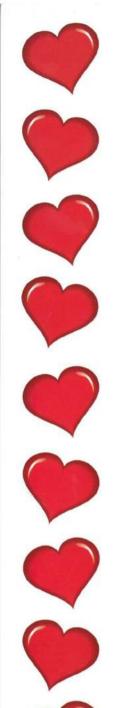

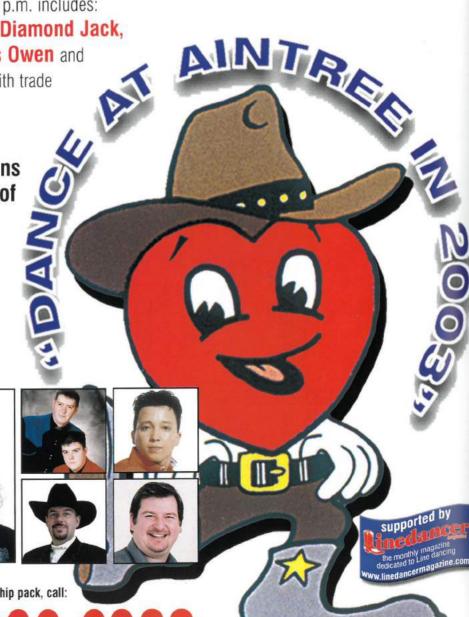

Dear Dancers

ast month I took the unusual step of addressing some of the issues that are causing concern and I also published a readers survey to allow you to have your say. We wanted you to tell us a little about yourselves, your club and the way you want to see Line dancing develop in the years to come. Well you did that, and I can tell you, the response has been overwhelming.

The constructive and detailed suggestions you have made underlines the passion Line dancers have and some of the excellent ideas put forward are already being prepared. For the most part, everyone seems more than happy with *Linedancer* and the vast majority of you see us as leaders in the field. Although there are only a few of us here, we do our utmost to bring you the best possible product month by month and it pleases us that our work is appreciated so much. Thank you for your kind comments, encouragement and support. It is much appreciated.



Naturally, we will share with you the information gleaned from the survey but we are still in the process of collating your entries. Whilst that work will take some time I have prepared a page (p.47) in this edition, which highlights some of the responses. It makes for interesting reading. Clearly there is a resounding message that comes from the survey; the fundamental concern about the number of new dances being produced. It is not just a question of the pressure this puts on instructors but, more importantly, it is a message that the dancers themselves would like to call a halt to the weekly burden of learning new routines only for them to be discarded within a short time.

I cannot emphasise too much the strength of feeling here. Make no mistake; this is a serious issue that goes right across the board. In my view, the dance floor has spoken and it is delivering more than a message – it is giving us a clear warning.

Almost on the same level was the concern about the advanced level of choreography, the number of tags, bridges, re-starts and phrases within it and the agility necessary to perform some of the routines. Our dancers are saying, "if you create new dance routines please create them for the level of the social dancer and not for yourselves, your rivals or for professionals."

Next comes the vexed question of music selection. This old chestnut will never go away. Even without the results of the survey we know many of you either prefer a "mix of music" or more Country music. Some think that we have gone too far in the Pop direction whilst others are happy with the selection. I assure you we will take all your comments on board but, at the end of the day, the decision is yours and it must be sensible for instructors to offer a range of music and alternative tracks where appropriate. We will certainly do our best to make helpful suggestions, so that *Linedancer* is an even more useful tool for you.

On a positive note, despite your concerns, you still thoroughly enjoy your Line dancing. There were several examples of dancers who had suffered serious illnesses and found Line dancing provided the most wonderful support. Many of you have made new friends through Line dance and you all seem to agree that Line dancing has a bright future if we can address the various issues of the day.

I feel more than ever that *Linedancer* is the bond that holds the Line dance scene together and that we have a tremendous responsibility to work even harder to meet your needs.

In the months ahead we will continue to do everything we can to make Line dancing, and *Linedancer*, an even more attractive prospect...

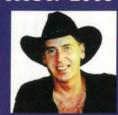

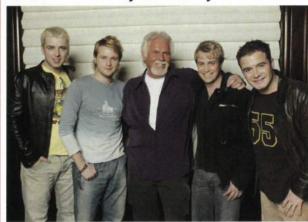

Jim takes up the story. "Well our first Laurel and Hardy experience took place on a trip to Hamburg organised by the late Bill Cubin, the curator of the Laurel and Hardy museum in Ulverston. He said, 'do you want to go to Germany for a month and work as lookalikes?" So, for some bizarre reason, they agreed and now, 12 years later, they're in heavy demand from TV companies, Entertainment and Lookalike agencies, the corporate sector, private bookers and party organisers in the UK, Bahrain, Dubai and, indeed, throughout the Middle East. But why?

"The TV shows are enjoying re-runs in the Middle East," says Jim. "It's really huge over there. You see, it's not seen as the usual 'corrupting Western' show. It's just good, clean fun and everyone loves it." Back home there are some 200 Laurel and Hardy lookalikes and 37 branches of the Laurel and Hardy Appreciation Society. "The scene is huge in Holland," adds Carl.

A recent return to UK TV (BBC2) has energised the trio and they have several aims apart, that is, from learning the latest Line dances. When Carl and Gary are not getting into lookalike mode they'll be on a dance floor near you. "We go to classes during the week, mostly," Carl tells us, "But we occasionally get away for a weekend," adds Garv. "This week we learned Maggie G's The Break. Great stuff!"

Just how good these guys are at their chosen profession (it can be a full-time occupation, depending on bookings) becomes clear as they walk into the Linedancer offices and proceed to cause havoc. Making drinks was never quite as complicated. How do they like their coffee? "Well," says Stan, "I like mine in a big cup!" "And so do I," says Ollie.

Perhaps fame has affected them? "No. Admittedly we have been on Blue Peter. The Big Breakfast and Brookside but it doesn't make any difference. Elsewhere, the dudes are working towards the placing of a Laurel and Hardy statue in Ulverston designed and sculpted by Graham Ibbeson, the man who produced the famous Eric Morecambe statue on Morecambe seafront, Lancashire. After all, Arthur Stanley Jefferson, later known as Stan Laurel, was born in Ulverston, Cumbria, on 16th June 1890. (Each year, the Dudes join 200 other fans for the annual Laurel and Hardy parade

in the town.) In Glasgow, where Stan Laurel's dad was a well-known figure in local theatre, the Dudes are supporting efforts to reopen the Pickard's Museum, a small venue where Stan made his debut as an actor.

The main aim is, understandably, to keep the memories alive (and kickin') through personal appearances. Booking these lookalikes is a great way to add a certain something to an event. "We'll meet and greet, mix and mingle and do several card tricks," says lim, and probably cause a little consternation along the way.

Meanwhile, Line dancing is a major part of Carl and Gary's life. "We love the social aspect," Gary tells us, "and we've even taken our Bronze medals!" 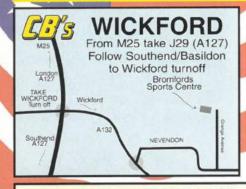

A Long Lost Brother



To her amazement, she discovered that she had a brother she'd never met...

here was rather more to the letter than initially met her eyes. Something in it made her read on. To her amazement, she discovered that she had a brother she'd never met...

He arrived in Burscough for the biggest party Ann's family had ever experienced. Since the age of 15, John Alexander, who is now 45 and married with two children, had been searching for his natural family. When he was a baby he had been given up for adoption and it was not until he contacted *After Adoption* in 2001 that he realised he stood a chance of finding them.

Eighteen months later, in April, after he started his search, his 79-year-old mother, Nancy, who lives with Ann, was overwhelmed to see the son she was forced to give away. Forty-seven-year-old Ann said, "It's a fairytale! I had no idea I had a brother. It was such a heartbreaking decision for mum when she parted with him in her 30s because of family pressure; she understandably never talked about it. When the letter came through the door in April, I thought it must be a con, but something opened my eyes and I started to realise that I had a long lost brother!

"I stayed awake the whole night, not knowing which way to turn," she continued. "The next day, my husband advised me to talk to mum and I eventually did. She was a bit shocked so say the least. I said I had some things to do and would come back to her

in an hour or so. If she didn't want me to mention it ever again, I wouldn't. In the end, she told me to contact him."

As soon as Ann saw John for the first time, there was no doubt in her mind that he was her brother. She broke down and wept all day. She added, "He is just the loveliest man I have ever met. He oozes love. He's been searching for his mother for 30 years and it is so lucky she has met him now.

Ann continues to dance in Southport with the Shy Boots and Stompers club. One of

the biggest moments in her life, before her recent discovery, was her participation in the Commonwealth Games finale in Manchester.

Now, the two families are busy preparing for another huge joint celebration in July, to mark Nancy's 80th birthday and the wedding of John's daughter.

"The dance steps are in my head from the moment I hear the music..." *Linedancer* speaks to Karen Hunn, the East Anglian teacherchoreographer...

ou might expect that the award-winning Karen Hunn spends her time writing dances and enjoying her success. After all, not everyone receives the Australian International Line Dance Of The Year award, as Karen did on April 10th when fellow choreographer Martin Ritchie, who spends a lot of time down under, presented her with the trophy for her dance, Evergreen.

Evergreen was one of the most popular Line dances in 2002 and continues to pack floors today. It was the first dance of Karen's that we published in *Linedancer* and it was an immediate hit. "I didn't know what would happen with the dance," Karen admits, "because, like the other dances, I just wrote it after hearing the music. It is a very natural process for me, probably because I've been a dancer on and off since my earliest years and have made up routines on numerous occasions." Lucky girl. Some of us would love to have such talent!

Since then, Karen has written several good dances but none as popular as her current hit, Badda Boom Badda Bang, to Freddie Said by Barry Manilow, from the icon's Here At The Mayflower soundtrack. "With Evergreen," Karen tells us, "it was a case of having heard the music several times. It was on the radio all the time, and TV. With this one I'd bought the Manilow album for And They Danced, which is popular with my classes. One day, driving along in the car to a class, I just slipped the CD into my car stereo system. 'I really should listen to the rest of the album', Karen told herself. So she did and was so taken with this new track that a dance presented itself immediately.

Badda Boom has been well received because of its simplicity. Almost everyone, from beginner-improvers to Advanced level, can and will dance it and that is its hook. Karen, like more and more choreographers, is concerned to appeal to the majority of dancers. "After all," she says, "I've only got my class to base things on. I think the dancers who attend are a pretty good barometer of what's doable, not doable and likely to take off." (She says that most of her pupils are at the Improver-Intermediate level.) Despite having a willing group of guinea pigs Karen admits that she doesn't try that many of her dances out on her classes. This is one thing that comes through strongly when you're talking to her - her lack of self-interest and her desire for Line dancing to succeed and grow across the board. "My only criticism of a handful of people in the scene is that they need to think of everyone, not just themselves. I'm totally the opposite to that, maybe because I do so much teaching and that's my main focus."

And she's right. Despite her international acclaim, Karen's bread and butter is her teaching. She lives in Bungay, a small, quiet town on the Suffolk-Norfolk border. Given the distances between large towns there's a lot of travelling involved. "I have to travel twenty miles from home to my classes in Norwich and a further twenty miles to Gorleston, in Great Yarmouth, where I also teach."

Initially, Karen taught exclusively at Sandra Butler's popular Wild Stallion club in Norwich but has branched out since then. "When I first started off in Line dancing around six and a half years ago it was all Country music. Happily, things have

changed and I revel in the variety of the scene today," says an animated Karen (she's very reserved, even during interviews!). "The only thing I find is that Intermediates are much fussier nowadays and that was probably inevitable for those who've been in Line for several years. They're much more choosy; the music has to grab them in order to encourage them to get up and dance." So it's challenging being a choreographer? "Definitely," Karen replies...

She may not be a millionaire yet but Karen has strong views on teaching, especially now she has thriving beginners classes. "Beginners need structure and to be taught beginner dancers. This sounds obvious but sometimes teachers try and make them do dances that are too difficult. I like Val Myers approach a lot and I've taken what he

(Mary Kelly version), Brokenheartsville and Just A Kiss. Oh, and Evergreen too! She taught Steve Mason's Cha Cha Cha D'Amour and Kate Sala's biggie, La Tenga, in May and resurrected Sha La La for those dancers in summery mood.

Karen has another, little known (until now) string to her bow. "Yes," she exclaims, "I run a successful Majorettes troupe in Norwich called 'Starlight Express'. They're great and I've been doing this for years. It's really good fun." Watch out, they may just appear at a Line dance event near you if we're not careful. Now that's different...

One of the things that has moved Karen most is the international recognition she has won through her choreography. "I am constantly shocked and delighted by the e-mails I get from around the world," she

has written to heart. My beginners enjoy his dances." Beginner dances need to be to good music, too, in Karen's opinion, in order to create as much interest as possible.

The pressure to teach new dances is typical to Line dance teachers and although Karen doesn't believe in pushing too hard she still finds herself teaching her different classes new material on a weekly basis. Current hot dances on the East Anglian circuit include The Break, Shakatak, Irresistible, Closer

tells us. "It makes it all worth while and makes you think when you discover that Evergreen is popular in the United States, Singapore and Australia!" What, then, does this rising star have in the pipeline? "Well, Indigo Moon, that I wrote with Robbie McGowan Hickie, is going well and I have just choreographed Runaway Waltz to Billy Bubba King's version of the Corrs Runaway from his new album." Good stuff indeed! Now that Karen's name is getting out there, her future is looking evergreen...

Latin Liners

Linedancer speaks to Barbara Spencer, whose Latin In Line club in Dorset has found a winning formula that appeals across the board.

arbara Spencer, whose unique brand of Line dance club has created great interest within Line dance circles says, "I'm interested in Psychology. It's all about assessing your club, not only to see what they'd like to learn but in terms of giving the dancers a sense of achievement." Barbara wants her club members to leave every class she facilitates "on a high."

"I decided to use my experience as a dance teacher and bring it to bear on my Line dance classes," Barbara tells us, "and I wanted the core of my lessons to focus on dancing...not learning. All of us dread the arrival of yet more dances and I've found that the club responds to a greater variety of music and rhythms rather than, say, new dance after new dance. It's important to make dancers feel included, not excluded. Coming from a general dance background and UKA qualification I tend to avoid using recommended music. Thus we avoid the problem of dancers struggling to use different music because they learn to see a particular routine as the beginning, not the end, of their general dance experience."

Barbara's club, formerly the Dorset Stompers,

and now known simply as Latin In Line (or simi-

lar variations!), is in a very healthy situation and this is down to Barbara's experience, and her unique choice of music and teaching style, coming to bear. "Yes, I use a lot of Latin music that I've come across throughout my career in dance teaching. All my ladies love Cha Cha, Salsa, Rhumba and Merengue. Three years ago I also took my Salsa teaching qualifications and there was so much Latin-style music available that I thought I'd see what my Line dancers thought. They love it and I wouldn't change this aspect at all!"

Barbara still has a Thursday morning class for those who want to learn advanced routines. "This way," she continues, "I am catering for Line dancers who want to go one step further. But I am not prepared to compromise on the basic instruction in that the dances I teach there will not make their way into other classes." Rock Your Body is currently being taught to the advanced group.

One of the big influences on Barbara's club has come, again, via the UKA. "Leslie Lawrence has choreographed some wonderful Swing and Latin routines that I have adapted for my classes," she says. "I was inspired to produce a routine to It's Never Too Late To Rock N Roll, at a Jive lecture a while ago. The music is available and using it was a good example of the radical approach that pays dividends every time. I have reworked routines and put them into a Line dance framework."

One of the things that Barbara feels is that clubs need to ensure that dancers really can cope with the steps for each routine. "If dancers feel they can't cope you might not hear from them. They'll just vote with their feet. So I make sure that technique is covered in order to help everyone manage their dancing easier. Then they relax and experience the 'feel good factor'.

One thing Barbara's dancers would like to see is a core of agreed or 'set' dances used at every social. "At least that way we'd be able to attend socials in the certain knowledge that we'll be able to do something when we're there. Line dance must be for everyone; simple dancing without a partner but with style, energy and with an emphasis on fun," she concludes.

It's all about assessment and preparation. Barbara says, "what we have learned is this. Fail to prepare - prepare to fail." Clubs grow where teachers and instructors spend extra time and where, in Barbara's opinion, dancers have a structure in place. "That's why I put my dancers through the UKA medal tests. It's an incentive, a reason to learn and that's vital. It's a good way of showing everyone they're making good progress and also introducing technique to them in easy stages."

The Latin Liners seem to have a winning formula and Barbara's beginner classes are going from strength to strength. Instructors might want to find out more about Barbara's approach. If so please phone her on (01202) 605554, or e-mail, dorset.stompers@bun.com

Viv Scott continues on through Australia onto Japan...

t was nightfall with drizzling rain as we wandered along a main road in central Tokyo looking for our hotel...As my husband, Michael, popped into a shop to ask directions, I waited rather forlornly under an overhang looking after the luggage. Suddenly, a male cyclist appeared out of the gloom, cycled right over to me and, without a word, handed over his umbrella and disappeared into the night. What a wonderful way to begin our holiday in Japan.

Michael and I had flown from Sydney, Australia, to the vast, densely popula ed city of Tokyo for a week's holiday en route back to our hometown of Toronto. To give you

an idea of the number of people who live and work in Tokyo, one of its underground stations has 48 exits and two million passengers pass through its gates every single day!! There are numerous stations. The subway system is as extensive as the London underground and there is an equally considerable above-ground train system. Both can be very intimidating if you come from a small town or village. However, the saving grace is the

warmth and friendliness of the Japanese people as you can see by the above example. We had only to stand a few minutes with a map in our hands looking confused and someone would be there trying to help us. Even if they didn't speak English they would attempt to direct us with sign language.

You could spend weeks in Tokyo and still not see all there is to see. The city is a collection of distinct areas from the ultra-modern crowded Shinjuku, with its towering skyscrapers and endless department stores to the funky old Ueno, with its market streets, interesting park and impressive museums. If you want to keep ahead of the high tech crowd, you shouldn't miss visit-





ing Akihabara, which is crammed full of high tech gadgets and gizmos of every kind. On the other hand if you would like to escape the hustle and bustle of the city, you can wander around the Imperial Palace in the heart of the city or visit a peaceful Buddhist Shrine in Asakusa.

I haven't even scratched the surface of the sights available to you let alone the options for day trips just outside of Tokyo.

However, as much as we were enjoying the sights of the city, I was very much looking forward to meeting Hiro Suzuki. I had corresponded with Hiro after finding his website, www.country.com, which includes information in English about Line dancing in Japan and his club Crazy Feet.

years ago he learnt the Electric Slide from a Square Dance caller and was hooked!! Whereas before, when he travelled to the US for work, he spent most of his time in his hotel room watching television. Subsequently he started searching out places where he could Line dance and now has dancing friends all over the world. He then started the Crazy Feet Dance Club and five years ago embarked on bringing international dance instructors to Japan to give the local dancers and instructors the chance to learn and grow. In April he will be travelling with Jo Thompson on a four-city tour of Japan and the month after with Max Perry and Kathy Hunyadi.

Hiro has brought over John Robinson, Scott Blevins, Bill Bader, Terry Hogan, Pedro Machado, Charlotte Skeeters, Michael Barr and Michele Burton. Michele named her dance *American Pop* after Hiro took her to the monthly dance of the same name held in Tokyo. I shall definitely plan my next visit to Tokyo around this event!! It seems that the dance is held in an enormous Atrium on the first Friday of the month and more than 300 dancers attend to dance to live Country bands as well as DJs.

I noticed at the workshop that the dances were taught predominantly to modern, funky music

Through Hiro we found a comfortable, conveniently located hotel, and despite the fact that his club's workshop was the following Saturday, Hiro organized an impromptu dance to which he invited me to teach and meet local dancers on the Saturday evening and a dance class to visit the following day. I was delighted to hear that

some of the dancers were dancing 'Beer Run'. Could he be as nice as he sounded in his e-mails, I wondered. He was!!

An athletic looking man with an energetic, bouncy air about him, Hiro is a busy man. However, although he runs his own business and travels a fair amount he still finds time to commit to his Line dancing passion. Hiro told me that over eight

Hiro is well known in the Japanese Line dance world and told me he was approached by a TV Producer who wanted Line dancers for the background in a programme. After several e-mails, to his amusement, Hiro realized that what the TV producer really had in mind was French Can-Can dancers, which is what the older Japanese think of as Line dancers.

I learnt that many Line dance classes are held in Culture Schools where classes on flower arranging, tea ceremonies, conversation and yoga are held and that's where Hiro's evening dance took place. I was quite apprehensive about teaching to non-English speaking dancers but I needn't have worried. The Japanese dancers were delightful; patient, tolerant and full of smiles. They knew basic English dance terms such as "shuffle" and "grapevine" and Hiro did some translating but other than that they concentrated on my feet!!

Shortly before I left Sydney I heard from Line dance instructor Shin-ichiro Baba invit-

ing me to the workshop. Most of my time was already committed in Tokyo so Baba invited me to lunch and sent Hiroshi Sudo over to pick both Michael and I up together with an interpreter, Eiji Tomiyama. Tommy's father had been an English teacher and had taught his son well. To my surprise we were taken to the workshop where tables were set up for us laden with food. There were well over 100 enthusiastic welcoming dancers filling the packed hall, among them the smiling faces of dancers I had met at the World's in Nashville. What a thrill it was to see them!

The Workshop Instructors told me that they had set up the JCWDIC (Japanese Country & Western Dance Instructors Council) to support one another and promote Line dancing. The group includes Baba, Setsuko Lizuka, Kazuhiro Iguchi and Martha Ogaswara. At the Workshop I thoroughly enjoyed their teaching as did their students. Setsuko, who teaches three lessons a day mainly in Cultural Centres, told me that to retain the interest of her beginners she uses different pieces of music so that the basic dances they learn always seem new and fun.

I noticed at the workshop that the dances were taught predominantly to modern, funky music and the dancers themselves were all ages and dressed mainly in modern, casual but smart outfits. I was sorry I could only spend such a short time there and to say "Goodbye" the instructors wrote out a little speech in Japanese for me to present! I'm not quite sure exactly what I said but from their applause it seemed quite acceptable to the dancers. At this point I thought I would be taken back to the hotel to change and get ready to go out again but my hosts were horrified at the suggestion, after all I hadn't had a proper lunch. What generous people the Japanese are but I must say I don't know how they stay so slim and trim. That said, I think it is all the walking and cycling they do...plus dancing, of course.

But I still had one more Line dancing session to go. The next day, Hiro picked me up to go to a class led by instructors Yukiko Ohashi and Toshimi Mori, both talented dancers, in a bright, airy studio in the heart of the city. Without any previous experience, these young dedicated instructors organized their beginners' class by themselves from the production and distribution of the flyers, the finding and renting of the studio, lesson planning and so on, although with some wise advice and input from Hiro whom they obviously respect and admire. Toshimi's four-month-old baby boy, Yusuke,

kept half an eye on the proceedings under the watchful eye of his father, Masaaki. No doubt a future Japanese Line dance champion in the early stages! Teaching this class was a delight; the enthusiastic response, energy and laughter were wonderful feedback. Again, delicious snacks were laid out during the break and time was set aside to get to know one another. It was clear that the students were very fond of their lively instructors and wouldn't miss their classes for all the green tea in Japan!!

As before, after the class finished we went for another meal! It gave me a good opportunity to spend some time talking to Yuki who would very much like to compete in the World's 2004 in Nashville. Unfortunately, there isn't a UCWDC event held in Japan so she would have to travel far afield, on top of which in order to be eligible for the World's a dancer has to compete in three UCWDC events. As you can imagine this makes competing extremely difficult for any Japanese dancer. Nevertheless, I do hope Yuki makes it, she is a wonderful dancer and delightful young woman and her passionate enthusiasm for Line dancing sweeps all along who talk with her.

What a privilege it was to dance with the Japanese dancers I met. They are enthusiastic, welcoming, dedicated and patient. Line dancing is still in its infancy but obviously

growing as instructors gain more experience and confidence and the word spreads that Line dancing can be lots of fun, good exercise and a great way to make friends. It's a universal language that we can all share...the language of dance that knows no barriers.

Dances I taught:

Beer Run, Country Rhythm (Catahoula), Step to the Rhythm and Wings (I Will Love Again).

TIP:

If you go dancing in Japan wear outdoor shoes and carry your dance shoes separately. Quite often you will need to change out of your shoes at the entrance, put on slippers and then once in the room change into your dance shoes. It is a Japanese custom in the home and many other places to take off your shoes before entering.



She's a little Devil





When Pam Pike first came across Line dancing in 1995 she had no idea she'd end up running the classes, as Linedancer found out during a recent interview...

v first experiences of dancing were on an Adult Education Short Course run by my local council in Walthamstow," Pam told us. "The instructor was Christine Gibbons and I'd only decided to give it a go because I'd seen it on CMTV and thought it looked cool!" Pammi, as her friends call her, didn't even know there were any local clubs for her to join but now, thanks in part to her background as a Special Welfare Teacher, she teaches adult Line dancers between 16 and 60 something years in age. Oh yes, she also runs clubs throughout Greater London, so there's never a dull moment!

Her teaching methods are fascinating to say the least. "Dancers will vote with their feet if they don't like what I'm doing," she says, "and, in London, because of the geography - the fact that there's bound to be another class within say ten minutes walk - there's plenty of opportunity for them to do just that!" So Pam likes to get it right.

The Adult Education course is run by Waltham Forest Borough Council: "We've structured the course to teach as many of the basic steps as possible but, at the same

time, introduce them to rhythm, tempo and differing music styles. That doesn't mean we stick to 32-count beginner dances. Far from it!" After all, Pam tells us, there's no such a thing as a harder dance step; just different ways of stringing them together to make a routine.

Chris (Gibbons) was a major influence and introduced Pammi to characters like Frankie Cull and Johnny Two-step and it wasn't long before she found herself DJing at Johnny's club in Chingford. It was here that Pam also met Lesley and Paul Michel who support her at another one of her clubs, the Thin Blue Liners, in Bushey, Hertfordshire. This was founded in September 1999 and was the first club Pam owned and she was subsequently able to help emerging choreographers and instructors as she had been helped several years earlier. "One thing about the London scene is that it is very active," she reports. "If I wanted I could go Line dancing morning, noon and night. There is something for everyone and yet you don't tend to hear a lot about some of the clubs. They seem to prefer to just get on and dance. I'm in close touch with a lot of instructors. Anyway, most of them are friends of mine now and the only opportunity I get to see them is when they're working at a club!"

What is also encouraging is the way in which many of Pam's fellow instructors work together for the greater good. "I like to visit other clubs as much as possible, not only to see what's new and popular on the dance floor. You might find me at Hill's N Toes, run by Hilary Kurt and Clive Fuller, good friends of mine, or maybe up at Mark Cook's Family Connections in Finsbury Park."

On Wednesdays you'll find Pam at the Hainault Community Centre, Essex, with her beginner/improver class. Fridays bring all levels to the same venue and Sundays are her day for a 40-minute drive to the Home Counties. "The Thin Blue Liners is a great club", says Pam, "and I work very closely with Lesley and I am thrilled by the way in which she's developed as an instructor. They're a really friendly group up there who are always welcoming to beginners and I look forward to sharing their company every week."

Pam believes that the atmosphere created at a club is vital. "It must be comfortable and welcoming," she insists, "and saying hello when new people arrive is really important. Put yourselves in the punter's shoes for a while and you get a good idea of what they want."

What comes across more than anything is Pam's sheer enthusiasm and her willingness to have a laugh with her classes. "Just recently it took them five minutes to work out I was teaching them the *Hokey Cokey*," she says, laughing. "Keeps em on their toes!"

The ability to communicate seems to naturally to Pam and that's certainly the secret of her success. In London, she tells us, it's more difficult to run classes because hall hire tends to be more expensive and some club and hall owners no longer see Line dancing as the poor relation. "I have to charge $\pounds A$ for a class," Pam says, "so you need to enjoy what you're doing and make sure that they way you teach is effective. I enjoy what I'm doing, what I'm teaching and what I'm learning and I think that comes across."

What also emerges is that Pam refuses to go with the flow. She chooses dances extremely carefully. "I'm not interested in 'keeping up' with everyone. I am aware of my dancers and have a feel for what they'll like. It's more than having an ear to the ground and I'm certainly not swayed by a noisy minority of dancers who might, for instance, have attended a Line dance festival and returned with umpteen dance sheets. My teaches are only 30 minutes long in general and then we're going to get maybe two or three recaps and reteaches in the following weeks so the choice must be right." Preferring to keep it 60-40 in favour of Country, Pam feels she has that balance about right.

All this Line dance activity would be more than enough for your average addict but Pam tells us that she is, "the proudest mum on the planet! Emma-Louise, 13 going on 30, and Adam, 10, used to be a little embarrassed by their mum's Line dancing activities but now they love joining me and it's a great feeling. They keep my ageing mind active and I am so proud of the people they're turning into."

A similar story relates to Pam's fiancé Pete. He, too, was a Line dance skeptic put off by the dire images portrayed in the media about our hobby. "He wasn't going to get away with it for long," jokes Pam, "and I'm happy to report that He has become quite a nifty In-

termediate dancer in the last 18 months. He back walls for me at the clubs I'm involved in and the next step is to get him teaching although he says it'll never happen." In her few minutes of remaining spare time Pam admits to be a faithful Chelsea supporter. "A true blue since I was seven," she proudly maintains. (Pam is also a talented choreographer and her dances are available via her website. See below.)

At work Pam says she's "humbled" by teaching kids aged between two and 16 years with physical disabilities. "They always have a smile on their face," she reports, "and they kind of put things in perspective for me."

"All I do is have fun on the dance floor," says Pam. Her pupils are certainly privileged to have such an encouraging and experienced teacher. Her colleagues in London speak extremely highly of Pammi and the many great things she has done for the scene in London. We wish her all the best and encourage any reader who is able to attend one of her classes or socials if they get a chance.

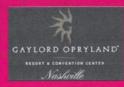

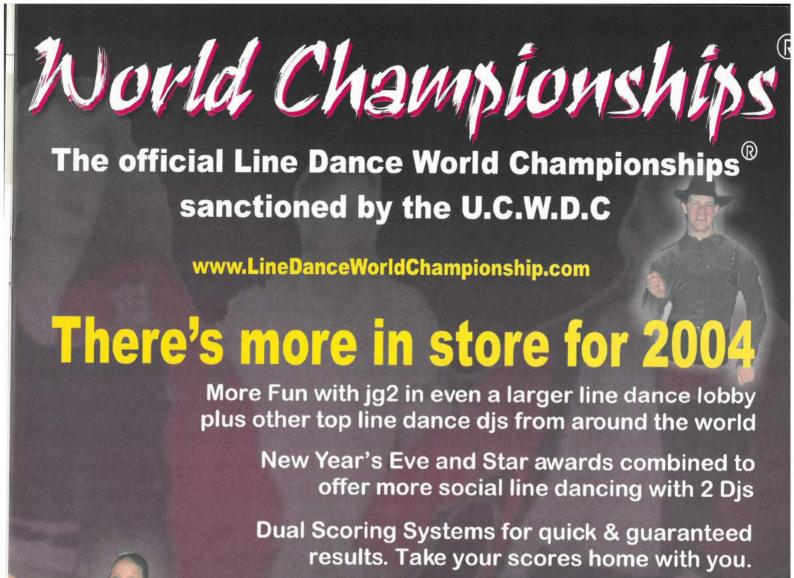

Whether you are eight or eighty, Line dancing is just the thing to put a little sparkle back into your life as Janet Slattery found out when she spoke to partygoers at Bagworth Working Mens Club in Leicestershire.

ena Pears celebrated the arrival of her 80th birthday on Friday April 25th 2003 - one day early - with class members of Dix 'n' Chix and her very good friend and neighbour Margaret Burton. The members had a collection a few weeks earlier and surprised Lena by presenting her with two rose bushes called Special Friend and Birthday Girl - along with a packet of fertilizer and a wooden gardener to look after them!

"It was a great night," said Lena. "Everyone sang happy birthday to me then we ate cream cakes especially baked for me by Line dancing friend June Dimmock." Just three days after her official birthday Lena and friend Margaret put the icing on the cake by passing their BWDA Bronze Medal tests with flying colours.

Lena and Margaret met some years ago at a bus stop. They used to go into town together on the same day and struck up a conversation. Things progressed naturally from there. Both had retired - Lena used to work in the offices at Tubes factory in Desford and Mar-

> garet helped her husband with his building business, so they enjoyed the regular outing and each other's company.

> Lena and husband loe have been married for more than 50 years. They have a married son and daughter, four grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Margaret will be 72 in August. She has two daughters, a son and eight grandchildren. She went to live next door to Lena four years ago after she was widowed. In her heyday Margaret was keen on jive and rock 'n' roll and is just as enthusiastic about Line dancing.

Both ladies like to keep active. They joined keep fit

classes for the Over-50's set up at the local primary school and were introduced to Line dancing by Julia, the keep fit teacher who taught one dance at each session. They liked it. When the instructor moved the classes to Bosworth Community College Lena and Margaret continued to support them for a while.

They noticed Dix 'N' Chix Line dance classes run by Yvonne McEwan were taking place at Bagworth Working Men's Club and went along to check them out.

"We were a bit apprehensive at first," says Lena, "but from the moment we stepped through the door we were made welcome. Everyone accepted us and our age did not

matter. That was nearly five years ago and we are still struttin' our stuff. We have made lots of friends and go twice weekly; to Yvonne's classes at Bagworth Club and Ibstock Club. We take turns in driving to the classes."

Lena has been dancing practically all her life. "I was 16 when war broke out in 1939. I went to the local girls' club in the church hall. There was a young married couple there who taught ballroom dancing. We learnt to waltz and foxtrot. Sometimes social dances were held and we were fortunate enough to dance to records. Joe and I were both keen ballroom dancers. When sequence dancing became fashionable we learnt that".

Sadly two years ago Joe had to give up dancing. "Line dancing has fulfilled my needs," continued Lena. "I don't need a partner and I sincerely believe it helps keep my body fit and more supple. It certainly gives my life a bit of a sparkle".





Lena is a live wire. She excused herself several times during our interview saying; "I love this dance, I've just got to do it," before heading hotfoot to the floor. Sliding coolly back into her seat she said, "There are so many dances that I like it would be hard to say which is my favourite. Islands In The Stream...Evergreen; any dance with a waltz beat...but I'm not much for the ones with too many twiddles and turns — I do have a limit!" She sits it out when Yvonne teaches The Break: "I might get the hang of this one next week". There is real determination in her voice.

Longevity and a love of dancing must be in the blood because Lena has two sisters who live in Yorkshire, one aged 89 the other aged 88. The youngest sister still goes sequence dancing. On her birthday Lena invited sequence dancing friends to their home to enjoy a glass of wine and piece of cake, then four generations of the Pears family got together for Sunday lunch to celebrate again. I asked Lena if she had any tips to offer others who might be apprehensive about joining any active lifestyle classes but who would like to make friends and seek new horizons.

Lena's motto is simple: "Don't give in; join in! There are perks to reaching 80 years old. You get that bit extra on top of your pension and I shall probably spend mine on Line dancing!".

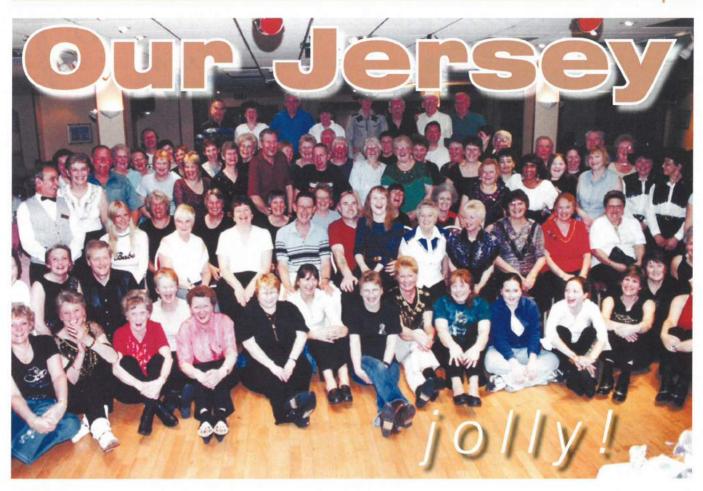

Dance Clinic

Pilates

WARMING UP TOPICS

It is encouraging to see topics like 'Warming Up' and 'Stretching' making their way onto the Linedancer message board. I am often asked if I still need to warm up. Yes, yes, yes. After a lifetime in the dance profession I still need to do warm ups, stretches and cool downs. I might not be as fit and flexible as I was when performing on stage but I feel best and move better when I maintain my structural fitness.

I STILL WANT TO BE ABLE TO TOUCH MY TOES

As I get older I still want to be able to do many of the things I could do when I was 18 like rolling down to touch my toes without groaning and feeling the strain. When I was a child I was always hanging upside down or doing cartwheels and handstands. Looking at these photographs I guess I am still being true to type.

PROFESSIONAL FEEDBACK

I can and do, my own conditioning exercises at home but there is nothing like professional feedback when going through your paces to ensure maximum safety and benefit. This is why I travel to Brighton [almost 50 miles round trip] to do regular sessions with Helge Fisher who runs the Brighton Pilates Studio instead of relying, purely on self-feedback. Under Helge's guidance any adjustments to my alignment and exercise technique can be made to ensure that I gain maximum benefit from each workout and continue to improve my body awareness.

TAILORED TO SUIT

The photos here demonstrate some of the more advanced exercises that can be done in a Pilates studio and these are only attempted, under guidance, once the necessary strength and flexibility have been achieved. If you are a Pilates beginner then a good instructor will tailor and progress your workouts to suit your ability, taking into account any injuries, medical conditions or alignment problems.

FEEL GOOD AND MOVE BETTER

Professional dancers have known about the benefits of the balanced way of working in Pilates for a long time. Following a Pilates or other good conditioning programme helps us to feel better and also move better. When I dance my body makes thousands of adjustments all the time so that I don't fall over. The more demanding the work the greater the challenge to the body to remain balanced. Without good structural fitness the body may not be able to meet these challenges without straining and putting itself at risk.

Moving better does not just apply to dancing though. By developing good postural habits we are helping to maintain our independence in later life because we want to continue to be mobile, active and able to do things for ourselves.

PILATES AND LINE DANCING

New steps and movements are emerging in line dancing almost daily. Some of them require a high level of strength, flexibility, co-ordination and balance if they are to be danced safely. Having good structural fitness will certainly help if you want to attempt these moves. How easy is it to balance on one leg? Do you feel wobbly or totally in control? If you want to be able to do all the fancy moves and turns then balance is a fundamental requirement, as you probably already know. Pilates can help you to develop the strong centre and good alignment that you need to tackle the latest Line dance challenges.

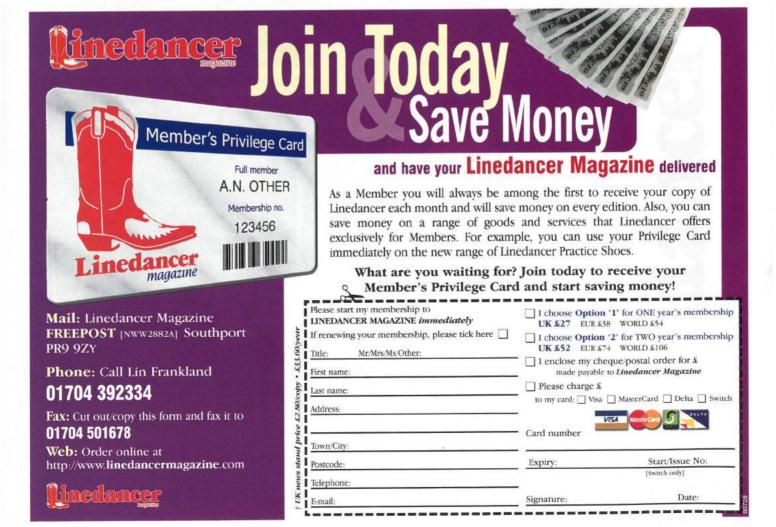

This represents a very small sample of the responses we have received to the survey published in last month's edition.

Comments like these are flooding in. Whilst they appear to be very negative, they are, in fact, simply honest statements of genuine concerns. Next month we will publish a selection of the responses from one of the other questions we posed.

The dance floor has spoken...

...and this is the message...

What is your greatest concern about the future of Line dance?

With so many difficult dances with such hard moves, I will (like many others) have to give up dancing.

It's just going downhill, many clubs are closing because it is becoming too techno!

We need more new members, the numbers are dropping in the clubs.

It's too disco. Too many turns.

Competitive edge on 'must do the latest dance' killing the social and fun aspect.

Too much Pop music and dances not really line dances!

Catering too much for advanced dancers, socials are becoming competitions.

Too many long, phrased and/or complex dances frightening away our existing dancers and deterring our new recruits.

That too many people will leave classes because they aren't learning satisfactorily, then classes will close and there won't be the choice for ordinary leisure dances.

Not enough new dancers. I have seen a big reduction in dancers at local clubs.

That it will fade out. I want to dance as long as I can.

There are too many new dances also they are becoming too hard.

That young people will not be encouraged to join us because of bad publicity and the perception that it is only for "oldies" and country music fans.

Far too many new hard dances. Not recruiting new members by making more time for beginners classes.

Dances getting too complicated and too many modern ones.

Because so many dances are long, fast and complicated, beginners come once or twice only — also many people have stopped line dancing for the same reason.

There's not enough attention given to beginners.

That too many new and complicated dances will put people off attending classes and socials.

That it will be spoilt by too much pop music. I took up line dancing because I love country and western music.

How to attract new dancers and keep them.

There are not enough young people taking it up because they think it is only based on country music.

Too much competition between local clubs to be first to teach a dance instead of working together. It is always them and us syndrome!!

Country/Pop music dividing Line dancers and too many complicated dances that put people off coming.

Too many dances every month and the music is getting out of hand.

People I know have left line dancing because there are too many hard dances to learn.

That it will become too complicated for the average dancer and people will lose interest.

Competition between local teachers i.e. who teaches fastest, hardest dances first.



Linedancer speaks to Zandra Varnham, who recently started a kid's Line dance class in the Milton Keynes area...

n the day we spoke to Zandy, as her friends in Line dance call her, she had just heard that she was being made redundant. Not the best of news but Zandra was in fighting form. "It's OK, I've got a job interview on Friday and something will turn up soon." You see, Zandra wants more than anything else to be a full-time dance teacher and started her training with BWDA 2000 last year. "From an early age I was dancing and I took ballet for years too. People at school knew about my interest in becoming a dance teacher but they wrote me off when I gave the ballet up. They said I'd never make it. I took that as a challenge, Look at me now, I've done the first stage by going through the BWDA 2000 system." Zandra had previously taught Irish and Line dancing on youth camps and thoroughly enjoyed herself surrounded by dozens of eager children.

After gaining her BWDA 2000 qualification, to celebrate and to put desire into action, Zandra started a new class on January 9th. The result, 'Funky Feet Dancers', a group of kids aged between six and 14. Initially, through support from a local hall's owners, where the Funksters meet, six children attended the first class and this has grown to 15 in a few short months, mainly through word of mouth. Impressive, given that Zandra has had to balance working full time with her dancing.

"Teaching the kids has been great," says Zandra. "I've learned so much in a short space of time and it's very rewarding. I was choked when they went in for their bronze medals with BWDA 2000, A great moment for us all. I was nervous to start with but soon calmed down. I've realised that with a group of kids like this you have to get the right ideas into their heads straightaway. Warming up, for instance. In every other form of dance I've experienced, and that's a lot, we've had warm-ups and stretching. But not in Line dance, much to my surprise. So from the outset I decided to warm up with the kids. They enjoy it, it's

a good way to get them moving and introduce new children into what I'm trying to do."

Zandra has been quite surprised to discover that the kids like some of the Country music numbers she's offered them, as well as Pop. "I let them choose which tracks to dance to," she says. "It works very well and makes them feel included in everything we do." Zandra is a local girl and was born in nearby Hemel Hempstead. She lived in Abersoch, North Wales, for some time, before heading south once more. She has been a Line dancer for eight years in total and her favourite class is Kim Ray's Bluegrass LDC, which meets in Bletchley. Zandra's current favourite dance is Losin The Love whilst her kids enjoy Ham's Jam, Cowgirl Twist, Stroll Along Cha Cha and Cheeseburger.

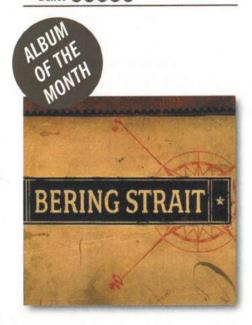
BERING STRAIT

ering Strait are a talented group of young musicians from Russia who decanted themselves to Nashville in the last couple of years. The release of their self-titled debut album has sent waves through Music City and indeed the rest of the States. The group comprises Natasha 25, lead vocals/guitar; Ilya 26, lead guitar/Dobro; Lydia, keyboards/vocals; Sasha 23, Dobro/steel/lap steel; Alexander 30, drums and Sergei 25, bass. As well as writing their own material they have used some of the finest wordsmiths in Nashville and it was with much anticipation that I put the CD into the player.

The first track, What Is It About You (110 bpm), is a strong opener. This Cha Cha will appeal to many of you and the band's superb musicianship is immediately apparent. A winner! Tell Me Tonight (136 bpm) has a Dire Straits feel to it and, with Natasha's smooth vocals, this delightful track is very danceable. I Could Be Persuaded (125 bpm) is a good fast waltz that is a little reminiscent of the Grease soundtrack; well, that era anyway! I'm sure you will be dancing to this before much longer. I love it. When Going Home (140 bpm) is another Dire Straits influenced number very much in the Sultans of Swing mode. It clips along at a nice pace. We are only four tracks in and so far all good dance tracks!

I'm Not Missing You (118 bpm) is another nice waltz and it is a haunting song that again could be a hit, whilst Only This Love (68 bpm) is a beautiful song that is too nice to dance to. I Could Use A Hero (113 bpm) was co-written by none other than Jenai. This contemporary Country track has a

strong beat and a good melody. The Trouble With Love (152 bpm) is a song based around a phone call and is the type of song that Carlene Carter was putting out at her best; a great track.

Jagged Edge Of A Broken Heart (112 bpm) is another strong dance track; it's another Cha Cha crying out for a nice dance to be written to it. Bering Strait (various bpm) is a seriously good instrumental on which the band gets to show off all their immense musical skills. It begins at polka pace, and then slows down for a couple of minutes before building into a rocker with an awesome guitar solo. Clever choreography could make this a bit special.

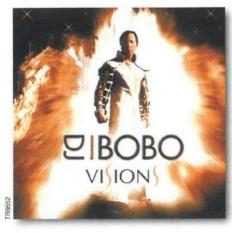
Porushka Paranya (134 bpm) is a traditional Russian song brought right up to date. Gary Queen of my Heart Lafferty has written a brilliant dance to this with which he brought Bering Strait to the attention of the Line dancing public. At the time of writing Gary's dance was gaining in popularity daily, and by the time you read this I am sure it will be a big hit! Closing the album we find Like A Child (129 bpm), a live recording which shows that the band are just as good on the stage. This as another fine dance prospect.

Bering Strait have delivered a superb debut album and, as long as they continue in this vein, they should have a highly successful career. I hope that choreographers out there take the time to look at this great album; I for one would enjoy playing many of the songs off it. Bering Strait is a damn fine album and you should get yourself a copy now.

J Bobo is a multi platinum-selling artist and now releases his eighth studio album. Let's see if his style will appeal to the UK Line dance market.

The first track, *I Believe* (132 bpm), has tempted Daniel Whittaker and Hayley Westhead to write *Black Magic*, a 64-count, four-wall intermediate dance to it that fits this great Pop track so well and it should be a big summer hit. *Rock My World* (110 bpm) inspired Alan Birchall to choreograph *DJ, Rock My World*, a 32-count, four-wall intermediate dance that will appeal to many of you.

Do You Remember (105 bpm) begins acoustically but soon builds into a nice steady beat that makes it good for dancing. One Vision, One World (105 bpm) has a bit of a reggae flavour to it, and it's another of those tunes that once it gets into your head you can't get it out! Another hit? Chihuahua (90 bpm), or Mambo No.5 revisited! This very catchy tune was a big hit in Spain and it's easy to see why! It has already had several dances written to it and, as ever, you pays your money and takes your choice...

Visions (144 bpm) has a Bollywood flavour about it and clever choreography could make it a good

dance track. Change the world (104 bpm) is a song with a message about changing the world. Not sure about the theme but it's a good funky track nonetheless. Let Me Be The One (130 bpm) is possibly one of the strongest dance tracks on the album; it has a good beat, a good hook, and I see no reason why this won't be a monster dance hit!

Let's Come Together (92 bpm) is another idealistic song although it is catchy, whilst Angel (95 bpm) has a Spanish flavour with its Flamenco style guitar. Music Is My Passion (124 bpm) and mine too. This awesome Latin flavoured Cha Cha is another perfect summer tune and must surely tempt someone to write a dance to it. I'm Living A Dream (110 bpm) is simply another good Pop dance track, and similar remarks apply Like A Bird (130 bpm), which is somewhat faster and reminds me of the old Buggles' hit, Video Killed The Radio Star. I Believe (Pop version, 132 bpm) is a bonus track that closes the album. It has a different beginning than track one and a different beat.

Visions from DJ Bobo is simply a great Pop album. Those of you taking a continental summer holiday will hear lots of these tracks in the bars and clubs. Order yourself a copy of this album and get ready for the DJ BOBO invasion!

roy Olsen, 30, was born and raised in Arizona. In his early twenties he began performing in clubs, which he grew to love, and fate took a hand in his career when Linda Ronstadt was recording in the same studio where Troy was cutting some demo songs. She rang her manager who signed him, and Troy was on his way.

We begin with Living In Your World (93 bpm), which has a slight Cajun flavour to it with some awesome fiddle playing. Troy sounds like a cross between Clay Walker and Dwight Yoakam and that ain't no bad thang! Making Believe (105 bpm) has an older Country feel to it with its twangy steel guitar and strong bass line. It's the kind of stuff you hear in Tootsie's in Nashville and will appeal to the Country purists. She's Mine (154 bpm) raises the tempo considerably and this Country rocker is ripe for choreography. This is one of the best dance prospects on the album.

Who Gave You The Right (114 bpm) is a very 'Texas' sounding track, if you know what I mean, and it would be right at home on one of Dwight's better albums. As with the entire album Troy had a hand in the writing of this song. Heaven That I

Found is a slow listening song that shows a different side to Troy, whilst *The Hank Song* (135 bpm) pays homage to the late, great Hank Williams. You can hear the Johnny Cash sounding guitar style that the Mexicans taught Troy all those years ago. *Little By Little* (96/192bpm) is a fine Two-stepper that is enriched with Wurlitzer organ. This is one of the best dance tracks on the album and I am sure that it could be a bit.

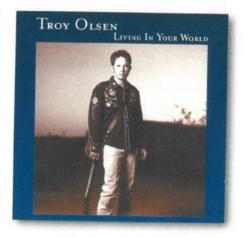
Stronger Than The Wine (120 bpm) is an East Coast swinger in the mould of some of George Jones hits. This is simply a good Country dance track. Rock Me (143 bpm) as the title suggests this is a Country rocker, a good dance track, just waiting for a good dance to be written to it. The closer, Trying to Find Love (76 bpm), is a Night Club Twostep. For some reason this track makes me think of a smoky bar down in New Orleans. It may be a bit slow for many of you but it is a good track.

In Complete contrast to the DJ Bobo pop album, Living In Your World from Troy Olsen is a fine real Country album and it just goes to show that there is something for all Line dancers out there. It is only a matter of time before Troy Olsen is a big hit, and I can highly recommend this album to you.

enny Rogers is a legend in Country music. He has sold millions of albums; indeed he is rated the fourth best selling male artist of all time! He has won countless awards, and, incredibly, he shows no signs of letting up. His latest album release *Back To The Well* will be his 61St. Amazing!

The first song Back To The Well (81 bpm), has a light bluegrass feel to it. I love the "swamp" harmonica, the fiddle, Dobro and mandolin. This is a nice opener, which could make for a gentle dance track. Listen To The Rain (78 bpm) was co-written by Billy Dean. Kenny himself describes this as "infectious with a haunting groove". The song is about staying in bed all day, making love and listening to the rain. 727 East Magnolia Avenue (80 bpm) will remind you of Lionel Ritchie's "Still". This beautiful Night Club Two-step will have you gliding along the dance floor. We Owe Them More Than That (104/208bpm) is a duet with Tim McGraw. This song pays tribute to country legends Hank Williams, Marty Robbins, Waylon Jennings and Lefty Frizzell. This is a good Two-stepper and is waiting for someone to choreograph to it.

Prairie Wedding (69 bpm) was penned by Mark Knopfler and it sounds like he plays guitar on the track. This is a cool song, which, rather unusually, tells the story of a mail order bride. I don't know how theses songwriters dream them up. I'm Missing You is a poignant song written by Steve Wariner. This stunning song is too nice to dance to. Harder Cards (75 bpm) was a big hit for Kenny last year in the States. This moving song is in the

mould of Kenny's classics Coward Of The County and Lucille. Kenny describes this as a public awareness record as it tells of domestic abuse...

Tears In God's Eyes (70 bpm) is another moving song about the difference between the rich and the poor and who need God's tears more. This is another nice little Night Club Two-step. Suitcase Full Of Blues (92 bpm) lifts the mood and the tempo. Awesome slide guitarist Leroy Parnell guests on this bluesy number and many will be surprised to find Kenny doing this type of song, which is a strong dance track.

You Have No Idea (60 bpm) is a beautiful love song, "It'd be like an eagle trying to tell you, how it would feel to fly above the world below you". OK, so I admit to being an old romantic! Handprints On The Wall (91 bpm) is a nice slowish Cha Cha about growing up and how time goes by through the eyes of a parent. The final song, Love Like This (88 bpm), is a duet with Alison Krauss whose smooth, distinctive harmonies add so much to this beautiful song.

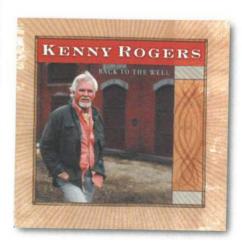
This album shows that Kenny Rogers still has so much to offer to the world of Country music. I admit that that the album is not full of rocking Country dance tracks, but it does have a variety of songs that can be danced to. It will be available as a limited edition double CD with a live album recorded in New York in 2002, which contains 17 of Kenny's biggest hits. This is a class album for those with discerning taste.

You're Never Too Old!

Who said you can't teach an old dog new tricks? I have been teaching two daytime classes for the past year. I learned to Line dance whilst on holiday eighteen months previously, and took to it like a duck to water. I hadn't danced for about thirty years as my husband was disabled for that time but, within a couple of months I was keeping fit, using my brain and, having recently been widowed, did not need a partner.

When our teacher Jane decided to give up teaching, many of the class members asked if I would take on the role, as they didn't want the classes to cease. I was unsure if I could do it or if the entire class would support me, but I need not have worried. They were great and gave me plenty of encouragement.

It is not a moneymaking exercise; I just do it for fun. Firstly, I bought four albums from the *Dean Brothers*, who I think are great and they also include dance scripts for the music. Then I discovered *Linedancer* magazine and now have the *Steppin' off the Page* CD, which has been a great help.

Our classes are for absolute beginners through to intermediate and ages range from 40–75 years old. New dancers are always introduced to the class and welcomed by all; they are very friendly ladies, not at all cliquey like some classes I have visited.

All dances are demonstrated thoroughly and any problems ironed out before we dance to the music. Quite often I will use a slower speed track for teaching a tricky dance and then repeat the dance near the end of the lesson at the correct speed. Although new dancers are catered for, it is never to the detriment of the more experienced dancers

and just recently, I have extended one of the classes for them to try some more demanding dances that I feel the majority of the class may not cope with. I want them to go home happy, not dejected.

We start the class with a simple warm-up; have a break to take on water halfway through, and a slow classic to finish. We usually do six or seven dances per hour and I never introduce more than two new dances in any one lesson. The new dances are then repeated for at least three more weeks so that they become very familiar and give any absentees a chance to catch up. I always call the dance steps throughout, especially for a new dance. When I feel that all are getting the hang of it, I reduce the calling to a minimum, if I see that everyone is competent, I shut up so that we can listen to the music and possibly sing along.

Every week, I ask the class if they have any requests and will relegate one of my planned dances to accommodate them, (thank goodness that I have a good memory it could be any one of two hundred) and we dance the request(s) there and then. After all, it is their class and I want them to do the dances that they enjoy, not just the ones that I like.

I prefer to use a mix of music, both Country and Popular; from the sixties to present day. Sometimes I hear people say, 'Ah, this takes me back to when I was a teenager.' We mustn't forget the golden oldies.

Considering that I am in my late fifties, we should remember; you're never too old to learn and have fun! Line dancing has given me a new lease of life.

The Linedancer Survey

At last Linedancer is starting to take the requisite action needed to rescue this great pastime of ours! The survey must be a first step towards addressing the real issues faced by dancers at club level. Your editorial said it all and for you to have to do this is an indictment of a small minority of Line dancers who effectively rule the roost.

You were right to state that it is the pressure to conform that is a major problem. We all know

of friends who have, as they say, "voted with their feet". It's a lot to do with the difficulty level and the sheer volume of dances. Sometimes friends of mine go to weekend events and come back with armfuls of dance sheets and our instructor can't cope. She can only teach one new dance and doesn't want to do more but feels under pressure from the noisy minority.

We need guidance and support. Please can Linedancer support the clubs that are the lifeblood of the scene rather than, say, the circuit dancers who do not represent the majority. Michelle Pearson, Lincoln.

Club or Country?

I have discerned a change in the attitudes of some Line dancers. The survey is a good idea and I hope it has not come too late to stop an exodus. The introduction of ever more fast and furious and complicated dances with tags and breaks has driven too many people away.

Between the Lines

Whether we like it or not, the majority 'core' of Line dancers are past their youth and do not want to feel as if they have done a marathon after a dance session. June's dance selection is right; something for everyone. Another problem came to light in Sho's Dance Clinic where she asked, "Who Benefits?" What about the dancers? Surely they need to benefit?

Line dancing has become a big business with some people making far too much money out of it. Today's scene bears no resemblance to that which attracted me initially, nine years ago. Then we all danced for the love of it, not for how much money could be made.

Choreographers cannot take all the blame. Dancers themselves must share some of it. If they do not like the dances they are being taught surely they should tell their teachers? Giving up is not the answer. In the class I attend we use a lot of Country music and use alternative tracks from many sources. The music is there if people will only look.

I've been an instructor now for almost eight years and thinking seriously about giving it all up because of the attitude of other instructors in my area. If this happens there will be a lot of dancers who can no longer continue as there is no way they can get to another club. There are about five others here and the problem is none will help take part in anything that we are organising, such as raising money for charities. One particular instructor has even organised a social night on the same date as we were trying to raise money for our local charity! Maybe they think you're out to poach their own dancers but, as I've said many times to my group, you

are free to choose where you go or with who ever you please as long as you support some of the events I organise.

I teach so that, for a couple of hours a day, dancers can forget any problems by coming along and enjoying themselves. They go home feeling good. I go home feeling I have achieved something as well.

Linedancer says: We occasionally hear of such sad stories and it contrasts with other examples of instructors working together. We must try and work for the common good and to understand that in order for Line dancing to grow we must try and promote Line dancing in concert with local instructors if at all possible.

Top Ten Trauma!

I have just completed the survey in the magazine, which caused me to reflect on my own and my fellow dancers' views on the current state of Line dancing. One of the things we'd really like to know is how the voting works for the Dancer's Top Ten because we are sometimes surprised by the dances which get into it.

We hear that if someone votes by computer they can vote many times in the month, whereas those who fill out the chart in the magazine would only be voting once a month.

We would love to know the truth...

Linedancer replies: The procedure is quite simple. Postal votes and online votes are entered into a single database. Each dance is given a 'weighting' score depending on its position. For instance, a person's top choice gets 10 points, their second choice 9 points and so on.

When the Top 10 was introduced online, anybody could vote. However, some people did try to manipulate the chart by voting multiple times. This was easy to spot and was always corrected.

To stop people trying, we made it a requirement to become a 'registered' user of the website in order to vote. This way we can check who is voting each month and once they have voted they are not allowed to enter again within a 30-day period.

We also 'tidy' the chart regularly to make sure spelling errors are corrected otherwise votes would be split between the correctly spelt dance and the mis-spelt dance. The Top 10 that appears in the magazine is a 'snapshot' of the chart produced each month just before the magazine goes to the printers.

Dances may rise rapidly in the chart if a number of people suddenly vote for the same dance, but over a period of time, this will average out.

The Westlife Experience

Like most Line dancers I prefer a mix of music - some Pop, Latin, Country and Irish. In addition, like many Line dancers, I have tried to get my friends involved in the Line dance scene because I enjoy it so much. I have had limited success!

It is true to say that the cowboy image puts many of them off and it is not helpful when Line dancing shown on the TV harks back to the relatively limited style of yesteryear and encourages the idea that we are all wannabe cowboys and cowgirls. This is not the Line dancing that I have come to know and love in the last five years, which has encouraged the development of a more modern style by no means dependent on Country music. The biggest Line dance of all time must be *Chill Factor*, to a Pop track!

True, I like some Country music but a lot of it is simply not my thing. I know a lot of my dance floor friends feel the same way, so

when I saw a London-based non-Line dance choreographer putting the Westlife group through their paces on BBC1 on Bank Holiday Monday I was shocked. We were told in the commentary that the cowboy attitude encouraged by the trainer was Line dancing. It bore no resemblance to what we do at our club. Despite the BBC Radio 4 programme that put Line dancing in a good light, the efforts of the BBC 1 researchers left too much to be desired.

When you are trying to sell a product you need to have a vibrant, modern and appealing image, so simply pigeon-holing us and telling people that a couple of ill-timed 'walks forward' is Line dancing is an insult. Recently, we have come in for a battering on TV. This is nothing new and doesn't help any of us.

If the Westlife programme had stuck to its brief - seeing whether the Irishmen could "cut it" in Nashville - then I doubt we'd have any complaints. That part of the programme

was successful in its own right. Judging by the responses on the linedancermagazine.com message board and elsewhere, there is confusion here. Being critical of the questionable image is not to criticise the Country music that many Line dancers love. Neither is it a question of the supposed 'origins' of Line dance, which seem to be many and varied.

I just believe that you can't turn the clock back and stop choreographers from exploring a number of related dance styles and putting them into Line dance scripts.

If programme makers are going to mention Line dance we need to make efforts to ensure they listen to the wide range of opinions within Line dance rather than giving the impression that we are renegade barn dancers! Only when we are organised enough to make representations to TV programme makers and the researchers who find subjects for producers can we hope to progress. Dave Coetze, Wimbledon, London.
