The collection launched the number-one hits *It's Five O'clock Somewhere* and *Remember When*, both of which have been nominated for the ACM song of the year and single record of the year awards.

#### Rhine Cowboys

The Country Music Messe bills itself as Europe's largest music fair. After appearing there for the second year in a row, *Linedancer* choreographers Alison Biggs and Peter Metelnick had to agree.

The talented pair report that more than 10,000 people travelled to the Berlin event and enjoyed performances by 100 acts. Four stages played host to diverse group of country acts

a diverse group of country acts. The largest stage had a dance floor in front of concert seating, letting fans dance along to their favourite bands. The floor was always full, with the *Tush Push* coming out favourite with the many Line dancers strutting their stuff.

Truly international in flavour, musicians and exhibitors came from as far away as Japan and the US changing the venue - the Fontane-Haus - into a European "Grand Ole Opry" for the weekend. Line dancing continued to be a major part of the weekend event, with instruction

from locals Enrico Adler and Susanne Schalewa, German Country Western Dance Association instructors Manuela DeGuire, Robert Hahn, and Heike Schmidt and, to add an international flavour, Britain's own Alison and Peter. During the weekend, more than 35 dances were taught, including competition dances for the upand-coming Berlin Open and Masters in Line.

During the course of the Saturday evening there were many demonstrations of all forms of dance in the Stage Hall, including the Can-Can by an amazing troupe of dancers from the Netherlands called the Can-Can Girls (although there were a few men in there, too). Then, of course, came Line dancing, and an audience of too many people to estimate.









Alison said: "It was the biggest audience we have ever had the pleasure of performing in front of, which was quite awesome and a little nerve-wracking!"

The Country Music Messe, founded in 1967 and promoted by American Tie, has been going from strength to strength. In the early days it had an audience of 2,500 people but it has come a long way since then. Next year will be its 10th Anniversary celebration and it is fast becoming a must for everyone who enjoys country music, partying and, dancing.

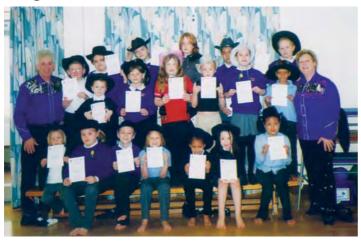
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#### Welsh Fargo Western Dance Club, Cardiff

#### Youngsters feel the beat



Young people in Shropshire are getting their first taste of Line dancing thanks to the efforts of one of the regions' top instructing teams.

Alan and Barb Heighway's Feel the Beat roadshow has been holding after-school classes for children aged 4-11 and are being overwhelmed with requests for their services.

The Telford couple, who set up their club seven years ago, began the initiative at Hollinswood Primary School and were delighted by the response. Word soon spread and the couple are now booked up for similar gigs more than a month ahead.

"It is a pleasure teaching them," said Alan Heighway, 56. "We realised quite quickly that because of the age range we had to keep things simple and that has been the secret of this success. We start off very slow and let them get the hang of things, bringing them on gradually. But we are always surprised at just how well they handle it."

Alan thinks it's important to make the dancing as fun as possible and encourages children to dress up in cowboy hats and only be done to country music

other western gear. But he has no time for purists who think that Line dancing should only be done to country music.

"We always teach dances to the original songs, many of which are from country music, but after they have learnt the basic steps we are happy to accommodate requests for other types of music. If there is a suitable pop song that fits the dance then why not do it? At Hollinswood, for example, we taught them *Old Soldiers* by Paul Bailey and then put those steps to two recent pop hits - Peter Andre's *Mysterious Girl* and *Cha-Cha Slide* by DJ Casper."

#### 7th Birthday for Jolly Stompers



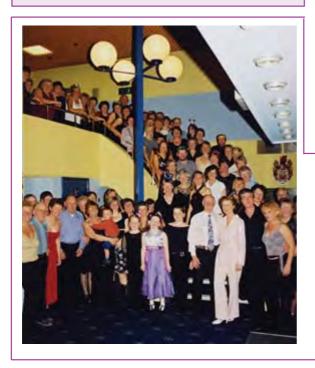

#### Lynn Williams L4 Leather Liners Gloucestershire Fizz

*Mary Kelly* Like A Rock To A Window -Darryl and Don Ellis

This is a great little beginner dance. It has all the elements you look for in that category of dance, 32 counts and plenty of interest in the foot work. With good music this is a good confidence-boosting type of dance as Beginners like a challenge but not a struggle. A good follow up from Mary after *Closer*.

#### Ain't Gonna Be *Tina Argyll* No Clouds - Liberty X

All my classes love this little dance, again only 32 counts but with some interesting steps. The music is from Liberty X but it is not overly pop. It's well worth a look at this one if you if you're looking for a easy teach where they dance, they sing, they smile.

#### Hay Honey *Ed Lawton* Why Haven't I Heard From You? -Reba McEntire

This is a fabulous Reba McEntire track which has a raunchy feel to the music. 48 counts 4 walls with one easy 16 count tag and an option to body roll if you want. A cool dance with the opportunity to put in a bit of attitude, the dance has had a good response from other clubs in this area, too.

#### Kate Sala

Mariana Mambo - Chayanne The class really like this dance - a good fun, happy dance, to a catchy track. You do not have to announce it, as soon as the class hear the first few beats they cannot get onto the floor quick enough. The steps hit the beat and the dance flows really well. Having mastered the tricky turns at the end, the dance grows on you the more you do it. Even our beginners are requesting it. A great intermediate dance. It will be a favourite here for a while to come. Kate has another big hit with this one and it will be another floor filler.

#### Hole In The Head *Neville Fitzgerald* Hole In The Head - Sugababes

I personally like this dance, and the great track that goes with it, but unfortunately my class do not seem to have taken to it so well. They have found it difficult to master and are shying away from it. I have noticed on visits to other clubs, that it's not a floor filler. The more advanced members of my class are sticking with it though.

#### Leave Right Now Jan & Mark Caley Leave Right Now - Will Young

The Will Young factor will be the success of this dance. The Ladies here cannot get enough of him. The dance has been cleverly choreographed to this slow track, by giving it a lift and some life, with the step arrangements and timing. It took time to teach, as the class had to get to grips with the timing, and tried to put their own styling to the dance. Once learnt, they seem to like it, and will no doubt continue to dance it. I will, however, be taking a coffee break.

#### Alison Biggs **AB Stompers, Herts** All Night Long *Robbie McGowan Hickie*

#### You Rock Me - Enrique Iglesias

I loved this dance from the onset and the class's reaction was the same. Prefer to use the music by Enrique over Atomic Kitten. It just gives the dance that something extra. Nothing difficult to remember, just a lot of fun to dance.

#### Cho-Co-latte

#### Yvonne Anderson

La Chiqui Big Band - David Civera

I learnt this from Yvonne while I was teaching at an event in Tampa, Florida in November, and have been teaching it ever since. It's an easy intermediate, fun-loving dance to an infectious piece of music. This fills the floor

every week in my classes. Also worth checking out is *Too Funky For Me* choreographed by Yvonne along with two US choreographers, Mark Cosenza and Glen Pospieszny. This is a great funky 32 count dance.

#### By Your Side *Kathy Hunyadi* Send Me A Lover - Taylor Dayne

This is an easier Night Club two-Step to a great song sung by Taylor Dayne. Although the steps aren't difficult it has to be danced with feeling. The entire class enjoys this one even though the music is on the slower side. It's a great dance to wind things down with.

#### You've Got Possibilities - Matt Monro (also on the Crystal Boot Awards Workshop Special CD)

A real 'crowd pleaser' at the Awards, it was great to learn this from Max Perry. It's a bit long and looks daunting but don't be put off as it is a well-crafted dance, typical of Max's experienced 'cool' style. Comfortable to dance, with familiar step combinations that help it to flow easily, our Intermediate class really enjoyed it and it appealed to all ages. We substituted the 'unwind full turn' in section 4 with a click of the fingers and the two half montereys.

#### Unmistakably Good *Rob Fowler* That's Good - Glenn Rogers (on the 2nd In Line CD)

We were not sure how the 'country personality' of this dance would be received, but the dance is a simple one with an easy 'laid- back' style, well followed by most levels of dancers and is relaxing to dance. (Watch out for a slightly challenging area due to the 'off-beat' timing in the rock and cross sequence and first slow sweep early on in the dance). Surprisingly some of the younger members liked the music and it certainly does grow on you as it is humorous. This 'makes the dance.'

#### The Groovin Thing Mark Furnell Superstar - Jamelia

Our younger members really enjoy this dance. It is funky and challenging because it has a tricky one and a quarter turn on one foot but if you take this turn in sections and 'spot' it is manageable. There is another tricky turning bit towards the end but this can be simplified from one and a half to a half turn. We vary the music and most steady chart tracks will do. The key to this dance is to look where you are going and don't panic! Mark describes this on the step sheet as a Beginner/Inter level. We personally would only teach it to our Intermediates and up... but give it a try.

#### Mark & Jan Caley Caley's Country WDC, Clacton, Essex

Lights Out Team UK

#### Out Go The Lights - Lonestar

This is a great dance to a great track by Lonestar. It is a high intermediate dance which fits the track a treat. Well received by the class.

#### Sube-Amor *Karen Hunn* Se Me Sube (Merengue Version) -Manny Manuel

This is a fast dance which took a couple of teaches to become a favourite with the class. A nice combination of steps fits this particular track very well.

#### Taste It Crazy Chris

Taste It - Blue A funky 32 count two wall dance which has become popular with all levels of dancers and gone down very well in our classes.

#### Much Too Young *Gary Lafferty* Much Too Young - Garth Brooks

A brilliant Garth Brooks track which we have always loved and now a nice improver level dance to go with it. The dance has gone down well in all our classes.

#### Hidden X

Andrew, Simon & Sheila

The "hidden track" by Liberty X is a brilliant but very hard dance which has become very popular with our advanced dancers.

#### Ladies Night Teresa & Vera

Ladies Night - Atomic Kitten

Yes, this is getting there, they seem to have taken to it, maybe because the music is current. Time will tell. Not a difficult dance and easy to teach. Being requested while we are still teaching. Good sign.

#### Cho-Co-latte Yvonne Anderson

La Chiqui Big Band - David Civera After the second week they are really warming to this dance. It will be BIG, as long as you haven't already Latin'ed them to death! On a cautionary note, we can't help feel that the word 'Beginner' shouldn't come within a mile of this dance.

#### De Wop Be Doo, Be Doo Gaye Teather Shang-A-Lang - Bay City Rollers or It Don't Get Better Than This -Rodney Crowell

This dance has been given to our improvers and experienced dancers and they love it. There is nothing difficult in the teaching, the only problem is deciding which music to use! The Rollers seem to have the edge at the moment.

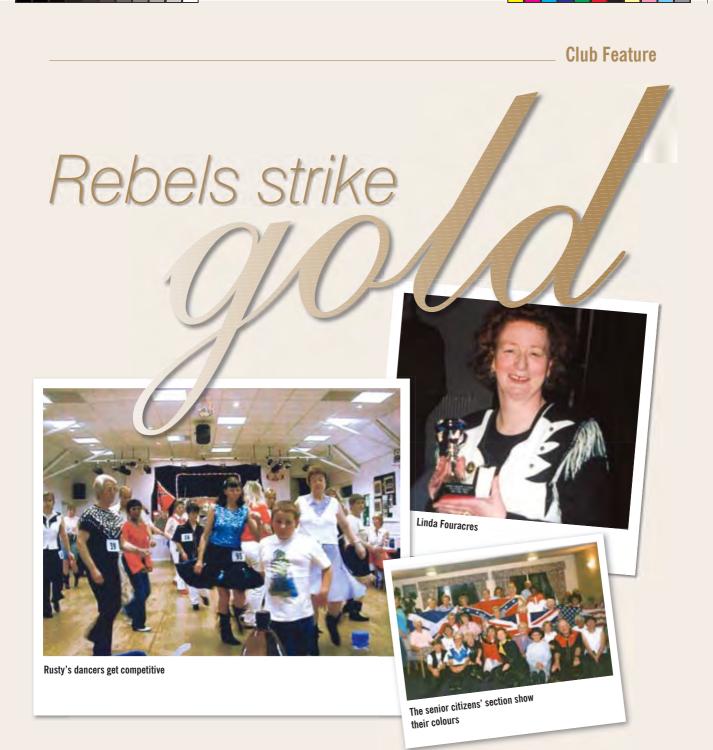

Glastonbury is famous the world over for its music festival - but has a thriving dance scene, too usty's Renegades, who form the Line dance section of The Linda Fouracres School of Dance, are continuing to pull in the punters by keeping classes fun and offering something for every level of

Line dancer, from beginners to Gold Bar standard.

"If your pupils go home after a lesson or dance, feeling exhilarated, then you know you have succeeded in your task," Linda says. "Line dancing is a fun way to keep fit and provides an excellent cardiovascular workout – but it is the social aspect that is all important.

"There is something about Line dancing that makes it a great stress buster. For many it is a period of time for people to enjoy a break from the stresses and strains of the day. Meanwhile, music can also be a marvellous healer for mind and body."

An associate member of the United Kingdom Alliance (UKA), Linda has been teaching in Glastonbury since January 1999. However, she actually started to dance from an early age - aged 3 in fact – beginning with ballet

before moving on to Tap, Latin American, Modern Sequence, Country, Scottish, Ballroom and Old Time Dancing. A fully qualified instructor, she is currently teaching Ballroom as well as Line dancing.

Recently at Walton Village Hall just outside the town, Linda hosted a unique dancing event that mixed Sequence, Line, Old Time and Ballroom dancing. The result went down a storm and became known locally as SLOB dancing – after the initials of the dance disciplines rather than the fitness of the participants!

Linda is very concerned that as much emphasis is put on cooling down after dances as warming up before them. It is especially important to have a gentle cooling down session after sustained dancing, she says

"The UKA training was invaluable," she says, "you learn all about rhythm, risk assessment, technique, and most importantly the correct execution of the steps!"

With regard to different rhythms and types of music, if Linda thinks a particular dance will suit a certain class then she teaches it - and it is at this point that your favourite Line dancing magazine becomes invaluable.

"*Linedancer* is invaluable for keeping me aware of the trends around the country and for all the scripts," Linda says. "Instructors always have to keep abreast of the dances being played at the local socials so dancers can go out and enjoy the fruits of their lessons!"

The classes gradually increase in difficulty throughout the session and pupils gradually progress from beginner to improver/ intermediate/advanced at their own pace. Medal work through the UKA is available for those who wish to participate. All those who pursue this avenue thoroughly enjoy the challenge and it gives them an added sense of purpose. The last medal test produced extremely good results from Bronze right through to Gold Bar 3.

Linda says: "It's a fantastic feeling watching the dancers at the monthly social. There is a wide range of ages and differing abilities, yet all of them are deriving enormous pleasure from their Line dancing. The pleasure and confidence that it brings is truly amazing. Many pupils say they cannot imagine how they managed before Line dancing!"

Pupils travel from Shepton Mallet, Frome, and Bridgwater, as well as from Glastonbury's surrounding villages. Linda's latest beginners' class, at Tor Leisure on Thursdays, has proved to be very popular. Every month a Line dance social is held in addition to the school's weekly tea dance and regular charity quizzes.

Cards and letters from pupils thank Linda for introducing them to dancing and acknowledge that she has opened up a whole new life for them.

Linda says: "These letters really make the job worthwhile. It is a lovely feeling to be able to bring enjoyment into the lives of others."

#### RUSTY'S RENEGADES LINE DANCERS

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t was my first visit to Benidorm and I was very pleased to be met and escorted around the sights and Line dance venues by fellow dancer, companion and friend, Margaret Burton who was enjoying a three-week holiday there. Margaret is a member of the Dix'n'Chixs Dance Club back in Leicestershire, England.

Our first port of call was the Hotel Ambassador where Paula Baines was leading the dancing. Paula (32) has been dancing ever since she was four years old, taking up Ballroom, Latin American and Disco and competing since she was eight.

She is a warm and friendly person who told me enthusiastically that she has always loved dancing. "Mum's a ballet and tap teacher so I kind of grew up with it. My role model is Paula Graves. She styled my hair and put

on my make-up. In fact, her mum was my original teacher when I first took up dancing." Paula explained that when you take up Ballroom and Latin American dancing you usually have more than one teacher as you need a wide spectrum of instructors to pass on their skills. She mentioned that her dancing technique was also greatly influenced by Pat Thompson and George Clode.

Paula Baines hails from Glossop but lived in Derbyshire for a time before moving to Benidorm. She paid tribute to her parents to whom she owes so much. "Over the years my dancing must have cost mum and dad a fortune and I do sincerely thank them for all they have done. One dress alone can cost  $\pounds 1,000$  and sometimes a dancer can have six dresses a year. Then there are shoes, makeup, hair and travel expenses." Paula's dancing has taken her all over Europe, competing in tough competitions, but it has all been worthwhile, she said.

#### **Line Dancers Abroad**

"I have been involved in Line dancing for 13 years now and I think I have found my feet," she laughed. "I am now a resident of Benidorm and run classes here in the Western Bar on Tuesdays, Fridays and Sundays from 3pm to 5.30pm. On Thursdays I teach from 2.30pm to 5pm. I also organise social dances." Paula emphasised that Line dancing is not just a winter experience, it takes place all year round and that most places are air conditioned so the dancers stay cool in the summer.

As the dancers began to arrive during the evening, a group of law enforcement officers "invaded" the floor. Tina Brown, Kathy Lazenby, Gail Geary, Fiona Goddard, Chief Inspector Lesley Brown, PC Trevor Binks and Christine Bolt caused quite a stir. The Line dancing gang from Leeds were on holiday staying at the Sol Pelican Hotel, having a bit of fun dressing up. They are all dedicated dancers and I saw them several times struttin' their stuff at other Line dances during the week (minus their fancy dress of course)!

Another lively character I met at the Hotel Ambassador was 76-year-old Ron Carter from my hometown of Coalville, Leicestershire. Ron spends five months a year in Benidorm and has been returning for holidays for the last 14 years. "It's a great life here," he said "and there's Line dancing all over the place." Ron and his late wife were country music fans and members of the Lone Ranger Club in Coalville. Ron still goes to the Club and visits venues where Country music events are staged. He does Line dance but prefers the Western Line dance, which involves Couples dancing.

"Line dancing has changed so much since it first came over to the UK and to Benidorm. When I got to know it 16 years ago it was all country music. Personally I don't really like the modern music and feel that too many new dances are being introduced every month. They come and go and are quickly forgotten but the old dances still crop up and people can still do them."

Margaret Burton is a regular holidaymaker to Benidorm and through Line dancing met up and formed a lasting friendship with Richard Clode and his wife Margaret who also return to Benidorm year after year. They joined us at several Line dancing events. The couple are seasoned dancers and said that Line dancing makes their holiday. Margaret Clode attends classes back home three times a week and I don't think I have met someone who knew as many dances as her! Her feet never left the dance floor. When I hear Mariana Mambo I shall especially think of her.

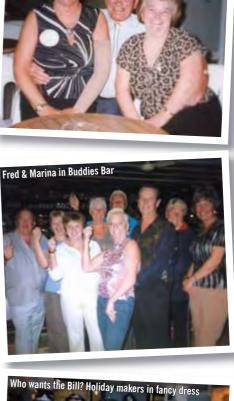
Next port of call was Buddies Bar where I met Marina and Fred Lyons. They have been married for 43 years and both are keen dancers. Marina is a talkative, bubbly lady with

lots of energy who puts charisma and expression into her dancing. She was born in Doncaster and at a very early age took up ballet and tap dancing. She was soon treading the boards taking part in pantomimes. In her early twenties Marina became interested in Ballroom and Latin American and has competed in numerous competitions. 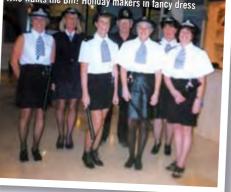

A

s some of you might realise by now, as much as I love Toronto in all other seasons the icy cold of the city's winter is not something I look forward to with much joy...

However, this winter my husband Michael and I had the good fortune to escape to the warm climate and tropical landscape of Southern California with some great Line dancing thrown into the pot. A little bit of heaven to be sure!

We left snow and below zero temperatures to land in Los Angeles to warmth, blue skies and palm trees. For those of you who have never been to LA, let me assure you that you could spend a long time here and still have things to see. Famous attractions include Disneyland, Universal Studios, Knott's Berry Farm and star-spotting in Hollywood but you should also visit the spectacular Getty Museum, walk along Venice Boardwalk and drive up Pacific Highway checking out the beautiful beach communities like glamorous Malibu where the stars hang their hats.

However, this visit we were heading off to the desert; to the verdant oasis of Palm Springs surrounded by the towering San Jacinto mountains. What an impressive and interesting place this is. You can hike the stark, rocky gorges and desert lands, which surprisingly are homes to fascinating plant and animal life. It was at the Fantasy Springs Casino that, after marching straight past the slot machines, I found a room full of enthusiastic Line and Couples dancers with their delightful and encouraging instructor Dottie Nelson. One of Dottie's students is the son of the owner of the casino. Bruce loves Line dancing and offered to donate a bicycle to a children's charity for every dance he learned and this past Christmas donated 46 bicycles. As soon as she heard that I taught, Dottie had me up on the stage teaching Fiddlesticks. What a friendly bunch of dancers they were and I certainly enjoyed myself. The next week I headed out to teach at the Agua Caliente Casino where Dottie also teaches. This is predominantly a beginners' class which takes place in the bar which overlooks the casino so the music merges with the jangle of the slot machines! Curious gamblers abandoned their machines to attempt this intriguing form of dance!

So now that I was warmed up, it was time to enjoy and teach at Gotta Dance in San Bernardino, Many of you will know of Doug and Jackie Miranda. They are talented choreographers and dancers and, organise a number of popular dance events. This was the second year for Gotta Dance and the star studded instructor list included Rachael McEnaney (UK). Barry and Dari-Ann Amato (Nashville), Bill Bader (Canada), Joanne Brady (Delaware), Mark Cosenza and Glen Pospieszny (Chicago) and Bob and Trish Boesel (Northern California). The event was held in the attractive Radisson Convention Center. Each hour, starting early Friday afternoon, there were two classes to choose from, however each dance taught was repeated during the weekend so no one would miss anything. I thought this was an excellent idea as well as the instructors' demos, which gave the dancers a preview of what was going to be taught. The excellent dance floors were courtesy of Doug who told me that, after having all sorts of problems with rented floors, he had made his own floors and kept them stored in his mother-in-law's three-car garage! Good job she doesn't drive ...

So on to the dancing. I was delighted to join Canadian legend Bill Bader and Grant Gadbois in their demo of Bill's *Canadian Stroll*, a beginner's dance that all can enjoy. Bill has written some excellent beginners' dances recently and always chooses good music. In her own fun-loving style, Joanne Brady also taught some beginners' dances including *Cajun Thang* by Jo and Rita Thompson. There was great Music and a catchy dance for *Cotton Fields* by Barry Amato and we had fun with Dari-Ann teaching *Bump, Bounce, Boogie. Poetry In Motion* by MIL taught by Rachael McEnaney, rather described Rachel's dancing I felt! Rachael used to fly in on almost a monthly basis, however at the time she didn't realise there was any Line dancing locally. She did wonder if the relationship might have continued if she had been able to dance as well on these visits.

Jackie taught her and Doug's lovely, flowing One Dream. It certainly would be a dream to dance like Jackie! I thoroughly enjoyed Mark Cosenza's No More Excuses, fun moves and foot tapping music. Chain Reaction by Glen Pospieszny was well received by the dancers while Trish Boesel did a good job of teaching Gotta Have Faith and dancers enjoyed Bob Boesel's Drops Of Jupiter. I had fun teaching as well and got a particularly nice response to Fiddlesticks and Wishes. In all, 27 dances were taught with an excellent selection for all tastes and levels. What friendly dancers there were at this event from all over California, Arizona, Oregon and from as far away as the north eastern US. They made me feel verv welcome.

The hotel's Saturday evening meal was excellent with plenty to go around as people went up for seconds and thirds. The evening show started off with unsuspecting 'volunteers' co-opted by Doug for the balloon game .... words cannot describe this adequately; you had to be there! We were then thrilled by Rachel's dance performance and delighted as always by Jackie's graceful moves. We enjoyed a duet by the Amatos. What a fabulous performance.

It was then, of course, time for the dancers to take over the floor. I really enjoyed Doug's stint as MC as he kept us all laughing and he was also an excellent DJ. He seemed to be constantly aware of the floor and made every attempt to ensure that we all got a chance to dance. When dances came on the floor that had been taught during the day, he handed the instructor the microphone so they could call it. That way no time was wasted with any more instruction and it gave the dancers a fighting chance to recall the steps! I thought that worked out very well.

All in all, it was an excellent, well-organised event. Doug and Jackie were wonderful hosts; welcoming, friendly and sensitive to the needs of the dancers. As well as organising other events in California and Hawaii, Doug and Jackie will now be holding events in Las Vegas. You can shuffle and vine your way between the slots and the dance floor!

But that wasn't the end of my dancing. The next week I headed off to an RV (Recreational Vehicle) camp, venturing across the mountains to the outskirts of the small town of Hemmit. A special workshop had been arranged by Paul and Karla Dornstedt with Bill Bader teaching and Bill had suggested that I come along and teach *Fiddlesticks*. The hall

in the camp was large and bright with an excellent dance floor and was packed with dancers who had come from all around the area. They were obviously loyal fans of Bill's who loved his dances and appreciated his friendly manner and experienced teaching.

I knew that there are many RV sites all over the US but I hadn't realised that there is a large permanent RV community of Line dancers. Paul and Karla told me that when they retired, their plan had been to travel until they found a spot they would like to live in permanently. However, that was ten years ago and they are still travelling..following the weather and the dancing! For the last seven years they, together with 15 other RV dancers, have spent the summer in Canada travelling 75 miles from their site each Monday to attend Bill's class.

The RV communities have Line dance 'rallies' across the country which consist of five days of dancing and partying and they travel from one event to another. I guess you would call them modern day wanderers. What an interesting life they lead! Many of them attended a weekend event in Palm Springs in February organised by Russ and Gloria Gunn. I could only go to the dance but saw many familiar faces there. I was told that some had their RVs parked in the parking lot. Not far to go for a rest if your feet got sore...

It was at this dance that I met 70 year old Ruth from Vancouver who had driven two days solidly from 3 in the morning to 6 in the evening on her own to attend the event and was returning as soon as it finished! Normally she and her husband winter in Palm Springs but because of illness he wasn't able to make the trip. However, Ruth wasn't going to miss it. I think she has to get the prize for the most dedicated Line dancer I have come across! Can anyone beat that?

My next visit was to Pasadena and what a lovely little town with a quaint high street. Well-known instructor Gene Morrill's class was in the community centre just off the high street. Gene is an energetic, enthusiastic instructor who has been teaching for 13 years. Gene's dancers were obviously very fond of him and I found out that he is also a matchmaker! I was introduced to a young couple, Maggie and Wang, who met dancing with Gene and subsequently asked him to give away the bride.

Not far from Long Beach, Lou Ann Schemmel's advanced class meets in a dance centre on a Wednesday night. Lou Ann is known for teaching the latest hot dances from the workshops. I was rather nervous about teaching at a class like this but I was pleased to find out that, although it is indeed a demanding class, Lou Ann taught in an experienced, relaxed, low key manner and obviously enjoyed herself as much her dancers.

Talented young choreographer/ instructor, Bracken Ellis, had just come back from Boston when I taught at her class near San Diego. She showed us her lovely waltz which came first in the phrased section of the choreography competition there. It is great to see young people capably taking on the responsibility for dance classes.

My last teaching engagement was the Tuesday evening session of the San Diego N/Line Dancers run by friendly and welcoming Shirley King and Carol Roland. What a great class. Held in a large hall upstairs in a Legion called Padre Gold, it was packed with enthusiastic dancers obviously enjoying themselves. Shirley spends the first hour of the evening playing golden oldies that fill the floor. Aside from the teaching, during the rest of the evening she intersperses the latest hits with ongoing floor fillers - obviously a winning formula as fairly new dancers mixed happily with more advanced dancers indicating the non-intimidating atmosphere that Shirley and Carol aspire to. It was a lot of fun to teach this responsive crowd of dancers.

All too soon it was time to leave but I was happy with the knowledge that Line dancing is alive and well in Southern California. So when the chill of next winter starts to bear down on you, pack your suitcase with your dancing shoes and come 'California dreamin'. You won't regret it!

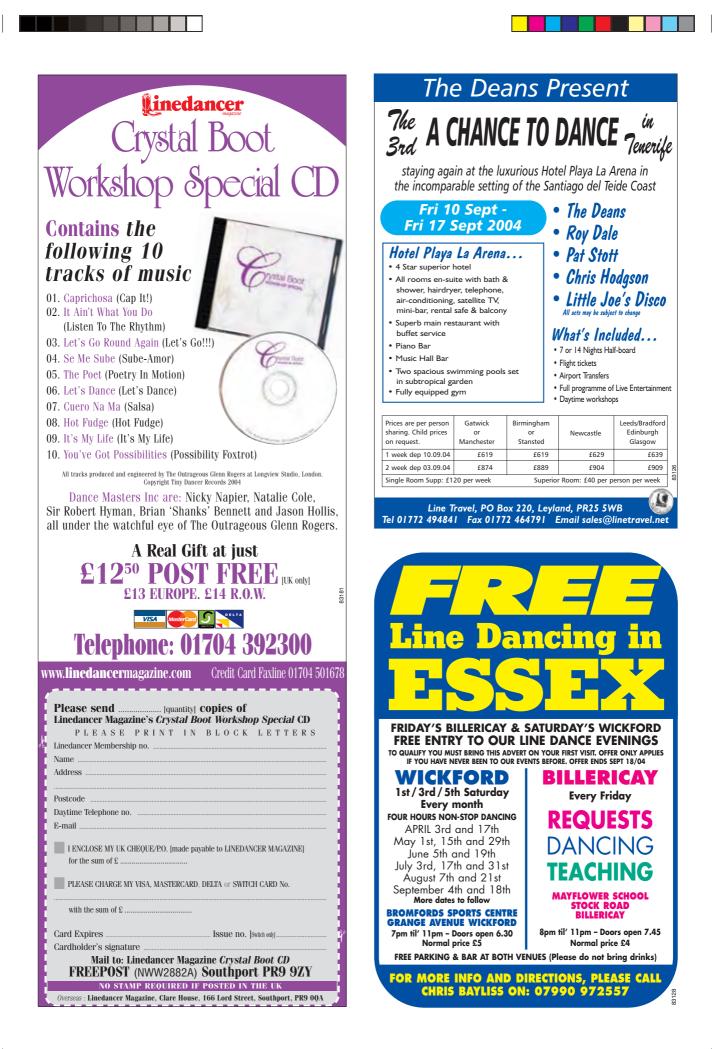

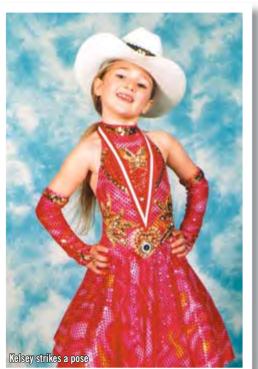

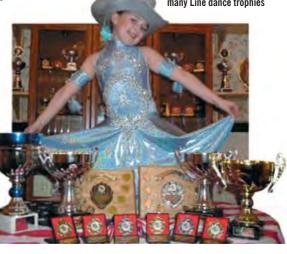

# The real **Marcel Boy**

#### Hard-working Jason on brink of world stardom

here has Jason Mc-Coy been hiding? The Canadian singersongwriter has been building up a cult following across the Atlantic but is now ready to burst into

the international big-time with his fantastic new album.

*Sins, Lies and Angels* is an amazing record. There's not one song on it that you won't enjoy. Although he has a thoroughly modern sound, Jason's song-writing skills and delivery is rooted firmly in tradition. He is that rare beast, a country act with something for everyone.



Jason, 33, was born in the tiny town of Minesing in Ontario and grew up listening to his father's huge country music collection. Although he liked rock and roll as a young man - and even played it for a while - his heart was always country.

Jason's heroes are singer/song writers like Merle Haggard and George Jones. Even as a youngster he would turn to the back of the albums he liked to see who the songwriter was. He got his break aged16 after winning a talent contest and recorded an album in Nashville. Even though he has decided the result of that venture is best left gathering dust in his attic, his eponymous 1995 debut album yielded three country number ones. The follow-up produced two top-10 hits, while the 2000 release Honky Tonk Sonatas scored four successes.

Jason's style of country meanders on the traditional and new country dividing line, but he notes that the current debate about new versus traditional country music has been around forever. He remembers heated arguments about the music of traditional country singers like Merle Haggard versus the talents of 'newcomers' such as Kenny Rogers and Dolly Parton.

Jason's career has taken him all over the world. He will shortly be heading to Nashville, where he and wife Terrine keep an apartment, before braving the troubles in Iraq for a concert entertaining US troops. He claims to have two left feet, but is genuinely delighted to learn that people in Britain are beginning to dance to his music and says he would love to tour the UK – especially as his mother was a member of the Campbell Clan from the Isle of Islay.

Asked what his greatest achievement has been, Jason says "staying in the country music industry for so long and staying with the same girl for 15 years!". He admits there have been low points when he considered quitting and following his father and sister, who both work as pilots (Jason at the age of 17 was the youngest licensed pilot in Canada). But although the skies have lost a good pilot, Jason McCoy's star is beginning to soar.

Linsey Carpenter has been teaching the South Coast to Line dance for over eight years and with her philosophy of making every single lesson as much fun as possible and looking after and nurturing beginners, her classes are more popular now then ever...

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t all started nine years ago when Linsey began attending a local Line dance class herself. Unfortunately, the instructors at the time moved on, took all the CDs and equipment with them and the class disbanded. A hardcore of about a dozen dancers still wanted to Line dance but had no teacher and nowhere to dance.

After some frantic phone calls a venue was found and with the use of a borrowed portable CD player, Linsey started teaching at her own club in a village football club's hall in the middle of nowhere, but it was a start and The Undefeated Linedance Club was born. Now the same club eight years on boasts a membership of well over 100 members and regularly hosts live events and well attended socials.

A lot of things happened since then. Linsey took her dance teaching exams through the BWDA and went on to become fully qualified. She saved up to invest in a high quality PA and radio-mic system, so that the dancers could enjoy their lessons more. She has opened two other local clubs, all with dedicated beginners' sessions. Linsey was then headhunted by Colin Norton the manager of The Viking CWDC in Selsey, West Sussex. "I wanted the best for my club. Linsey is the best in my opinion and every session is full of fun, laughter and great dances. She's so good, I've retained her for the fourth year running. Something that has never been done before."

But what makes her classes and clubs so popular? One thing is Linsey's attitude and belief in life. "Teaching people to Line dance

is not only about the dancing. It's about people enjoying themselves and socialising with other people." Linsey continues, "Right from the first time I took the stage for my first teach. I realised it was more than just about the dance. It was about the complete experience of a night out. That's why I take a lot of time in choosing which dance to teach at which club. The music and the dance have to be right to create the atmosphere for all four of the clubs where I teach. Each club has a different clientele and dancers of different abilities. It is very important to teach what the dancer will like and not what I like." Along with her DJ partner Andy, Linsey has been running The Undefeated Linedance Club as a non-profit making club with a very professional approach. This has helped in being able to host monthly live music nights with the best in live entertainment.

Linsey and Andy have just started their fourth straight year at The Viking CWDC where they provide two totally free Line dance sessions every weekend between March and October.

"Teaching at one of the most popular Line dance venues in the country is very satisfying and totally different from my regular clubs. Sessions are open to both local people and holidaymakers. They are FREE for everyone and there is also plenty of time to dance to requests. There is a hardcore local base that attends every week, but teaching the holidaymakers and club members is what I really enjoy. No matter what their standard, it is so satisfying looking at their faces when they "get" their first dance! That look is priceless." Linsey always carries the latest edition of Linedancer so she can inform the newly converted holidaymakers where they can dance closer to their own home.

Line dancing has also helped Linsey become half the woman she was. Using Line dancing as her form of exercise, Linsey developed her own diet. We all know how rude it is to ask a pretty lady her weight, but it's safe to say that for each year Linsey has taught at The Viking, she has shed at least a stone in weight!

Linsey is a shining star on the south coast and if you want to catch her at one of her clubs here are the details:





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If you have been flapping your arms about, cruising around the local Line dancing class doing Alan Birchall's Wave on Wave then you know already that Pat Green the 30–year old–musician who penned the song is seriously `good news' for dancers

at is about to embark on his first European tour, including dates in the UK this May. *Wave on Wave*, the album is released on April 5. If you have already fallen in love with the single, you will not be disappointed

with the rest of the 12 tracks. Pat is proud to call himself a Texan. So proud in fact, that he freely admits, "I'm the hardest part of it to move!" Moving may have taken some persuading, but he's eventually agreed to hit the road with his band, as he emerges butterfly– like from the chrysalis of brand new talent about to bask in the sunniest spotlight!

Unconstrained, unashamed, the guitar slayer from the Lone Star State is about to stop waving merely to the fans at Austin and move on up from being the most popular country artiste nobody has heard of to one whose name will be on everyone's lips.

The plain speaking, honest to goodness Texan spoke to me from his Los Angeles Studio, during a break in recording. The first thing I asked him was - did he know about the success of Wave on Wave - the dance? Whatever the American equivalent of 'gob-smacked' is - Pat was. "They've been dancing a whole dance? To us? That's absolutely amazing!" Immediately he laughed. "You know, that's really kind of funny because starting out, like ten years ago when it was much more brash and it was the 'fad', we used to say - 'no Line dancers'! But since then things have changed a lot! And if people wanna dance to the music – I've had a change of heart. I'd rather people listened to the music. That's kind of the point, isn't it? I guess the message is listen with your ears - not just your feet!



If you really believe in a song that you've written it comes across on stage and that's what makes people come up to see the show Pat admits that he loves dancing. "I dance with my wife all the time. I don't do a lot of line dancing, just because I've had the same girl for a long time, you know. So we do slow dancing. I love to dance for several reasons!"

Green and his gang of groovers started off attracting a young College audience always ready to party. Has he made a conscious effort to tone down his wild side? "No, absolutely not!" he laughed out loud. "My wife has made a conscious effort for me. But you know... I am 30 years old, and I think I am going backwards!"

Lyrics of his self-penned songs are fabulous. Very earthy, real and relatable. He gets great satisfaction from them.

"Absolutely, writing is the most important part for me. The creative aspect is what really sort of gives you your wings to fly. It gives you confidence. If you really believe in a song that you've written it comes across on stage and that's what makes people come up to see the show, that's what makes people go out and buy the records, it's not just because they hear songs that are mass produced. It's much more than that. It's a combination with the music and the lyrics and how it stirs you emotionally. That's the reason why we do it."

Country or not Pat believes it's the writers' responsibility to tell the truth. "What I do know about writing is one thing my dad taught me. That if you're always straightforward and honest with your writing people will know it. If you're writing about something that's not in your heart, that you haven't experienced or it isn't part of your curiosity, then people are gonna know it. Because that's the X factor in songs. The connection." Coming over to the UK for the first time, "With a guitar!" is something he is



looking forward to. "My parents have been there, lots of times when we were kids. I've really loved the UK for a long time. I love the history, I love the whole package, you know! The attitude, everything about it!" One of his studio engineers is English, he tells me.

Pat Green's band have been backing the boy from the backwoods for a long time! "Everybody who has ever come into the band is still here with the exception of one. They're a very consistent group, they're great guys, and we think creatively as a whole, which is very special." Wanting to be a musician was a fever that took hold and never let go. "I guess when I started I was just engaged by being on stage and the energy that, whether you like it or not, is there, you know. And I think you can do one of two things - you can either run like hell from it, or you can embrace it. Well - I just fell in love with it. I was doing other people's songs and just kind of getting my feet wet as far as playing guitar and singing in front of people but the more it was going on I couldn't help but really want to make the whole rig!'

He's chuffed to have been born and raised a Texan. "Obviously you know about the Texas Bravado, and the way that Texans are and all that, but really it's much more important! It's where I was raised, and where I'm comfortable with the people, and that's where I still live! We're all very comfortable in the locality we grew up in." Wife of four years, Kori met Pat eight years ago at College. They have just produced their first mini-Green – four month old Kellis.

"To have musical independence and control is, Probably one or two on the list of what you need to be successful. That's why it took so long! It's very important to me, with the music that I create, that from every angle, from every level, it's right. If I don't have control in the studio, I lose control of the rest of it as well .. so the studio's the most important."

"The secret of country music's longevity is the honesty that comes across. You know with pop music you can suggest whatever you want to put behind the meaning of the words. I write with a sense of .. hope. I write for everybody. All genres. I don't know if you'd call it Country music. I think that's what they called it just so they knew where to put my records to sell them! I don't wear a big cowboy hat and I don't drive a 4 x 4 and I wear bands! I just go out and play the music and whether or not you call it Country, or you call it whatever - I just put it out there. And whether you wanna sing to it, or dance to it - that's fine. I'm a very accepting soul, when it comes to how anyone wants to enjoy music! I mean I love rock and roll too, whenever I'm listening to it. And whoever the listener is - hey - I'm sure they wear many hats, you know?"

He agrees Country is as relevant as it's always been. There's a real good reason, too. "Just because it's the heart of our music. It's the Music of the Common Man, for lack of a better way to put it! It really is, you know the guy who's out there busting his butt working in the field or working in a factory or whatever. That's really who it spoke to a long time ago and it's still the same today. I think County music became a huge part of the culture."

Young Texans have taken him to their hearts. Why? "Probably because I've got a young soul!" he laughs. "I'm boisterous and maybe too hot at times, but that's the way it is and you know, I don't fight it. There's certainly a great many people who are past the forty year mark, and they wanna go back – you know? Live vicariously through me. Well, I'm quite happy to be that vehicle as well."

Music is one way for young Americans to get in touch with their heritage – but not the only way. "You can do that by hanging out with your grandfather. And listening. And by paying attention to the world as it goes by. I think that country music is good at doing that. I think if you want to think about America, if you're trying to figure it out the way it was, listen to old music. But old music – you know, rock and roll – is just Country!

"There's an awful lot of stars, like The Eagles, and people go around thinking they were one of the greatest rock and roll bands, but essentially that was Country! So things have changed a lot regarding the dividing lines between rock and country, but good music is good music. Whatever kind of music it is. If it's good – everybody knows it."

He has been hailed as the Leader of the New Texas Music Scene. What does that mean? "It means a lot of eyes watching me!" He howls with laughter. "To see if I screw it up!"

I've heard tell he's 'nothing to do with Nashville', is it true? "You know, I have plenty to do with Nashville! I think it's gotten through the lines that I have a disdain for Nashville. But I really don't. You know there's a soft under-belly or dark side to every business. And Nashville gets a bad rap for that. Because they get the picture that record label moguls are monsters! But they have been really great to me. They've opened up the wall, and let an outsider in. So, the guys in Nashville are promoting my records to radio. They've been quite kind to me. It's like a lot of industries. There's good and bad people in it - not all in Nashville!"

He has been called 'A Country Music Maverick', would he agree with that? "I've been called a what? A maverick?" I tried one more time trying to get through the gales of laughter, "Oh – you've got to say it with a southern drawl!" he insisted. "OK – Maaverrick! Alright! Sure – I have to live with that. You know it's better than being a country music sleeper!" He laughs again. "Yeah, I'm wild and I definitely leave a wake behind me, – if I've been there."

"When they play gigs like Billy Bobs, the audience dance a lot. Oh for sure – yeah! They're out there!" he laughs again. The energy of performing never ceases to give him a buzz. "I'm an adrenaline junkie! I can watch people dance or anything. To see people enjoy their life because of something you do for a living's like a kick in the pants, you know. It's the coolest!" He's thrilled that people are calling him at the studios from across the pond to talk about what I do for a living – "that's the greatest!" He says.

Pat Green is on his way at last and although it's only the beginning already he's figured out how he'd like to be remembered, "I guess if you wanted to do my tombstone," he says philosophically. "You could say – loved his wife, loved his child, loved his kids, left behind a lot of happy people."

Amen to that!

Pat Green will play Lock 17 (formerly Dingwalls) in Camden Lock, London, on May 5; The Olympia in Dublin on May 6; The Arches, Glasgow on May 7.

# TRACY LAWRENCE

Strong DREAMWORKS DRMF 14209-2

racy Lawrence is described as being one of the premier voices of his generation. His music has been used by both line and couples dancers over the years, especially his waltzes like, "Alibis", "Stars Over Texas" and "I See It Now". Tracy has had a colourful life; being shot several times when he first arrived in Nashville, and had well documented drink and substance abuse problems. However his life is back on track, with a beautiful wife and two kids, and a new record deal with DreamWorks.

Its All How You Look At It (114bpm) opens the album and what a cracker it is! Best described as funky country, this song shows that Tracy is as good as ever. This song is a major contender to be a dance hit.

*Strong* (98bpm) is a good steady track, a cha cha, with good backing from the line up of some of Nashville's finest musicians. The song is an anthem for single moms, and is another good dance track.

*Stones* (68bpm) slows the pace to nightclub two level, and Tracy describes this song as being "the meat and potatoes of the record, about life, the hardcore country stuff I like".

Paint Me A Birmingham (66bpm) is a nightclub two step, and this is one of those songs that come along every now and again, that really moves you. I once heard country songs are like a three minute movie, and this one is a perfect example. Tracy is superb with material like this, it's moving, it's gorgeous, and I really hope that someone writes a dance to it soon.

*On Everywhere But Hollywood* (94bpm) the pace is lifted again. Who says there aren't enough good country songs to dance to?

Bobby Darwin's Daughter (90bpm) is in the James Taylor mould. It's a song about a guy who doesn't appreciate what he's got at home, and then something happens to wake him up to what he's got.

What The Flames Feel Like (100bpm) is a country rocker that Tracy describes as "pushing the boundaries of the country music genre". Yet another with strong possibilities for the dance floor.

Sawdust On Her Halo (132bpm) has a gospel flavour at the beginning but then turns into pure Brooks & Dunn, kickin' country! One of the best dance prospects that I've heard for some time.

Finally we have *The Questionnaire* (75bpm), which is a moving song, about which Tracy says, "Is like reading a book that you're absorbed in, you can't put it down". The orchestral backing is superb, and when you don't expect it, the song finishes with an awesome guitar solo. Glorious!

Tracy Lawrence is right back to his very best with this brilliant album, "Strong". It shows that there is plenty of good country music to dance to and if you are a choreographer, dip your bread! If you don't buy another country album this year, you simply must buy this fantastic album.

# JAMES OTTO Days Of Our Lives

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ames Otto was born on an army camp in Washington State. He has been singing since he was four and his parents realised he was a naturally gifted musician. He played violin briefly, then saxophone for five years, and then moved onto guitar when he was thirteen. He moved to Nashville in 1998 and eventually he got a record deal with Mercury. In 2003 he was asked to support Shania Twain on tour.

Kicking off with *Long Way Down* (136bpm) you immediately get the feeling that you are about to hear something special with this album. James sites his influences as Bob Seger, The Allmans, James Taylor, Hank Williams and the like, and as you listen to this danceable track you can hear shades of them all.

*Gone* (81bpm) reminds me of Craig Morgan's "Almost home", it's a good song and a good dance track.

Misspent Youth (106bpm) is one of half a dozen songs on the album that James had a hand in writing. It's a nice smooth song lamenting the story of a misspent youth.

Sunday Morning And Saturday Nlight (87bpm) has a west coast rock feel to it, and would have been right at home on Joe Cocker's Mad Dog's and Englishmen album. Awesome!

Song Of The Violin (160bpm) is a song that James' grandmother asked him to write for her, and the

orchestral strings on the backing are wonderful. This fast waltz might make a good alternative for Sundown or Midnight waltzes.

*She Knows* (80bpm) is a slowish song as is *The Ball* (64bpm) a wonderful song that will have you hanging on to every word.

The title track *Days Of Our Lives* (150bpm) is another fast waltz, and this song catapulted James to the fore in America. This beautiful track will surely have a dance written to it soon.

The Last Thing I Do (128bpm) is a superb dance track co-written by David Lee Murphy and with Bekka Bramlett (Bekka & Billy) providing powerful harmony vocals, this powerful song is just crying out for a good dance to be written to it.

Lowdown On The Highlife (99bpm) is yet another waltz track, but this one is more traditionally country, and again another that will be danced to.

Finally we have *Never Say Goodbye* (68bpm), which sounds like the Counting Crows, and it's a great way to close the album. The Hammond organ, the lead guitar, and the powerful gospel-like harmonies enhance this awesome track.

What you have with the debut from James Otto is an album with lots of dance tracks to suit all preferences, and I am sure we will be dancing to some of them soon.

e all have our favourites in music, and I have to confess that Lorrie Morgan is my absolute favourite female country singer. I fell in love with her music back in the early nineties watching CMT Europe, and had the pleasure of see her live in Nashville back in 1996. Lorrie has learned some invaluable lessons in the "school of life" which translates into her music, and this classy lady has had some monumental hits over the years. Now with her new label Image, Lorrie releases Show Me How.

To whet your appetite we open with *Do You Still Wanna Buy Me That Drink (Frank)* (97bpm) an up-tempo number chronicling the story of a single mom in a bar being offered a drink by a guy, and her telling him of her life with two kids. A great start, setting the scene for the rest of the album, and I am sure that someone will write a good dance to this track.

Used (64bpm) is a beautiful song, the type that Lorrie excels on, and using a soulful approach to the tender lyrics, almost imploring you to listen to every word. The song was co-written by Bekka (Patient Heart) Bramlett who also sings backing vocals on much of the album.

Bombshell (120bpm) is a sassy little number with some clever lyrics "Yeah it used to be fun layin' in the sun in that little bikini of mine, but now my idea of letting it all hang out, sure has changed with time!" Lynn Gannon has already been inspired to write a dance Bombshell, which is 48counts. 4walls. and intermediate.

I Can Count On You (74bpm) is a stunning song, a nightclub two step. When I saw Lorrie perform it earlier this year she said it was the best song she has ever recorded! Not much I can add to that

Collar black is a country music legend. This Texas native has consistently produced high quality albums for over a decade. He has a long time song-writing partner, Hayden Nicholas who co-wrote several of the songs with Clint on the album, which is the first release on Clint's own new Equity label.

Spend My Time (68bpm) opens the album and this was a successful single in the States. This smooth song highlights the awesome talent that is Clint Black. Damn fine country music!

We All Fall Down (74bpm) showcases Clint's amazing prowess on the Harmonica. This funky, danceable track has elements of the Blues to it, and it is just waiting for a good dance to be written to it.

*She's Leavin'* (74bpm) is a nightclub two step, this time enhanced with beautiful harmonies from country star Lisa Cochran. I love this song and I'm sure that you will too.

*Everything I Need* (90/180bpm) The pace is lifted considerably with this hot two step. A superb country dance track to delight both line and couples dancers.

Whatever Happened (82bpm) is a steady cha with some really nice lyrics "Whatever happened to

except to say that this is Lorrie at her finest. Cowritten by Angela Kasset (Something In Red) and with just John Jarvis on piano for accompaniment, it is one of those songs that will have you reaching for the repeat button.

The title track *Show Me How* (103bpm) has a contemporary feel to it, and it would be at home in the mainstream charts. With the great guitar backing, and Susan (Closer) Ashton on harmonies, I see no reason why someone can't write a nice little dance to it.

Us Girls (99bpm) is another of Angela Kasset's contributions, and is one of those "ladies anthems" in the mould of Martina's "This One's For The Girls". This song, as with many of the others, shows that Lorrie certainly moves with the times.

One Less Monkey (99bpm) And now for something completely different! This is Lorrie being funky. There is some awesome backing here, cool guitars, funky horns, and some strong backing vocals from Bekka and friends, and it's sure to have us all dancing soon. Go Lorrie, go!

Charlie And Betty (121bpm) is a rarity in that it is Lorrie's self-penned song. With harmonies from Alison Krauss and Rhonda Vincent and some good country pickin', this song is very easy on the ears, and as it's a cha cha we could very well be dancing to it soon.

I had the pleasure of seeing Lorrie at the Opry earlier this year singing a couple of these songs, and she is looking and sounding as good as ever. She can be very proud of this awesome album, which will have widespread appeal; I highly recommend it to you.

the change of seasons, whatever happened to all my reasons, to open up my heart and let it be.......Whatever happened to me". Again I am sure that someone could be tempted to choreograph to this song.

The Boogie Man (122bpm) is an awesome west coast swinger, and is without doubt the best dance track on the album. If this doesn't have choreographers fighting over it then I'll eat my Stetson! This will be a massive dance hit!

Someone Else's Tears (70bpm) and Haywire (69bpm) are two tracks at slower paces, the latter being an "edgy" song knocking the Internet!

The last song on the album *A Lover's Clown* (74bpm) is a moving song that Clint wrote with Steve Warriner, and is delivered in Clint's inimitable heart rending vocal style. A fine way to close a fine album.

Spend My Time is not an album full of rocking country dance tracks, however their is a good selection of differing dance styles to suit many tastes. It is however an album for those who appreciate country music at its finest. Worth the price for "The Boogie Man" alone, this is an album that will give you many hours of pleasure whether listening or dancing, and you should order yourself a copy today! LORRIE MORGAN

Many people have cable A current hot topic is the debate about the number of new dances being choreographed, which seems to be at an all time high. There has been much debate in our BTL pages as well as on the Internet. Many instructors feel that they are pressurised into teaching too many new dances, and many find it too hard to keep up with, and very often there is a big cost in buying all the music for the latest, hottest dances.

and satellite television and they are able to see new songs weeks before they are released. Then there is the rush for writing dances to certain artists, for instance Enrique or even Liberty X, whose music has been successful in Line dancing. Some think that if they churn dances out to these artists' tracks, they will have an instant hit! There are of course choreographers who make their living from Line dancing, and as they are constantly on tour they need to keep producing dances, but then we have always had those people on the scene. Maybe the number is growing...

Consider this: if there was a way of stifling people's inspiration to write dances, then we may not have discovered the amazing talents of the many choreographers. We might even have been deprived of some of the great dances that we have all enjoyed over the last couple of years.

Teachers, please don't feel pressured into teaching too many dances; you will lose customers very quickly. You don't have to believe the hype about any dance – just go with your instincts. You know your market; what your class will like. To all the 'would be' choreographers, keep writing those dances because you never know when you will come up with the next Dance of the Year! Could everyone remember that in life you always have the choice to do or not do something and that includes Line dances. Variety is the spice of life and it is variety that will keep us all happily dancing for many years to come. Trust me!

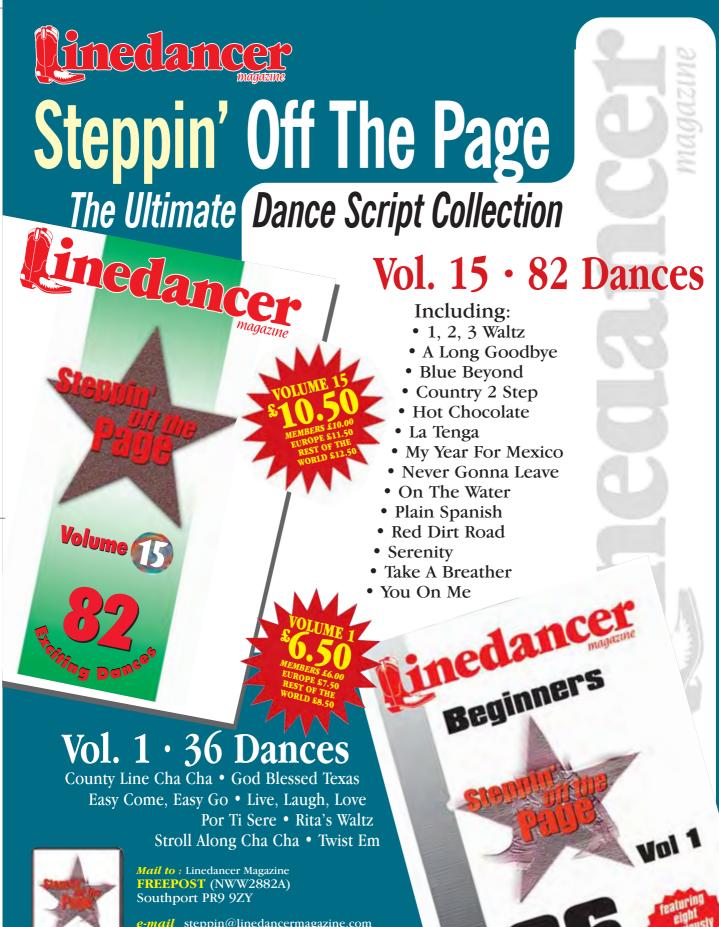

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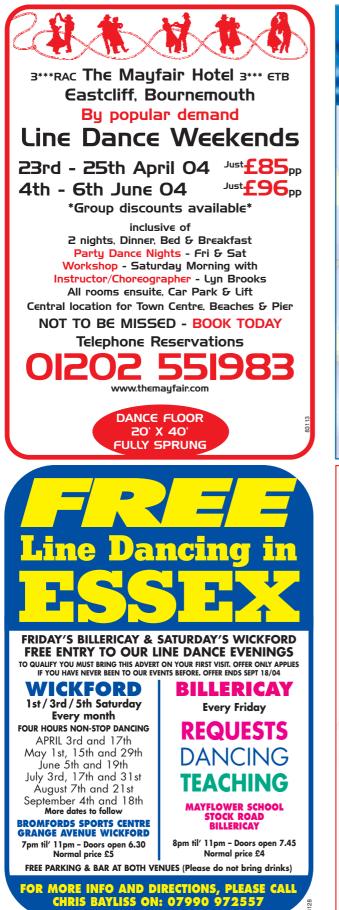

Your recent interview with Rob Fowler, and in particular the reference to varying the music for beginners, could have been written about one of our local instructors, Chris Bayliss of CBs Line Dancing who has been doing this for a number of years.

The origins are from his social evenings (on the first, third and fifth Saturdays of the Month). He wanted a way for beginners and intermediates to dance all evening without the experienced dancers becoming bored.

The answer was to split the floor into two (or sometimes three) dances for each piece of music. Everyone can dance if they wish and it isn't unusual for an experienced dancer to take a break by dancing an alternative.

The idea of various music tracks is introduced in the classes during the week. There, beginners may dance a new dance to three different tracks of increasing tempo. Where the halls allow, he will also introduce the split floor as the classes change from beginners to intermediates with all dancers on the floor.

On a separate issue, Chris has the ability to call ahead. This makes learning a new dance much easier. "Hear my voice, it tells you what to do next" is one of his mottoes - I can vouch that it works. After missing several classes, I once danced five new dances (new to me anyway) in an hour to a reasonable level and, believe me I am no dancer.

# Dance Clinic By Sho Botham MA Menopause

A line dance teacher telephoned me recently to ask if I was aware of any other teachers suffering from the embarrassment and reduced confidence due to the type of memory loss and forgetfulness connected with the menopause. She was particularly concerned about instances where despite thoroughly preparing a new dance, she finds herself panicking, convinced that she will not be able to remember the dance when she starts to teach it. This loss of confidence can be so strong that she has on some occasions, decided not to teach the dance at that time rather than risk making a mess of it.

# **BLANKING**

Her other main concern was 'blanking' which of course, we all experience at some time. You know the sort of thing. You are dancing a dance you know well when all of a sudden you have a momentary lapse of concentration. The mind goes blank, your feet get in a muddle and you smile to cover up the fact that you really feel a bit of an idiot. 'Blanking' connected to the menopause happens much more frequently than the occasional 'blanking' that can be attributed to things such as a busy day, overwork, things on your mind. When 'blanking' happens often and you regularly seem to be looking for words that have disappeared into the black hole of where lost words go, or you keep finding yourself up stairs and you can't remember what you went up there for, it can be very frustrating.

# **KEEP A SENSE OF HUMOR**

As with lots of menopause symptoms there is no magic cure although there are some things that all women can do to help minimise any negative effects.

The first thing is to realise that having 'menopausal memory moments' does not mean that your intelligence is reduced. With the current culture of openness, it is much easier to admit to having a 'menopause moment' than previous generations could. Many dance teachers now feel able to admit to having 'blanked' when teaching, in a way that would not have possible in the past. Keeping a sense of humour can help to reduce tension and give a bit of breathing space. This is not an excuse, of course, for poor preparation where the 'blanking' is due to not knowing the dance well enough in the first place.

# **HAVE SOME OPTIONS**

Teachers who find themselves panicking about teaching a new dance may want to delay it until next time or if it is important to teach it at that particular time, may want to be open with the class and explain how they feel about teaching the new dance. They may want to try something practical such as writing bullet points on a sheet of paper as a memory trigger to refer to if necessary. Sometimes having a trigger like this is enough in itself to boost the confidence and it may not actually need to be used. It is always important to prepare well so that you can be confident that you have done your homework.

# DIET

The menopause affects some women more than others. Our diet, exercise and lifestyles all play a part in the way the menopause affects us. Eating a well balanced diet that provides your body with the nutrients it needs is vital. In countries like Japan, where plant oestrogens are an important part of the diet, women do not experience anything like the level of menopause difficulties that western women do. Because of this there is growing belief that women can benefit from including phyto-oestrogens in their diet. Foods rich in phyto-oestrogens include beans, pulses, soya-based products, bananas, apples and green, leafy vegetables. There are lots of books available with recipes for boosting intake of foods recognised to help with menopause symptoms. One such recipe, for 'HRT cake', that appeared in a magazine a few years ago was tried by some of my Line dancers as well as women attending my Women-to-Women workshops and very yummy it was too.

# **EXERCISE**

Keeping activity levels up to the recommended 30 minutes of moderate exercise at least five days per week offers lots of health benefits and can improve your well-being generally. Your Line dancing contributes to your weekly amount of physical activity. But remember that one long session such as an all day event, will not provide the same health benefits as five 30 minute sessions of physical activity spread over the week.

# HORMONES

During menopause, levels of the hormones oestrogen and progesterone reduce and this can cause problem symptoms. It is also worth bearing in mind that some symptoms attributed to the menopause are in fact caused by something else, for example, an under-active thyroid. If you have a thyroid disorder, you should not overdo soya-based foods. Check with your doctor to make sure that the symptoms you are experiencing really are menopause related and not something else in need of medical treatment or advice.

# RELAXATION

Finally, practising relaxation skills and/or breathing techniques has been found to help with a number of menopause related symptoms including stress, hot flushes, irritability and sleeping difficulties.

As I said earlier, there is no magic cure for 'menopause memory moments' but hopefully I have given you a few ideas that might help.
