centre, dressed in multi-coloured tights, with a bag of chalk around his waist, climbing up a make-believe rock face!.

This does not bother me in the slightest, but I can see that this type of attitude could dissuade some men from giving it a try and send them running back to the bar for a 'pint of comfort'.

I know that we won't change these entrenched ideas overnight, and maybe we don't want to, but is there anything we can do to entice more men out onto the hardwood? If we had an extra one guy for every two gals dancing, the boost to numbers would be dramatic.




I don't have the answer to enable us to seize this opportunity, but knowing what a great community the line dance family is, I am confident that someone out there in 'Linedancerland' will share their secret with us. In the meantime though, 'let's hear it for the ladies', in appreciation of their continued support, but ask ourselves, 'where have all the fellas gone?'

Finally a heartfelt plea to all the cowgirls out there, please be angels too and, stand by us men, give us a line to stand in, be proud of us and give us all the help you can.'

After all, WE'RE ONLY MEN'.

by Debra Williams It could be said that Nottingham's 'Kickin' 'Kate Sala was destined to be a dance instructor, the prediction having been made at a tender age. But although Kate possessed an early passion for dance, it was the casual, almost tomboy image of cowboy boots and thumbs in belt-loops which drew her into line-dancing. Not one for tutu's and tiaras, line-dancing became the perfect outlet for those skills recognised by her childhood dance tutor. "When I was five I started dance classes in ballet, stage, modern and tap. By the time I reached the age of ten, my teacher told my parents Kate will never make a ballerina, but she'll make a great dance instructor'." Kate puts this success down to her computer-type memory, which almost automatically logs and files the trickiest steps into her brain with ease. With her natural sense of rhythm and co-ordination, as well as proficient organisational skills, she rates these talents as probably the most fundamental for teaching a line-dance class. Kate's overwhelming eagerness for dance is thoroughly contagious and she now teaches four classes in and around the Nottingham area. Ever smiling, and always enthusiastic. she claims that her easy going nature is another ingredient which is essential when entertaining and teaching a group. been active, and I've always enjoyed dancing - whatever I'm happy." This aspect of Kate's personality was in evidence when

"I'm a fun-loving person, it's just my character. I've aiways the music, whatever the dance. When I'm dancing,

Linedancer Magazine caught up with her at a social event at the Richmond Holiday Centre in Skegness, where her reputation had spread to event host Maurice White, leader of the 'Skegness Six', who hired her as instructor and presenter for the evening.

Seemingly inexhaustible, Kate performed every dance, step perfect, that the DJ played throughout the evening. Her tireless contribution was one of the major factors of the successful night, which resulted in a repeat booking in November when Rob Fowler will attend.

Kate, however, is quick to point out that not all her achievements can be attributed to herself. Her in-depth knowledge of line-dancing is fed to her daily by her DJ partner of six years, Russ, known as Jazzy Joe.

"A big part of my success is Russ. He buys every linedance magazine he can find and reads them cover to cover. He also buys all the current CDs and is totally

up-to-date with the music and the new trends. He constantly nags me to learn the new dances which he knows will be popular."

This is a business relationship which thrives on the close bonds between the two partners - bonds which Kate often feels are somewhat psychic! "We perform separately, Russ as DJ and myself presenting, but somewhere along the line we are linked. There is never an organised set list of dances we play, they are mostly requests, but very often Russ will play a song and people think I must know what it is going to be, but I don't. Once, after a hectic dance, I casually said that I was feeling 'all shook up', just as Russ put on that track. We read each other, Russ can mouth something across a room and I understand him fully where I wouldn't some-one else. It's totally instinctive."

It almost seems like Kickin' Kate and Jazzy Joe never did anything else, although less than two years ago line dancing played no part in either of their lives. Kate's first taste of line dancing came at a class with the dance 'Copperhead Road'. Immediately hooked, her skills increased and she subsequently attended a B.W.D.A teaching course. Once on that 'copperhead' road, the first dances she taught were 'Honky Tonk Stomp'

and 'Birchwood Stroll'. Her current favourite is Love Letters, though her all-time number one is the heart-thumping, leg-plaiting Rob Fowler creation 'The Beast'.

Watching from the side-lines, Russ became avidly interested in the range of music associated with the classes. Inevitably he became Kate's regular DJ, and it was then that their double-act flourished. Today the pair are as enthusiastic about line-dancing as they were in the beginning. As they showed at Skegness - as a couple, they make a great partnership, and as a partnership, they make a great couple!

Have you ever wondered as you scooted, vined, and shuffled, who it was that took the time to define all those dance terms, and standardise them so that you can find consistency wherever you dance?

Kelly Gellette, one of the people responsible for this, visited Paris recently where Maureen Jessop met her. This is her story.

'At three years old, my mother decided I must learn to dance. She thought that I should be another Shirley Temple,' laughed The First Lady of Country Western Dance, a tiny bundle of energy.

Originally from the Chicago area, Kelly has danced all her life,ballet, jazz and ballroom included. At 10 I started doing ballroom. The boys wouldn't dance with the girls because they were scared, but they'd dance with a little ol'kid like me!'

From these early experiences, a natural progression was into teaching. While teaching at the famous Arthur Murray studios she met her future husband Jim and the couple progressing to the ownership of dance studios in the Mid-West. After some professional dance experience in shows, films and TV they somehow ended up in Las Vegas, where they still live today. I thought he wanted to move there and he thought that I did!'

Las Vegas led to dancing in, and training dancers for, casino shows as well as opening another dance studio called after her South American Ocelot Baya -Kelly has owned Ocelots for over 30 years, using them in films, TV and publicity.

In the '80's, she became involved in CW 'There were a lot of people teaching who didn't really have a background in dance. They knew i had and they wanted me to help them and that's how the NTA(National Teachers Association) got started.'

The aim of the NTA was to help teachers - not to train them - but in 1990/91 a syllabus was put together by Kelly and a teacher training programme with graded level tests was developed. This was not a certifying course. Kelly presided over the NTA from 1990 to 1994 when she stepped down to concentrate on the accreditation programme before being re-elected as President in 1996.

A need to standardise dance terminology was felt necessary because when CW started up in the late 1970's there was little standardisation. People had no background in dance, the steps and patterns had different names in different parts of the States. "We took surveys, and people told us what they wanted steps to be called. We used these surveys to put together the programme but it's not my programme." she insists.

Nowadays, with dancers coming from a good background of dance, such as the Master's level dancers, the technique is a lot better 'Which some people don't like because it is taking away from what THEY call Country' Kelly sees this as quite normal as it happens in other styles of dancing too, every time there is competition.

Kelly seems a tolerant person and has no objections to influences from other modern dance styles including jazz and hip-hop. However, she does not recommend teachers teaching the styles to people not capable of doing them. This is her 'pet hate' as her estimation of a good teacher is one who understands the people they work with.

'Hit the level of the classes they are teaching,' as she puts it. These teachers need not necessarily be the best dancers or technicians in her opinion.

The NTA programme and tests do not lead to a qualification as Kelly feels this is saying that one teacher is better than another. The accreditation programme consists of a series of workshops ,either given by herself or one of the other committee members - all of



whom test each other to maintain standards. These workshops expose the material, terminology, step patterns, moves, weight changes and foot positions.

This 'practical testing' is backed up by 'theory' in the form of a hefty manual with practical and written tests taken at 9 levels in line and couples dancing.

Kelly believes that serious CW dance teachers should try to take lessons in other dance styles, even belly-dancing. 'Good for isolating the different parts of the body.' Music lessons too, give a better understanding she feels.

Regarding 'keeping it country' Kelly Gellette is not against using other forms of music to dance to, especially if Nashville is not producing good danceable music. It can even be good for improvising different styles 'We dance cha-cha and polka to 2-step music.' Always progressive, she believes we have to go with the times.

This remarkable lady was not only involved in dance, but was also an accomplished sportswoman, a swimmer and diver, tennis player and

former ski instructor. In 1990, a student fell into her and tore ligaments in her legs and hips which put an end to her dancing.

'My biggest concern is teacher training' and to this end she travels all over North American and Europe. Next year she hopes to go to Australia. She also judges for major competitions and has written a series of books 'The Complete Kelly Gellette CW Dance Library' covering everything from line, partner and couple dances including technique and terms.

She feels line dancers will eventually get away from wearing western style clothes 'Which is a shame, because the whole idea of CW dancing is the outfit.'

Looking to the future, Kelly is optimistic about CW dance.'CW is not going to go away. As long as you have people who can dance to decent music in a decent place you're going to have fun for both 2-steppers and line dancers. What's so great about line dancing is it allows people who don't have partners to get up and do what is good exercise. I could go on forever about that!'

Think co-op, think high street supermarket and store with banking facilities. But think co-op in Derby and you will find a group of instructors and DJs who are forging close bonds to strengthen links between classes in their area.

The principle is one of unity - one for all and all for one - as these pioneering 'Musketeers' explained the logic behind, and the benefits for, a line-dancing co-operative.

The alliance consists of two instructors, Sunny Tynan of the Derby and Rotherham 'Hotshots', and Allan Pratt of Derby based 'Cowboy Boogle', along with line-dance DJs Tony Akers and Nigel Gaunt. The reason for their association is simple - they feel it is beneficial for dancers. instructors, the future of the dance form and our industry as a whole.

DJ Tony takes the credit for the original idea. His daytime job operates a shift working pattern which meant he couldn't always attend his usual line-dance class, so he joined Allan's group to keep up with the new dances whilst still continuing to DJ for the 'Hotshots'. He discovered that many pupils attended both classes, some because they enjoyed both groups, others merely because of the convenience of the day or venue. The seed of an idea had been sown.

He said "So that each group's events didn't clash throughout the year, I approached Allan with the view of running joint socials. From some of the stories I have read in Linedancer Magazine, this could have led to a stand-up fight, but he enthused and we got together. We are all mature enough not to expect to be the sole act in our area."

The benefits of joining forces to arrange social events are many, but Tony ranks the expense of running one as probably the most important.

"The cost of putting on a big event can be quite daunting for one small club. Big rooms with large dance floors can be costly to rent, then if there is a live band to book the expense is even greater. By merging two clubs together these expenses are split, and the overheads are more likely to be recouped with the extra ticket sales from two classes. It makes an event viable, and when the dance floor is full there is always a great atmosphere."

So far the amalgamation has proved effective. Successive socials attract increasing numbers and they are becoming welcome get-togethers of old friends without a hint of the rivalry and antagonism occasionally aired on our 'Between the Lines' pages.




BROOKS AND DUNN - IF YOU SEE HER ARISTA RECORDS & & & & & & D. D. D. J.

What you notice immediately about a Brooks and Dunn album is the outstanding production, the unique twang of Ronnie Dunn's voice and the raw energy of Kix Brooks' vocal delivery. It has a stamp which no other Nashville act can match.

There are only a couple of real uptempo belters on this collection with the main feel veering towards the moody and dreamy but if quality makes up for quantity we're quids in!

YOUR LOVE DON'T TAKE A BACKSEAT FOR NOTHING is a 132bpm nod to the previous album's MAMA DON'T GET DRESSED UP FOR NOTHING but is just as infectious, a storming thumper for which I already have a vision of Pedro Machardo in hat spinning, floor sparkling flight.

WAY GONE, 158bpm is more BOOT SCOOTIN' BOOGIE, a jumping tonker which is ideal for a host of dances like Hot Tamales and Tush Push. Could have been recorded by BR5-49.



Less lively but still motivating are the picture painting 126bpm triple step BORN AND RAISED IN BLACK AND WHITE, which Mark Collie originally recorded, and BRAND NEW WHISKEY (123bpm) which is about as country a strutter as you can get.

HOW LONG GONE, the album's opener is a first class 114bpm shuffle, great guitar riff, beautiful melody, a catchy

chorus and a sure fire country radio hit which will have a useful place on the dance floor.

Other shuffles / cha chas are I CAN'T GET OVER YOU (99bpm) wich a hint of Neon Moon about it, SOUTH OF SANTA FE (107bpm), moody and sombre and WHEN LOVE DIES (102bpm) a reflective late night swayer.

There are two out and out belly rubbers, the beautiful YOU'RE MY ANGEL, fast enough but not meaty enough for the dance floor at 87bpm. The massive hit IF YOU SEE HER is the other, a duet (or should that be triplet) with Reba McEntire, and an 83bpm power ballad that, accompanied by a red rose and a box of Milk Tray would turn a girlie's heart to slush.

The only remaining track is HUSBANDS AND WIVES, a remake of the Roger Miller standard, a 106bpm waltz which really hits the soft spot, an indictment of modern day relationships to embarrass anyone whose pride has ever got in the way of love. Outstanding Try it for Waltz Across Texas.

Despite again and unsportingly refusing to include any dance scripts or tempo listings in the sleeve notes, America's top country twosome have continued to come up with the goods. The words dynamic and duo spring to mind.

BR5-49 - BIG BACKYARD BEAT SHOW ARISTA RECORDS @ @ @ ji ji ji ji



BR 5-49's eponymous first studio album was a cracker, a breath of fresh air that was in contradiction to the predictable Music City same-ole sound. Having been the house band, playing for tips, at Robert's Western Wear Bar on Nashville's Broadway, Arista took a chance on the retro hillbilly outfit which were creating such a stir around town.

But that was nearly two years ago.

BIG BACKYARD BEAT SHOW is the long overdue follow-up, eagerly awaited by anyone who got hooked on the unique talents of these five quirky musicians which, in line dancing terms meant tracks like CHEROKEE BOOGIE, HONKY TONK SONG, LITTLE RAMONA, EVEN IF IT'S WRONG, and ONE LONG SATURDAY NIGHT - a mighty hard act to follow! So, hoofers and scooters are we in for another onslaught? Will the BR boom bombard us in the same way we embraced May mania? Most likely yes....And track by track, here's why:

THERE GOES MY LOVE (120bpm) kicks off, a fresh and heartfelt interpretation of the old Buck Owens hit. Pedal steel, honky tonk piano, fiddle and Hawk Shaw Wilson's shuffling back beat. Huge hardwood hit.

REAL WILD CHILD (145bpm) is the old Johnny O'Keefe rocker from the 50s which re-emerged in the 80s as a hit for Iggy Pop and is an Elvis meets The Grease Soundtrack cool cat kickin' cut. Hit.

The dual tempo 90/180 bpm HURTIN' SONG seems to be a compromise, an attempt to record a song which will get mainstream airplay on US country radio. It ain't bad but it offers nothing special and is probably the album's weakest track. Miss.

Back to business with OUT OF HABIT though, a 165bpm rockabilly swinger, penned by one of the two lead vocalists, Chuck Mead, that hums with Jay McDowell's upright bass and smacks of juke joint atmosphere. Hep hit.

STORYBOOK ENDINGS (IF YOU STOP BELIEVIN'), written by the other lead vocalist Gary Bennett, is marvellous, a swiftly swaying 147bpm waltz that captures the essence of lost love in a dreamy, bobby sox and popsicle kind of way. Twinkle and twirl, 2, 2, 3. Hit.

EIGHTEEN WHEELS AND A CROWBAR is the anchor of a BR5-49 live set which first appeared on their LIVE AT ROBERTS mini album. A 135bpm jangly guitar lead angry trucking song it is a sleazy, sinister strutter. Hit.

PAIN PAIN GO AWAY (181bpm) is a jolly double two step with sad and sombre lyrics, a combination which the BRs achieve so superbly. Hir

YOU ARE NEVER NICE TO ME is a fast and furious 262/131bpm swing tune of Bob Wills influence. Another Gary Bennett original. Hit.

Und jetzt meine Damen und Herren, ein POLKA! And guess what, it's about a girl called Maria, seemingly the only female name you are allowed to use in a country lyric. GOODBYE MARIA at 126bpm 4/4

time into 156bpm 3/4 time will motivate anyone with Bavarian blood to don some lederhosen and give the Von Trapps a run for their money. If someone comes up with a dance to match the mood and phrasing of the song, huge holsten hit.

SEVEN NIGHTS TO ROCK brings us back to familiar territory, a 189bpm ducktailed hairdo rocking stomper. Hit.

More than a shade of Guy Mitchell's HEARTACHES BY THE NUMBER in the next cut, the 125bpm MY NAME IS MUDD, a gen-u-ine shuffler that would make Ray Price proud. Written by Chuck Mead but could have been plucked from any Opry superstar's catalogue. Heavenly honky tonk hit.

More high energy swinging in the form of YOU FLEW THE COUP comes next, a 124/248bpm Cowboy Charleston which showcases each of the five superb musicians brilliantly. Hee haw hit.

CHANGE THE WAY I LOOK is maybe another 'filler', a 178bpm rockabilly rouser that neither excites nor disappoints. Just OK.

Last up is the I34bpm GEORGIA ON A FAST TRAIN which was written by Billy Joe Shaver and was a hit for Johnny Cash, appearing here in a much more upbeat, chirpy version. Great song so you can't go wrong. Hit.

On balance not quite as aspirational as its predecessor, mainly because there isn't any one stand out track as there was with CHEROKEE BOOGIE before, but this is still a mighty good album and it deserves to find its way into most collections.

LEANN RIMES SITTING ON TOP OF THE WORLD HIT LABEL & & & D

What a success HOW DO I LIVE? has been. Triple platinum, a hit all over the world and still in the UK charts after four months, this moving Diane Warren ballad is LeAnn's new 'career' song (eclipsing

BLUE) and the reason she is causing a stir across the country.

This album, featuring the famous ballad, though not its dance mix equivalent, is a 16 track assortment of complimentary

material. As such only a handful of cuts are of any use on the hardwood floor

although in musical terms this is a terrific line up.

Dance stuff first though and the only real uptempo number is ROCK ME (147bpm), a raunchy country blues number with a Rolling Stones backbeat. The rest are slower, the 118bpm SITTIN' ON TOP OF THE WORLD is a classy cha cha, NOTHING NEW UNDER THE MOON (120bpm) a stirring chugger, SURRENDER (122bpm) a building shuffle, UNDENIABLE (100bpm) a gutsy drifter and COMMITMENT, the new single at 109bpm a quixotic animated cha cha.

Other slower stuff that could be used: LeAnn's admirable song-writing debut MORE THAN ANYONE DESERVES (92bpm), INSENSITIVE (90bpm) and LOOKING THROUGH THE EYES OF LOVE (81bpm) which is the theme from the movie "The Magic Sword - Quest For Camelot".

The rest are for the settee or the car and include another Diane Warren song, FEELS LIKE HOME plus an interesting version of Prince's PURPLE RAIN.

There are some very good songs here and the youngun's voice is mature way beyond her 15 years so if you're a fan of HOW DO I LIVE you'll be happy enough with the rest of this set.

In a 'Stars In Their Eyes' world of course this would be an album by Leann Battersby and would include Janice and Toyah on backing vocals with Gary Mallett on drums. Just think of the possibilities, Rita Sullivan as Reba McEntire, Des Barnes as Garth Brooks, Vera Duckworth as Scooter Lee, Ashley Peacock as Alan Jackson, Samantha Failsworth as Shania Twain, Jack Duckworth as Dave Sheriff, Steve MacDonald as Ethan from The Cheap Seats, Audrey Roberts as Trisha Yearwood, Natalie Horrocks as Dolly Parton. Now who would Fred Elliot be? Of course, give him a beard and he's Raul from The Mavericks! Ken Barlow? Mmmmmmm.....

THE MOST AWESOME LINE DANCING ALBUM VOLUME 2

EMI MUSIC FOR PLEASURE & & D D D D D If you're not careful you could overlook this. EMI have stupidly (for them) and naively (to our advantage) released this as a budget/mid price album which has uninspiring packaging and an appalling list of dance suggestions that must surely been picked at random out of a hat.

However, to overlook this excellent value for money 20 track collection is to overlook a goldmine of line dance material. Because, for all its marketing shortcomings this is as good a track listing as you could wish for, the best of previously inaccessible Australian material coupled with some Nashville corkers.

Australia's answer to Garth Brooks is Lee Kernaghan and he has 2 cuts here, the classic OUTBACK CLUB (155bpm) for Gordon Elliot's Outback and the excellent CHATAHOOCHEE sound-a-like SKINNY DIPPIN' (173bpm) for Dougie Laing's dance of the same name. Lee's sister Tania pops up with the 152bpm strutter BOYS IN BOOTS (a kind of country THESE BOOTS ARE MADE FOR WALKIN') and another Antipodean babe, Gina Jeffries supplies GIRLS NIGHT OUT, a 177bpm clap-along chugger for Terry Hogan's line dance.

Roger Miller's son Dean has the best track from his album included, the superb 122bpm honky tonk strutter, I FEEL BAD. There is the cajun feast that is Charlie Daniels' 188bpm FAIS DO DO, the western swing two step SHE CAMETO DANCE (152bpm) by Asleep At The Wheel, the rockabilly classic WILD SIDE OF LIFE supplied here by Pirates Of The Mississippi in 167bpm grandeur and the happy, clappy, strutty, twisty, versatile TWO DOLLARS IN THE JUKEBOX (135bpm) by the recently deceased and ludicrously named Eddie Rabbitt.

Then there are the stompers and slappers, Billy Dean gives us the 159bpm HAMMER DOWN, Chris Ledoux weighs in with the socking 157bpm CADILLAC RANCH, Steven Wayne Horton the infectious 148bpm ROLL OVER, Tanya Tucker the 166bpm WALKIN' SHOES and Ricky Lynn Gregg the slower but no less powerful 126bpm IF I HAD A CHEATIN' HEART which is an ideal teacher song for most upbeat dances.

Other slower tracks are the 120bpm STAY THE NIGHT by George Ducas, John Berry's superb KISS ME IN THE CAR (121bpm) and Pearl River's GOOD THING GOING (116bpm) all of which have a solid, driving rhythm and work well on the floor. Fastest track on the album is Dan Seals' LOVE ON ARRIVAL (196bpm), a fabulous two step and the slowest is Lacy J.Dalton's cover of the Everly Brothers' LOVE HURTS at 95bpm.


Pick of the entire bunch though is the brilliant sing-a-long stomper LIFE IS GOOD (143bpm) by Tex Mex star Emilio which was almost custom made for Bill Bader's Vancouver Boogie. "Where the band is hot and the beer is cold, folks round here have a lot of soul, life is good and I'm gonna keep it that way....." Totally infectious and one of the best songs never to have been a hit. Should have been the lead track on the album.

Don't let this pass you by. A gem.

JILL MORRIS - JUST ONE KISS BMG ARIOLA IMPORT & & & & D D D D

Due to support from a number of keen admirers (choreographer Chris Hodgson and Redneck Records' Bob Farrington to name but two), Jill Morris' second album for Ariola has begun to attract much

interest in the line dance market.



It is only available as a European import and is unlikely to get a UK release but is worthy of comment as the word is out on this attractive German born songbird. Her previous album's LIMBO is a dance hit already and has been featured on BOOT

SCOOTIN' BOOGIE VOLUME 2, so we'd better take a listen and see what this new collection has to offer.

I GET SO RATTLED is the track causing most stir, a splendid I19bpm shimmying strutter for the dance Ready Steady and a seedy accompaniment to boot. But there are several others worthy of mention.

The old Tams hit BE YOUNG BE FOOLISH BE HAPPY, revisited by Sonia in the early 90s is given a 136bpm beach feel by JM and will accompany the summer sunshine just perfectly. Maybe not as exciting as the original but a respectable version nonetheless.

Angela Kasset's RUNAWAY LOVE (she wrote SOMETHING IN RED for Lorrie Morgan) is a thumping 136bpm chugger which has true energy, LOVEY DOVEY (130bpm) a Reba like country funk growler, EVERYTHING ABOUT YOU a 121bpm strut in similar vein and title track JUST ONE KISS (138bpm) is a pastiche of a number of different influences and the chorus of which is identical to The Honeycombs number one hit HAVE I THE RIGHT. Even so, the latter is another great sing song tune.

I LOVE THAT BOY is the pick of the pack, a 131bpm ultra catchy join-in-and-holler shuffle which for some reason reminds me of Wizzard's SEE MY BABY JIVE.

There's a waltz, the 93bpm DON'T SAY A WORD and a couple of slow cha chas, the rocky 92bpm SHOT FULL OF LOVE plus the passionate 80bpm LOVE ME OUT OF MY MIND (I love it when you talk dirty |ill!).

The very gentle and moving 72bpm ONE MOMENT IN THE SUN penned by two of the best modern songwriters, Kostas and Pat Alger is a tad too slow for dancing as is the 66bpm I'LL NEVER SAY NEVER AGAIN but this too is a beautiful song.

This is an album that grows on you the more you hear it and unlike some of her contemporaries, who draw inevitable comparisons, Jill Morris has the talent as a singer and picker of fine songs to go the distance.

Zehr gut Jill.

LISA ERSKINE - SEE YOU ON THE OTHER SIDE SOUTHBOUND RECORDS & & & D. D. D. J.

Lisa Erskine's album has been released in the UK as a direct result of Peter Metelnick's interest in her music and their forthcoming autumn tour, which has been organised by John Matthews.

This is not a customised line dance album and you won't find tempo listings and dance suggestions. It is a straight-ahead country album by a talented and developing Canadian singer/songwriter and it is jolly good; endearing vocals and commendable production enhancing the fine choice of songs which were co-written by Lisa and Johnny Douglas, who claims knob-twiddling duties.

Uptempo wise there is LOSIN' END, a 169bpm cajun flavoured two step, NOT SO FAST, a 162bpm honky tonk strut with catchy chorus, CAN'T BUY MY LOVE a 184bpm triple step and the 159bpm I COULD LOVE A GUY, another cajun two step which is reminiscent of early Trisha Yearwood material.

There are three ballads too slow for dancing but of these I KNOW WHERE YOU ARE is very pretty, SUMMER ROSE an even prettier sweet love story and THE OTHER SIDE OF LONELY a gorgeous romantic summer evening hold-hands-and-sigh mood setter.

DIG A LITTLE DEEPER (91bpm) is a slow strutter but building rouser, TAKE IT TO HEART (115bpm) a bluesy rocker with interesting key changes and title track SEE YOU ON THE OTHER SIDE (123bpm) an uptempo cha cha not dissimilar to Martina McBride's INDEPENDENCE DAY in structure which stands out as the album's best cut.

It may be a while before Lisa Erskine challenges the likes of Shania Twain or Patricia Conroy in the Canadian country music awards but on the strength of this album it may not be out of the question.

MAVERICKS IN HYDE-ING



It's a piece of cake

The catch-phrase of one of the founder fathers of CW dancing is not so well-known in Britain - yet!

American Barry Durand is a champion dancer, top instructor and original choreographer who keeps the emphasis on fun!

Catch one of his classes and you'll see that dancing really is, as he tells us, 'a piece of cake'.

Maureen Jessop met Barry at the UCWDC European Championships in Holland where the versatile man was judging, giving workshops in line and couples as well as giving a cabaret performance.

'The reason I first took lessons in Country in a Country bar was to meet girls!' admits Barry with a grin. That was way back in 1976! Quite a surprise perhaps for those who may think it is a new craze. Yes, people where Tush Pushing over 20 years ago!

It is hard to believe that Barry had to go to all that trouble to meet the girls with his charming, easy-going personality and mischievous eyes and grin.

It is has been to our advantage that he did. Discovering that he had talent for dancing he also took up disco, jazz, ballet and tap. He also began teaching dance in various parts of the States. As well as teaching, Barry choreographs not only line but also dance routines for teams and shows.

'I like it all!' states Durand, when asked for a preference,"I love teaching because I like being on stage. When I teach, I've got a captive audience and they laugh at my jokes. They are stuck with me for an hour and I have as much fun as I can. In performing, I get to do my comedy for I,000 people instead of 100!" You will see what he means if you get the opportunity to catch a tongue-in-cheek routine such as YMCA!

Now spending as many as forty five weekends a year on the road he used to own a dance saloon and studio in Washington DC, the capitol being the home of his annual competitive event the UCWDC 'The Eastern Invitational' now in its eleventh year and attracting up to 2,000 people.

I was the first Country guy to win the US Swing Championships twice, in my hat and boots! he added, proudly. In swing circles they call him 'That Country Guy' and in Country he is known as 'The Swing guy!', but according to Barry 'Dancing is Dancing!' This is also his feeling about the controversy around the modern moves and music. 'If they're going to dance, and the music makes them then I'm happy with that!' He thinks it is significant that now pop bands, Rednex for example, have revamped oldies such as 'Cotton-Eyed Joe' and given them the techno beat that appeals to the teenagers. 'If it makes them move - Let's do it!'

In his travels Barry has noticed that Europeans currently have the enthusiasm that the Americans gained years earlier. 'The level of dance is so good at this point, It really has escalated over the last three or four years. Then people were barely starting to touch the surface but now I feel line dancers in Europe are better than in the States!"

To prove his statement he adds, 'At this year's World Championships in Nashville half of the line dancers were from overseas and they more than held their own!'

Durand feels that the reverse is true for couples dancing which still has a long way to go outside America. His theory is that line dancing brings in new people, it teaches them to move, improves balance and footwork. Many then move on to couple dancing. He believes in teaching it as a line dance first, then match up the men and women.

From his 20 years experience, he can see that CW dancing goes in waves, believing that it is only going to get bigger and bigger in the future.

Always the innovator, Barry has been working recently in what is a new field for him, choreographing line dances to the songs of singer lill Morris. This was an enriching experience providing the opportunity to work with musicians, getting them to understand what dance is all about.'I helped them chose the music and helped them re-write it so it would fit line dances. There are very few Country artists who really understand music for line dancing."

Plans for the future include settling down to married life with Kathleen his fiancée. He would also like to travel further, Australia for example. 'They haven't experienced me yet!' He jokes. He would like to help younger people get started, believing that 'They should be out on the road now

Elected to the exclusive Country Western Dance Hall of Fame in 1997, Barry declares himself the youngest of the 'famous foursome' made up of Dave Getty, Mike Haley and Jeff Bartholomew.

Durand feels satisfied that his contribution to the development of dance over the years had been recognised by his peers, They woke up and saw that fun is what we're supposed to be having!"


On the agenda is the revival of the equestrian interest at Rancho Texas with ponies, carriages and horses for riding and showing.

There are probably several thousand line dance instructors around the country who have 'dipped' into their pockets and invested in CD and cassette players, record decks, amplifiers, speakers, and a never-ending stream of vinyl, tapes and CDs to play. For many it will have taken more than twelve months to recover this outlay. Some may now be making money.

Those of us who are heavily involved in line dancing or who work parttime at it have made a simple career move. Like prospectors in the Old West we can pack a bag, gather together our experiences, and move on if the vein peters out. A brave few have, however, committed themselves right down to their 'last cowhide'. They are true pioneers. Hopefully, others will take heart from their courage and follow the 'open trail'.

Debbie Hogg and Sandra Butler are such pioneers, for they have opened a dedicated line dance venue in Norwich, at the old Rollerdrome on Plumstead Road. Called The Wild Stallion Dance Ranch, a principal aim is value for money. It is to be run as a club with a nominal annual membership and fixed entrance fee to members, it will open every night of the week with established programmes.

The site has a 5000 square foot maple dance floor, it includes a bar, a games room - for non-dancing spouses, family, or friends perhaps - and equally important for a busy city venue it has ample on- site car parking.

This is a true business venture, it is new territory, but it is primarily a dream, Yet so far it has been, and will continue to be, an all-consuming, never-ending, exploration into the unknown which could take over one's life.

So businesses need to make their own luck. They have to have a proper plan, a business plan. Every finance house demands a comprehensive plan before advancing any venture capital, or even in the provision of loans to established profitable firms whatever their pedigree. Money-men do not expect the plan to be a rigid unchanging document. That is not the point of a plan; a plan is nothing but planning is everything.

It means that the amount of thought, careful consideration of issues, costing of ideas,

weighing alternatives, and the assessment of options helps to ensure little is neglected. Each of the resulting parameters becomes a standard against which results can be measured. You are able to see how well you are doing.

Debbie, and Sandra have been along that trail; they have fought their 'Indians', dealt with 'rustlers', and coped with cash droughts, storms of every nature, and floods of tears maybe - a metaphorical warfare known only to entrepreneurs with a dream.



The Wild Stallion will continue to have the pressures experienced by all other businesses, old and new; where is its market now and what is going to be its future market? That is the dream that produces sleepless nights.

The two girls have however done their homework. By establishing early objectives, principally financial, they segmented their market; by recognising their prime objective was to fill every minute of their major new asset, the dance floor. The market segments had to be line dancing in its various forms, Country & Western, Country Rock, Irish and Australian inputs, partner dancing, and now even the disco scene. Steps, Shania

> Twain and The Mavericks are bringing Top of The Pops magic onto 'the range', and youngsters may rustle themselves a side of beef or two.

The idea of this segmentation is to aim promotional апу activity specifically at that part of the market, and chose the right dances, experienced instructors, identified music, and so the appropriate timing can be accordingly. Apart from Debbie's own dance experience she has Jean and Ted

Griffin, long established and renowned teachers of both line and couples dancing, and supported ably by Debbie Letts who is to concentrate on the youngsters.

The whole principle of segmentation leads to the USP, the Unique Selling Proposition, a drive to establish a brand personality that will lead to a haven from competition; not competition from other line dance venues but competition for the peoples' pound. Competition, therefore, from bingo, cinema, or theatre. Anywhere, where evenings are spent, is competition.



BWDA teacher training programmes are under consideration but the attraction in months to come will be top performers such as Sean Kenny and the Rye Bros. Many other names

are scheduled in what is set to be a well constructed programme.

The Wild Stallion Dance Ranch is a dream, but a dream now about to live in the real world. It is a commercial proposition and will have to be run on business lines which is the dream of two remarkable ladies, both with the heart and the drive to succeed. They

industry needs them, and more of them. We need enterprise, we need more dedicated venues, we need pioneers. They need our continuing support. Hopefully, the day will come when regular coach loads will be moving across territories to support such new ventures





CLINT BASTWOOD - man with no name?

ASHBY-DE-LA-ZOUCH is a town of King and Castle, romance and battle. Sir Walter Scott used Ashby Castle in Leicestershire as a backdrop to the fictional tournament in his novel Ivanhoe in which the famous hero fought the Black Knight. It is also the homestead of another "fighting hero" Clint Eastwood.

Janet Slattery met the 'man with no name' before he set off to join eighty stompers at a charity line dance held at the town's leisure centre.

The tiny man in the black stetson hat plays a mean harmonica. He talks in rhyme and is fast on the draw to entertain with his set of bones. He lives in a modest semi-detached house with his wife Sylvia. They have raised four children , Billy, Rosanna, Joanna and Julie, and have no fewer than eighteen grandchildren.

Joseph Eastwood celebrates his 75th birthday in August. A Romany by birth he is proud of his roots. He changed his name by deed poll to Clint, because he admires the man and the tough yet protective screen image he portrays.

Inspired by the American West, Ashby's cowboy wears his gear everyday. Shirts with bolo ties and collar tips, a leather belt with large buckle - he's even got buckskins, silver spurs for his boots and a sheriff's badge on his waistcoat. Until the Dunblane tragedy he used to carry fake guns in his holsters but has now put them away for good.

Clint Eastwood the movie star owns a 22-acre ranch in Carmel, California, is 6' 4" tail, weighs 190lbs and earned his reputation in the 1960's westerns as the man with no name, the quiet stranger with heroic attributes. He entertains by keeping the western film alive and has probably never heard of his English namesake.

Their lifestyles may be oceans apart but they do have some things in common. Both are senior citizens, both like music - the superstar an avid Jazz fan whilst the local star prefers country and western music. In their youth both used their sporting talents to teach others.

Our man Clint is noted for helping local good causes, and he's no stranger to television. He's appeared on Esther Rantzen's "That's Life" programme, Russell Harty's Chat Show and on "Down Your Way". He was filmed by Carlton Television at the American Theme Adventure Park and more recently was invited to take part in Michael Barrymore's Show but this was cancelled due to the presenters illness. Videos of Clint and his famous clapper bones have winged their way to America, Canada, Germany, and Australia. Clapper bones you may ask?

Clint says he is the World Champion Bone Player. His claim to fame, he says, was registered for him in the Guinness Book of Records by the late Roy Castle, presenter of Record Breakers when he visited Ashby-de-la-Zouch in 1994 with the Cause for Hope Appeal.

He and Sylvia are members of The Lone Ranger Country & Music Club in Coalville. There he met one of his favourite performers, Dave Sherriff, and the two became friends. Clint proudly shows off the two badges Dave gave him to add to the collection he wears on his waistcoat.

"Line Dancing has been around for a long time" he said. "It used to be incorporated with the dances at The Lone Ranger Club but then it changed to traditional country and western dances, which are different, so I have not done any for a while"

"I'm really looking forward to this" he grinned as we entered the hall where the event was taking place "but I don't know if I shall do any boot scootin' as I still have aches and pains from my accident". (He was recently knocked off his bicycle by a car). However, with "true grit", he joined in.

Instructor Nita Pearson was calling the steps and the stompers, with some amusment at first, soon got Clint in line and showed him the routines.

Age knows no boundaries! he soon showed 'em a thing or two about line dancing but once the pace quickened to Scotia Samba a very dizzy dancer had to sit down and 'soak a coke!'

When asked if he had enjoyed his evening out he replied "It's been great just to sit here and watch but I think I am getting a bit too old for dancing now. It has certainly moved on a bit. The footwork is much more complicated and there are lots of twists but it's still as much fun" he joked. "I only wish I did not suffer with Tinnitus then I might hear the music better" he added.

Clint is not afraid to poke fun at himself and does not mind if people have a laugh at his expense. "Some find me rather extrovert in the way I dress" he commented "but at least they remember my name! Life is about being happy and I am happy", he smiled

I asked Clint if he had fulfilled his life's ambitions.

"I hope not" he replied quickly. "I'd still like to go to America to meet Clint Eastwood in person".

With that he wound up the interview, slipped on his all-American jacket and carefully put his bones and harmonica into his all-American holdall. Just as he was leaving, almost as an afterthought, he turned around and with a twinkle in his eye said: "Hey, did I remember to tell you... I can also play the bugle!"



manage to maintain this fresh attitude because they not only work together but also have their own musical careers, Gary as a solo artist, and Mandy and Sean as a duo.

The band enjoy performing the full range of country music for both hard-core country fans and line dance audiences. The divide between the two, they feel, is not so great as it was. The face of line dancing has changed over the last three years and the mix of old and new country songs now demanded by line dancers means that the songs they enjoy doing suit both audiences.

If non-dancing relatives and friends are taken -or dragged!- along to line dance evenings, they should at least have something good to listen to. Southbound is a collection of good voices and harmonies simply and well presented. The appreciative line dancers at Leas Cliff Hall were given two 45-minute sessions by the band who performed songs by a wide variety of artists; popular numbers for some 'old favourites' and some more recently choreographed ones.

It has to be said that Southbound is an interesting choice of name for a band based in Dover; any further south and they could make their reputation as the first scuba country band. The majority of their gigs have been performed in southern England but, in time, Southbound is a name that should become familiar to country and line dance audiences in more northerly venues as well.

CHECK OUT THE CHECK SHIRTS

The Leas Cliff Hall line dance party was organised by Julie and Chris Curd who run the Check Shirts Line Dance Club.

Julie, an American Line Dance Association line dance instructor and aerobics teacher has been teaching line dancing for two and a half years. She has eight classes in Folkestone and Hythe catering for beginners and advanced level dancers.

Chris does the dee-jaying for the classes and the dances, and his disco kept the dancers on the move between Southbound's sessions. His music collection consists mainly of Country music but he is 'happy to play anything the punters want'.

At all their dances, the Curds provide a useful and informative line dance party programme that lists the songs, the artists and the suggested dances (plus alternative dances). Printed on the back of the programme are a few words about line dance floor etiquette, something Julie believes is important; high kicks etc are not encouraged! She also believes in keeping old classics in circulation alongside the new ones.

Live bands may well be appearing more often at the Check Shirts' parties and, starting in the autumn, Julie and Chris are hoping to organise some line dancing weekends. These would include a full day's instruction plus a dance featuring both live music and a disco.

Something to 'check out' in the future.

Mandy Gafrey started singing in pubs at an early age. She has always performed country numbers and names Patsy Cline as her greatest influence. It is not surprising, therefore, that her voice has been compared to Cline's. It is said that she can also 'do a good Shania Twain and Tina Turner', but her voice is good in its own right.

Sean Gafrey's early experience was as a rock guitarist but he states that he became interested in the technique of country guitar playing and, consequently, the country interest grew.

Gary Dean's roots are also in rock and one of his early influences was Elvis Presley but he always enjoyed the 'old' country sound. In recent years, the 'new' country style of Garth Brooks has made an impression on him too. Gary has written his own material which he describes as 'commercial rock' and one of his songs, Painted on Jeans, has been adapted to a country rhythm and is in Southbound's current repertoire. He also has two albums-worth of published rock material which Gary says could be 'converted' to country.

Backstage the three all appear relaxed and at ease in each other's company and their shared enthusiasm for the music is tremendous. They probably



The Intermediate

Pete Leonard is a seasoned cabaret artiste with a history. He has played across Europe entertaining audiences with his musical repertoire and compered innumerable shows with his quick and lively banter. He believes stage presence is essential when teaching a line-dance class and, as a producer of line-dancing videos, his performing past ensures a professional presentation in front of the camera. Based in Torquay, Devon, Pete teaches line-dancing with his teaching partner of seven years, Paula Bentley. Linedancer's Debra Williams finds out more....

"Communication is the key for instructing any class. My background as a cabaret act and compere means that I have the ability to speak to people in a manner which puts them at ease, and as both Paula and myself are experienced performers, we are confident on stage. We always have fun with the class, and are still very much a double-act as we teach."

So says Pete whose career began at the age of fifteen when he would strum his guitar on the beach at Bude in Cornwall. He went on to play drums for a local band, then bass guitar with a dance band before realising a preference for the electric organ - subsequently settling with the keyboard. In 1975 Pete formed the duo 'Fusion' which travelled the length and breadth of the country backing stars such as Roy Castle. lethro, Gary Wilmott and Bobby Davro.

During 1982 and 1983, 'Fusion' toured Europe, taking in Belgium, Holland, Germany and France, ending the run with a full season at the renowned 'Papagayo' Club in St. Tropez. The club was a social meeting place of the rich and famous and the likes of David Bowie. Tony Curtis and even Michael Jackson could often be found in the audience.

Paula was enlisted into the duo in 1990 following an accomplished solo career as a singer and dancer, and together they entertained holiday-makers at Torquay Leisure and Wallace Arnold Holiday Hotels. It was here, in 1995, that they were first introduced to line dancing.

One evening, a couple of Canadian tourists intrigued Pete with a style of dancing he had never seen before. The dance was the 'Electric Slide', and the couple were only too happy to pass on their knowledge of the steps. Then, as if by fate, Pete received a telephone call from his Mother.

"She told me I should be line dancing. She had joined a local class and knew I would like it. By now I was extremely interested, so I headed down to Bude equipped with my video camera. The class was run by Gerry and Margaret Evans, and was held in a small school hall. I danced a bit, filmed a bit, and was immediately hooked."

Line dancing soon became a feature of the 'Fusion' act, and following the offer of the use of the Victoria Hotel's main ballroom, Pete and Paula's first class was advertised. Armed with a stack of dance sheets sent by the Canadian couple, they initially attracted 25 people. The second class drew in 75, and subsequent evenings saw 200-250 dancers on the floor. Their 'Great Western Line Dance Club' was then formed.

During that summer Pete bought an American line dance video for further instruction, but was disappointed with his purchase."It was very fast and I couldn't understand any of it. As I also run my own video production company, I thought it would be a good idea to produce a simple guide to line dancing with beginners in mind. We used some of the first basic dances brought to Britain - Texas Stomp, Birchwood Stroll, Cowboy Strut, Electric Slide, Cowboy Motion, Cowboy Charleston -and broke them down in a way which was easy to understand."

Although originally sold to class members, 'Line Dancing for Beginners with Pete and Paula' soon found its way onto the shelves of Sainsbury's supermarkets. Today it is sold, along with seven successive videos, at WH Smith, HMV. Our Price, Virgin and the Music Video Club. Pete's future project, already in the planning stage, is a line dance video solely to the music of Dave Sheriff.

Pete Leonard and Paula Bentley are U.K.A professional line dance instructors, and continue to support and promote line dancing throughout Devon. Forty five of their pupils have also taken examinations in line dancing, and have gained bronze, silver and even gold U.K.A medals between them. Another exam preparation class is due to start this October.





DO INSTRUCTORS NEED EXTRA INSURANCE?

Is it wise for instructors to avoid getting insurance? Is it possible that, unbeknown to some, line dancing is a hazardous hobby? John Stapleton investigates.

No sooner does someone mention insurance than we are told that as a nation we are under-insured. Pursuing the point invariably leads to a largely irrelevant sales pitch, often ranging from possible cover for garden gnomes to the real risk of being struck by lightning on the golf course. Rarely, it seems, is the issue related to a subject we can see as being significant to us.

But do we see only what we want to see? Ominously, we householders are obliged to have household insurance, and similarly with overseas holiday insurance. To most of us the risk seems minimal and yet another demand upon our much depleted stock of hard-earned cash.

Rare it is for a mishap to result in a claim but the consequences when

the unexpected happens is almost always costly.

Yet most of us do still risk it.

How many line dance instructors have insurance against loss of earnings should they break a leg? Arguably, and even worse, how many are insured against students breaking an ankle on a slippery dance floor? What if financial compensation is sought? Some teachers may have to leave town on the first coach west!

Who is likely to make a claim? It could be almost anyone who suffers a loss of earnings or has a particularly painful time. Even the unemployed have to be available for work to claim benefits. It goes without saying that a broken arm or leg prevents such a claimant being able to work, at least for a period. But a claim is most likely if an accident is considered the result of inadequate maintenance of the dance floor.

Consider carefully; is the floor maintained with, say, a non-slip polish, or is it not maintained at all. A village hall may not have anyone available or skilled to undertake the work. A school hall may not be considered an important area for work by a caretaker. Who decides? Accidents can happen on the most carefully maintained floors. A slip could be the result of a spilt drink.

So, are you insured? Undoubtedly, whether dancer or teacher, you will be relying on the insurance cover of the owner, for as the owner rents out the property, insurance is mandatory, is it not? But has anyone read the hiring agreement, if there is one? If there is no such agreement, is there a notice board with a poster advising that all hirers are responsible for their own insurance cover? Is there any disclaimer of any description? If there is no such advice is there likely to be any insurance in place?

Do you know? Have you checked? What have you got in writing? If no, then book your departure ticket on the stage and beware of the posse...

Say you have checked and there is insurance in place. You may well be fortunate, or you may not. You had better ask your hall owner if his insurers are aware that line dancing instruction is taking place two or three times a week with an instructor. Ask if the existing insurance cover in place is appropriate to your circumstances.

Remember, insurance companies are not charities.

Interestingly, insurance companies work on The Law of Probability or 'what is the mathematical probability of an accident and of a claim?' To calculate a risk they need facts. So, unless consulted and advised they will draw a clear distinction between the common risk of a claim from an elderly couple waltzing at a sequence dance, and that of a thirty-something high-kicking

during Tush Push. Certainly so if the dancer risks landing on his spine.


The two are not comparable, the risk is not the same, the damage will not be the same, and the claim would not be the same. There would be a difference in premiums consistent with the risk involved.

So it may be that your hall owners general insurance cover is inadequate. Line dancing has moved from the slow moving herd of recent years to the frisky athletic dancing of the past year. Insurers may not have recognised the change in the 'herd'. and will not, therefore, have reassessed their position.

So what have we got? A number of establishments with no useful insurance, a larger number with potentially inadequate insurance, and a few, hopefully, with full cover. What line dancing clubs need is a blanket policy - and fast.

Who bears the ultimate responsibility? In the event an instructor has to safeguard himself and students against the possibility of litigation in any form so it is a matter of taking personal responsibility. The risks are present and growing as dancers get younger and dances get faster.

Cover is on offer for line dancing clubs which should include Public Liability, Personal Accident, and All Risk Equipment Cover Instructors and dancers should consider their own positions carefully. But they should advise their insurers of the growing penchant for line dancing and the fact that it can be rigorous.

The occasional big event, however, should be seen as a one-off occasion and so insured each time against all risks, including assaults on top performers by their own fans. Whilst insurance companies may not have a great public image we should take advantage of whatever skills are on offer.

It could save our ranch-house let alone the herd we covet.





It was also a disappointment to our supporters who had come to see us perform. Indeed, it would have been better entertainment for all spectators to see each team's full routine. I sincerely hope that the organisers will read this letter, consider the effect that their decision to run in this manner had on so many people and take this into account when organising next year's event. I am convinced that there could have been a way in arranging the competitions to allow each team their full five minutes, even with the number of teams entered. You just have to work out how long it took to run two-minute elimination rounds. Remember, not all teams would

The issues of instruction, legal and

medical matters should all be addressed. Remember the incompetent can't survive if we don't patronise their classes. Your magazine is a great read, never shirks the issues and if you are brave enough to print this I cannot wait for the replies.

After attending the British Line Dance Championships, I feel there should be a national standard for competition judges, as there seems to be no consistency in the way teams or individuals are judged, and rules applied. My daughter dances with the Pocklington Posse line dance team, who entered the qualifying heats of the British Line Dancing Championship last November. They had elected to dance "American Pie" and wanted to make sure that this piece of music was acceptable under the competition rules. They "surfed the net" and discovered that American Pie had been in the C & W charts. Their team coach also contacted Rob Fowler and was assured they would have no problem with their choice of music. They duly competed at Bridlington, won their heat and went to Leicester for the semifinals.

There seven teams participated

and the panel of judges decided initially that each team should be allowed to perform two minutes of their routine, and the best five teams could then dance their full programme. Having travelled miles for two minutes on the floor, not surprisingly all seven teams objected, so the judges retracted and the competition was allowed to go ahead in full.

The Pocklington Posse did their American Pie routine and was cheered off the floor but shattered to be told after the judging that they should not have used this piece of music; it was not C & W! They were also criticised for dancing in lines too much! The team were left with the distinct impression that the judges had not even marked their performance, they had lost the minute the music started. Their coach told the judges that she had checked with Rob Fowler prior to the heats. They just shrugged and said "Oh Well"...

I realise that this is now water under the bridge, so to speak, but it reinforces my feeling that judging should be taken more seriously and a consistent standard achieved. A number of people, including other instructors, to whom I have spoken about the competition in general have used the phrase "we don't know what they are looking for" - one could almost ask - do the judges?

WIDE BOOTS



I have been line dancing for three years now and have made a lot of good friends though it. I have subscribied to your magazine for one year and always look forward to receiving it.

I have never written to you before but I have a question that I hope you might be able to help me with a problem which concerns boots. I take size 9 with a broad fitting, and have found that all of the size 9 boots with pointed toes are too narrow across the foot, and are too painful to wear for any length of time. Size 10 are simply too big, but I have found that square-toes boots are broader across the foot. The only problem is that there are not many square-toed boots around, and of the designs that I have seen, these are not all that stylish like the pointed-toe boots. It was suggested to me that I could get my boots stretched at a cobblers or saddlery, but this has proved impossible because of the boots being too high at 12 inches. I have also tried the old trick of packing the boots tight with wet newspaper, and the use of Tuxan stretch liquid, but these ideas do not seem to help.

So do you have any idea where I

can either get some wide-fitting pointed boots, or who sells square-toed boots in more adventurous deigns? I have tried all my local retailers and R.Soles as well, but to no avail.
