

ublin is a long way to go for Sunday lunch but believe me it was worth it. Naturally, there was the Guiness to sample but there was more Black Stuff on my mind that day. In the best of places to leave you with a real boot scoot of a hangover after a night's no-holds-barred line dancing, how appropriate that I was off to meet the maker of Black Coffee! No, this isn't a Gold Blend advert. Home to a unique crowd of line dancers that put the fizz in effervescent, Ireland is where you'll find Helen O'Malley, the lady who wrote THAT dance.

"Pity I didn't take any royalties," jokes Helen, trying to find an explanation for the phenomenal demand.

Helen O'Malley "Johnny, my brother, is the DJ at our club and so I wrote the

dance as

ambitious, organising an 8 hour dance extravaganza. And since the first event last year more than £42,000 has been raised for deserving causes that include the Richmond Brain Research Foundation, where Helen now works.

To witness the irrepressible dancing appetite of the Irish it'd be a must to come along. And before you ask, of course you're welcome, this is Ireland afterall! Make up a team of four; harass everyone from mayor to milkman to try and raise between you £320's worth of sponsorship; and then if you're able to have a go at some of the 40 selected dances, you're just about ready to dance your way to oblivion. Easy!

his wedding anniversary.

Then we began teaching it, but I never

More than just a talented choreographer, Helen runs her own dance club. The Nash Villains meet every Sunday at the La Touche Hotel, not far from the family home in Shankill, County Wicklow, about 30 minutes drive from Dublin. She is also the Vice Chair of the Western Dance Association of Ireland, recently set up to bring together dance clubs from both north and south and establish a core of familiar

Since first getting to grips with the Electric Slide three years ago, Helen has become what you might call rather a big wig in the line dance field - respected, well-known - but her approach remains disarmingly down to earth. She's one part of a great family team.

Johnny is the man behind the music while her other brother Dermott and his wife, Diedre, are two more instructors. Most of the family are hopeless line dance addicts, and it's growing. Helen's daughter Sarah met her fiance, Eddie, during what must have been a pretty sensuous Tush Push. But unfortunately husband Liam remains unconvinced, prefering a less hectic game of golf.

"The Nash Villians are successful because there are four of us," says Helen. "Dermott is the best line dancer in Ireland in my opinion, but really the team's no different from the people on the floor. You're there to provide a service, not get heavy and lay down the law. If they're not enjoying themselves they'll just go somewhere else."

Enjoyment comes a guaranteed for anyone attending next year's International Line Dance Charity Marathon on April 12th. At the suggestion of a friend who was bravely embarking on a sponsored walk in South America, Helen decided to attempt something equally

Elie Goser Wiem you wind

As Alan Britton from the band Country FM will tell you, there's plenty of Union Jack in the Stars and Stripes. It wasn't a navigationally challenged Italian who discovered the last frontier but John Cabbot, a Bristol bloke, and those Stetson hats? They're as British as fish and chips.

Here's a thing you probably never knew. Back in the 1800s, J. B Stetson swiped the design for his broad brimmed hat from those made around that time by Christy's Hat Factory in Bristol. Hoardes of dewy eyed settlers dreaming of a new life of plenty departed from the Royal Port, and when J. B spied their practical apparel he decided to run a few off himself, only to be successfully sued and spend much of the remainder of the century paying off costly royalties.

Food for thought indeed while you munch a turkey leg Christmas. over America's hond with this drizzly isle is stronger than you'd imagine, which goes some way to explain our fixation with country music.

More au fait with the history than most is lead singer and guitarist, Alan Britton of Country FM, who was only too pleased to talk to Linedancer about the country vibe in his home town of Bristol.

Two years ago

Alan invited Chet Atkins to the UK, the man who helped popularise the Nashville sound in the 60s, much in the same way as new country has championed line dance today. The sell-out concert at the 5000 capacity Bristol Amphitheatre, supported by Country FM, was Chet's first in Europe for 11 years. And Alan was privileged to present his hero with the Gibson Living Legend Award in recognition of his work.

Honing his own writing skills, Alan also spent the best part of the last 10 years moving back and forth to Nashville working with Roger Cook. No, not ITV's intrepid investigative journalist, but another Bristolian and top notch song writer who has worked with some of Music City's biggest names, among them Don Williams, Alan Jackson and Crystal Gayle.

Quitting the studio for the time being, Alan has teamed up with keyboard player and fellow vocalist Andy Christie, and an appropriately titled bassist, Richie Bassman, and decided once more to hit the stage. Country FM has been the exclusive live music act at every heat of Boot Scoot's British Line Dance Championship.

"I steered away from the performing side to learn the trade - the song writing, production and the rest - and come in at a higher level," says Alan. "So far it's working well. We're very honoured to be part of the championship. And we're very encouraged by the way it's gone. The only movement in country

music that's really happening at the moment is the dancing. And we love playing music with energy."

So taken have Country FM been with the fun and appeal of line dancing that they now incorporate Footsteps, their own line dance troupe, run by instructor Sheila Base. Combined they offer the pretty unique package of tuition, demonstration and live music 7 nights a week in the Bristol area. Footsteps have also qualified for the semi final round of Boot Scoot's team competition, performing the Shakin' Shack. And more accolades belong to Alan's wife Shirley, who heads the management team.

"Country listeners tend to prefer the older music while the dancers are always looking for something new," says Alan, commenting on the championship tour. "Chattahoochie and Copperhead Road are popular because they're

people know. but original song of ours, Do It To It, has become quite a favourite with dancers. We've found it fits really well with the Electric Slide. Slappin' Leather and Tush Push more by accident than anything else. Getting out there, playing live and mixing with the dancers is the best way learn."

Do It To It appears on Everybody's Line Dancing, a new album of selfpenned songs and popular covers

Staying abreast of the latest trends within country music and line dancing, raising the profile and trying to apply a more professional gloss is the task Country FM have set themselves. As their name suggests they are currently pestering the Radio Authority to start their own country music station in the Bristol and west country area, and aspire to nothing less than establishing Bristol as the Nashville of Europe. Two years ago Alan even led a delegation on a mission to twin the two cities, plans that ultimately bit the dust due to council dithering.

But step by step as Country FM await their radio license Bristol is winning back some of the recognition it deserves. John Cabbot and the chap who made those "Stetson" hats would be proud. Says Alan, "we want to make Bristol the hub of country music in the UK and establish country music as mainstream. It really is that simple."

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
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Out & About

Line dancing on the National Curriculum? If students at Wakefield

Girls High School in Yorkshire could decide, then they'd be sitting their GCSE tomorrow!

More than 350 students out of a school of 780, gave up their lunch hour to experiment with line dancing. The event



was organised by their headmistress, Mrs Langham, and David Harrison of the Renegades, to introduce a fun means of exercise where all can take part. For most it was their first real taste of line dancing, but judging from their response, it was definitely not the last!. So exuberant were the dancers, aged 11 to 18, that by the second step of the first dance the sound equipment had to be shifted

to where it wouldn't bounce all over the place in time to the music. The school has a reputation for high standards, and to test their mettle David taught four dances in little over an hour, quite a challenge for first timers.

She taught 10 dances to mostly original music from the band's self-titled album, such as Tennessee Twister to Union Street, The Cajun Slap to Johnny Can Dance and Ski Bumpass to a new Soca tinged number from the Devon outfit, called Walk Don't Walk.

Everyone on the packed dance floor had a great time, and all enjoyed the hectic schedule Stevie had cooked up on this bonfire night party! Only in "alternative" Totnes could experienced line dancers find themselves stomping next to groovers in green wellies, and certainly many new faces left dying for more.

Big love for somebody new

Anxious as you no doubt are to get hold of *Toe The Line 2* once it arrives, we see from the promo blurb that among the original and inventive track listing on the new compilation CD, there are songs from the new albums of two superbly talented country names. They're not in fact the only ones, but seeing as though Somebody New by Rhett Atkins and Tracy Byrd's Big Love are top of the review pile this month, I just thought I'd mention it.

The phrase "Back to Basics" may stick in your craw but following the new country roller coaster of the last few years there does now appear more effort in certain quarters to reestablish country's "traditional" sounds.

Big Love, Tracy Byrd's fourth album, is steady progress up the quality curve and is every inch the nostalgic refrain. Don't Love Make A Diamond Shine won't challenge Byrd's Watermelon classic, but has choreography written all over it, as do Lifestyles Of The Rich And Famous - they played it at the Wildhorse Saloon! -; Big Love, the title track and Toe The Line 2 closer; and Cowgirl, a brisk and cheeky little cajun number.

From the conservative and rootsy country sound of Big Love to the rockier and more modern style of **Somebody New**, not that Rhett





Akins is particularly a new boy though less familiar Monsieur Byrd, certainly. As you may remember 1000 Memories was the first we heard from him, and a good dance track, That Ain't My Truck, appears here from from the well-received debut album.

No Match (For That Old Flame) and Love You Back are two excellent and very danceable openers. Chunky electric guitar mixes with Akins's smooth and confident vocals, building a nicely flowing and toe-tapping rhythm. More good dance numbers arrive in the shape of Too Much Texas and I Was Wrong - both more subtle and sexy little songs - and Every Cowboy's Dream is a playful little ditty of a thing that finds a place on Toe The Line 2. Another must from Santa.

ichard Davies is a line dance instructor from the north of England, and according to one member of guide to rue. his class, "The only line dancer who tells jokes." Swappin stand up for his witty writer's pen, here's a tongue-in-cheek guide to making all your dreams come true. Wanna top the line dance charts? Just follow the Gladthorpe

It's a familiar scenario. You are the founder and instructor of the Gladthorpe Stompers Line Dance Club, now established after three weeks of pulsating action. basic steps have been mastered, and the members are both committed and enthusiastic. All can now perform half a simple dozen dances, and are sufficiently tuned in to the country music scene to know that Brooks and Dunn are not firm of

your vast collection of two discs! But more than likely you'll feel the stirrings of a different urge. It's about this time that most instructors want to write that Sure-Fire Line Dance Hit!

Now this is by no means as straightforward as it appears, because choreography can be a long and painstaking process. There are, however, certain short cuts, and if you follow a few simple rules it will only be a matter of time before the whole line dance world is stomping away to the dance you choreographed yourself!

The first rule concerns the title. It is essential that you choose something with a certain zap to it. You may wish to include the name of your club, thereby expressing the fierce pride you have for your home town. But think carefully, is "The Gladthorpe Stomp" the sort of thing that is going to set the world alight? Afterall, would you leap to your feet for the "Basingstoke Shuffle"? A title that is at least vaguely American is an improvement, but avoid the temptation to stick a pin in the atlas of the USA. You may well hit Prattsville,

Nebraska (pop. 113), which is hardly a promising start.

If you are unable to fit a place name, try calling it Cowboy...something. With any luck someone will confuse it with Cowboy Strut and will be half way through before they have realised their mistake. If all else fails and you really can't think of a good title, do what everyone else does. Call your new dance "Boot Scootin' Boogie". This will lead to a series of long debates over who has the authentic version. But beware! Claiming that your steps were first discovered on a parchment in the hold of the Mayflower will convince no one.

The second decision is, of course, the music. This is of vital importance but there is one golden rule. Wherever possible choose

a tune from a CD that is about to be deleted. This will ensure hou of fun for every other instructor as they search record shops and a boot sales in vain pursuit of that elusive title! The fact that you ov the only copy will give the Gladthorpe Stompers a feeling

exclusivity that can barely be imagined. Failir this, choose one decent track on a otherwise dire CD costing no le than £18:99. This will have similar effect on your reputatio However, there is a fin alternative guaranteed immortalise the name your club and cau endless innocent fu

dance to "OI Step Forward Teach the dan at your clu and when yo and your fello members turn up at a li dance and t familiar begins, stand the middle of t floor and insist performing yo own steps. everyone objec

proclaim in a loud voice, "E at Gladthorpe Stompers we always dan

(Only for those with FUN in mind!) Having selected the music, then comes the serious business terminology. To a Gladthorpe Stomper, standard terminology is f wimps. Forget "shuffle" and "scuff", think of the fun you will provi for hundreds of complete strangers as they try to fathom out "A ric grapevine followed by a Flying Arkwright." Wherever possik include among your obscure, yet creative, steps at least o downright dangerous move. For example, this could be an awsor sequence of jumps and turns calculated to give even Rob Fowler double hernia. Think of the pride that would bring to the Gladthor Stompers, and you could always visit him in hospital!

Having completed the dance steps it is always a good idea to inclu your own brief hints and tips to ensure that the dance goes with swing. These should be brief but firm, such as, "Take care wh doing the backward somersault." Tips on style should be cautic and not overtly self-congratulatory. And a post script that rec "Goes well after 6 pints of lager" will hardly endear the dance anyone outside your own club.

Finally, every good artist should always sign their work, and t applies just the same to line dance choreographers. Make sure the at the bottom of the page you include your name, address, and t telephone number of your solicitor. Depending on the complexity the dance and the obscurity of the terminology, it may also be a go idea to note the number for the local branch of the Samaritans. So that's all there is to it! With any luck you will have written a dar so unique that when it is performed at a line dance championship, the competitors can happily ignore what you have written, and simple dance six minutes of variations. The dancers will be delighted, audience will love it, and the name of the Gladthorpe Stompers \ become a household name. From that moment on your chest v swell with pride every time you hear an instructor adjusting his thro mike to utter those magic words: "And now let's have everyone on the floor for the Gladthorpe Stomp!"

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

DAY 1 Thurs 7 Nov

Travel pills consumed, lucky charms carefully stowed, and Duty Free generously stashed, our American Airlines flight deposited us in Chicago where we were to take another, internal flight to Nashville.

It was early evening when we arrived in Music City, the weather mild and miserable. By Saturday it would be snowing!

Our hotel, The Clubhouse Inn, was centrally located on Broadway downtown, and was to the satisfaction of everyone. After one or two complimentary sharpeners in the downstairs' bar, most decided to do a little exploring. 2nd Avenue was only a few blocks walk away. Lined with fairy lights it's where you'll find some of the city's best bars, restaurants and nightclubs. You can't miss the Hard Rock Cafe and, of course, there's the Wildhorse Saloon. For those jet lagged and peckish, Demo's steak house and Italian restaurant on nearby 3rd Avenue, is a fine introduction to Nashville's good food and famous Southern hospitality.

DAY 2 Fri 8 Nov

More streetwise by the evening, it was time to do what we'd all been was for, dance at the Wildhorse Saloon - a stylish, three-tiered nightclub wi wooden dance floor and disco lighting. When not dancing yourself you can grab a bite to eat in the restaurant, visit the enclosed shop

recline at the bar; you can even get your shoes shined!
Arriving early, the Saloon's resident instructor, Scott Lanius, gave us hour's instruction, teaching Catfish and the Texas Twist, before the group let loose on their own. But what surprised everyone was how much be they were than the Americans. After the excitement and non-stop dancing of Friday, Saturday was a far more relaxing proposition where most couldn't resist a trip to the nerve centre of country songwriting, Music Row. \$9:95 admits you to the Country Music Hall Of Fame, shrine to the greatest names, not excluding Tennessee's most famous personality, Elvis Presley. The museum provides all the history behind Music City's legendary rise and houses some priceless artefacts. Elvis's gold Cadillac; his 24 carat piano; original song lyrics; and guitars belonging to contemporary favourites like Garth Brooks, are all on show. The admission fee also includes a trolley bus tour passed the record companies and offices of Music Row itself, and a visit to its most famous studio, RCA's Studio B, where Elvis cut some of his best known records and which has reopened for the first time in nearly 20 years.

Later that evening we were the guests of the Opry Land Hotel - an out of town oasis with 3000, unprintably expensive rooms - before attending a variety performance at the prestigious Grand Ole Opry. The grounds of the hotel are decorated like a page out of a fairy tale - showered with fine, white

Christmas lights, enticing you inside to where 9 acres of glass roof encloses a stream, waterfalls and a multitude of plants and shrubs - a bit like a rich man's Crystal Maze! The best place for any linedancer once they've won the Lottery, after a free tipple in the Jack Daniels Saloon Bar we jumped at the chance to look around

Everyone was less enthusiastic about the Grand Ole Opry, in truth the biggest disappointment since the seaworthiness of the Titanic! Despite the appearance of some familiar names like Stonewall Jackson and Ricky Van Shelton, the rest played corny, dreary stuff - strictly for the tourists. Broadcast on radio we were all in stitches as each act was spliced by adverts for Massey Ferguson tractors; Old Folks' Sausages; and, of course, we were all reminded to "Drink Coke." The highlight of the evening was Tommy, our joke telling coach driver, and, oh yes, it started snowing.

And so all good things must come to an end. Even if the dancing was less of a challenge than expected, all our holidaymakers had a great time showing the locals how it's done. And the people are so unbelievably friendly. Catherine Coleman was so impressed she's even planning to come back here to work. She'll probably be dancing on the next record of Al Wiley, the singin' taxi driver she and mum encountered on one of their shopping sprees! There's so much to distract you in Nashville, so much I haven't even mentioned - like the wealth of historical buildings, museums, and sites connected with American Independence and the Civil War. 

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
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The Woolpackers band is set to make Emmerdale famous for more than just tales of northern grit and Yorkshire yarns. Fans of the TV soap will have already seen characters Zak Dingle, Vic Windsor and Terry Woods performing their hit country single, Hillbilly Rock Hillbilly Roll, which soured into the charts last month at No.7.

And the Top Of The Pops stars are the first to admit that they owe their success to the massive popularity of line dancing. "We didn't actually realise how big line dancing was until we went about making this record," says Alun Lewis, 41, who plays Emmerdale shopkeeper, Vic Windsor. The song has been choreographed its own special dance which Linedancer exclusively released in its November edition.
